



# Editorial

AN CAN EXPRESS HIS RELATIONSHIP TO GOD BY MEANS OF words, and Christ used human words to express God's requirement of man: 'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart etc.'. Admittedly there are differences between love for a fellow human being and love for God. But human words are the only ones we have to express our thoughts and, in spite of limitations, they do convey ideas. What we know of human love can tell us some things about what our love for God ought to be.

When a man falls in love with a woman, he becomes obsessed with her and cannot get her our of his mind. Everything he sees reminds him of her and he consciously relates everything to her. Although we say we love God, few of us have this kind of obsession. Though some of the saints, if their biographers can be believed, did have this consciousness of God, for most Christians it is at best a very short

phase, perhaps almost momentary.

However, love grows and at a deeper level it is expressed in other ways. The married man is not consciously thinking of his wife all the time. In fact his very love for his wife makes him give his mind to other things but always for her sake. It is frequently true that the prime motive that drives a man to concentrate on his work is his love for his wife. There is a parallel in this with the Christian's love for God. Though not consciously thinking of God, he does what he does for the sake of God. He often says he makes his work his prayer. He is expressing his love for God by doing what God wants him to do at that time.

But if a man says he loves his wife and concentrates on his work to the exclusion of all thought of her, his love is naturally enough suspect. We expect him to think specifically of her at certain times and express his thoughts. Likewise a man who claims to love God must also think of Him at specific times and express his

thoughts. If he does not his love is suspect.

The normal way in which a man addresses himself to God is in prayer. Pope Paul VI was reported recently as saying that Catholic's don't pray as much as they used to. Is this equivalent to saying that they don't love God as much as they used to—that they are forgetting the first commandment given us by Christ? The idea is worth examining.

At the outset a man may address his lady in fairly formal language. But as the couple grow in intimacy he does not need this prop. His very love suggests the sentiments and the best way of expressing them. He is not saying one thing and thinking another. He is conscious of the person to whom he is addressing himself.

With prayer a man is mindful of the God to whom he is speaking.

When John XXIII opened the Second Vatican Council he emphasised the need for personal, individual renovation. This is the condition without which updating is useless. The use that Christians make of prayer is, as well as being a community

matter, also an important personal affair.

In the epistle to the Hebrews we read of Christ's practice of prayer, which should serve as an example for us, "During this life on earth, he offered up prayer and entreaty, aloud and in silent tears, to the one who had the power to save Him from death, and he submitted so humbly that His prayer was heard." (Heb. 5:7)

# Annual Report

Very Reverend and Reverend Fathers, Ladies, Gentlemen and Boys.

It is my pleasant duty to welcome you all here tonight and to present to you the eleventh annual report of Francis Douglas Memorial College.

Perhaps never in history has there been so much stress on freedom. And all agree that freedom is necessary for full development and especially for that segment of development called a training in responsibility. However there seems to be very little agreement as to how much freedom should be allowed. And so we have the problem—among others—of a permissive society. In schools this problem has as many ramifications as in society at large: some pupils think that they should be allowed more freedom as far as courses, classes and conduct are concerned, some parents think too much freedom is allowed and others too little, some teachers think there should be more freedom and some think there is already too much. While there is no reason to doubt the sincerity of anyone, it seems necessary to restate the platitude that sincerity is no guarantee of truth. Because a school is not isolated from the world all the converging and diverging currents can still be discerned in it. Conscious of the necessity of a training in freedom we have certainly allowed more individual freedom and have reorganised the prefect system to give real responsibility to pupils, to involve more in decision making and to exercise a measure of self government by the pupils. This has been achieved by forming various committees, each of which has a prefect as chairman who is also responsible for recruiting members for his committee from the different classes. A staff member acts as liaison between the committee and the staff. Most pupils have come to realise the difference between the new system and the old, and, I think, most appreciate it. However, it would be dishonest not to admit that some have abused their freedom and have demonstrated an almost complete inability to bring themselves to do what was expected. Apparently in the past any decisions were propped up by some external force. It is inevitable that some modifications will be made in the arrangement but we consider the new one an improvement on the old and intend to persovere with it next year.

The practice of sharing classes with Sacred Heart College was expanded from small beginnings last year and extended into Upper Sixth Form. It enabled students to select a suitable course from a wider variety of subjects. We are most grateful to the Sisters for their ready co-operation, and look forward to continuing the scheme next year as both academically and socially we feel that it is worth continuing.

The imparting of religious instruction was, again, one of the serious concerns of the staff. Regular religious knowledge periods were programmed and a definite course studied in each class. The school mission, along lines similar to last year's, was held in July and our thanks are due to Fathers P. Shannon, B. Sherry and S. Hurley for their assistance and enthusiasm in helping to make boys aware of the needs of others and of God's reliance on human beings to carry out His designs. 'Devoted' is the word that best describes the work at the college of our beloved chaplain, Rev. M. Uhlenberg. He has maintained contact with the boys through class visitations and by taking a personal interest in all that concerns them. The Y.C.S. was again organised in the Sixth Forms. The prayerful preparation of meetings, the discussion at meetings and the ensuing action helped to form the minds and characters of the members. From time to time Scripture services were organised to implore God's help in the important matter of choosing a vocation in life. On the topic of religious vocations it is pleasing to record that at the beginning of the year two ex-pupils entered the diocesan seminary. a third is following in the footsteps of Father Douglas in the Columban Missionary Society and a fourth entered the House of Studies with a view to finding out more about the Brothers' life. The most outstanding religious event at the college was the ordination of our first Old Boy priest, Rev. J. Julian. Please God he will have many successors.

Last year's academic results were up to the college average. Roger Cruickshank gained a place on the credit list in the University Scholarships examination; four candidates were awarded University Bursaries; sixteen were granted Higher School Certificates; twenty-five gained University Entrance; twenty-nine Endorsed School Certificates; forty-six qualified on the School Certificate Examination for entrance to Form Six.

According to what is now a well established custom, parent-teacher meetings were held in first and second terms. Both were well attended and I would like to record the appreciation of the staff for the great efforts so many make to attend those meetings. I would again like to draw attention to two topics dealt with in the July meeting. The first concerned the pressures put on pupils and staffs by parents, government and business. These can be beneficial but sometimes they lead to unreal, even harmful situations. The other concerned the necessity to make a choice between the requirements of study and the many other possible activities. The increasingly higher academic standards demanded today require a

larger degree of concentration on intellectual work. And this can frequently be gained only at the expense of certain social and even economic advantages.

The Ladies' Auxiliary was very active throughout the year. Under the leadership of J. Coppen, president, and R. Meulekamp, secretary, the round of Monday lunches, Gala Day, our own and the Taranaki Inter-Secondary Schools athletic carnivals, dancing lessons for the Fourth Forms, the college dance and clothes sales were all attended to with the ready co-operation, cheerfulness and efficiency we have come to take for granted. Many thanks to all who helped, especially to those ladies who assisted with the lunches. The Men's Committee, organised by Messrs. C. Gifford and P. Dwyer were active on Sports Day and Gala Day. To all who gave their time and talents we express our gratitude.

Throughout the year the college continued to offer a wide variety of sports. Primarily games are meant for relaxation but the other aspects are perhaps just as important. They can be a valuable training ground in acceptable social behaviour, they present innumerable opportunities for unselfishness, they can reveal both one's abilities and limitations and they obviously present opportunities for inter-action between persons. Details of particular sports can be read in other parts of this magazine, but here I want to express my appreciation of those members of the staff, parents-especially Messrs. R. Crowe, L. Morris, E. Stachurski and B. Stachurski-and other helpers whose efforts, skill and generosity made it possible to provide a wide variety of team sports at the College.

Enthusiasm was the keynote in all exercises undertaken by the cadet unit. Officered by Cpt. L. Walsh the C.O. and Lt. D. Thompson, 2 I.C. the unit maintained its efficiency. During the barracks week in February we were proud to welcome back Brendan King, the winner of the W. R. Friar trophy for 1968. We are happy to congratulate Murray Wackrow on winning the coveted award this year. In seven years the College unit has won the award six times. Again I express my gratitude for what the Army authorities have done to help the unit and especially I thank Mr. W. Heath W.O.1. for his invaluable assistance.

Again this year a band of devoted ladies contributed to the daily life of the College. Mrs. A. French added another year to her activities as secretary, sympathetic counsellor and public relations officer; Mrs. E. O'Neill helped another group of boys with remedial work; Mrs. D. Giles looked after the needs of the library. At the beginning of the year we were fortunate in being able to welcome Mrs. C. Ryan who brought her knowledge, drive and experience to piano teaching at the College. Mrs. O. B. Johnston, Matron,

was ever on hand to bring balm, consolation and relief to any who suffered injury, and to look after the general health and nourishment of the Brothers and boarders. To all these ladies we express our profound gratitude.

After four and a half years at the College, Mr. V. Hellyar retired at the end of first term. He left a well set up woodwork room and ideals of efficiency that we hope to maintain. We thank him for all he did for the College and wish him well in his retirement.

At this point I would like to record our gratitude to Drs. Barclay, Livingstone and Rae for their services in looking after us. Likewise I would like to mention with gratitude the ready service and attention we have always received from all at the New Plymouth Hospital.

In spite of a very busy year Fr. Doogan has always been ready to help the College. The same applies to Frs. Carter and McCarten and, in fact, to all the priests of Taranaki. To them all we say thank you.

College captain for 1969 has been Jim Reilly. He has the qualities of a true leader and I commend him on the way he carried out his duties throughout the year. Head day boy was Murray Wackrow. It was a fitting climax to years of obvious leadership that he should have been chosen by the student body and the staff to inaugurate this new position of honour and responsibility in the school and to set a high standard right from the start. Both these young men have helped materially in the smooth running of the college this year.



Wednesday, 2 July, must have surely been one of our College's proudest moments, since on this day our first old boy was ordained to the priesthood.





# Flambard and Christchurch

Some thirteen years ago the London Province of the De La Salle Brothers had need of a larger house than that already possessed as a novitiate and scholasticate. The Superiors went searching for a suitable place and eventually bought a house and estate known as Dogmersfield Palace. This lay close to the village of Odiham near Basingstoke in Hampshire.

The 'Palace' part of the title was intriguing and another Brother and myself were commissioned to trace the history of the house and uncover anything of interest in the past.

After weeks of research in the British Museum and the Public Record Office we established that we had acquired a house of great antiquity through whose doors and rooms had passed a cavalcade of history.

One part of its story might interest New Zealanders as there is a link between Dogmersfield Palace and a city of these Islands.

The house is recorded in the Domesday Book as being in possession of one Sweyn, a Saxon thegn. After the Battle of Hastings it passed by 'right of conquest' into the hands of Ugo Barbartus (Hugh of the Great Red Beard) as a reward for his part in the battle.

In the year 1090 as a gesture of gratitude for rather dubious political services it was granted to the central character of this story, Rannulf Flambard.

This man was the chief minister of King William Rufus, and for his unscrupulous dealings on behalf of this monarch, a man of like ilk, was made Bishop of Durham.

With that peculiar mixture of political chicanery and piety that marked many prelates of his day he decided to raise a priory to the glory of God and the honour of an obscure saint.

He chose as a site a hill in the south of Hampshire on either side of which flowed the Hampshire Avon and the Stour. Now, it appeared, that a supernatural force came to conduct the building. Each morning when the labourers ascended the hill to start work they found the materials gone and discovered that they had been moved closer to the sea at the confluence of the two rivers near the village of Twyneham. They took this to be a sign of the Divine Will and

commenced the work at the new site. The work went well and a superb edifice arose from the skill of their hands—or was it their hands alone? For throughout the work there was always one extra craftsman whom they could not account for—and he was a carpenter.

Tragedy seemed to have struck just before the completion; as they lifted the final great oak beam to support the apse they found that through some accident or other it had been cut too short and would not span the arch it had to support. It was measured and re-measured, lifted and tried but it was still a foot too short. Disappointed and grieved they left the beam lying and returned home for the night.

Next morning when they came they found to their astonishment that the beam had been lifted into place—and more than that—it was now too long, for a foot or more of it protruded into the retro apse!

The Miraculous Beam can still be seen today as it was left nigh on nine hundred years ago.

Strange too was the fact that the number of workmen tallied for the first time that morning and the unaccountable carpenter had vanished. The light then dawned upon them that another Carpenter had been with them all these days. Rannulf Flambard heard of this and changed the intended dedication to Christchurch.

Thus it was that eight centuries later men who had lived and worked beneath the shadow of this lovely church crossed the world to dwell in New Zealand. When they saw the rich pasture lands that they were to work with their hands, their minds turned back to the lovely countryside they had left.

They remembered the soft flowing Avon and the brow of Hengistbury Head. They saw above the storied city God's Ancient House, over the windy uplands gazing out towards the sea. And deep about it drowsed the grey dreams of the buried centuries. Thus it lay exceeding wise and strong and full of years. Their new home they would call Christchurch and they did. When that happened, did not the soul of Rannulf Flambard find peace that his church was remembered in a land he had never known?

# Parents Auxiliary

At the moment a lot is being said about the State's giving or not giving aid to our schools. Very little has been said about Parental aid. We all want our children to have all the material

assets of the best schools—tennis courts, swimming pool, lovely grounds, impressive buildings. But we would like to imagine that some fairy godfather will grant the money.

At present the P.T.A. has three or four meetings a year. Notice of the meetings and agenda is sent home beforehand. We realise that many notices never reach home with the result that few attend these meetings. We are trying to help to provide further amenities for our children.

This year the new swimming pool came into It is a pool to be proud of and our boys will definitely gain much from having a pool in their school grounds. The pool has cost a considerable sum and although Government granted a subsidy for the work there is still \$15,910.00 owing on the project. To raise money to help pay for this we have had several fund-raising efforts. The annual Gala Day is the most time consuming and financially rewarding of all. Our mind seems to be always on the Gala. Stall convenors prepare for months in advance to have enough sewing, knitting and produce ready for the day. Many mothers have done so much behind scenes for this event. Several women spent many hours just before the day, making 'phone appeals for cakes and sweets. Asking is never easy, but when the promised goods really do arrive they feel rewarded for their efforts. The men come into their own on this day and do a tremendous job. We are now planning Gala Day 1970 and are looking for stall convenors. Volunteers will be welcomed with open arms. We can never have too many helpers.

Every Monday morning two or three mothers come to package lunches and to serve at interval and lunch-time in the tuckshop. Here we get the full co-operation of the boys and the fantastic profits made are ploughed back into school amenities. The usual handsome profit was made this year. Mothers are seldom called on more than twice a year and those who volunteer for this task really enjoy their morning's "work".

The only other fund-raising functions held

this year were our Used Clothes Sales. A used uniform sale in January was not well patronised, but we were much more successful in June and October in the Old Folks' Hall and earned over \$100.00. We are grateful to those who sent such good, clean, wearable clothing for the sale. Garments complete with buttons and Zipps bring in so much more.

We do not spend all our time earning money. We cater willingly for various social functions held during the school year. The school was again host for the Inter-Secondary Sports. Luncheon was provided for the officials and tea and refreshments were sold on the grounds. Ladies again manned the tea stall for the School Sports.

In March we held a social evening to farewell Brother Peter on his overseas trip.

We also catered for the College Dance but before that we helped to prepare the Fourth Formers for the occasion by having dancing classes on four evenings. The boys loved the classes and all eighty of them turned up each time. Sad to say we were short of partners. However, those Fourth Formers will remember learning the Gay Gordons from the "old ladies" for a long time.

We also poured hundreds of cups of tea on the Ordination Day. And do you remember enjoying a cuppa on that very cold reports evening?

Many parents have been wonderful and have spent many hours working for their boys and for the college. Some parents who no longer have sons at school still respond to a call for help.

I would like to thank all those who helped during the year and look forward to seeing them among the crowd of new faces at the first meeting of 1970.



Early this year, the Club was presented with the Stuart Hayton Memorial Trophy. This trophy is offered in contest to the three Interact Clubs of New Plymouth for the best prepared article on the year's activities. The presentation was made at Inglewood at a Rotary Convention and again repeated at New Plymouth a week later. The winning of the trophy is a measure of the Club's success, and I am sure that we have established a reputation by it.

Our service to the school saw the Interactors armed with shovels and picks at the site of the swimming pool. Our project was to level a drainage slope on one side of the baths, and this was undertaken with enthusiasm. Within a week the job was completed—much to the relief of all concerned! The project not only fulfilled our obligation to the Interact constitution, but was the first time the club carried out some community action.

The most complex undertaking this year by Interact was a fund raising scheme. The funds were required to sponsor an Asian Student to this or some other suitable institution. For this purpose 30c samples of Maui I oil were sold in door to door sales. The oil was obtained for 20c from the N.P. West Rotary Club-some 4000 bottles. The Club went out in force on two Saturdays, and profits soon mounted up. Displays were set up in Devon Street and at the Winter Show. Because 2/3 of the cost went towards the Intellectually Handicapped, this project also served as a community service. Overall, the scheme was very successful and a net profit of \$230 was made.

On the international scene, the Interact Club

has sent several cartons of text-books to the Pacific Islands where they are sorely in need. Several more cartons are to be sent in the near future. Our long range international project, the sponsoring of a student, may well take several years to eventuate; a positive start has been made, however, and doubtless this will gain momentum.

For its members, Interact does not always conote 'giving'. Guest speakers frequently attend our meetings, and this year has been a particularly good one in this regard. Club members have on several occasions been invited to Rotary functions, to 'observe' the function of a service organisation. Members are expected to get as much enjoyment out of Interact as the effort they put in.

Interact, I feel, has made its mark in this College. We are an established Club, with our own banner, stationery, bank account, directors etc. Interact affords an opportunity for its members to plan and execute their own affairs; it is something of a challenge to senior pupils. And finally, the Interact Club is a means of repaying the school for what the College has done for its senior pupils.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank the various people concerned with the club for their help and advice throughout the year. In particular, I would like to thank Mr. Trevor Burrell, our Rotary Advisor, who, with his 2 I.C. Mr. Terry Boon, has advised and coaxed the club to its present high standard. My thanks also go to Mr. Stuart Hayton and the other Rotarians who have shown so much enthusiasm for the club.

# THE Y.C.S.

# ("YOUNG CHRISTIAN STUDENTS")

This year was the sixth that Y.C.S. has been functioning at the College. The members profited from the discussions and from the talks given by the invited speakers.

Since all members had been involved in Y.C.S. the previous year, the group started without introductory delay. Each group organised its own roster of leaders. Some of the more interesting discussions were those on 'Sincerity', 'Vocation', 'Youth in the community', 'Value of people around us', and 'Protestantism'.

Some of the points discussed under 'Sincerity' were the value of being frank with ourselves and with others. It was generally agreed that motiveless deeds, although they may be good, have less significance than those done with a specific intention.

The meeting on 'Vocation' coincided with the Rotary sponsored tour of vocational avenues. The suitability of a person for his work seemed to be accepted as fundamental. Most of us preferred to choose a vocation which develops in its demands on us. To make the best of our calling we must accept our limitations and understand the value of our aspirations in life. Also discussed was the place of marriage in our vocation, but more immediately, our attitude towards it.

A meeting concerning our duty in 'civvy street' was 'Youth in the community.' Under this topic student demonstrations gave rise to vigorous discussion. Most felt that those who instigated demonstrations were sincere, but that many participated merely for the devilry of it. As a result of this meeting, Mr. L. Herdman, chairman of the N.P.C.C. Works Committee, was invited to speak on Local Body Administration. He ex-

pressed concern at the low percentage of votes caste in local body elections. As well as explaining the basic procedure of administration, he exhorted us to take an interest in our city and to offer our services if we thought we were in any way capable: the city must be planned and organised by somebody.

Following this meeting there arose an interest in politics in general and as a result Mr. Brian Clarke, was invited to speak in his capacity of National Party candidate for the coming elections. He answered questions on State aid, the doctor shortage and immigration. He personally is not in favour of State aid because he fears that this would destroy the individuality enjoyed by private schools. On the doctor shortage he recommended that overseas doctors be encouraged to immigrate. Although we were too shy to take him to task over any point, some rather spirited discussions took place after the meeting. Candidates for other parties have not been able to speak to us.

'Protestantism' our most recent discussion has helped us to realise the problems confronting unity among Christians. The problem in Northern Ireland, a disgrace to all Christians, received quite a deal of attention. In the course of the discussion many of the groups found that they knew little of the doctrines of other churches and as a result a Methodist clergyman was invited to speak to us at the next meeting.

Although no specific group activity was arranged this year, many of those boys available took part in Miles for Millions, and a small group helped in the Salvation Army Appeal.

Our gratitude is extended to Brother Julian whose experience and knowledge were a great help in our discussions. But for his ideas many of our periods would have been fruitless.

Here is a person who has suffered the effects of a broken home, drug abuse, exploitation—you name it, she's done it in fact. I sat down in front of the television thinking that I would suffer the interview out. The half hour that followed left me with all sorts of impressions, wierd and wonderful. I forgot about the interview until I happened upon an article in the Zealandia, about the whole affair. Needless to say they wrote M.F. down the drain with all manner of labels-nutcase, wierdo and catastrophe itself-a hippie. I think the people that the Zealandia asked to comment on the interview missed the point and were not tuned in to this happening. M.F. was quite honest and frank. She did not pretend that her life was one big success, reached by taking speed pills and marijuana. On the contrary she stated that she wasn't in the ideal sense, happy. Whilst she may not have accepted the idea of suffering, this does not make her a weirdo or someone we all feel sorry for. At least, she is trying to seek out and she does think.

# STEELMAKING INDUSTRY IN N.Z.

Founded on the black treasure of New Zealand beaches—ironsand—the first New Zealand steel industry is being built at Glenbrook, Auckland.

New Zealand has always been dependent on overseas resources for her steel, but, in 1959, the Government financed an investigating company to look into the possibility of manufacturing steel from local raw materials. In 1962 the investigating company reported: "New Zealand is richly endowed with raw materials well suited to steelmaking . . . and is remarkably fortunate in having these raw materials close together and close to the main marketing centre, Auckland."

The major deposits of ironsand on the west coast of the North Island contain more than 500 million tons of iron-ore concentrate. In the Waikato Head deposit, there are more than 150 million tons of concentrate, enough to support an industry producing 500,000 tons of steel a year for 50 years. It was estimated that 25 million tons of coal would be used in 50 years, and adequate reserves lie in Huntly and Maramarua areas. This coal is well suited to steelmaking. Reserves of 6 million tons of limestone, which will be needed also, were found only three miles from the ironsand deposit.

Electric power has been made available by the New Zealand Electricity Department and the large quantities of water needed for mining and concentrating the iron ore will come from the Waikato River.

The building of the mill was started early in 1967, and it is expected to be completed in 1978. When it is in full production, in 1983, it will be producing about 600,000 tons of steel annually.

The New Zealand Steel Industry has a promising future, and the country can hope to benefit from this newfound source of income.




The team would like to express their appreciation to the people of Masterton who kindly

"Son when I was a boy we used to go down to the beach and dig up a sackfull of 'em with a shovel".

This phrase is typical of those quoted time and time again by fathers, uncles and grandfathers to many wide-eyed youngsters up and down the beautiful golden coast of the North Island. Some just cannot imagine it, others do their utmost to visualise a whole sack of the popular shellfish which has proven to be such a sought-after delicacy. It is true, however, that only as far back as the late thirties, the toheroa was dug up in hordes and feasted upon mainly by the local Maoris and townsfolk of the coast.

The question is why has this delicious sea food become so popular? It is rumoured that the sudden explosive rush by city folk and those ignorant of the shellfish's delightful taste was ignited by none other than the Prince of Wales. While on tour in New Zealand he was treated to a plate of soup the name of which he was not told. He courteously accepted it and after

cautiously tasting he was enthralled by its flavour. Throughout his tour thereafter he demanded this soup before most of his meals. This soup, he was told, was from a large shellfish found on one of our coasts—it was called the toheroa.

After the great publicity from this incident the beaches of Otaki, Levin, Foxton, Paraparaumu, Waikanae and Manakau were flooded regularly by waves of toheroa hunters, most of them ignorant as to what they were looking for. But nevertheless its popularity was established and rangers were appointed to control their flow to twenty per person which could only be taken during daylight with a wooden implement, not a steel one. Far too many, however, were being removed from beds until at the present time the season lasts a mere two weeks in which a single person may take only ten of the molluscs during daylight hours and all must be dug by hand.

Well that's the history of the toheroa's popularity. Let's hope the restrictions are not carried further than the authorities have taken them at the present time.

# TARANAKI SECONDARY SCHOOLS' RUGBY TOUR

Four members of the College 1st XV, Noel Bourke, Noel Karalus, Rollo Vavasour and Murray Wackrow, were selected to tour New South Wales with the Taranaki Secondary Schools Rugby Team for two weeks during the August holidays. The following is an account of their trip:

Having left Auckland International Airport in brilliant sunshine, we were greeted in Sydney by the Combined High Schools Rugby Officials and rain. From Mascot, we were whisked off by our billets and at this stage were all feeling the effects of the flight and the two-hour time lapse.

The first game of the tour against a Philip Zone Team was played in very humid conditions and on a typically hard Australian ground. It was here that the Australians experienced their first taste of Taranaki rucking for they are instructed to lie on the ball with their backs to the opposition when a ruck is being formed. This type of play continued throughout the tour with the invariable result that one man per game had to retire due to a little nudge from a not so gentle Taranaki sprig.

A tour of Sydney the following day, which Rollo unfortunately missed, gave us some idea of its size. Sights included were Bondi Beach, The Gap, Vaucluse (an exclusive suburb), Australia Square, above which towers the tallest building in Svdney, the Sydney Cricket Oval and of course King's Cross. A barbecue was held at Centennial Park in very pleasant conditions, for the weather left behind at Auckland had caught us up gaining a few degrees on the way.

It was disappointing to be travelling to Nowra, approximately 156 miles south of Sydney, by train in such summery conditions where we were to play the Jervis Bay Naval College. On our arrival, however, rain began to fall and the game was played in typical Taranaki conditions, wet, muddy and cold—it really made us feel at home. Once again rucking problems arose with the inclusion of one more—binding on the wrong side of the ruck. This we found very aggravating, however, in due course, the matter was dealt with very firmly. A highlight of the visit was for three of us a trip in the Jervis Bay Search and Rescue Craft. Noel Karalus preferred to lie on his bed.

Midday Thursday, we left for Canberra by bus. The lack of scenery was very noticeable and makes one really appreciate the beauty of the New Zealand countryside. Mr. L. Walsh, the team coach, who was a fine ambassador throughout the tour, excelled himself on the bus.

Canberra more than lived up to our expectations for it is indeed a beautiful city having been planned since its first inception. Excellent organisation by the co-ordinators of the trip resulted in a conducted tour of the capital. Those of us with cameras were kept very busy for it didn't matter which way you looked, there was always something worthwhile to get down on film.

The game against Duntroon Military College was one upon which much emphasis had been placed and resulted in a very fine exhibition of rugby. As had been expected the 'Duntrooners' were very fit and hard, but seemed to lack some of the basic fundamentals of rugby. Immediately after the match, we were bundled into a train bound for Sydney.

Sunday was our first free day and the few extra hours of sleep and relaxation were very much appreciated. The following day we were taken on a cruise and this time saw the immense size of Sydney from the harbour. A barbecue at Clark Island was very enjoyable and at about this time we began the so called psychological work-up for the 'Test Match' of the tour against Combined High Schools, a team selected from sixty-seven Sydney Secondary Schools. We won this game quite comfortably in extremely hot conditions—around the 80°F mark.

Early Thursday morning we left Sydney by rail to complete the final stage of the trip to Quirindi, a rich agricultural district 250 miles north west of Sydney. Oh boy, that country included hospitality! Activities barbecues. kangaroo shooting, frequenting of golf clubs, introductions to the one armed bandits and numerous others. As a matter of interest we played on the same ground where the All Blacks won a match against Northern New South Wales 103-0. An interesting pre-match feature was the return of our coach to 1st class rugby playing for the Quirindi 'Old Buffers'.

After a rousing farewell at the station late Sunday night, we arrived two hours late at the Central Railway Station Sydney, just in time to see our flight pass over our heads to Auckland. Five of the team were able to get away on a later flight, but the remainder of us enjoyed two extra days in Sydney, departing for Auckland Tuesday evening. 
### **Tennis**




#### CROSS-COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The House placings were the same as last year with Benildus again showing swimming


