ANNUAL REPORT

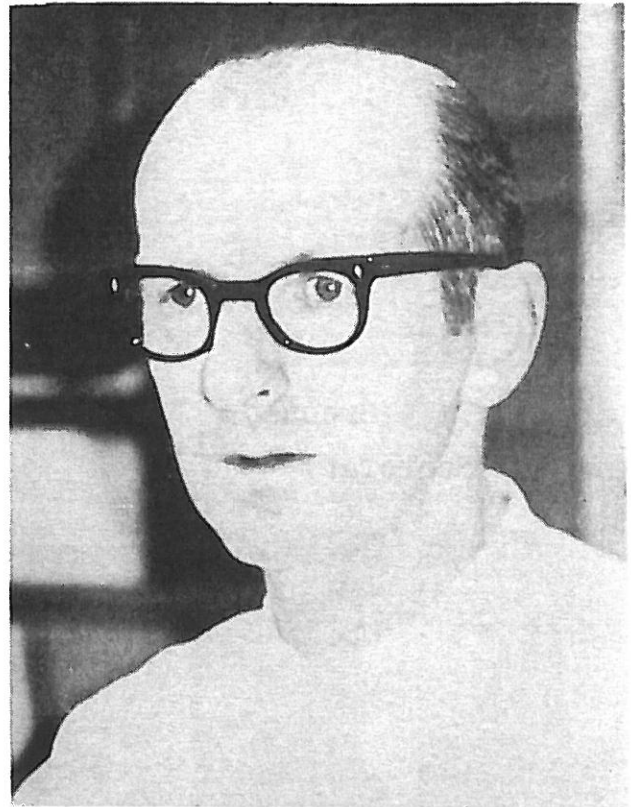
Very Reverend and Reverend Fathers,
Ladies, Gentlemen and Boys,

I present to you this evening the 14th Annual Report of Francis Douglas College.

Allow me first to make a tribute to my predecessor as Director of the College, Brother Julian. Brother spent ten years at Francis Douglas and during a major part of that time he was concerned with the vital question of the continuity of the College. It was thanks in a large measure to his efforts that ways and means were eventually found of facing the financial burdens which at one time made the future of the College doubtful. Brother Julian has now taken up an appointment at De La Salle College, Scarborough, Queensland, and I am sure that you would wish to have recorded your sentiments of gratitude for the work he achieved here and to wish him a fruitful continuation of his labours for Christian education in his new appointment.

The value of a Catholic education has been repeatedly challenged over the last decade. It is encouraging for those engaged in this work and also for you parents who have faith in its value to know that the Bishops of New Zealand saw fit in their most recent gathering to give particular emphasis to their conviction that the Catholic School is an irreplaceable element in the Church's total mission of spreading the Christian message. Its establishment and maintenance have always required sacrifices on the part of the Catholic population in general and of parents in particular. It is the Bishops' belief that these sacrifices are eminently worthwhile.

The teaching of Religion continues to be given primacy in our programme. We are most fortunate in the large proportion of Brothers on our staff and in the fact that both our full time lay teachers are able to take these classes. I mention this because it may not be known to many of you that in a large number of Catholic schools the teaching of religion has had to be considerably curtailed because of the lack of teachers qualified in this area. We are also most fortunate in the fact that both of our chaplains are actively involved in this aspect of our programme. Father

Uhlenburg, in so far as his health allows, visits the classes regularly. Father Sherry is, in my opinion, the most active school chaplain I have yet encountered. Father has throughout the year, daily and systematically catechized the classes and followed a regular roster of interviews with the senior boys. I am certain that his work during the year has been much appreciated by the boys.

I have, myself, been most grateful during this my first year at New Plymouth, for the assistance and advice of many among you; to Fathers Carroll, Donoghue and O'Brien of the three New Plymouth parishes, in particular, for their assistance in many ways to both the Brothers' Community and the students.

We are also much indebted to Sister Barbara and the staff at Sacred Heart College who have co-operated with us in many activities and to Sister Rosalia for her many kindnesses to the Community.

A special word of appreciation to Mrs O. B. Johnston, College Matron, for her unfailing skill and devotion in controlling the domestic side of the hostel as well as

caring for the health of the boarders and the occasional needs of the day boys. To Mr D. Ingram, Mr S. Wells, Mrs F. Novak and Mrs D. Hooker, executive of the P.T.A., for their much valued assistance and also to their many helpers. To Mrs J. Murphy for the time and talent she put at our disposal in music and to Mrs Campbell and Mr D. Hooker whose dance classes prepared the boys and girls so well for the annual dance. To Mrs M. Ryan, not only for her contribution to music as a staff member but also for her generosity with her spare time in preparing for the school Mass for the Feast of St. John Baptist de La Salle, the item for the Schools Music Festival and for the Gondoliers.

Once again Mrs J. Brennan and Mrs A. French have given excellent service in the school office.

We are very grateful also to those Fathers who have assisted with the coaching and managing of various teams. Their help is acknowledged individually elsewhere.

I wish to record here also my gratitude to the school's Interim Board presided over by Mr K. Mulcahy and to its efficient and dedicated secretary, Mr M. Finnigan. It is thanks to these gentlemen in large measure that we have been encouraged to undertake the burden of the present extensions. This decision to commence the construction of five additional classrooms was taken only after considerable thought and consultation. There has been a small but gradual decline in school roll over the last several years. This has been due to a smaller number of boarders, associated with fluctuating agricultural incomes; a limitation on the numbers able to be taken as day boys at Form I; and a poor perseverance rate beyond Form V. Thus we need to admit larger numbers at Form I (and these are available) and to improve perseverance beyond Form V. With the availability of more classrooms in 1973, we will be able to take all applicants for Form I. Thus our Intermediate roll on present applications will increase from 88 this year to a minimum of 100 in 1973. We also are planning to introduce a third Form III next year to cater for an increased enrolment here also.

It is expected that if boarding numbers remain approximately at their present low level we will still gradually increase our

overall roll from 360 this year to 450 in 1977. On the other hand had we failed to provide the extra accommodation it is estimated that our numbers—reducing class sizes to meet new schedules—would have fallen to 275 in 1977 and the school thus have become unviable. The extensions will be partially completed by the end of January at an estimated cost of approximately \$70,000. To meet this extra debt we will need the full support of all parents both through the prompt payment of fees and also by membership of the shares scheme. The risk we have taken in this further expenditure is very great. All of the Brothers have had experience of the loyalty and generosity of parents and past pupils in other parts of our Institute—we feel that not to have gone on with this project would have demonstrated that we trusted less in the generosity of the people of Taranaki and in their concern for and the high priority they place on giving their sons a Catholic education. Two years ago the finance committee set themselves the goal of selling 2,000 \$6 annual shares in the future of secondary education for boys in Taranaki. Up to the present nearly half of the goal has been achieved. We do appeal to those among you who can afford it, to contribute to this scheme and also through you to Old Boys and others who value Catholic Education.

Lastly, and in a very special way, I wish to express my sincere gratitude to the members of our teaching staff, both Brothers and Lay Teachers, for the professional competence and devotion they have brought to their work.

School Captain for 1972 was John Luoni who has been a boarder since Form III. John proved at all times most worthy of the confidence placed in him by staff and boys. He was a leader in all the major sports and school activities and also demonstrated his all-round competence by becoming Dux of the College.

In 1971 nine boys gained a University Bursary, 25 were successful in University Entrance and 41 boys qualified at School Certificate to enter Form VI. Percentage-wise these results are well up to national averages. We are concerned, as are many educational groups in New Zealand, that the present examination system, especially

at the Form V level, fails to offer sufficient motivation, especially to the less gifted students. There are many signs that there is growing dissatisfaction with this aspect of our education system, and ways are being investigated of remedying the weakness. In the meantime we are planning to introduce more attractive courses and alternatives for the less academically gifted students.

Our ex-students continue to do well at University and among the more outstanding graduates of 1972 were Stefan Moch-nacki (U.E. 1964) who completed his Master of Science with distinction in Physics and Jeffrey Reeve who graduated B.Sc. with honours and has been granted a post-graduate scholarship to Edmonton University in Canada.

We are very happy to note also the Final Professions of two Brothers of the Staff, both ex-students of the College. Brother Peter Bray, who was finally pro-

fessed in December of last year, and Brother Kevin Neal who will be professed in January next.

We ask you all to join with us in thanksgiving to Almighty God for the many vocations to the priesthood and the religious life that have already come from the College in the short period of its existence. It is our hope that the example of the heroic life of Father Francis Douglas to whose memory our school is dedicated, will continue to inspire many from among our students to dedicate themselves in a special way to the service of God and country.

May I conclude by wishing you all an abundance of the peace of Christ in the coming season of the commemoration of the Lord's birth. May all of us share that joy that Christ came on earth to offer each one of us.

FINAL PROFESSION OF COLLEGE OLD BOY BROTHER PETER BRAY

In January of this year, a present staff member, and old boy of the College, Br. Peter Bray, made his final profession in the College Chapel, as a De La Salle Brother. In an impressive dedication ceremony incorporated into the Offertory of the Mass, Brother Peter made a life commitment in the presence of a large group of relatives, friends and confreres. Chief celebrant was former classmate, Father John Henderson. His vows were received in the name of the Church and the Institute by Brother Augustine Lynch.

Peter Bray received his primary education from the Sisters of Our Lady of the Mission at St. Joseph's School, Waitara. He

was a member of the first Form III class in the College in 1959, a class which proceeded through to Form VII under the kind, firm, and experienced hand of Br. Jerome, the first Principal of the College. A browse through the College magazines during these years shows that Peter Bray was the first prefect on the Waitara bus; that he won the maths. prize in Form V; that he was the cadet senior shooting champion in 1963. In the light of subsequent events, it is interesting to note, too, that he was a member of the Benildus Club, of which we read:

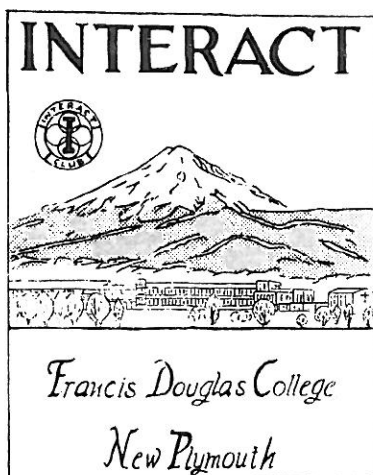
"The Benildus Club at present numbers 50 sincere boys who meet each fortnight for a Gospel Discussion and Prayer. There is no doubt that their association in the Club will benefit them immensely both now and in their post-school life."

The number of priestly and religious vocations which can be traced back to this Club bears witness to the truth of this statement by Br. Conrad, the founder of the Club.

Br. Peter entered the De La Salle Novitiate at "Oakhill" in 1964, completing his teacher-training in 1968. While teaching for two years at De La Salle College, Ashfield, he completed a B.A. and Dip.Ed. with Macquarie University. The following year he returned to his Alma Mater, teaching mainly Maths. and English in the middle secondary, where his worth has been attested to by pupils and staff alike.

The members of your community, congratulate you, Br. Peter, on your commitment to "the service of the poor through education", and welcome you into their ranks. We would also like to reiterate our gratitude to your family, in particular to Mr Bray.

INTERACT REPORT, 1972

We have mentioned much in the last few years about the activities of the Interact Club that has existed for the last five years, but what is it exactly?

First and foremost it is a service club, an organization that exists for the benefit of others, those in the school and the outside local community, and as well, international service of some kind.

The very first Interact Club came into being in Florida, U.S.A., in 1962, sponsored by Rotary International. Since then these clubs have spread rapidly and are now found in 70 countries with more than 3,000 clubs and about 70,000 members.

The purpose of Interact is to provide opportunity for young people to work together in a world fellowship dedicated to service and international understanding. The goals are:

1. To recognise and develop leadership and personal integrity;
2. To encourage and practise thoughtfulness to others;
3. To create an awareness of the importance of home and family;
4. To build respect for the rights of others;
5. To emphasize acceptance of individual responsibility as the basis of personal success, community improvement and group achievement.

Interact Club projects and activities are initiated and carried out by the club members themselves led by their own elected officers; the clubs themselves decide what these activities will be.

It is expected that each club will undertake two major projects a year, that will be of benefit to others.

The two major projects we attempted this year involved helping the community and helping to create a better international understanding.

To help the community, the club, through our connection with the birthright organization, assisted those families without fathers. Interact helped by cutting and stacking wood, also by planting and weeding vegetable gardens. The club has also helped to excavate an old New Plymouth vicarage. Many members helped with this and all found it interesting. Our club has combined with Rotaract on two separate projects. Also during the August holidays we helped them raise funds for Crippled Children at the National Trolley Derby. To create a better international understanding, the club intends to raise sufficient money to eventually sponsor an Asian Student to live and work at Francis Douglas.

About once a month a Guest Speaker attended the meetings. These people talked of their interests and line of work. Non-members could also attend these meetings so there was always a large audience. Talks, ranging from Search and Rescue work to the Vietnam war, were given and the interest of the audience was always shown by their eagerness to ask questions.

To round off this year's report I will take the opportunity, on behalf of the club, to thank those people who have helped and given advice to us throughout the year. In particular I would like to thank both Mr Phelan, our Rotary Representative, and Brother Declan, whose guidance and assistance were much appreciated.

LIBRARY

A very pleasing feature of the Library in 1972 was the greater use made of the reference section. A new set of encyclopaedias proved a great asset in this department.

Popular Authors:

Alistair MacLean and Paul Brickhill proved the most popular authors, while Teenage Tales were the most sought-after books in the senior school. An overwhelming demand was made for W. Price's adventure books in the Intermediate school.

Meetings:

Our attendance at meetings of the Taranaki Schools' Library Association has proved a tremendous benefit, and shows us that we are not alone in the problem facing all school libraries — Censorship, defacement and lost books. Forty books failed to return to this Library last year.

Working Bees:

With Mrs M. Smither classifying, three working bees were held. We thank the ladies who gave their time and skills in getting 180 new books on to the shelves for repairing and for recovering the good old faithfuls. Emphasis in the buying this year was placed in the Chemistry, Physics and Biology departments.

Replacements:

This service is available to all schools, costing nothing but the effort of collecting and returning books. 610 books were borrowed on request by teachers and boys for the first two terms, ninety-five percent being non-fiction and great demands being made in the hobbies section. THE DEBATING SOCIETY

This year proved to be our most successful yet, both in terms of numbers participating and of the quality of debating. Up till this year, our efforts have been mainly directed to preparing a small group to represent us in the Catholic Schools Competition, held this year at Wellington. This year we widened our local horizons with quite a number of junior and senior debates against Spotswood College and Sacred Heart. Another interesting development has been the introduction of an annual debating competition organised by the Federation of Catholic Clubs and Societies for schools in the Wellington Archdiocese and, as a result, local competition, we hope, will assume a greater importance.

Our most consistent representatives in the senior debates were Gerard Dewar, Chris Wells and Martin Allison, ably supported on occasion by Kelvin Bourke and Mark Rhodes. After early victories over Spotswood and Sacred Heart, the seniors lost gracefully to St. Mary's, Wellington, whom we congratulate on winning this division of the debating competition. In a keenly fought tussle, we failed to convince Sacred Heart, in the inaugural competition debate for the Sacred Heart P.T.A. Debating Trophy, that "Democracy as a form of government, has failed". Congratulations Sacred Heart. Our best performer in this debate, and indeed throughout the year, was Gerard Dewar.

Our fifth formers, all raw recruits to debating this year, gradually gained confidence and polish after several debates with Spotswood. Our team comprised Brian Thompson, Andrew King and Adam Barrett, and later in the year John Bower.

Kevin de Lacy represented us well in the elocution and oratory at Wellington, and also did Chris Wells in the Religious Questions. In the local debates, subjects ranged from the generation gap to co-education, and even to Men's Liberation, which we contested strongly. Though they lost more debates than they won, all members can now speak publicly with ease and confidence.

In the junior ranks, it was encouraging to see the large number of boys in Form III who participated in intra-mural debates. Unfortunately it was not possible to give all those who so desired an opportunity of competing with other schools, as did Brian Carmine, Peter Gleeson, John Hollewand, Russell Baines and Kevin Brophy. Form IV, represented by Stanley Bunting, Peter Adams and Danny McCarten were vanquished by Sacred Heart early in the season. However, ably assisted by Kevin Brophy, they came back fighting to win the F. Van Hattum Trophy in the annual competition debate. Here, Danny McCarten proved to be the "find" of the debating season, demoralising the opposition with his ruthless logic, sparkling wit and superb eloquence. With debaters of the calibre of Kevin Brophy and Dan McCarten, our senior team should be strong in the years to come.

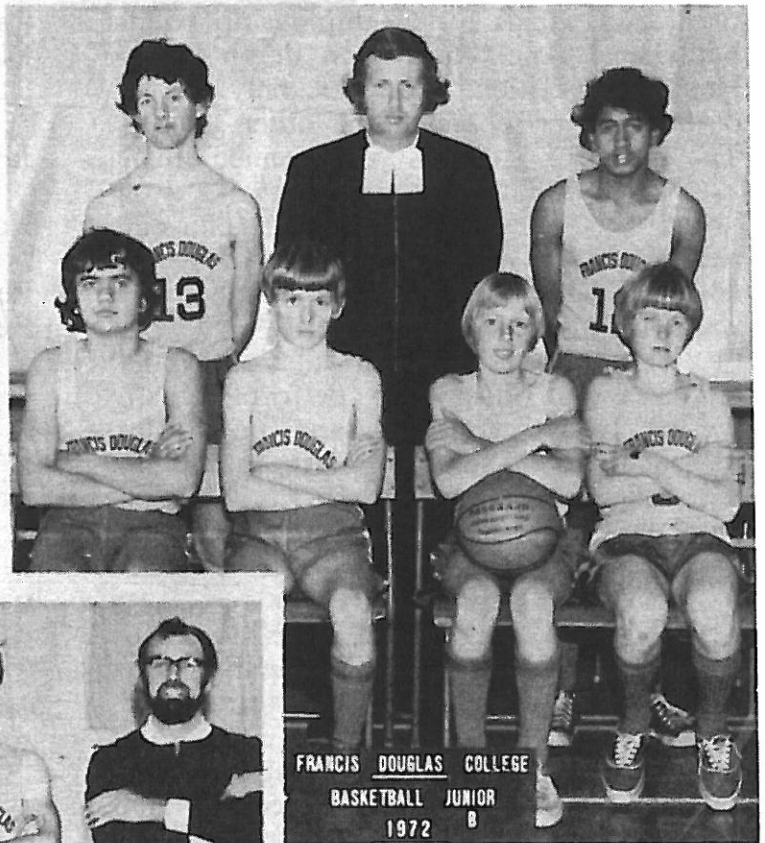
