

Leo has always exhibited dedication to his faith and Catholic beliefs - a great role model - and now as he faces retirement I'm sure he'll continue to contribute to the well-being of others. There will be plenty of time to play some bowls, cut those lawns, and even possibly paint the house!

All of us need to know:

that we are **good** and we need to be affirmed we need to know **who we are** we need to have a place **where we belong** we need to know **what we can achieve** 

Our challenge at Francis Douglas is to try and fulfil those needs.

As a Catholic College, we are committed to the objective of being attuned to the teachings of Christ in the Gospels. Our **goodness** as staff, yours as parents, and our students' needs, should always be acknowledged and affirmed if we are to grow as people and become responsible.

The task of teachers and parents is to work with our young people to find out who they are, to walk with them and as the "Footprints" prayer says, sometimes carry them.

Young people need a place where they belong - they need adult models in the home, at school, and in the wider community who live their ideals, and in this area they can be de-

manding. I believe Francis Douglas College is a place where they can belong. Our students have models, our students are challenged to work out their faith, are challenged to work at their self-discipline, are challenged to study to their potential and are challenged to become part of the college in some way.

The College has a positive feel about it and values learnt in the home are being fostered in the school. Challenges are put before all students as to their responsibilities as Christians and Catholics and their role as students.

The staff are being challenged by the introduction of new syllabuses and the New Zealand Oualifications Framework, FDC staff are facing these challenges professionally and enthusiastically.

In accordance with the Strategic Plan 1995 has seen the introduction of Japanese as a language in the college across all Forms 1 & 2. The intention is to build the subject by degrees with a Japanese option available at Form 3 in 1996.


A major development thrust at senior level has been the introduc-

tion of more subjects as alternatives to the standard external exam subjects. Both English and Maths have classes at Form 7 which are for Higher School Certificate but not Bursary.

Three new subjects to be introduced at senior level have been School Certificate Performance Music, Form 5 Horticulture and Form 7 Graphics.

The College roll on March 1 figures was 512. This is an increase of 30 on the past couple of years. There are 27 full time teachers and 8 part -time teachers currently on staff. Ancillary staff number 10.

With the retirement of Mr Leo Walsh in May more staff ad-

At present there are six brothers in the Brothers' Community - Mark, William, Tim, Anthony, Oliver and Gregory. We all acknowledge the contribution made to the beautification of the College by Brother Oliver and Brother Gregory.



#### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT





The school speech finals held annually are proving to be a great success. The talent and standard have been excellent. The annual O'Shea Shield competition is proving to be a popular event as well. The College was well represented by students and the results were very encouraging.

The College cultural review in October is now three years old. The two evenings attracted large audiences. The individual items music, speaking, theatre sports, song and dance proved an entertaining and rewarding evening for all.

There are three bands in the College - concert, jazz and pop. Many students learn private music at the College. Students provide musical backing for College successes and also entertainment at the College Gala Day and other functions.

During this year nearly all staff have taken part in professional development. A number of staff are completing courses extra-murally. New syllabuses in Maths, English and Science have meant the staff in these subject areas have attended meetings on a regular basis. Three staff members have completed training courses as Support Teachers. Two staff members have trained to be consultants in technology.

Last year's examination results saw the recent standards of the College maintained. The percentage gaining a 'C' or better in School Certificate (61%) remained above the national average. (57%). Of the 12 School Certificate subjects nine recorded improved performances relative to the national mean.

The Bursary results were pleasing in that five Scholarships were achieved in the 9 'A' Bursaries - our highest for some time. There were 8 'B' Bursaries.

In sport, one of the encouraging signs in the school is the large number of students who participate in sport and the support that comes from staff and parents. College teams and individuals do extremely well in competitions winning our share and more.

The Strategic Plan Committee has put together a draft plan for the next 5 years. This documant enables the College to set realistic goals and will be a valuable working document for all concerned with the College.

Francis Douglas together with Sacred Heart combine to be ministers at a monthly Mass in St Joseph's Parish. This has proved to be a worthwhile exercise and enables the colleges to be part of the parish in a formal way.

I believe all staff are responsible for the positiveness of Francis Douglas College. Staff sensitivity and professionalism are vital for good things to happen and I wish to thank staff for their support and encouragement.

Thanks to students for their willingness to do their best for themselves, their families and the College.

The College parent support is encouraging and loyal and I thank parents for their contribution. I thank the PTA for their tremendous enthusiasm and energy in backing the College.

Special thanks to the Board of Trustees for their guidance and support and for their willingness to see the College adapt to changes positively. I believe the College is in good heart, there is a good feeling among staff and students and parents and I am sure the challenges which face us will be met positively.

Finally I would like to pay special tribute to Mr Leo Walsh, DP, who retired in May. Leo has been associated with the College in some way since the College began 36 years ago. Over that time as coach, teacher and administrator he has always given much of himself. He has been loyal and I am sure those who have come in contact with him have always been impressed by him as a person and I'm sure his advice and guidance to many of us will always be remembered.





#### **NAROOMA**



Since taking over as principal, Br Tim has sought to enhance the links between Francis Douglas College and the other colleges in Australia and New Zealand. One successful way in which this is being done is through the conference centre and retreat facility situated at Narooma, on the south coast of New South Wales.

The facility is based at a motel on the Pacific Highway owned by the de la Salle brothers and operated commercially but used for several weeks of the year for conferences and retreats for the brothers and the lay staff in the schools. In recent times a key emphasis of the brothers has been on the concept of "partnership" with lay associates of the order as a means of furthering the ideals of the founder, St Jean Baptiste de la Salle, a French priest who began a network of schools for poor children in France in the seventeenth century.


The Narooma centre was established as a means of developing the partnership between the brothers and the lay staff in the schools. Every year retreats and conferences are conducted among groups of staff and students to help increase awareness in the schools of the links between the colleges.

This year Richard Marris and Lindsay McMorran attended a 5-day management seminar for departmental heads. Other staff to have attended similar seminars in previous years are John Whyte, Martin Dravitzki, Graeme Mustchin and Kevin Murphy.

A seminar was held this year for office staff in the colleges. This was attended by Jean Keegan.

In addition there is an annual retreat for the head pupils of the de la Salle colleges throughout the region. This year, Mark Butterworth and Tim Stuck were our representatives.


Simon Hancox attended our school from May to September of this year. He was an Australian from a small town of only 6000 people so he found New Plymouth a "big city".

I never thought I'd be writing for the FDMC school magazine two years after graduating but stranger things have happened I guess, and a lot of water has passed under the bridge since that golden day, or perhaps under the hull of a US Navy warship would be a more appropriate analogy.

Since leaving FDMC in 1993 and subsequently leaving the country altogether in February 1994 I travelled to the United States of America with one goal in mind - to join the Fighting Blue Jackets. Being an American citizen through my father (who some might know as an occasional reliever at FDC) gave me the opportunity to join this vast fighting force which promised me adventure, travel and a firm start in a harsh world. Thirty thousand dollars was thrown in to sweeten the deal and I signed on the dotted line. The adventure began.

The first three months of my navy



career was spent at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes, Illinois. Here I was taught the meaning of discipline, respect and team work.

After graduating I received orders to my first command, the USS Detroit Aoe04, an Emory class Fast Attack Replenishment ship stationed at Earle Weapons Station, Earle New Jersey.

Two months after reporting aboard, we left on a 6 month Mediterranean deployment which was extended to the Arabian Gulf. We visited such interesting countries as Israel, Turkey, Greece, Italy, Spain and selected parts of the United Arab Emirates. We transited the Suez Canal in 32 hours and steamed past the Rock of Gibraltar, and spent many weeks in the Adriatic Sea while detached with NATO off the Bosnian Coast.

We arrived back in American waters around March this year and underwent an extensive shipyard period in Chester, Philadelphia. It was here that I left ship on new orders.

Over the last two years I have been trying to become a navy draughtsman, which I recently achieved, and I received new orders to a Submarine Tender, home ported in the Island of Guam.

I am currently on transfer leave and eagerly anticipating my new role on the USS Frank Cable, but for now I'll settle for the comforts of home; a real bed, home cooking and dry land.

For anyone who is thinking of joining the military, go ahead and do it. The places you'll visit, the people you'll meet and the experiences you'll have will be totally worthwhile and treasured for years to come.

Michael Normanton, this year's student representative on the Board of Trustees, gave much of the impetus to getting the council up and running.


Each student level from Form 1 through to Form 7 elected representatives and we met as a group several times over

The girls have the pleasure of worrying about getting the ball gown ready in time. This can sometimes cause friction between the couple as they bicker about colour matching and so on.



This year proved to be most successful with a first place to the junior drama team who totally blitzed the opposition with their great rendition of "The Terrible Fate Of Humpty Dumpty".


The junior debaters performed well but were just not good enough and were beaten by St. Mary's Stratford by a mere two points.



# FORM TWO DEBATING







The college are lucky to have the strong voice of John Plunkett on these occasions. His voice we have known about for some time so it was interesting to hear that he had written his own composition.






The behaviour and discipline of the boys was commendable. A full result booklet is to follow which will show that our school runners all finished within the top 95 out of 392. A very good effort.


Much promise, on paper, pre-season saw a strong looking unit ready to take on all new-comers. Our first match against Hawera showed clearly that this would be no easy season. The


### THE LIFE OF A RUGBY PLAYER JUST **BEGINNING TO PLAY**





Soon everyone else arrived from the town. His next years of life were spent in a small cell, What would he become, only time would tell?


He decided, in prison, he would do no more that was wrong,

The work isn't easy, he doesn't find it easy, but he gives it his best shot. No complaints, nor bitterness, just dedicated effort.

It's just the way he carries himself, a challenge almost as if to say 'If you can do it, I can do it too .... and better!' That challenge has hit home to me. It makes me tense, like a coiled spring, filled with anxiety and adrenalin. It has made me realise what I could achieve ... accomplish, if I drove myself one hundred percent.

I have no disability, so I don't need to push myself any harder. My student, however, totally deaf to the outside world, has to reach beyond all normal realms, jump higher than he is capable, stretch further than is possible. He has a right to complain, to be bitter, but he doesn't seem to show that, to me anyway.

His strength, his determination, is a message to us all. An act of defiance, an immovable desire to succeed.

There is no doubt in my mind that he will continue to climb the barriers, accept the challenges. The question is though, will we?

We were lucky, we only had 80 ducks living on our flat. Some people have up to 200. I class them as a pest.

You can ring up DOC to come and get rid of them for you, well that's what I thought till my mate's father called them up. They came out to his place alright, but when they went to shoot them, they only fired blanks at them. They said they were not allowed to kill them. They set up a gas gun which gives off a loud bang to scare the ducks away. This works but only creates more of a problem for neighbouring farmers, who then do the same. A week later all the ducks were back again. It was a pretty poor effort by DOC I thought.

During duck shooting season they fly around in pairs mainly. This means not many are getting shot at duck shooting season and there are getting more and more. Most people would rather shoot Mallard and Grays. The only time they are really getting shot is when it is illegal.

I don't think they should be classed as a duck because they live and eat differently. They live on the paddocks and land on the hills when we chase them. You hardly ever see a paradise duck on water whereas Mallards and Grays live most of their lives flying around or on the water. Their eating habits are different too. The Mallards and Grays eat weeds and other things out of the ponds whereas the paradise ducks eat grass and other stuff. Sometimes you will find them feeding in a pond, but not very often.

In the future I hope the government make it legal to shoot paradise ducks all year round or at least during the months January to March when they are moulting. These are my thoughts and I believe there are people out there that feel the same way.



1995 is a year when New Zealanders can finally feel good about themselves.

It began - as always - way back in January, and quickly flicked through the calendar to the contesting of the America's Cup, that mighty trophy of trophies that has so narrowly eluded Kiwi clutches for the last decade.

From the beginning, New Zealand was always a contender. Through the stages of the Louis Vitton Cup, the New Zealand onslaught beneath the direction on Peter Blake and Russell Coutts sent the other teams running for cover - some even sought sanctuary on the bottom of the sea. The result was inevitable. New Zealand through to the final, against one of the most 'popular' men in international yachting circles, Dirty Den himself.

The resultant five-nil whitewash - or blackwash - of the opposition was heard back in this country by the greatest support team behind any campaign; 3.6 million odd. Kiwis danced at the Auckland Yacht Club headquarters to the strains of "It's a kind of Magic" and "We are the Champions", while their compatriots sat at home, redsocked and wide awake, glued to their television sets.

This year also was the Rugby World Cup year. New Zealand sent the fittest, most well-prepared side yet to the tournament, and again New Zealanders' hearts swelled with pride as we watched Jonah run through the opposition back-lines, as unstoppable and undeniable as the sheer determination of the Kiwi campaign itself.

Some felt - and still feel - disappointment over the final result. I disagree. The side of a nation on the other side of the world, with a fraction of the other's population, may walk onto a park and be beaten, sure. But if this same side can extend the hosts before a home crowd, while crippled by food-poisoning, as far as to the point where the referee may have to decide the winner on the number of players sent off during the tournament, they can still hold their heads high. Otherwise rugby is not what I have previously understood it to be.

The Bledisloe Cup brought yet more moments of pride. Jeff Wilson paid back the far corner for last time's narrow miss, and it was another blackwash - two -nil - against our favourite adversaries on the rugby field.

Not only in rugby and yachting have we staked our claim to international fame, but Michael Campbell's recent form shows that again New Zealanders are climbing through the ranks of the international golfing elite.

While New Zealand has climbed to the heights in sport, we have also witnessed one of our own receiving the highest honour possible in the British Empire. Sir Edmund Hillary, the first man ever to scale the mighty heights of Everest, was awarded the Order of the Garter, and stood alongside other international figures in the ceremony.

1995 marks a very significant anniversary for the older - and indeed the younger - generations of Kiwis; the fiftieth anniversary of the end of the Second World War. The cost of this conflict is immeasurable, but in lives it numbered in the tens of millions. New Zealanders answered the call to fight off the threat to international peace that the Axis represented, and stood proudly with the Allies to halt and then remove this shadow of fear from the lives of future generations. Men such as the late Sir Charles Upham epitomised the Kiwi in war; fierce, totally committed, and just damn brave.

Finally, this year is the one hundred and fifty-fifth since the signing of our founding document, the Treaty of Waitangi.

This marks our progression together as a nation, just as surely as sport, honours and war do. For the first time in many years, there is evidence of a growing harmony and final settlements among the brothers of the Aotearoa whanau, and tangible evidence that we have a bright future to look forward to. And it's only August!






### **FENCING**



### 7th Form Reading Tutor Programme


This programme involves 7th Form students assisting junior students with reading and related skills. The peer support is often as valuable as the tutoring.





During the year each of the Form levels had the opportunity to participate in a "retreat" day. Form Three journeyed on an Emmaus walk to Ferndale Hall










### THE NEW ZEALAND QUILT PROJECT

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

Heath was the recipient of the National Bank Award for English and the Social Sciences Award. He also received the Gaines Award which is given to a top academic


student who is intending to pursue law.
