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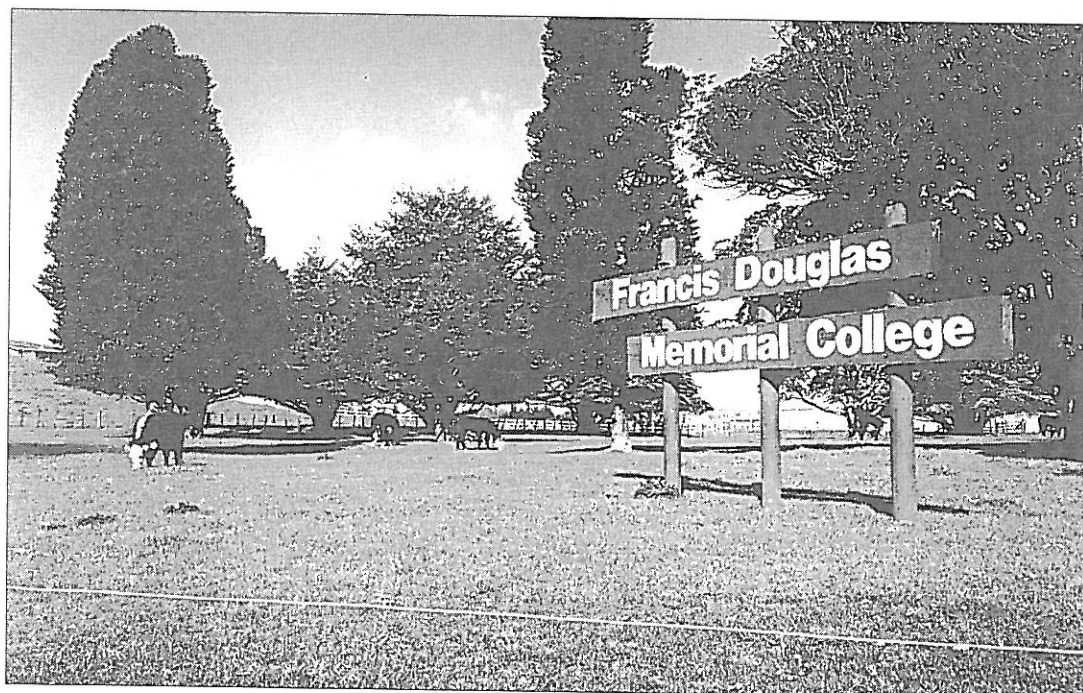

DEDICATION - BROTHER ROBERT



Brother Robert left FDMC in 1993 and is now living in Bolivia. Recently he wrote.....



I found my way to the Radio San Gabriel community which is in the centre of the city about a half hours drive from the airport. What I didn't realise was that the following Wednesday was Ash Wednesday and the Carnival season was just starting and that nothing would be open until the following Thursday. On the Monday a group of four of us made an all day excursion to Copacabana on the shores of Lake Titicaca. The Virgin of Copacabana is the patron of Bolivia and it is a centre of pilgrimage all year round. It's about a three hour trip from La Paz including a ferry crossing. The border between Bolivia and Peru goes through the centre of the lake but on the trip there we skirted through the border with Peru a couple of times. There are a couple of islands in the lake which contain Inca and pre-Inca ruins.

The city proper and our community is at 3500 metres; the college is at about 3000 metres and we went further down the canyon to about 2500 metres and dined in an outdoor restaurant on duck. There is a noticeable change in climate the lower you go and it's quite pleasant and warm at lower altitudes.

The Provincial decided that the Brothers working on the project (three from Spain, one from the United States, and myself) would meet in La Paz on 1st September to begin planning the Project. Until then the Provincial asked that I stay in the Radio

San Gabriel community and try to understand something about the Aymara culture and spend three months in Cochabamba at the Language Institute studying the language.

The Aymara Indian group is the largest of the Indian groups, with its own culture and language which have come down from the Inca civilisation. This group in Bolivia makes up 25% of the population of Bolivia which is nearly 7 million.

The low quality of education in the rural Aymara area is a problem. 25% of the teachers lack any qualification and the other 75% have a minimum formation. 55% of the rural Indian schools offer education for the first three years of primary but the learning achieved is minimal. The dropout rate after the first 8 years of education is 90%.

The aim of the project is to improve the teaching standards in a number of rural Indian schools. The project will involve working with 300 teachers who are teaching about 6000 students.

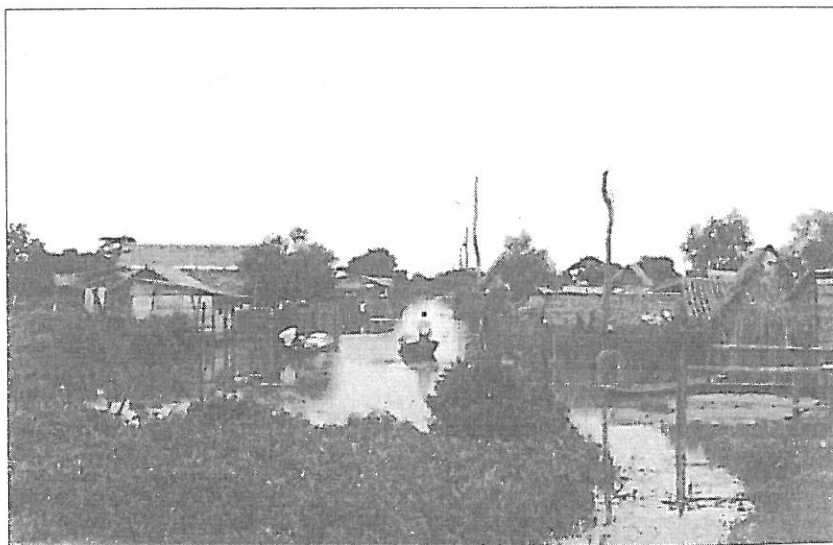
Adjacent to the Indian Agricultural school which the brothers have been running in the Altiplano for the last five years, they have just finished building an educational complex which will be used not only for the general education of the Aymara people but as the base from which this project also will operate. The centre is located in the Andes about an hour's drive out of La Paz at an altitude of 4000m.

The brothers involved in the project will need to do some study of the Indian language and, with the resources of Radio San Gabriel and the teachers concerned, publish bi-lingual textbooks to cover all areas of the curriculum from Years 1 to 12. Brothers

will visit the teachers in their villages to assist with practical implementation of the curriculum and courses will be run in the centre to improve their practical expertise.

The project is expected to take up to six years and the team to be involved will be made up of brothers from Spain, the United States and New Zealand.

I made a couple of trips to the Language Institute and enrolled myself for two six week courses in Aymara. On these six week courses there is a ratio of one teacher for each student so it will be more intensive.





DEDICATION - BROTHER DAVID



I have spent a fair bit of time during the last two weeks trying to get my identity card sorted out. It was nothing major - just six visits to Immigration whereas as far as I could see it could all be done in one hour. However, I finally got it - it was the first time in my life that I have had all my finger and thumbprints taken. They have the fingerprints of everyone in Bolivia with an identity card.



I am now in Cochabamba doing the language course. The course involves four hours of class each morning and the afternoon is available for working with tapes and doing written work.

With only myself and the teacher for each lesson I don't get time to relax. The pronunciation of Aymara is extremely difficult - there are many guttural sounds which don't exist in English or Spanish and often

La Paz is built on the side of a hill. Whenever you have to go anywhere it always involves walking up and down hills. With the shortage of oxygen nobody moves very quickly!

they run three or four consonants together, but I am starting to get the hang of it.

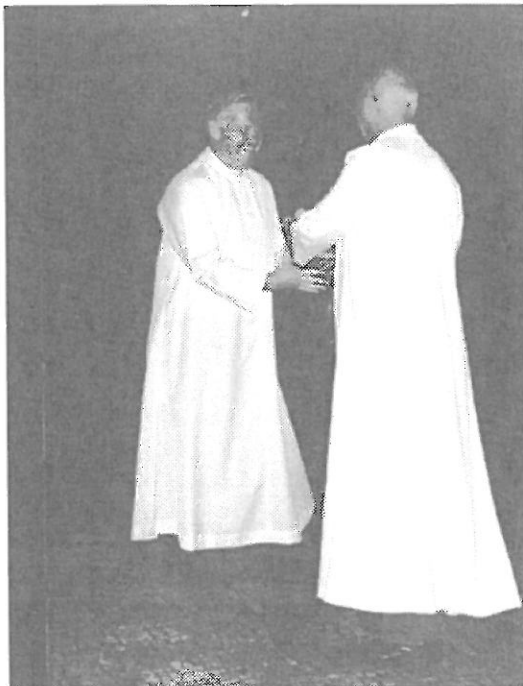
BROTHER ROBERT

Shane Bloomfield (13)

Third Form Pupil, Inglewood. Died in motor accident. Sadly missed.

Stephen Fox (36)

Attended FDMC early 1970's. Suddenly in N.P. Parents Maurice and Belinda, PTA members. R.I.P.

Fr Paul Goddard (43)

Inspirational leader at FDMC 1965 - 1971. Missionary Priest with Colombans. After some years on leave was about to take up Priestly ministry in Auckland Diocese.

Stephen Johnston (42)

Died in UK (1995). Remembered as a diligent student in late 1960's.

Andrew Harris (32)

FDMC 1976 - 1981. Died in a storm after climbing Mt Everest along with fellow guide and several of the group. FDMC was Andrew's only NP school where he was a popular student and a keen soccer player. He began his mountaineering career with his father on Mt Taranaki while at school.

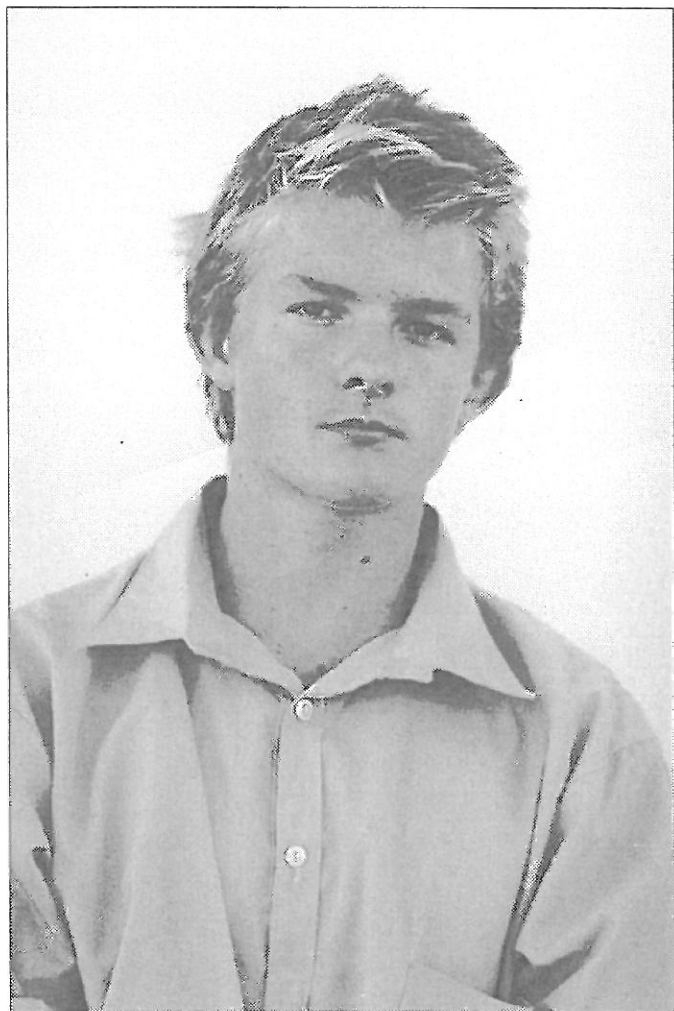
SHANE BLOOMFIELD born 27 SEPTEMBER 1982 died 2 MARCH 1996

Shane was an adventurer. From the time of his birth six weeks prematurely he was right into life and all its aspects. He was just so keen to get started and always looking out for something new to explore. He consistently had many projects on the go - bonsai, calligraphy, drawing, painting, hunting, cacti, computers, chemistry experiments, cooking, reading. He was a devourer of books which frequently led him to misjudging time - late nights and late mornings, often the last to arrive at St. Patrick's primary school even though he lived right across the road. His various nicknames make an insightful comment on the wonderful person Shane was: The Big Friendly Giant, Absent-Minded Professor, Blondini.

Academically, he was very gifted and used his gifts to achieve the high standards he set himself. He was Dux of St. Patrick's in 1995, a target he set himself when promised a computer by his parents if he achieved it. This reflects how steadfast and focussed he was in reaching the goals he set himself. His parents reflected that when he started at Francis Douglas Memorial College this year he was determined to experience everything the College had to offer, go through to Form 7 and then start on what the world had to offer. His thirst for knowledge and zest for life were a wonderful model for all those he came in contact with.

Shane's parents expressed how proud they were of Shane and of his achievements. "He crammed a lot of life into his 13 years. Sometimes an unfinished symphony is best."

The College offers Shane's parents, Sharon and Mark, and his brother Matthew, deep condolences and prayerful sympathy.

Father Francis Douglas's name lives on as an inspiration for students. Mrs Eileen O'Neil's name lives on in the hearts and lives of those past pupils, staff and Brothers.

MR ANDREW HARRIS

On 18 July representatives of the college staff and students gathered to pay tribute to Andrew Harris, an old boy (1976-1981) who was lost in a blizzard on Mount Everest after reaching the summit.

At the mass conducted by Fr David Monaghan, which was attended by Andy's parents, Ron and Mary Harris, the congregation was told of Andy's love of mountaineering, which began when he completed his first summit of Mount Egmont at the age of 11. He got the mountaineering bug and when he left school he began a career that took him from mountain guiding at Mt Cook, to acting as a guide for several scientific expeditions in Antarctica, to a heliskiing business in Queenstown and to the very top of the mountaineering profession with his expeditions in the Andes and the Himalayas.

His final expedition ended in disaster on the slopes of Everest - ironic because as a mountaineer he was careful, meticulous in his preparation and absolutely professional in his approach.

The college offers its sincere sympathy to Andy's parents and to his brother, Dr David Harris (now living in Saranac Lake, New York).

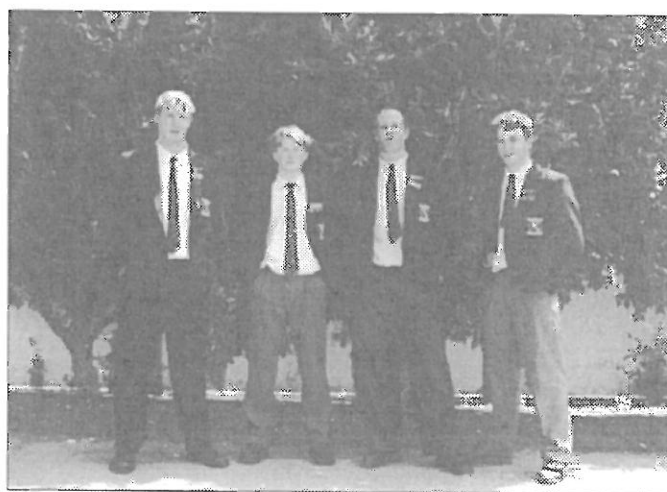

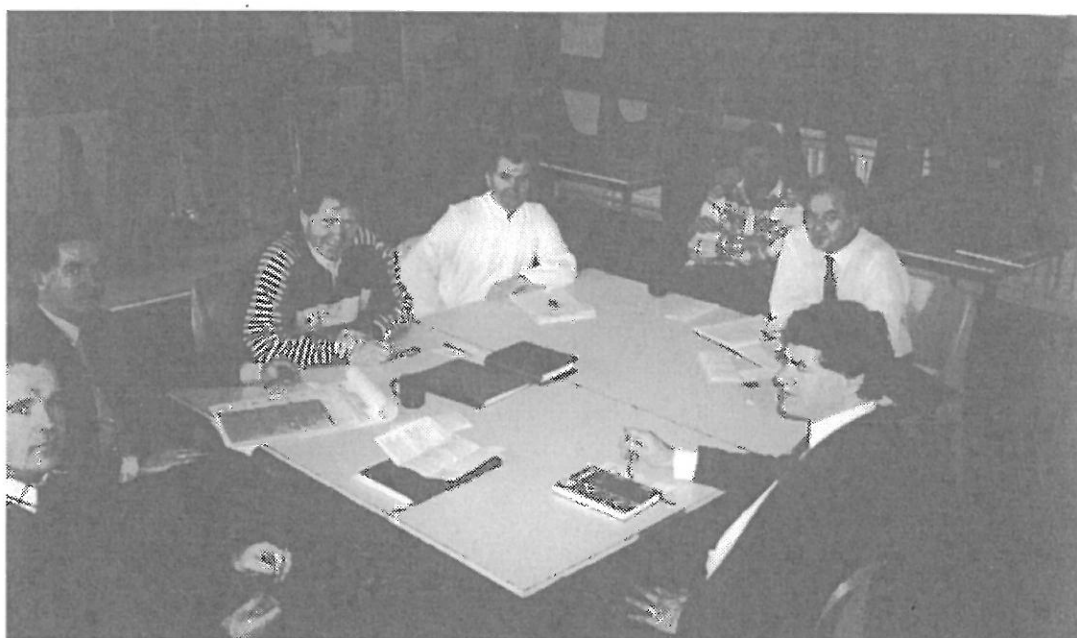

Their work usually goes unnoticed in the school community and they should be congratulated for their smooth running of the school.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Francis Douglas Memorial College is indeed a special place. The students, teachers, parents and wider community are supporting and helping one another to grow as individuals who have values and beliefs which reflect the College's special Catholic character.

The College is growing in character, attitude and numbers. Challenges are presented to students, teachers and parents, achievement is seen and progress made. There is a real positive sense of belonging at the College and we need to use this as a stepping stone to face the changes education and schooling are asking of each of us.

ROLL

The College roll based on March 1st figures was 585. There has been a large increase in the number of students in Form 1 - 81 in total in three home-room classes.

ACADEMIC

The increasing roll has brought about changes in classes and curriculum structure. For the first time there are three Form 1 classes with every likelihood that this will be the norm in the future.

Development of language programmes was an area identified in the Strategic Plan. Japanese has continued to develop with its extension into the Form 3 option choices with the intention that it should be offered at Form 4 in 1997.

Over the last few years there has been a continuous growth and development of the technology subjects within the College. Graphics is now offered through to Bursary level. The numbers looking to take Workshop Technology have also steadily increased.

1995 saw the first full year of a Form 5 Music class and it is anticipated that Music will continue to develop at the senior level.

Changes to the Link funding system and the need to do more for the less academic students at Form 5 have seen the introduction of two Vocational classes.

1996 has seen the introduction of the National Certificate in Retailing course. This is taught outside of normal class time and is delivered under the auspices of the Manakau Polytechnic.

One pleasing result of the School Certificate results in 1995 was the continued strength and improvement in the technology subjects such as Workshop Technology, Graphics and Art. Bursary results were solid with two Scholarships, 5 'A' Bursaries and 11 'B' Bursaries. Two students missed on gaining Scholarships by only one mark. At Bursary there was an increase in the percentage of students gaining entry to university.



STAFFING

There are 30 full time teachers and 8 part-time teachers currently on staff. The College administration and ancillary staff number 10 including office staff, library, teacher aides and caretaker. Mrs Margaret Hobson is the College Administration Manager. During the 1996 school year Mr Alastair Wells and Mrs Elyne Plumb are on leave and additional staff for 1996 include Mrs Christine Alexander, Sister Katrina van de Water, Mr Craig Thomas, Mr Russell Cleaver, Mr Graham Coxhead, Mrs Vonda Montgomery, Mrs Maria French, Mr Andy Cowie and Mrs Judi Mallalieu (Ancillary).

BOARDING HOSTEL

Brother Anthony as Hostel Manager and Mrs Margaret Fleming (Matron) are to be commended for administering a very good hostel. Their interest in the boys and their attention to duty are excellent. All supervisors are to be commended for their faithful duty and positiveness. The hostel domestic staff are an asset to the college and their interest and sense of belonging add to the good feeling in the hostel. Hostel Management Board meetings are held three times a year and area meetings (Opunake, Hawera, Stratford, etc) are held on an annual basis to allow feedback and discussion with our boarding parents. At present there are 105 boarders.



PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



PROMOTION

This is seen as a vital factor in keeping the College in the minds of our local community and beyond. It has been emphasised to the students, both day and boarding, that they as a group are our best promoters. College Open Days are held twice a year for day students and once a year for boarders - however the College is always open for visitors or those enquiring. Visits to primary schools and parishes Taranaki wide and local parishes are seen as important for our continued future as well.

DE LA SALLE BROTHERS COMMUNITY

Francis Douglas Memorial College is still very much seen as special to the Brothers and the Brothers' presence is much appreciated by parents, staff and students. The Brothers' Community is: Brothers Mark (Director), Anthony, William, Oliver, Tim and Gregory. I would like to specially mention the contribution of Brothers Oliver and Gregory - their presence is very much valued in the college community and their contribution to the appearance of the College grounds is outstanding.



COLLEGE CHAPLAIN

Father David Monaghan completes 17 years at the College in July. Father Monaghan's readiness, sensitivity and availability for Mass, sacraments, prayer and classes in our College is appreciated by all who come in contact with him.

CULTURAL

There are indeed many talented students in the College and over the past twelve months students have been involved in many areas: College Speech Finals, Theatre Sports, O'Shea Shield, Junior (Forms 1/2) Debating, Taranaki Speech & Drama Festival, Variety Evenings (with Individual Items, Song, Drama, Dance), College Bands (Jazz, Pop, Concert), Music Festival (with a Choir of 70 plus students from Forms 3 - 7).

The interest and support, training and encouragement by staff should be commended and acknowledged.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

A programme of staff development operates for the whole staff and this is co-ordinated by Mr Lindsay McMorran who is the Professional Development Co-ordinator. This included staff attending a two day First Aid Certification Course. Some staff are studying extramurally as well as staff being involved in the development of the new curriculum with emphasis on assessment techniques required for the Qualifications Framework. The De La Salle Brothers continue to sponsor staff attending courses at the LaSallian Centre, Narooma, New South Wales. Subject special courses organised by Palmerston North College of Education also involve a number of staff.

CATHOLIC CHARACTER REVIEW

A review of the special Catholic character of the school was held in August 1995. Sister Teresa Hanratty and Marcia Morrison from the Catholic Education Office in Palmerston North carried out the review. The process took five days and staff, students and parents were involved.

The report back by the review team to the Board of Trustees was very positive and supportive. Recommendations and suggested developments were made. I believe this was a very good process highlighting the positive awareness of staff and the caring attitude that flows from the staff to the boys and amongst the boys themselves.

As a result of this review a lunch time school Mass is now part of the college timetable and this is well attended by staff and students.

In addition to this Brother Mark McKeon has set up a Campus Ministry programme involving the training of students to minister and help out with the younger members of the College.

SPORTS

Eighty percent of the College student body play an individual or team sport. It is encouraging to see the enthusiasm, competitiveness and sportsmanship of the students. Outstanding achievements are noted at assemblies and presentations take place. Thanks to Mr John George (Sportsmaster), Mrs Elyne Plumb (Basketball 1995), Mr Andy Cowie (Basketball 1996), Mr Graeme Mustchin (Soccer) and Mr Andrew Murray (Cricket).



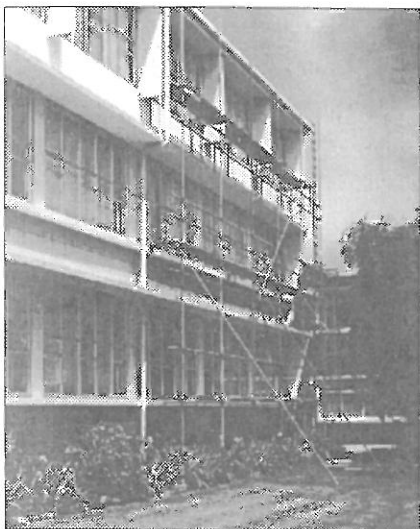


PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



MAINTENANCE/IMPROVEMENTS

The College and Hostel buildings were painted over the Christmas holidays 1995 and this has certainly given the College a much needed new look.



Other work completed included additional drainage work carried out on the fields, upgrading of the concrete playing areas in the courtyard areas, continued landscape improvement, concrete road-way to Agridome completed and carpeting of stairwells and corridors to reduce paint maintenance and add acoustic effect.

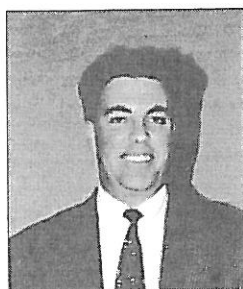

Staff changes didn't cease once the year started either. During the year there have continued to be comings and goings.



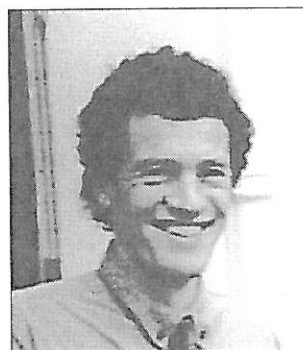

Russell Cleaver crossed town from New Plymouth Boys High to teach Mathematics and has contributed much to Cycling and Triathlon in the school.

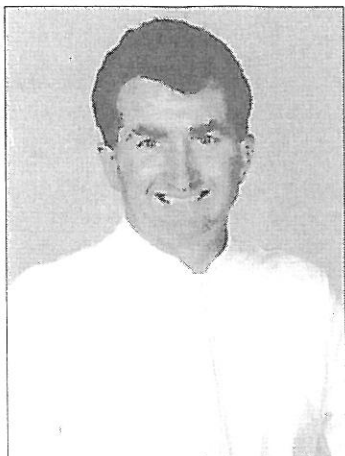

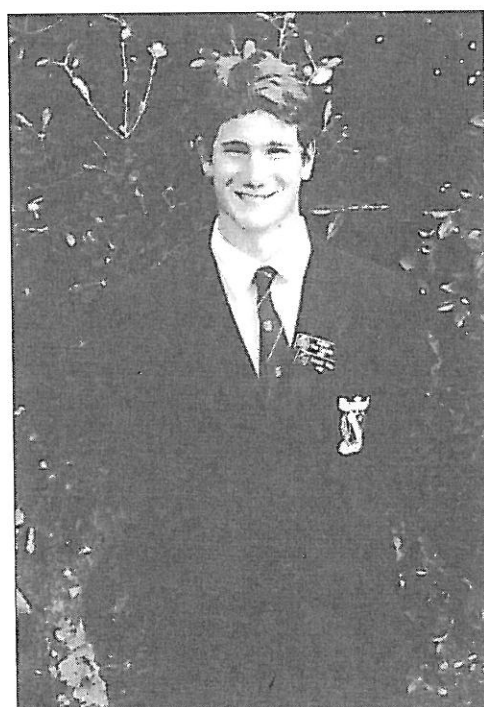
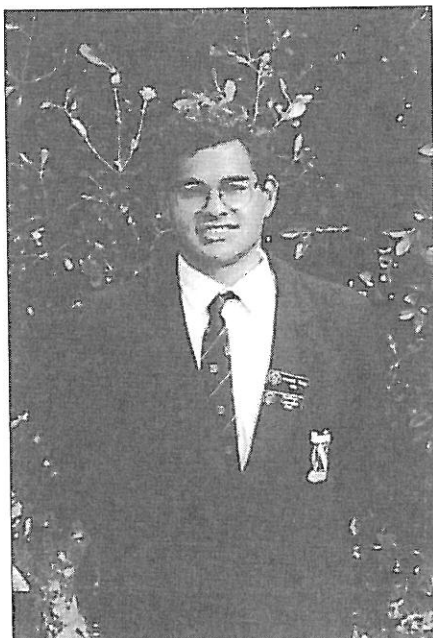

NAROOMA

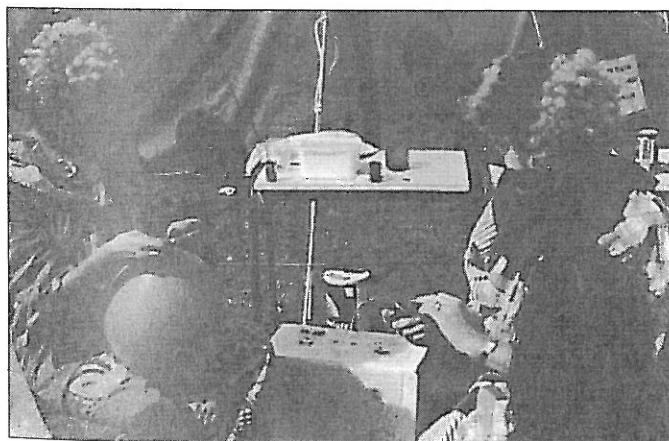


Once again the PTA has had a very successful year of fundraising and helping out at College functions.

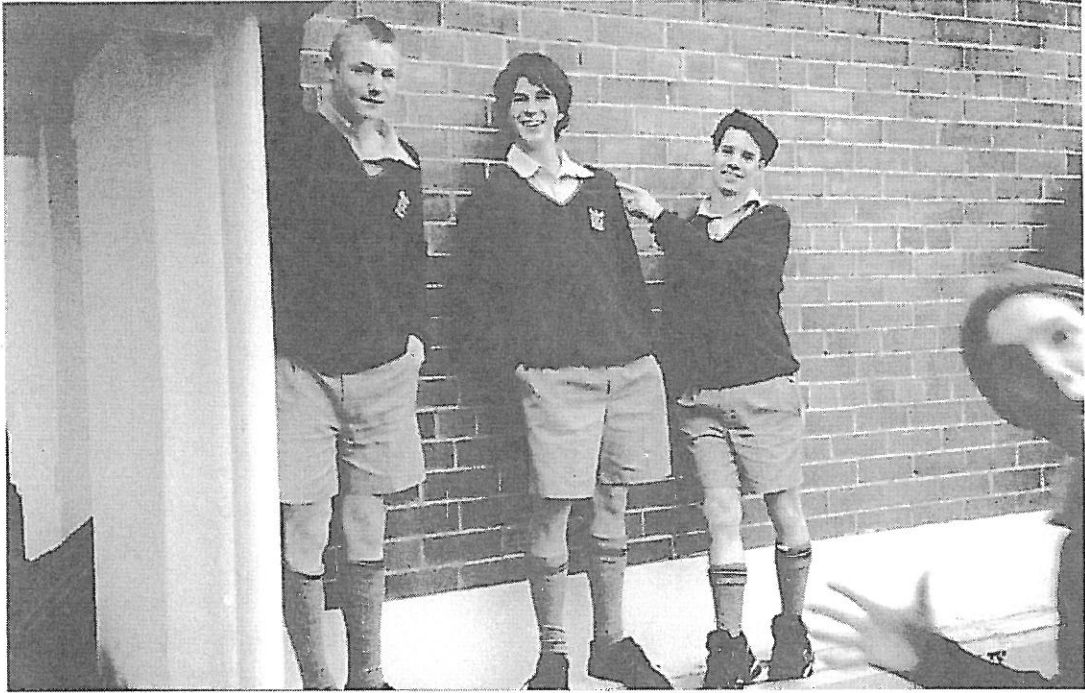
This was an experience never to be forgotten.

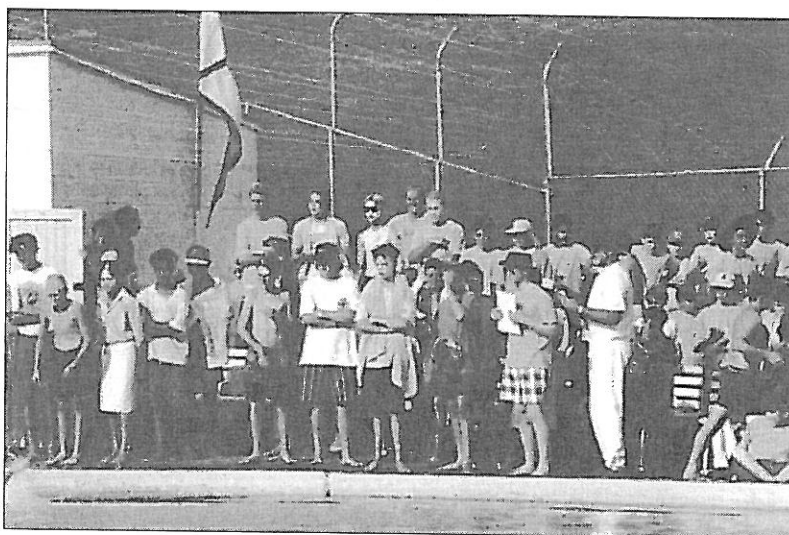
With only a second coming from the swimming sports, an event we expected to take out, the house spirit was down, and with the athletic sports coming up we were in big trouble.

This is what I hoped La Salle could do on the day, run and run fast. But the tragic loss of one of La Salle's young men in a car

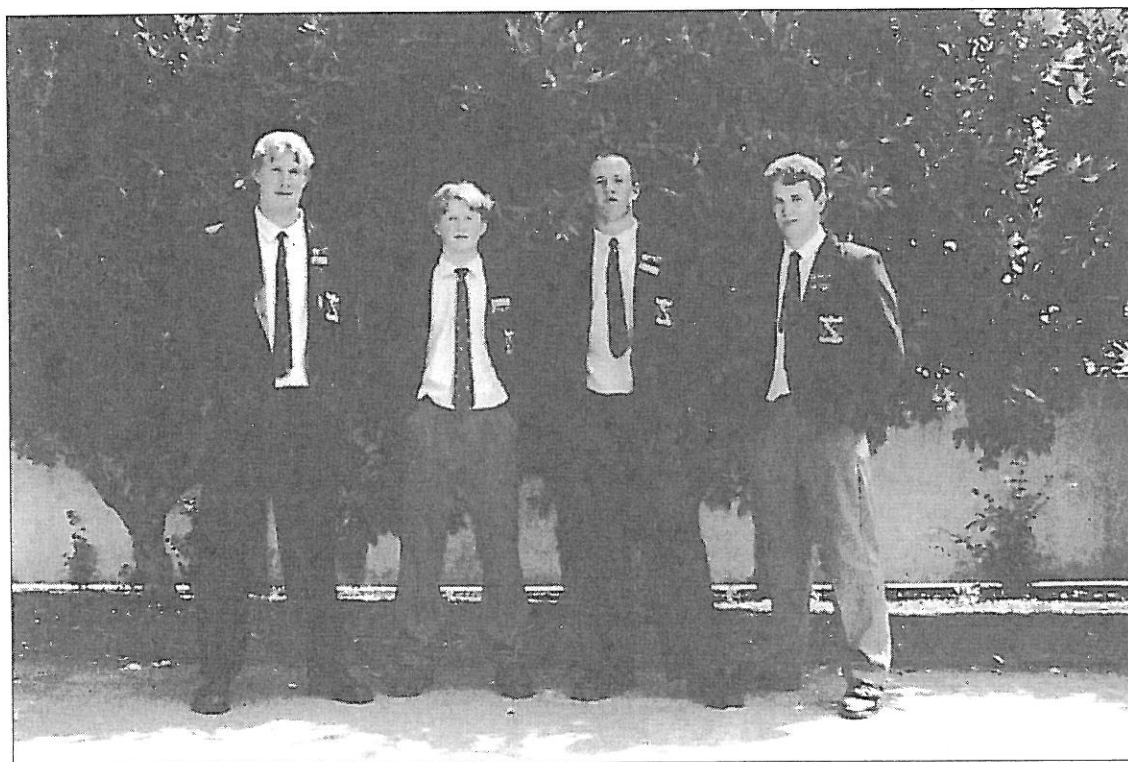

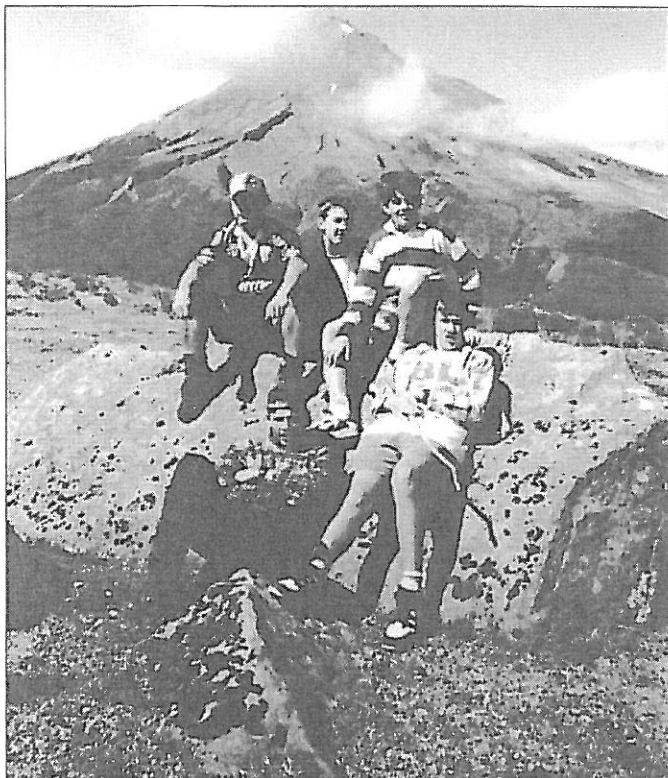

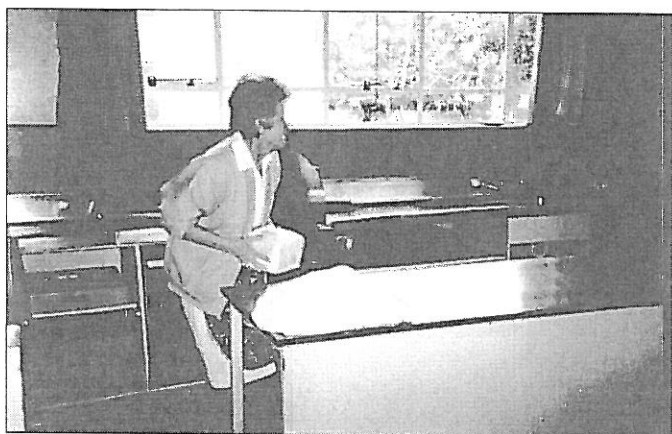


HOSTEL

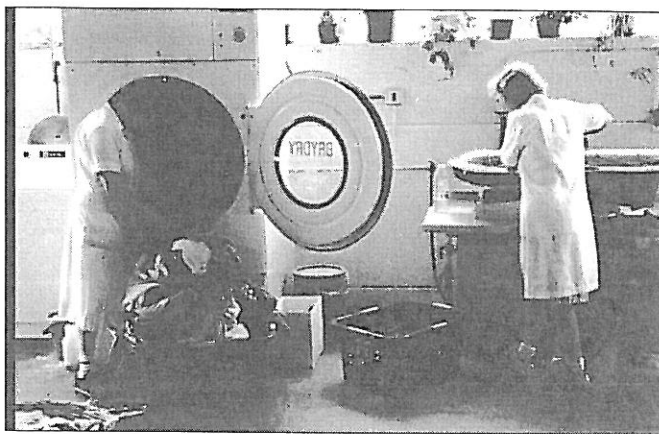

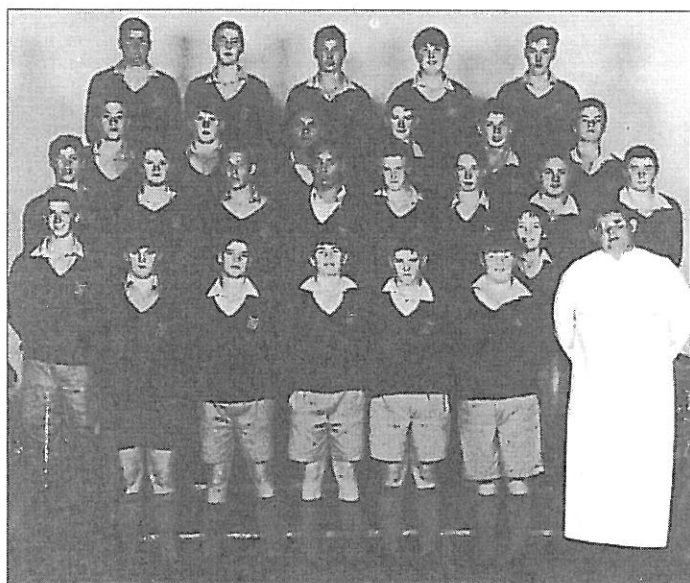
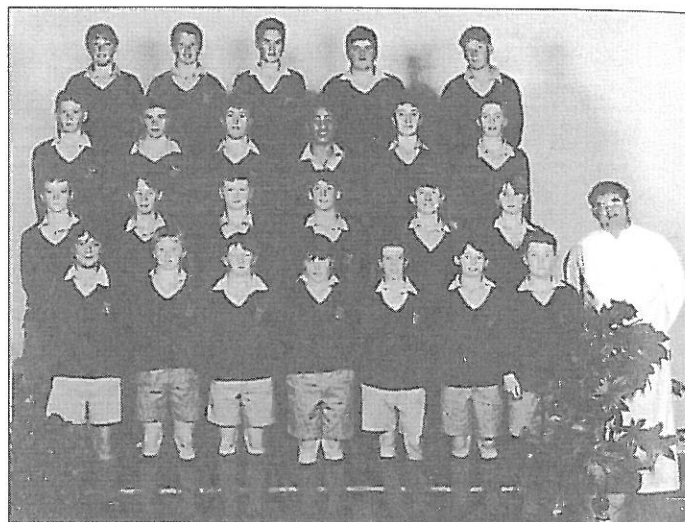

A great time was to be had by all, with an excellent atmosphere generated by the FDMC and SHGC students' warm personalities.

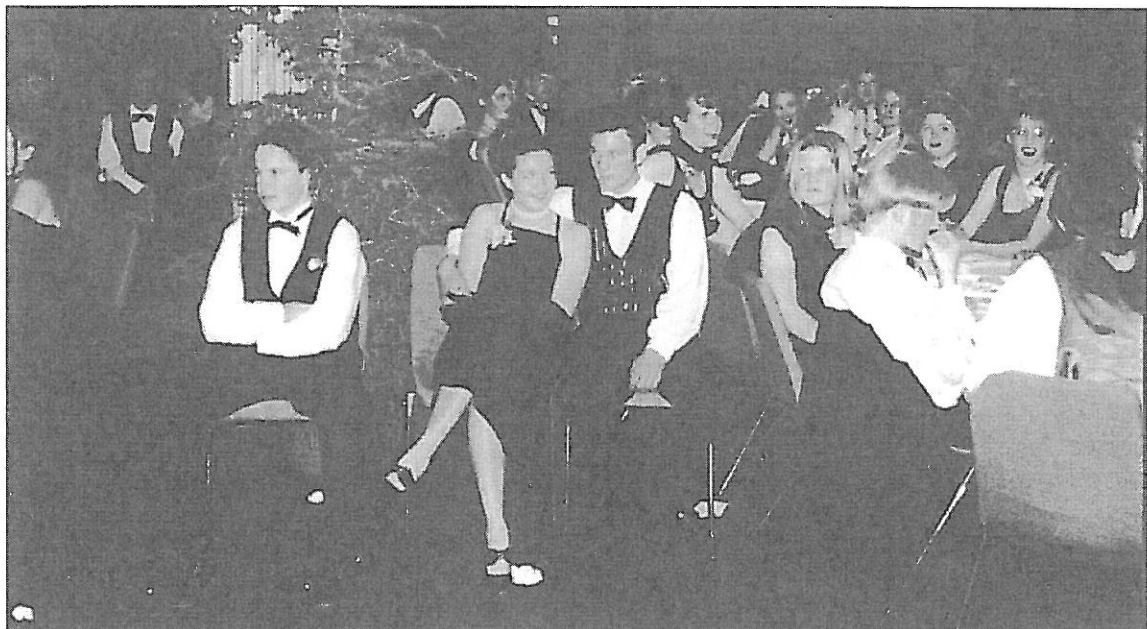

The evening drew to a close at approximately 12.00 pm at which time many students took the chance of other new adventures!

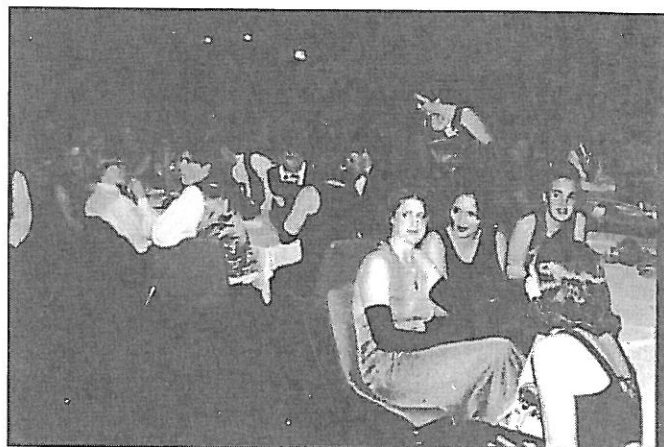
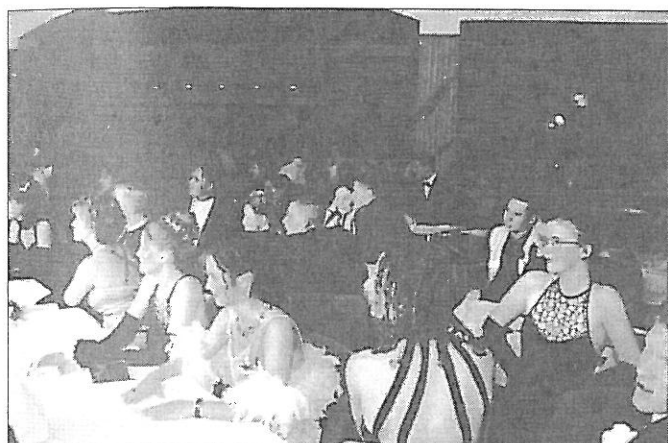

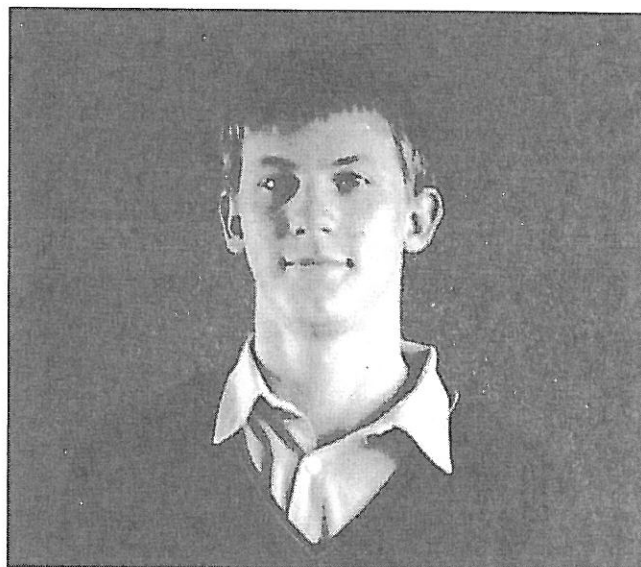
EXCHANGE STUDENTS

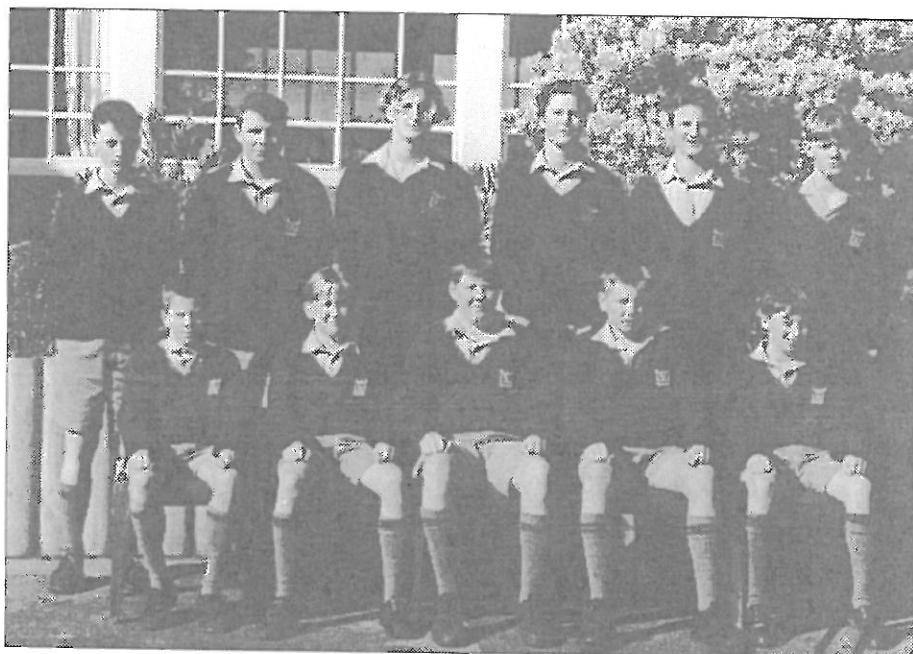

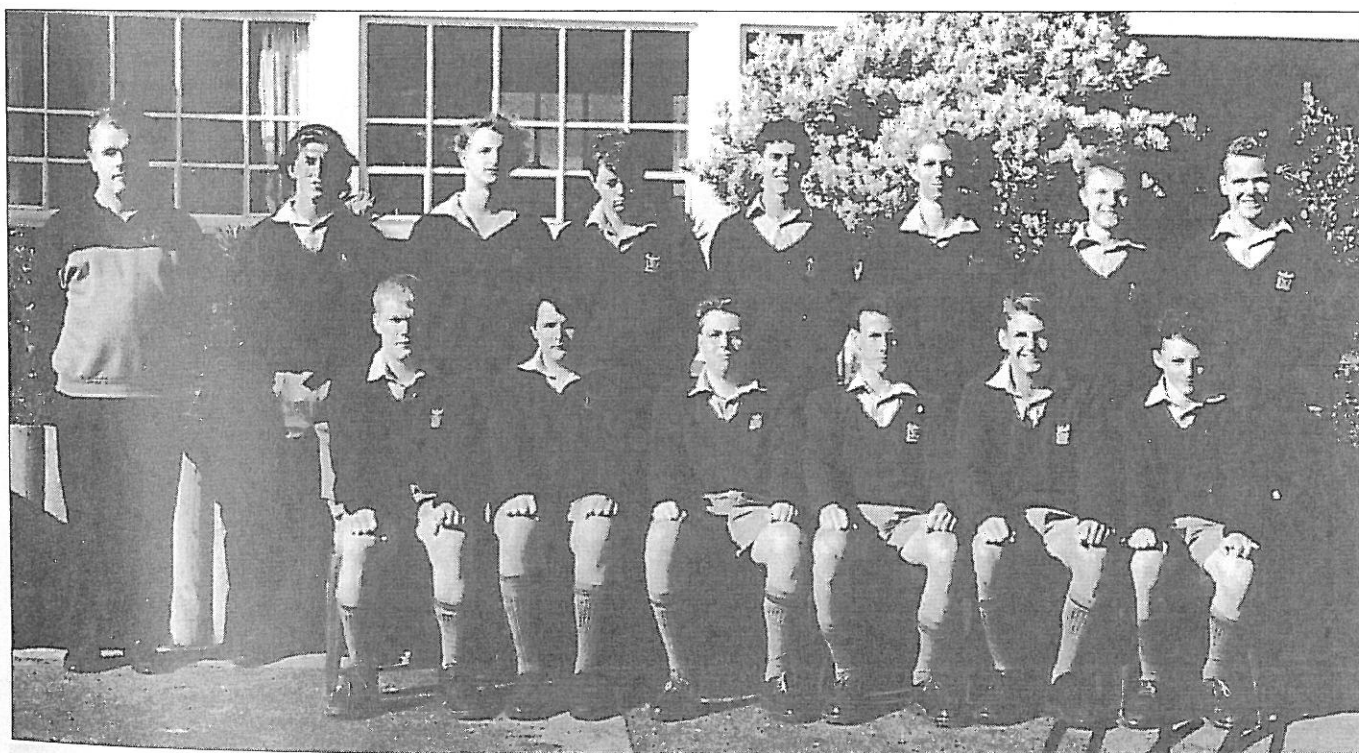

UNMAN, WITTERING AND ZIGO



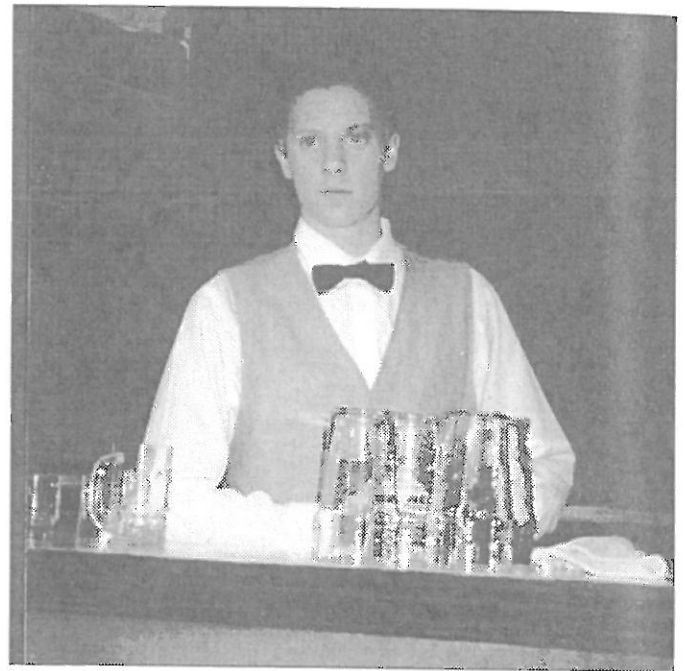

Our junior drama team, who were all 3rd formers, presented "Us and Them", a very interesting production involving people from the East and West. They worked very hard on what was quite a difficult script.

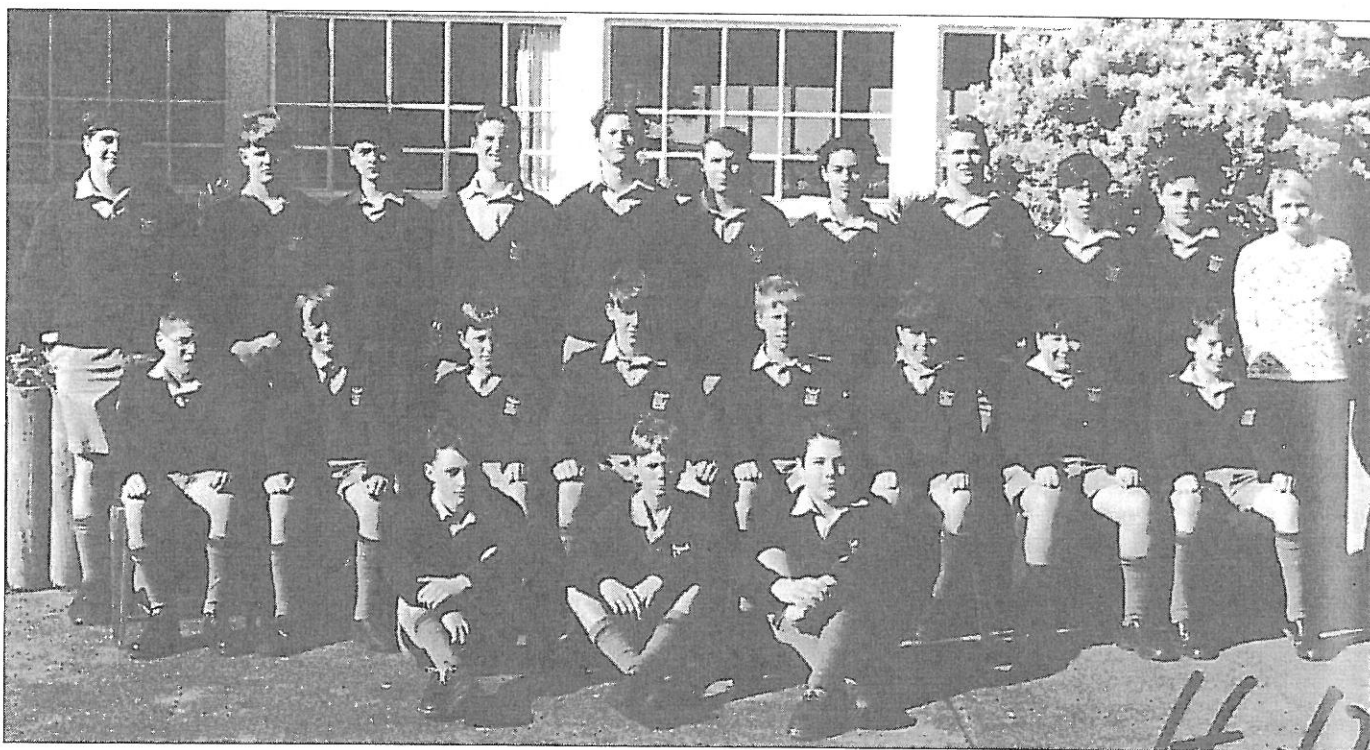

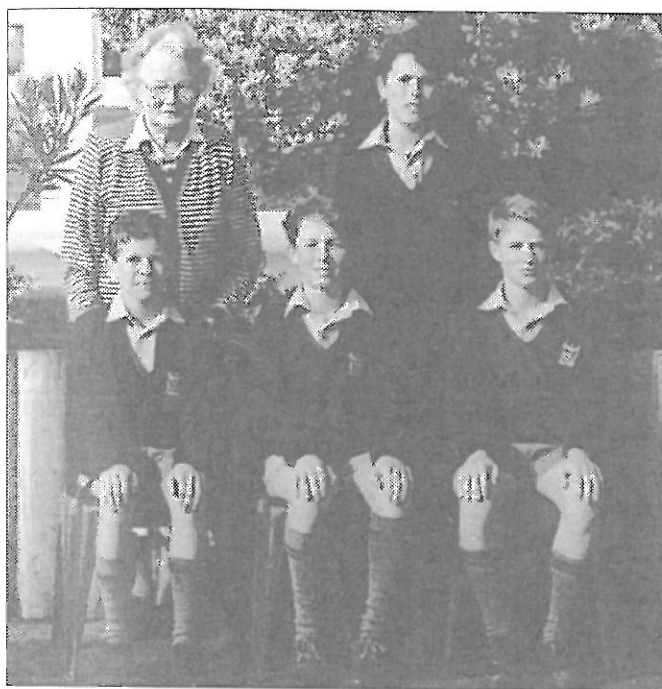

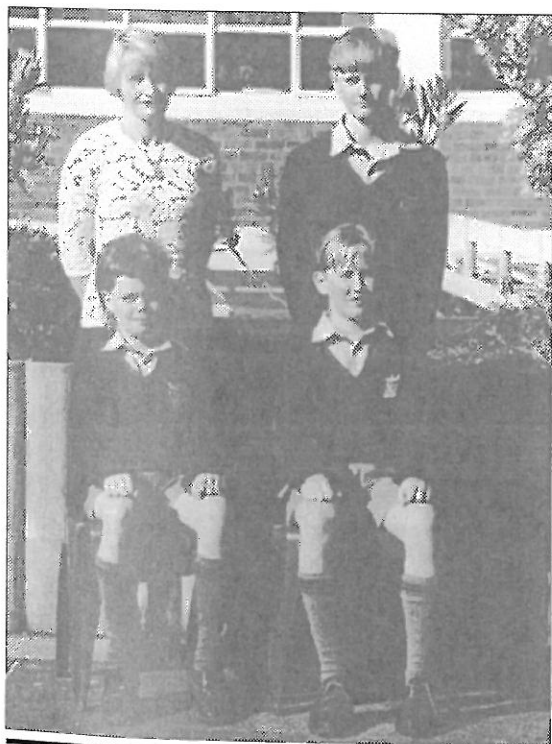


DEBATING

Rockquest was another venture for the up and coming band. After coasting through the heats in Hamilton they returned a

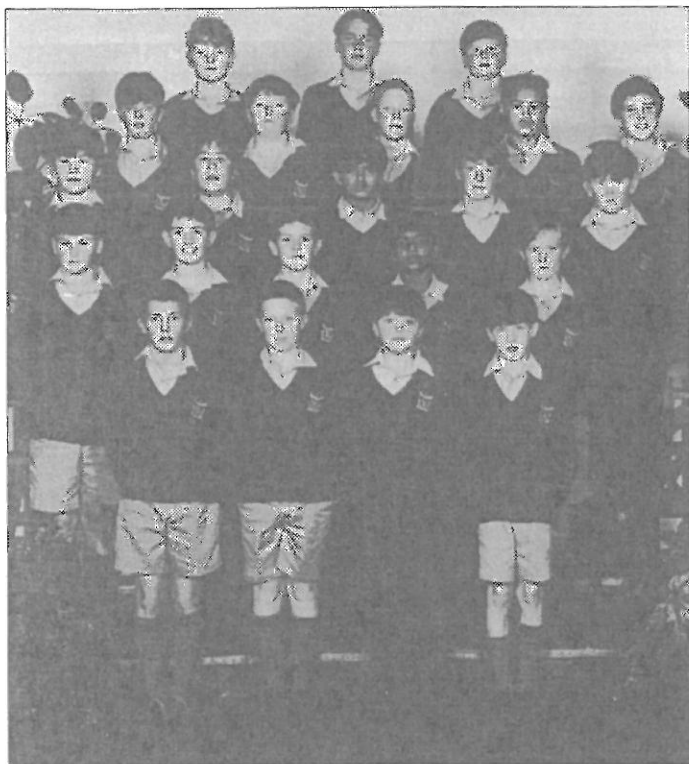

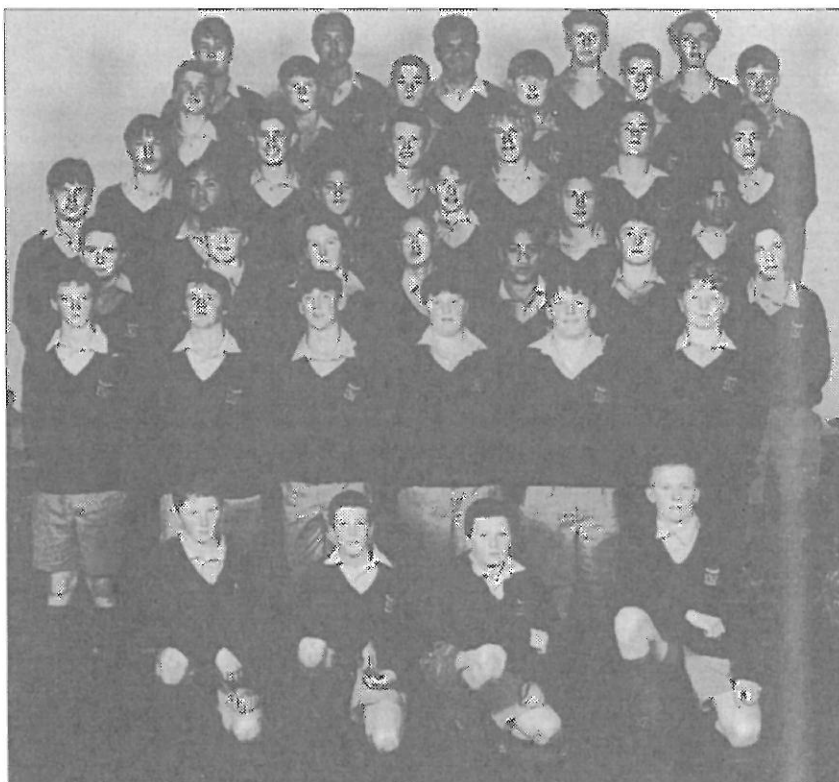

REVIEW CONCERT



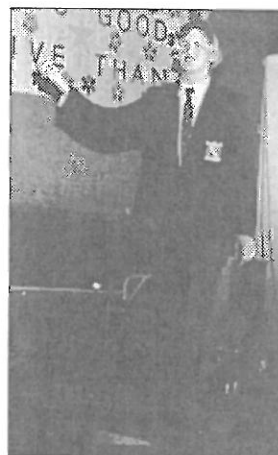

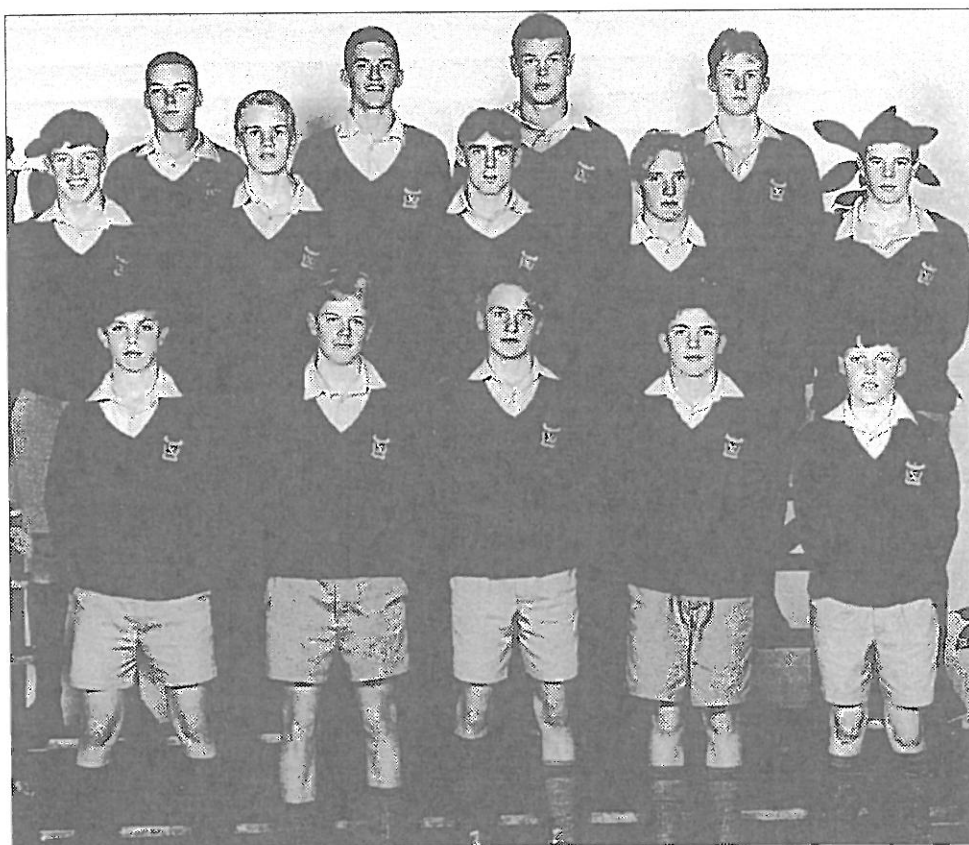

The teams each started at three minute intervals and rode a 16km course from Inglewood, down Mountain Road and return. In their first event of this type we were all pleased with the 3rd

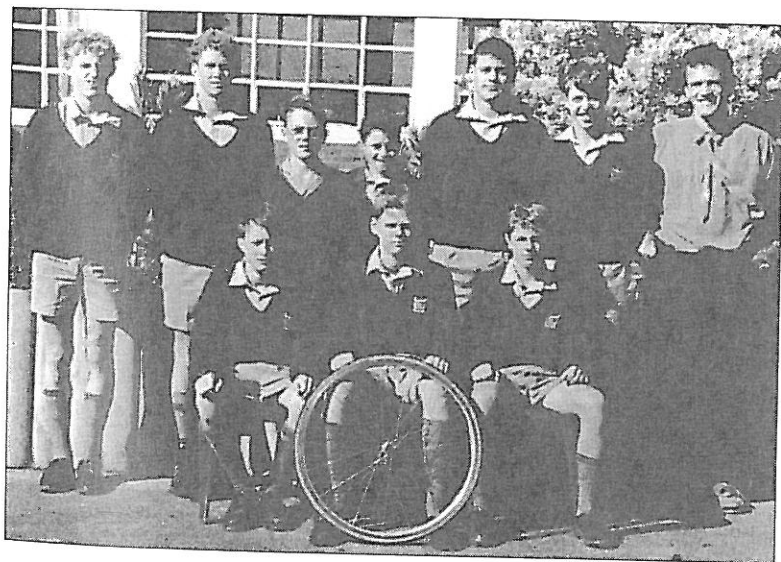

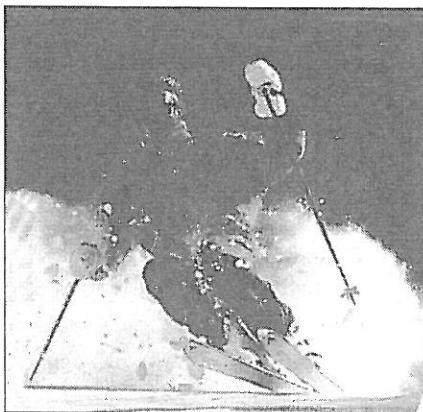


SKIING WRESTLING

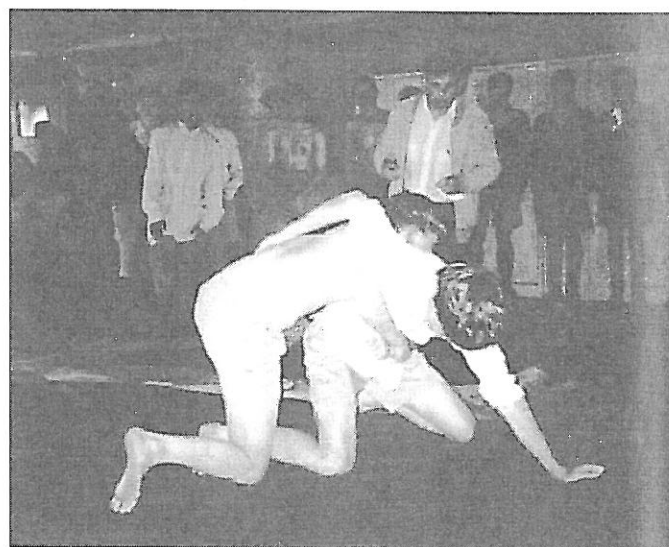
WRESTLING

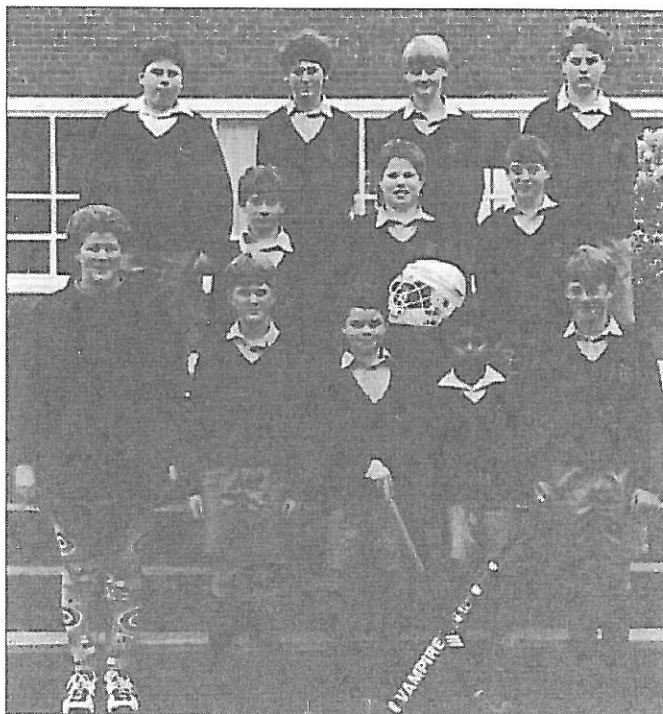

Our final Goal 3 The NZSS National Finals, with the top 16 Secondary School teams in New Zealand competing. The tournament comprising of 4 sections with 4 teams in each section. To obtain our aim of Top Eight we had to win or come 2nd in our section play. Winning 2 from 3 games put us into the quar-

ter finals and up against St Johns (Hamilton), who had beaten us twice in college games this year. We threw everything at St Johns, advancing to a 14 point lead at one stage. Eventually their size and our unforced errors took their toll with the final result in their favour by a mere 2 points (60-58).

Our goal now turned to placings 5th-8th and playing against PNBHS, the team that beat us at the Regional Tournament by 16 points. Again they were more urgent than we were, inflicting a 13 point loss (75-85) and putting us up against Logan Park (Dunedin) for 7th and 8th placing. The FDMC pride proved too great with the team comfortably beating Logan Park by 20 points (74-50). Mission Accomplished. Nationally ranked 7th.

Total games played 18 with a 13-5 result, amassing 1554 points for while conceding 1074 points. As Coach, I congratulate the team for the commitment on and off the court needed to claim the necessary results. I also thank Alex Kirk for taking on the role of manager and team physio, which required endless hours of organising so that events ran smoothly.

I would also like to thank all supporters for their timely positive thoughts and backing, all the office staff for the extra work load placed upon their already full load and finally to Brother Tim for his guidance and advice freely given.

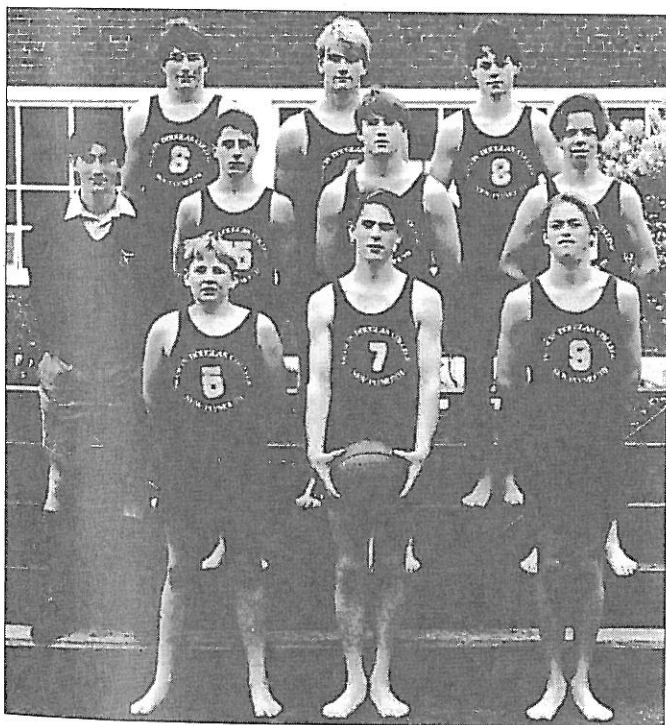
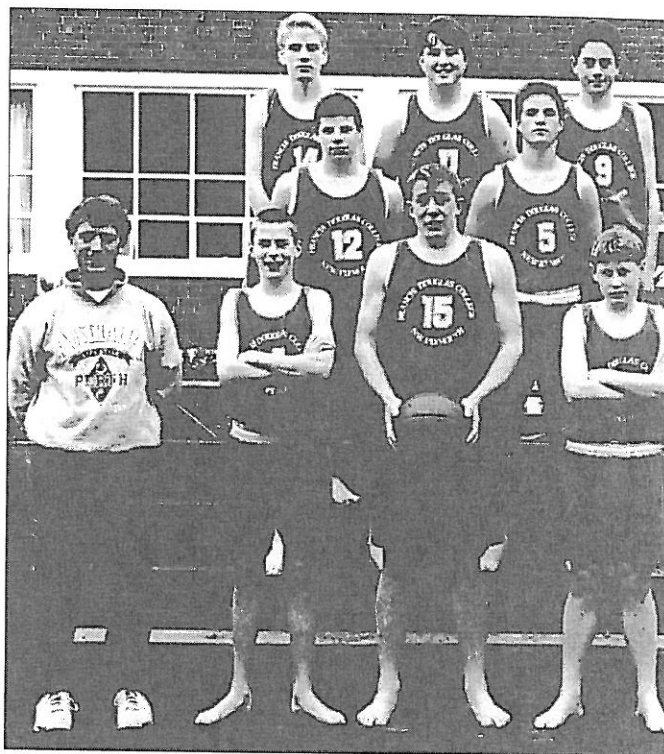


SENIOR B

Thank you to STARS Travel for sponsoring the A team and we hope to see you next year supporting the players.

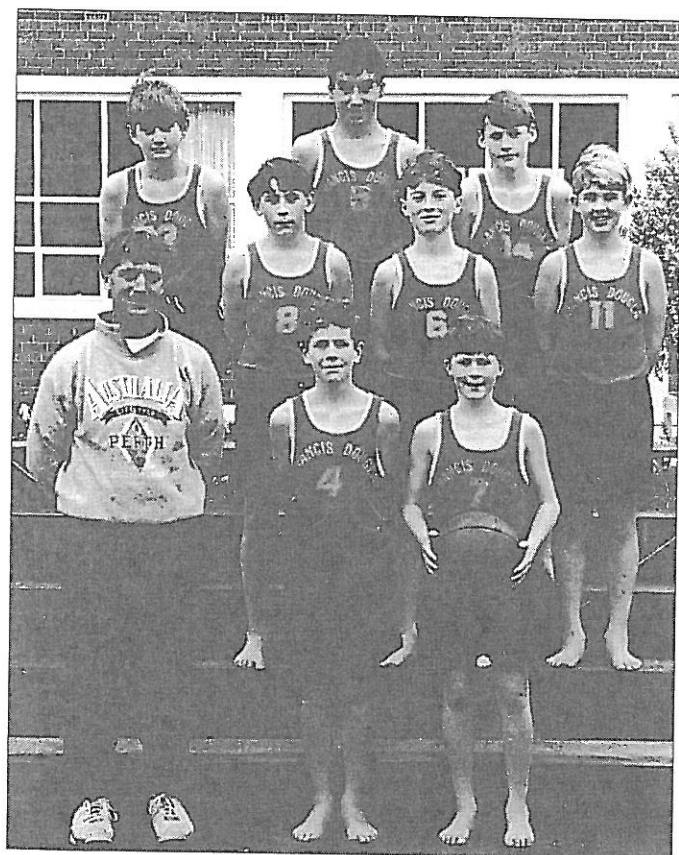

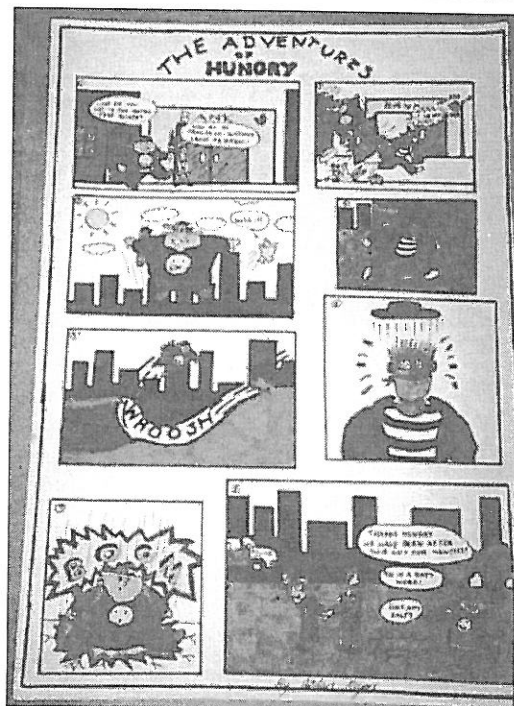
After I had my feet planted safely on the ground and I had taken a few deep breaths, I reattempted my climb, this time without any accidents.

I heard a crowd of people talking and screaming, mumbling and someone saying "Look, look." All I could remember was being hit on the head by a cricket ball.

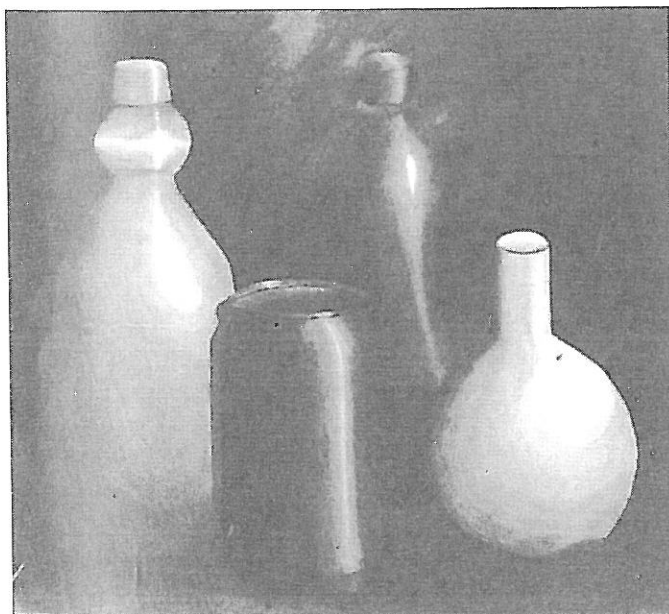

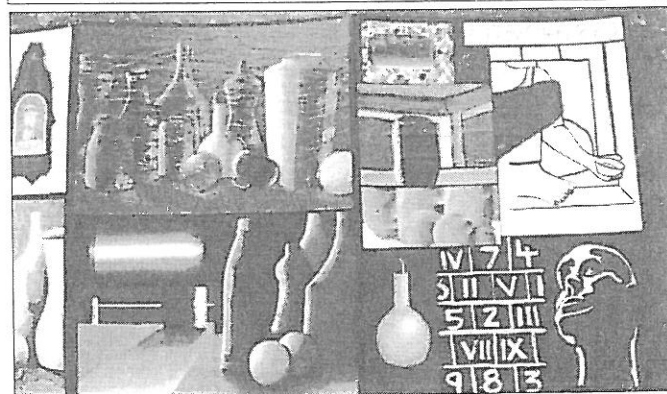

Graciousness, loyalty and respect were a few of my Grandfather's strong points and will be very sadly missed by those who were close to him.

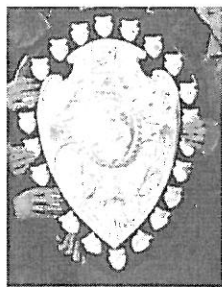


THE LOG OF WOOD

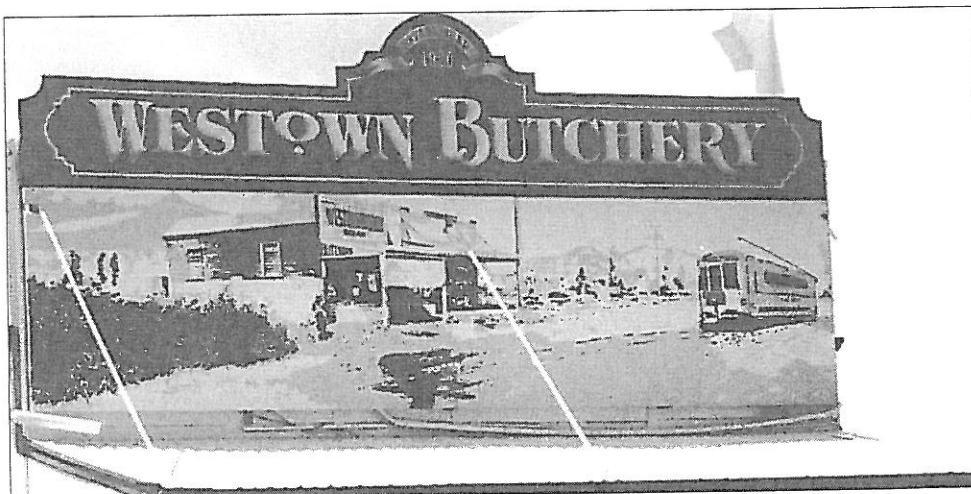

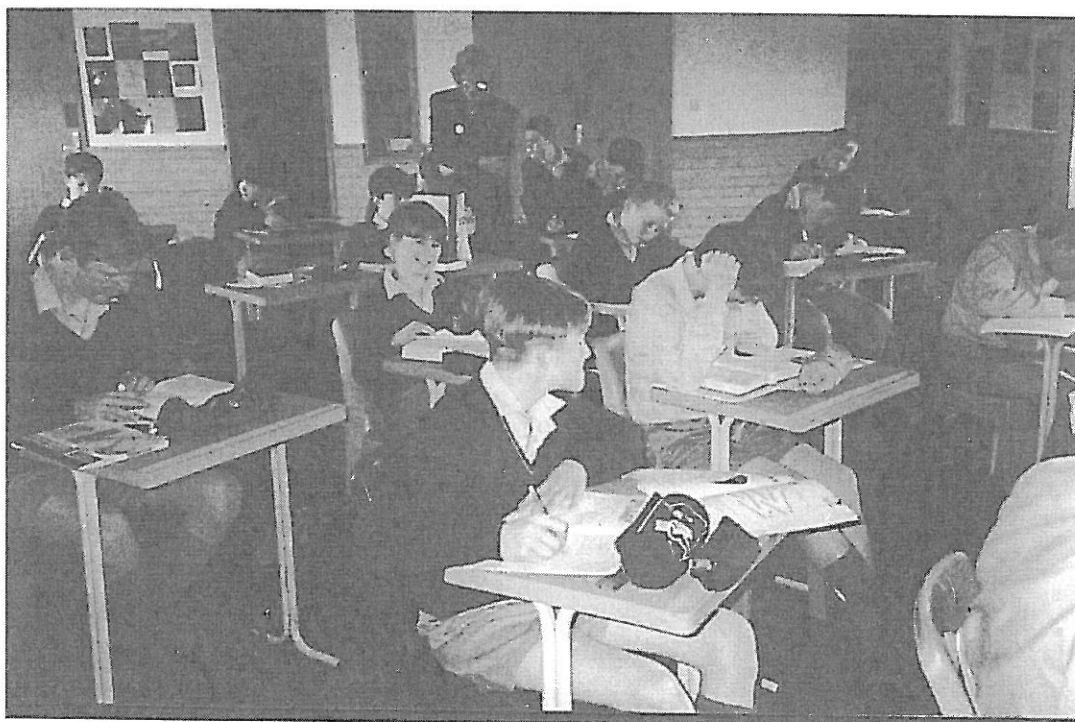

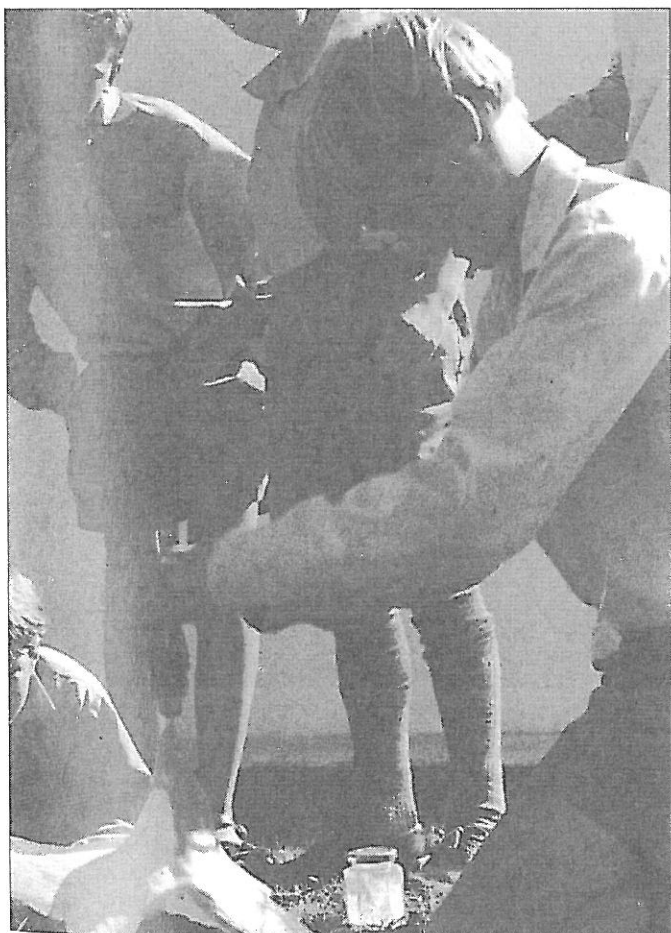
ACADEMIA



The Australian Science Competition is an event which Francis Douglas Memorial College enters annually. This year a record 425,000 students entered the Competition which is held throughout Australia, New Zealand and the Asia-Pacific region.

"The Competition provides participants with the opportunity to assess their performance on a range of skills and processes related to aspects of Science, like problem-solving, reasoning and critical thinking in Science. It also gives the most able students the chance to display their outstanding talents and simultaneously provides all participants with valuable information regarding their potential strengths and weaknesses in Science." (Prof. Jim Tognolini, Director Educational Testing Centre UNSW).

Francis Douglas Memorial College selected student entries on merit from each form in the College. The students acquitted themselves well. Quinten Werder in particular earned a High Distinction Award, placing him in the top 1% of students in New Zealand. 21 of our students earned Distinction Awards (next 10% of the country) and a further 21 earned Credit Awards (next 20% of the country). 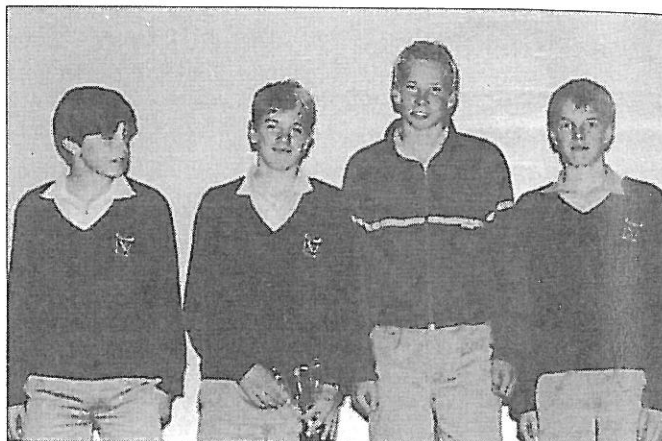


MATHS QUIZ

VOCATIONAL SKILLS

This year a new option called Vocational Skills was introduced into the syllabus being available to students in the 5th and 6th form levels. The course covers a wide and varied range of subjects and activities.



During the year, there have been many interesting trips undertaken, such as a great day away blackwater rafting at Waitomo, and a few days away in Wellington.

The Wellington trip was a great success with over half the students experiencing a big city for the first time. While they were able to attend a national careers expo, go shopping amongst the skyscrapers, and cover the general tourist attractions. Tele-Bingo was enriched by a very vocal live audience, one of the highlights for some.

Visits have also been made to the Ambulance Station at Base Hospital, industries such as Kiwi Dairies, and the Power Station along with familiarisation visits to the Polytechnic and the Taranaki Work Trust.

Also during the 3rd term some of the students were given the opportunity to sit for their Learner Drivers Licence. This was a six week study course presented by Constable Phil Wipatene from the Police. It was pleasing to have 100% pass rate in this. A Drink/Drive programme was run alongside this involving all the students.

A First Aid certificate course was also given and again a full pass rate attained.

The vocational students chose to support two charities this year, one being the Ronald McDonald House for very sick children which is in Wellington, and the other being a puppy from the Blind Foundation. Both causes have been most appreciative of the support given.

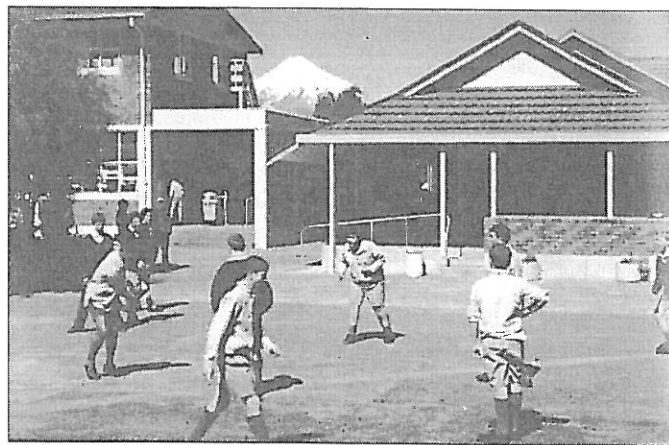
CAREERS

Recently a large careers noticeboard was installed by the wind tunnel in the Physics Laboratory area. Its main function is to provide information on a variety of career pathways and the various study courses available in New Zealand tertiary institutions. It is intended to encourage students to seek out what is positive and available on the job market, and not just dwell on the negative - the idea that there are no jobs out there.

Gone are the days of the "stable" work place when a young person could expect to remain in the same occupation for his entire working life. A young person must now accept that he will need to retrain for at least 4 or 5 different jobs in his working life. Appropriate education and training is far more important now than it has ever been. Hence the need for a boy to work out his own career pathway.

The careers advisor is very familiar with the new technologies coming and about the wide variety of new job opportunities which this will create in the future.

To the person who wishes to dwell on the past it might appear that it is all doom and gloom out there. To the alert and aware student however, development of new technologies and new service industries, means a future full of exciting job opportunities.

COMPUTING



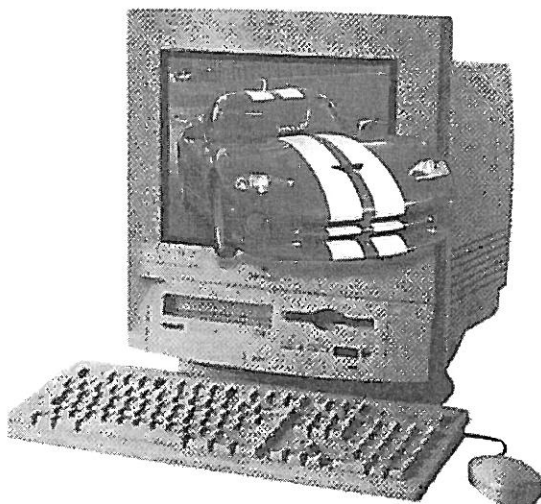
Computing at Francis Douglas continues to develop and maintain its progressive focus in keeping up with the latest technological initiatives.

This year has seen a wider use of the technology across a broad range of subject areas.

Regular classes are using the facilities as an integral part of their work. Some Junior classes have explored Computer Graphics while others have been using desktop publishing programmes to produce their topic studies.

At the senior level, specialist subject areas are using specific software to research and present, to demonstrate and explore and their work. Courses continue to integrate elements of computing and the opportunities to develop computer skills is available to all our students.

The interest in and use of the computers is ever increasing and consequently some remote access has been made available so that staff and pupils can continue their work from home.



There have been some really exciting changes over the year including:

We have a new workgroup server. Capable of providing the storage capacity required so that our students can have easy access to their work throughout the school.



Extensive recabling onto "Ethernet" has taken place to enable;

- * Each computer to be linked independently to the network.
- * Faster transmission of data.
- * Better "Sharing" capability. (The new cables can carry more information.)
- * Flexibility within the system. (We can literally unplug a machine if its faulty or plug in an extra printer when report time comes, without affecting and other users.



There are now three printers available. In rooms 11, 12 and the library.

There are now four computers available in the library. These machines are all linked onto the network and are available to staff and students.



There is a range of new software. We are able to offer programmes used by professionals in graphics and design, word processing, spreadsheets, data bases and desktop publishing.

The additional flat bed scanner and a "Presentation" System give the opportunity to produce high quality work incorporating the latest technologies.



The future looks good and already some further developments are planned for 1997.

A message ...

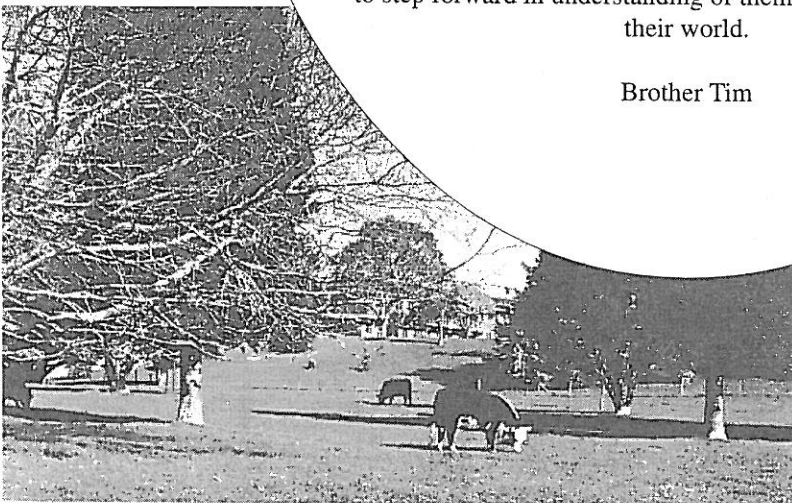
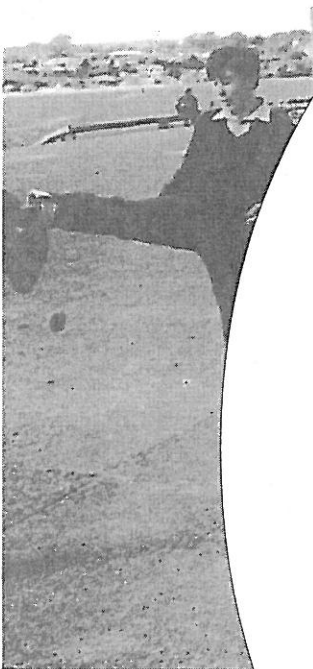
Life for all of us is spoken of as a journey and the journey for each of us is a myriad of experiences in which we grow towards freedom and integrity as a person.

Hopefully the involvement of the youth ministers at the retreats will be a common occurrence in the future.

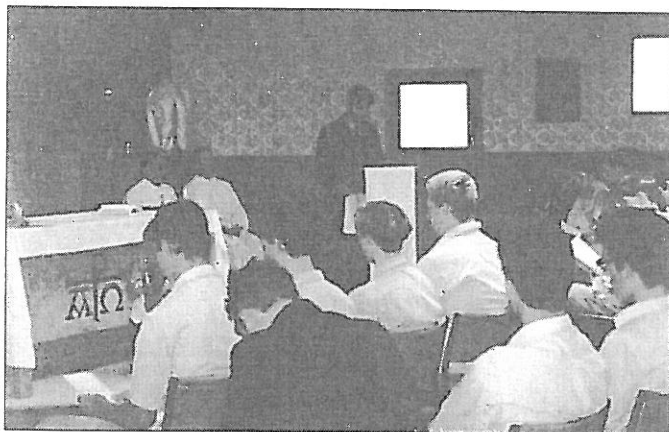
SCHOOL LITURGIES

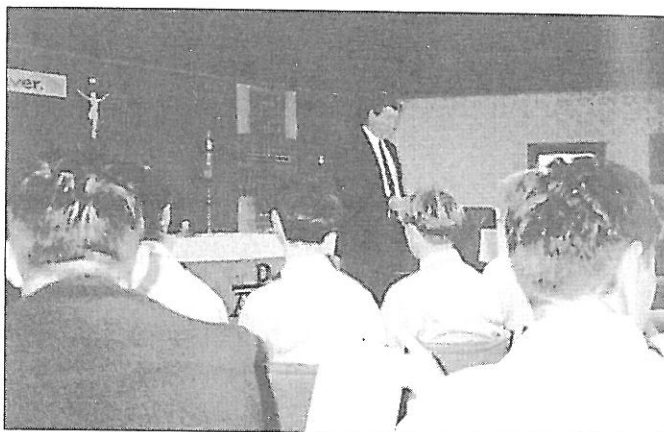

- 3) Have a mass/service.

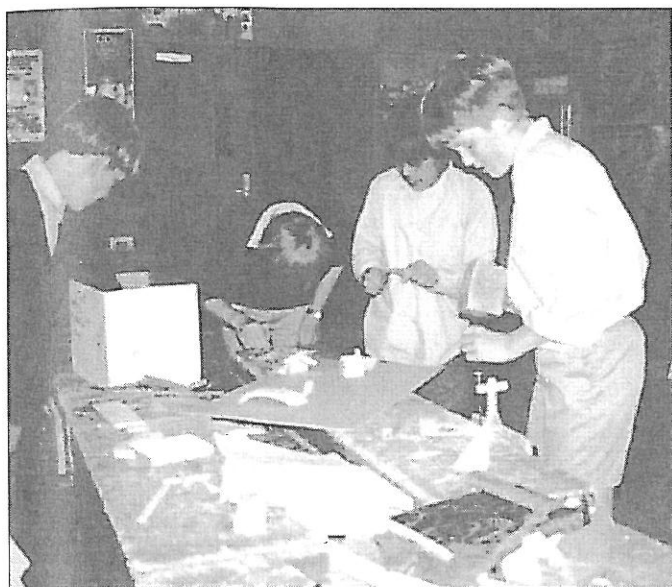
Questions considered included :

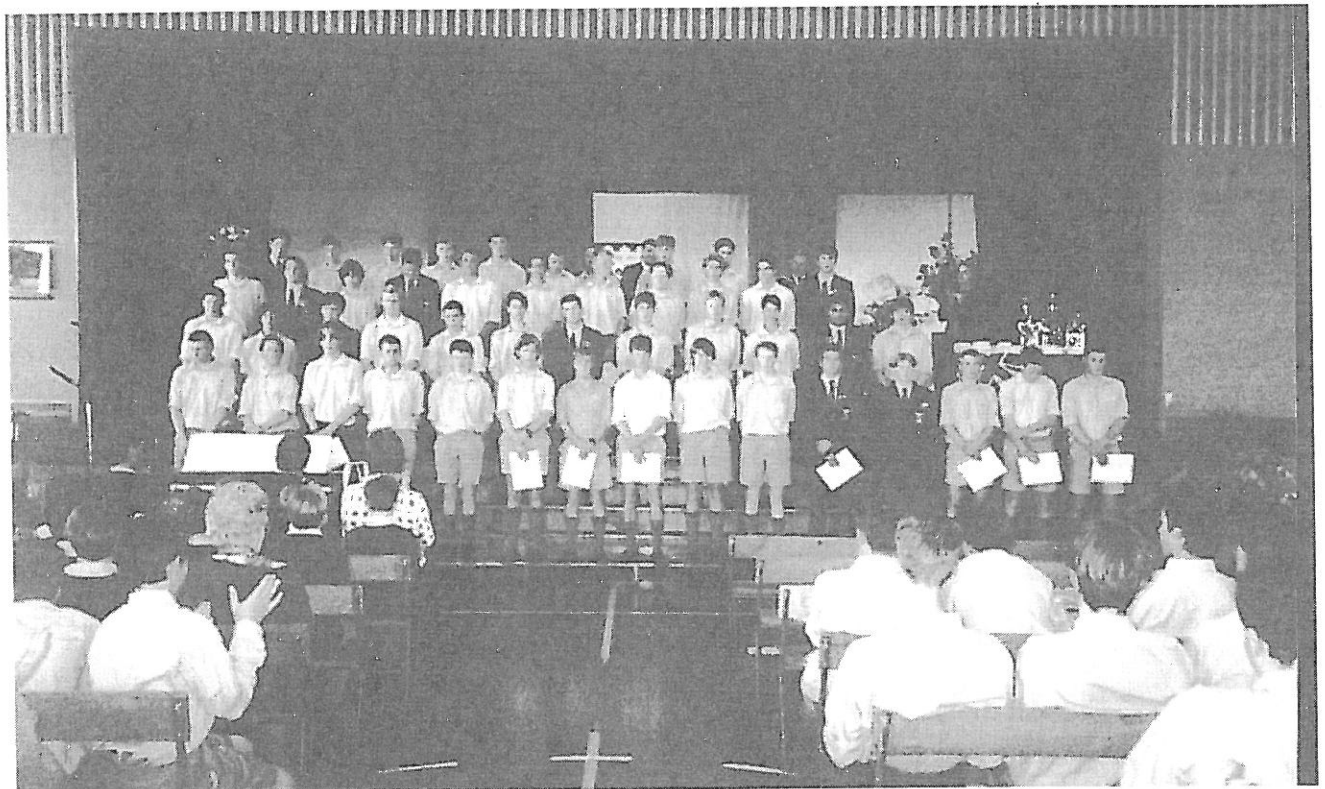
Clem has just completed Scholarship papers in Calculus, Statistics, Geography and English. He will sit Bursary in all five of his subjects also.

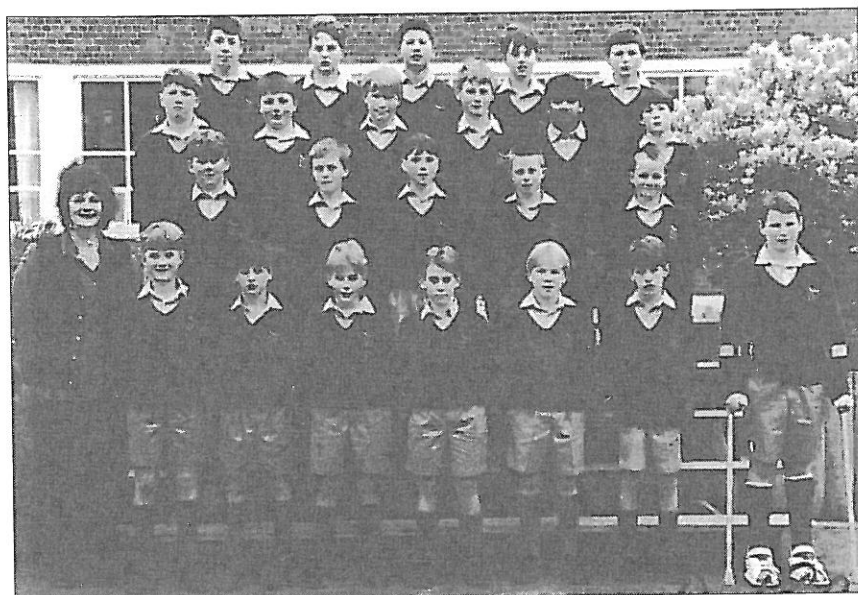
