BROTHER OLIVER

While Brother Oliver was working as a groundsman and laundry help at an orphanage in Takapuna, a De La Salle brother, Brendan Carroll, came from Australia to visit his sister. Brother Oliver had wanted to join an order since he was sixteen, but at the time there were no De La Salle brothers in New Zealand, and when

B r o t h e r Brendan asked if he was interested, he said yes.

After his training in Coodamundra, New South Wales, Brother Oliver went to the 120 acre property at

Oakhill, where he ran the garden for the 70-80 men in training there. It was an extensive farm with a dairy as well as poultry and pigs, and later veal and beef stock instead of the dairy cows. During Brother's time there, they made their own butter and the cows were milked by machine. What the cows ate was important because it

could flavour the milk, as happened when they found some onions. When Brother Oliver was eighteen, he was given his first chance of cooking for a group. The Oakhill cook went away for a holiday, and he was asked to take over. There had been little variety in the menu, and the novices offered him a challenge when they asked for something different. Eggs were always

useful- served with salt they were savoury at breakfast time, but with sugar they made a satisfying dessert!

Brother Oliver has never been outside Australia or New Zealand. He spent a year teaching in Surrey Hills and another year at Armidale, as well as five years running the farm at Boystown in the 1960s. For a while

he helped collect weather information three hourly at Burradoo in New South Wales. It was at Burradoo that Brother Oliver developed his love of roses. When a lady who lived nearby died, her English gardener who had gained his experience in France, gave Brother Oliver cuttings off her roses and showed him how to bud them.

Brother Oliver had only visited New Plymouth briefly before he came to live in 1980. He had always been interested in gardening. The clay

ample greenery,


but few flowers inspired Brother Oliver to create the flowerbeds in the courtyard, and later the others.

Scones and cakes are Brother Oliver's specialty in the kitchen, although often he has made weekend lunches as well.

Whatever Brother Oliver has done, he has wanted to excel in. That first meeting with Brother Brendan started everything off, and he has continued to get pleasure from giving others pleasure. Because he likes his home, Brother has turned down the opportunities he has had to travel. He feels fortunate that he has had good health



with only brief interludes in hospital for hernias and appendicitis. The first New Zealand De La Salle brother, and now a brother for seventy years, Brother Oliver feels that his life has always been planned, and he is very contented in his choice of vocation.

This is the last Annual report I shall write as principal of this College, a position I have enjoyed for the past five years, so vou will understand if I reflect a little more widely than simply focusing on the events of the year just past.

Taranaki

Let me be very explicit concerning my dominant thoughts. I genuinely believe this is a great school and Taranaki is a privileged place in which to raise a family. I have enjoyed my time here enormously and met some wonderful people. There is a book about Australia entitled "The Lucky Country". The author obviously did not know about Taranaki. Anyone living here is very fortunate.

It is not that everyone is wealthy in economic terms. Rather it is a recognition of the message which I heard enunciated, as I watched a late night TV programme, by a man living a simple alternative life-style in self-constructed accommodation without the comfort of modern inventions:

"My wealth is not in how much I have but in how little I need."

When you live in a secure place where there is a real community of supportive and caring people, you already have what you really need. That is the wealth of Taranaki.

There may be occasional underlying tensions - no humans ever totally escape such differences - but rich or poor, pakeha or maori, Catholic or non-Catholic, this school or that school, male or female, all Taranaki people meet as friends and companions on life's journey. FDMC enjoys a healthy rivalry with New Plymouth Boys' High School and other Taranaki Secondary Schools yet we all have great friends who belong to those school communities. The sporting competitions are usually very friendly and the rivalry is mostly good humoured.

The precious Taranaki heritage which is held in common so strongly is far more powerful than any elements of division. The web of relationships and friendships binds all together. It has been my privilege to be here and to be accepted so warmly. I am moving on not because I want to but simply because I long ago vowed to go wherever I can be of most use to the mission of the De La Salle Brothers.

Looking Back

In my first Annual Report in 1998, I identified what I perceived to be the strengths of this College. Repeated in abbreviated form below, I noted:

There is a strong commitment of all staff to the Special Character of the College as a Christian school in the Catholic tradition.

Staff-student relationships are excellent, characterised by mutual respect, lack of anger and easy affability. Francis Douglas is a just and peaceful place.



Francis Douglas has a committed staff with very good people in positions of responsibility. Discipline, under John Whyte, is exercised firmly yet compassionately. He is well supported by the Deans at each year level. Richard Doherty coordinates our

high quality Intermediate School and, with the staff, creates great enthusiasm among the boys beginning their education here.

There is an excellent spirit among the boys. Misconduct such as bullying stands out as the exception among behaviours This school is a very happy place. Classrooms are generally well controlled and boys are cooperative and compliant.

There is very good parental involvement in



school activities - Gala Day, school camps, coaching teams, supporting teams and so on. I would describe it as a very good family spirit.

Deputy Principal, Martin Dravitzki, and the Heads of Department invest a lot of time in curriculum development and delivery.



Finances are very well managed and scrupulously accounted for. My thanks to our Business Manager, Diana Blair, who is very thorough and supportive as she discharges her duties conscientiously and generously.

The hostel makes a very positive contribution to the spirit of

FDMC. I am very pleased to note the obvious good relationships between day boys and boarders, a total lack of the rivalry that occasionally afflicts some boarding schools.

The organisation and conduct of the various sporting carnivals and the Senior Students' Ball as well as the relationship of our leaders with leaders in other schools has been very balanced and pleasing.

The speech, debating and drama programmes supported by many staff are also very valuable co-curricular activities.

The sporting programme is quite extraordinary, something very special. I am in wonderment at the number of teams competing for our College. We enjoy our wins but, more importantly, have a tradition of competing well. The Sports Coordinator, John George, has done an outstanding job.

Facilities are generally very well maintained and the grounds are magnificent.

I am pleased to report that I believe that these are still great strengths of this College and I can genuinely repeat the acknowledgements above.

In my 1998 Report I also asked: What are the problems facing us?

I listed the following as the most obvious short-comings:

Our facilities for teaching and staff are below standard. There is simply not enough room for the increased number of students and staff.

The school library is too small with inadequate

student access to information technology.

Past enrolment policies and procedures have not been adequate for coping with the greatly increased number of applicants.

The level of academic commitment of some pupils is not high enough. More time needs to be given to private study than I observe many boys giving at present. I see it as a matter of priority for me as Principal, to improve the commitment of the boys to academic excellence and to the acquisition of good study habits

Situation 2002

My most obvious personal satisfaction is that I have not destroyed the good spirit and enthusiasm which was already in place when I came here and which had generated such extraordinary roll growth. The ERO (Education Review Office) report which we received in September stated:

"The principal and senior management team have complementary strengths. They have clear job descriptions and areas of expertise, and share the common vision for the school".

An honest statement is that I have kept out of the way of John Whyte as he coordinates and directs the staff and students of the College so well on a day to day basis whilst Martin Dravitzki has attended so competently to the extraordinary amount of work associated with the delivery of the curriculum, timetabling, assessment and reporting and accountability requirements.

Graeme Mustchin has been a steady beacon



for our Special Character as a Catholic school overseeing the delivery of a religious studies programme which promotes sound Christian values as well as delivering knowledge whilst Diana Blair has managed the business side very well. John George has been an outstanding Sports Co-ordinator. Richard

Marris coordinates our efforts in the O'Shea Shield. This year we gained our best results ever.

Recognising that people can do the things specific to their area better than one can do it one-self is an important aspect of leadership. Our team strength has been in having a common

vision and interest yet a faith in each other which leaves sufficient autonomy for each to get on with his or her tasks. The past five years I have enjoyed being part of that team and I am deeply indebted to these key people for their loyalty and support.



It is difficult drawing a line anywhere in talking of support because all the staff and the entire parent and student community have been so committed and loyal. It is all too easy to offend by omission but I must certainly acknowledge the outstanding contribution made by Margaret Milne in many areas such as those of Assistant Principal, Leadership Coordinator, Special Needs Co-ordinator (until this year), Year 13 Dean, Acting Deputy Principal and also of Richard Doherty as Coordinator of the Intermediate Department. There is no finer Intermediate school in New Zealand.



Working with the Board to address the physical needs of the school as well as to develop sound strategies and policies for the delivery of education and to ensure compliance with Ministry guidelines has been very rewarding - but at a cost. I have never been able to spend as much time with the students as I would have liked. I have been more remote from many of the day boys than I would have wished.

I am very pleased that ERO could check all "Compliance Areas", as they did this year, and report that

"ERO's investigations did not reveal any areas for concern".

I believe, nonetheless, there is far too much time wasted on such issues in the NZ Education System. It is essentially a good and sound system but why waste so much time and energy making people jump through bureaucratic hoops? The vision proposed in "Tomorrow's Schools" wherein responsibility was to be devolved on to local Boards has been greatly corrupted by

creeping centralisation, excessive accountability requirements and the associated mountains of paper work. I believe I have capably discharged my responsibilities in this area and shall leave a legacy of quality documentation but it is one aspect from which I shall be pleased to walk away.

It is a serious concern that the "bureaucratic hoops" which carry little remuneration for most staff may deter some staff from taking on positions of responsibility. Often, the accountability impedes the time which can be spent in actually delivering quality education.

My experience at FDMC has been to work with an outstanding Board Chairman in Michael Finnigan who has been consistently supportive and enthusiastic. The College is fortunate to enjoy the fruits of his wisdom and balance. The various Board members have made valuable and generous contributions dealing with specific issues patiently and assiduously. Board meet-



ings have provided a valuable forum for sound governance and collaborative planning. The staff representative for most of my time here, Richard Marris, has been an excellent link between the staff and the Board and has worked collaboratively with me to ensure good relationships between

governance and management. I have appreciated his input very much in a wide range of areas.

It is a great satisfaction that the most obvious shortcomings which I identified in 1998 would no longer be listed today as shortcomings. We have been through a period of substantial physical development made possible by collaborative planning with the Catholic Schools' Board in Wellington, a very successful Jubilee Fundraising Appeal led so well by Peter McDonald, generous donations by parents to the Appeal or the Development Account and the good work of our own Property Staff. Our Property Manager, Dan Keegan, is extraordinarily skilful in both design and the practicalities of construction. I have enjoyed working with Dan very much to develop the buildings and grounds. Our facilities for both staff and students are now very good.

The Jubilee Appeal was launched with the theme: We can make a difference. A wonderful group of workers raised in excess of \$1.1million. Parents were challenged to donate money and to "invest" in the future education of Taranaki boys. Financially the Appeal was very successful and there have been great improvements in facilities for both staff and boys. But, you might still ask, has it made a difference to the education the boys are receiving?

The Benchmark Indicators, provided by the Ministry of Education, demonstrate in a measurable way the high quality of the academic programmes in the College - and that the Appeal has made a startling difference to the results obtained by the students in public examinations. It is also clear that we have high retention rates and that those who do leave before Year 13 have been well prepared for entry to the workforce.

This year the Ministry also provided us with our own longitudinal, comparative statistics - that is to say, a comparison of how we have done year by year. Is there a trend towards getting better or worse or are we more or less at the same level? The benchmark indicators create a measurable basis for comparison. We are now doing significantly better than average - based primarily on the grades and progression rates achieved in Year 11 & 13 exams - in almost every comparison with schools in this area or with schools throughout New Zealand or with our roll range or in our decile.

The improvement in almost every category is significant. We are now attaining levels which a few years ago seemed quite out of reach. The combination of sound policies and planning by the Board, very good teaching and classroom management, focussed hostel supervision and the additional facilities have made a remarkable difference.

There is no way of isolating out any single factor. The efforts of the staff to teach are obviously helped by better facilities. Having the facilities for students to learn under the guidance of teachers working in an atmosphere of high morale has made a difference.

The Education Review Office recently noted that ICT (Information and Communication Technology) is now "a strength in the curriculum". Staff and boys have made giant leaps in the use of ICT. The general reduction of overcrowding,

more playground space, removal of pressure points where pushing and shoving once occurred and the bigger and better equipped library certainly help.

Martin Dravitzki, Richard Marris and Heads of Department have worked hard to develop a comprehensive curriculum which delivers quality education whilst preparing the students for the public examinations. Above all, the attitude which is now strongly accepted in the student body is that it is "cool" to be a good student and it is far from "cool" to be a fool.



At the same time the highly successful Careers Pathways Programme and Careers Guidance Centre have helped create direction and purpose for many boys who may otherwise have drifted aimlessly. The development of Career Education and the Careers Pathway Programme

as well as other STAR funded courses by Carol Land, with assistance from Cristel Chapman, has been absolutely outstanding.

Alongside a strong academic programme, the extra-curricular activities of the College continue at extraordinarily high levels of participation. Just over 80 percent of boys have represented the College in some sport or activity this year. Normally the boys are great ambassadors for the College. Our successes are too numerous to list in this report but are summarised throughout this Magazine.

The enthusiasm and cooperation of our Year 13 students has been very good - and an excellent example to the rest of the student body. The College Captain, Jonathon Milne, and Vice Captain, Ben Whittington have been outstanding. Jonathon is a natural leader, multi-talented but unassuming. Ben has also matured over the years to be a very strong and competent leader of men. I have high personal regard also for the Hostel leaders, Kieran Burke and Jordan Mullin and Civics Captain, Danny Brown. The full leadership group gave a very positive impetus to College activities. The opening of the new Year 13 Common Room by All Blacks Coach and old boy, John Mitchell, was a highlight during the year.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Of vital importance is the continued focus on good classroom management and sound discipline exercised by teachers with support from John Whyte and the Deans. Without doubt John Whyte is the best Deputy Principal with whom I have had the privilege of working. His very sound judgement, consistency and compassionate insistence on standards for both staff and students, as well as his careful attention to planning, ensure the highest standards in day to day school control.

In the hostel the expectation that study time is to be taken seriously is well established and both hostel and day boy standards have risen simultaneously. All the single rooms in the hostel help the boarders study better - which then extends to better classroom atmosphere with good resident students competing with other good day students. Standards rise as students motivate and assist one another. Thank you firstly to Brother Michael, and more recently to Mr Cleary, and the other supervisors for excellent work in the hostel.

The wonderful contribution to the College on hostel and school boards and the Appeal committee by parents such as Bernadette and Paul Bourke, and Paul & Margaret Butterworth, has been inspirational. I am pleased that the Interim Hostel Board has now achieved the completion of a constitution for a permanent hostel board which has been promulgated by the Provincial, Brother David Hawke, acting for the Proprietor. This is a notable move in ensuring the long-term viability of the hostel.

Special Character

Along with the ERO review, the roll & compliance audit carried out by the Ministry and a copyright survey, we also had a special character review during 2002. There was an extensive internal component to this review provided by a group of staff and students led by Graeme Mustchin and a visit by external evaluators, Br Steve Hogan from De La Salle Mangere and Colleen Roche, Principal of Carmel College in Auckland.

Colleen commented very positively, inter alia, on the very good atmosphere in the College, on the clear priorities described in the Special Character section of our Strategic Plan and on the "fierce loyalty" of the students to their College.

When parents choose to send their sons to Francis Douglas Memorial College, they select a school which professes to offer a strong Christian education. Under the Integration agreement, the "Special Character" of the College as a Catholic school is preserved by a legal requirement that not more than 5 percent of the total enrolment be accepted from families who do not have a clear link with the Catholic Church.

When families without direct link to the Catholic Church send their children here they are termed "Non-preference enrolments", not that they are in any way inferior applications but simply that they do not have a preferential right of entry. In fact some of these families are our strongest supporters simply because they seek out the education we offer which is based very clearly on belief in God and the Gospel values.

All boys, all families once here, are treated equally and all are expected to live up to high standards. All will be exposed to the Gospel values and all are expected to conform to Catholic school practice, such as religious education lessons, whilst we continue to respect the right of individual freedom of choice.

We pride ourselves on being a College which builds on unity rather than division. The Brothers were very privileged during 1999 to have the newly ordained Anglican Bishop in Taranaki, Philip Richardson, living with them. What unites the Christian Churches is far more important than what divides. The Bishop's presence among us and continuing friendship has been a mutually enriching association. There is a sign of hope and maturity in this that the common understanding of the central Christian message to love God and our neighbour is more important than any point of division.



We are fortunate to have the services of a resident chaplain, Father Joe O'Riordan, who has settled in well to become a key part of the Francis Douglas community. His warm interaction with the members of the school community and celebration of the Eucharist makes him a reassuring face of the ministerial as-

pect of the Catholic Church.

Formerly the full-time chaplain at Sacred Heart Girls' College, Margo La Berge, has now taken on a role sharing her time between Sacred Heart, the parish of St Joseph's and FDMC. Together with Father Joe and our Religious Education Co-ordinator, Graeme Mustchin, Margo has given new impetus to youth ministry at FDMC. This shared modus operandi has established invaluable direct links between the two Catholic secondary schools and the largest parish which is significantly enhancing the provision for the Catholic youth of New Plymouth. Our thanks to Father Tom Lawn and the other priests for their generous support and assistance.



A Special Character Services Coordinator, Peter Costello, was appointed in 2002 to ensure that the notion of service is placed before the College family. He organised the annual Mission Action Day, the food bank appeal and other activities de-

signed to promote the Christian notion of caring for, and giving to, others, especially those in need.

All staff are invited to share the ideal of being "brothers" or "sisters" to the children entrusted to our care. This is the Lasallian tradition of education, our specific emphasis. Those in authority do not lord it over the other staff nor the pupils - rather we accompany them, respecting them, with the eyes of faith, as equals in the sight of God, just as precious to Him as we are, just as important as ourselves. Every boy is our brother, a fellow child of God, a fellow traveller on life's journey. Francis Douglas Memorial College should be a place known for its warmth and compassion. There is no such thing as enough when it comes to love. Staff are expected to have a positive attitude in their approach to the boys with the aim of rewarding good conduct rather than punishing bad behaviour

Over the past two years we have re-modelled the chapel, both interiorly and exteriorly, to refocus attention on the chapel as the spiritual centre of the College. To enrich the chapel further as our "sacred place" we have installed stained glass windows. The first three are already in place in our Mission wall - one of St John Baptist De La Salle located in 17th century France and one of Francis Douglas rich with symbols of his life in Taranaki, New Zealand and the Philippines. These windows stand on either side of our College crest with the motto, *Christo Duce*, ("with Christ as our leader").

The windows have been financed as "memorial windows" and will serve as a reminder to pray for individuals or families whose lives support, or have supported, the mission of this College to bring a Christian education to youth.

Two further windows are to be installed in the "culture wall" of our chapel emphasising the coming together of Maori and Pakeha. It is in the chapel that all these elements of life find unity and meaning.

Our Maori strategic planning was praised by ERO. Our vision is that every Maori Student attending this College will come to understand the Good News that he is precious and important in the eyes of God. Each and every student will feel supported and encouraged to develop to his unique, full potential by the collaborative efforts of the Maori community and the staff.

Among our eight stated goals in the Maori section of our strategic plan, we affirm our intentions to enhance the sense of self-worth of every Maori student in an environment in which their traditional culture is held in high esteem, to assist each Maori student to become a good citizen in Aotearoa by sound character development and a high level of academic achievement and to combine the positive aspects of both Pakeha and Maori cultures so that the College ethos is one of unity and confidence rather than division or suspicion.

It is my belief that the special character of this Lasallian College, which promotes an egalitarian unity and respect for all, resonates extraordinarily well with the special community spirit in Taranaki.

Gratitude

I shall leave Francis Douglas with an abiding gratitude for having been part of this community for the past five years.



In the Brothers' House I have enjoyed the unique inspiration of living with our 89 year old rose gardener and cook, Brother Oliver. Next year I shall have to make my own coffee for breakfast! It was fitting that we celebrated the 70th Jubilee of our first New Zealand Brother with the opening of the new hostel building, Oliver Lodge. To all the Brothers I say thank you for your strong fraternal support.

There will be quite a changeover this year with Brother Anselm, Brother Fabian and Brother Frank taking up other appointments but I am pleased that they will be replaced by some younger Brothers. In these days of few vocations the Brothers will still have a strong presence in Taranaki.

Thank you to Diana Blair as well as to Karen Maclean, Maree Fleming and Glenda Elliot who have provided me with so much direct assistance in the College Office and in promoting the College and the Appeal. I have been able to have full confidence that all will be done very pleasantly and competently.







Thank you to all parents who support their sons in so many ways, but especially those who contribute through the PTA. The most recent use of PTA funds was to pay the costs for building the much needed shelter near the front gate for those awaiting buses.

Just over forty years ago, as a senior student at school, I reflected on the parable of the talents and was moved to make a decision to join the men who taught me in giving my talents "to go wherever I may be sent or to do whatever may be required of me." I resolved that I should give God some return on the talents which I had received. Sobering gospel words I thought: "To whom much is given, much is expected."

I would certainly have been more than happy to continue to live and work here for a few more years and to exercise an influence on the life journey of the students in this College. Living and working here has given me a lot. Yet my belief is that you can be happy wherever you are if you have the right attitude. When my Provincial says to me that there is more need elsewhere for what skills I possess, then it is time for me to move on to whatever new challenge lies before me. After all as I once heard it said:

"You cannot love all mankind, only people one at a time. The one you are with is the one that counts."

I am leaving the formal education sector to return to working with young, needy people in what is termed the "welfare sector" - mostly dealing with those who have dropped out of normal schooling or who have transgressed the law leading to imprisonment. My special mandate will be in promoting the work of BoysTown Family Care, an organisation which the Brothers have developed but which we have recently put under the guidance of an incorporated Board. I am officially Deputy Chairman of that

Board and will also be acting General Manager for the next twelve months.



I wish incoming Principal, Brother Peter Ryan, every blessing in his precious responsibility. I know him as a man of vision and purpose who has already won acclaim in New Zealand as Deputy, and sometimes Acting Principal, of John Paul College in Rotorua. Yes, he is another Australian but he can expect great support here from the strong team around him and the wonderful families in this College.

Former FDMC staff member Brother Ray Khan is returning as Director of the brothers' community whilst Brother Peter Smyth and Mr Phil D'Ath return from extended leave. We have recently welcomed Br Bede Mackrell who has

spent much of his life as a PNG missionary. Ralph Waldo Emerson once wrote: "Nothing great was ever achieved without enthusiasm." This place generates enthusiasm. I have especially enjoyed the enthusiasm of the students and their loyalty to the College. With God's blessing, long may it continue.



in the meetings and learning a lot about the College.


The opportunity presented to me was very valuable as it enabled me to learn about some of the problems facing the College but also at finding solutions to these problems.








SCHOOL CAPTAIN





















Another year has passed in the history of Francis Douglas Memorial College. Back in 1998 we embarked on a journey leading to life long friendships and stories which are bought up time and time again.



During 2002 we have engaged in social activities with Sacred Heart and St Mary's. We managed to get two socials with each school and these were enjoyed by all.




To the hostel leaders next year, all the best carrying out your duties and to the rest of the board-

ers of 2003, carry on the public pride which is instilled in the hostel. Just remember to be proud of the hostel and study hard!




As I talk about


O'SHEA SHIELD REPORT
