FIRST ELEVEN SOCCER

The 2002 season was for some of the players a busier year then last. It started in January when New Zealand soccer selected a squad of 20 players to attend the Oceana Under 16 Tournament held in Sydney Australia. Paul Cunningham was selected for the squad and played 4 full games out of the 7. These being: NZ v Fiji, NZ v American Samoa and NZ v Australia in the series final. The first 3 games NZ won comfortably .However in the final they lost to a polished Australia 4-1.

In February NZ Soccer introduced an Under 20 Federation League which ran for 7 weeks and was played at various venues all over NZ. Both Tom Peacock and Paul Cunningham were selected for Federation 4 (Central North Island)

Most of the First XI were involved in Senior football and played for the school youth team throughout the winter season.

The Federation for 15th and 16th grade trials started in June and Francis Douglas boys Ben Jagersma (U15), Jeremy Hill, Thomas Peacock and Paul Cunningham (U16) were all successful in gaining selection to the final squads.

After an intensive pre- tournament build up playing mini tournaments in Palmerston North, Taupo, Napier and Masterton the Federation 4, captained by Paul Cunningham won the National Identification Tournament in Napier beating NZ 15 Grade Academy 2-1, Wellington Fed 6-0, Auckland Fed 2, 4-0, Otago Fed 7, 5-1 and NZ Academy in the final 2-1.

U19 Wellington and Napier Tournaments held in September and October each year are New Zealand's most prestigious. Taranaki does not compete in these tournaments unfortunately. However Manawatu A.F.C invited Nathan Hill, Paul Cunningham and Ainen Kereopa as guest players for both tournaments in Wellington. Manawatu reached the finals after 7 games but were beaten by Miramar Rangers 2-1. At the Napier Tournament played over Labour Weekend, Manawatu were eventually beaten by 3 Kings Auckland in the semi-finals with 3 Kings winning the final against Central of Auckland.

So what about school football?

The FDC 1st XI programme for 2002 was geared to prepare for qualifying to attend the NZSS Jim Wishard Tournament held in Nelson in August.

FDMC played St Augustines Wanganui and won 3-0. FDMC won at St Johns, Hastings 4-1.

Then we played a friendly with NPBHS going down 4-1 (albeit with a depleted team)

We then had to play and win against Freyberg College, Palmerston North. We won 4-1, Wanganui High School was next, going down 2-4. However by this time FDMC had done enough to qualify for the Jim Wishart Tournament in Nelson.

The problem was how do we raise the money for the travel, accommodation, food etc. This was finally achieved with the positive input of parents, players and sponsors putting in long hours of work including various methods of fund raising. We eventually flew from New Plymouth to Nelson and stayed at the Tahuna Beach Holiday Park. When we arrived we found that the lads didn't know how to peel spuds, carrots etc but by the time we left they had become Master Chefs.

The Jim Wishard is a tough tournament and due to some early injuries to key players, younger lads like Ben Jagersma and Ciaran Forsythe were forced into the firing line and did a fantastic job with mostly 2 games a day. The squad was able to produce some good results but could only manage a 16th place out of 24 which was acceptable given the quality of the 24 school teams participating. It was decided that the MVP for the tournament was Ben Jagersma, top goalscorers jointly were Paul Cunningham and Jeremy Clark.

I would like to make a special mention regarding Mrs Jan Forsythe (Nurse Jan) who worked non stop in keeping the boys mobile after injuries and general knocks, bruising and pulled muscles and for her work in the kitchen and on the field with the ice and medical kit. Thanks Jan.

Also thanks to Mike Crow for his support both on and off the field throughout the season and especially at tournaments and to ALL the parents who contributed in many ways towards making the tournament a success.

And lastly all the squad members were great ambassadors for FDMC, both on and off the field. To the lads who are leaving the college and the team Robbie, Miles, Bas and Pim, all the very best for the future. To the rest, see you next year.



INDOOR ROWING




GOLF

MISSION TO MANILA

In January of this year, I had the good fortune of being asked to travel to the Philippines with a group of 7 youths to carry out a mission. We would be governed by world-wide agency 'Habitat for Humanity'.

For the whole of 2001 the seven of us "kids" were saving like mad. We had to raise \$3600 each for the travel costs and building costs. Needless to say, the year was long and slow on the financial front. However, our time had come, and we were going to make the most of our trip.

We flew the 17 hours to the Philippines and ventured out of the plane, a strange experience for someone who has never experienced 38 degrees of heat. The seven of us younger ones and 2 group leaders (my father Mike and his brother Si, referred to as "The Uncles") had finally arrived at our destination. It was a long time coming and we did not know what to expect, but we knew it was going to be tough.

Our mission was clear: work for five days on a rural building site in a place named Sariaya, three hours south from the capital Manila. We had to build as many houses as possible. Now Filipino houses and New Zealand houses differ somewhat. The smallest houses here can house a family comfortably, over there, ten or fifteen people fit into a house that is five metres square. This is what we had to build, and it was hard work. For starters, there are no machines in the Philippines. All of the concrete turning and mixing was done by hand, and all of the water had to be carried from a dirty well 200 metres away. We had to lift and shift all the concrete blocks ourselves, tie the steel by hand (I still have scars) and as there was no let up from the beating sun,

we sweated our bodies away. We persevered for our five days and left the building site far better off than when we arrived.

The friendships we made there with the builders and helpers were golden, and I will return to visit again

someday. In the five days, we built five and a half houses. Good Kiwi work showed through, because on arrival back in New Zealand, I received an e-mail from one of the building site managers, saying that following our five days of work was a group of 30 Koreans, and in the week that they worked, they made only four houses, compared to our 5, they had more time and 3 times as many people!!! I would never boast though.

So the hard work aspect of the trip was finished, and the group made a decision to move camp from Sariaya in the south, to the capital, Manila.

We had 8 days left to complete the trip. Our itinerary was this: we would visit child aid organisations and observe the work that they are doing in their communities, and offer our help.

So for the week, we were visiting some of the worlds poorest people, and handing out information booklets on health and the like. We got to see the effect that child sponsorship has on the families and communities in these regions, and believe you me, a little bit of New Zealand cash has a massive impact.

I personally loved this week. The experiences of that week could never be retold on paper. The myriads of children swamping us, visiting extended families all living together in a slum the size of a bathroom, eating the different foods, using the insane transport systems, playing street basketball with the men, walking through dusty streets full of street dogs and death, and generally experiencing the harshness of this unstable nation, it really opened my eyes to how fortunate we are here in New Zealand. It was basically an indescribable experience.

I would class the trip as the scariest thing I have ever done, but also as the most important. To experience things I never had, and may never again experience was very amazing. I recommend a trip to a third world country for anyone who reads this and gains even the slightest interest, you will not be let down. Would I go back you ask? Not in the near future, far too intimidating in the Philippines for me, but in twenty years, I would love to go back and rekindle the friendships I made.

in the Tongariro district.



CAREER PATHWAYS PROGRAMME & STUDENT COMMENTS

It has been another great year for thirty students in the CPP Course. They have had the opportunity to experience a range of vocational activities and training courses. This year students undertook a range of training and work experience options including: Hospitality, Tourism, Multimedia, Engineering, Carpentry, Panel Beating, Agriculture, Electrotechnology, Automotive, Film, Radio, Plumbing, Horticulture, and Outdoor Adventure.

Students also had the chance to undertake distance learning in English, Maths, Sociology, Fashion Drawing, Electronics, Horticulture, Turf Management, Self Management and Boating. The Career Pathways Programme has provided the majority of students with workplace skills, as well as a greater knowledge and understanding of the wider opportunities available to them. The majority of the students have either obtained employment or have firmly decided to move into further training.

"It has prepared me for my future."



YEAR 12 BIOLOGY

Reports on the Year 13 Biology fieldtrips by Arjun Nath

Trip to Kawaroa Beach

The purpose of this fieldtrip began as an investigation of the inter-tidal shrimp. It ended as a competition as to who could catch the most shrimp. Many groups decided to exhibit the superiority of their species (human, we presume) by wiping out entire populations within the rockpools. Being gentlemen, however, we spared pregnant females.

The fieldtrip required careful observation of the shrimp in its environment. Many astute students noted that shrimp struggled to survive out of the water. We concluded that the shrimp was a marine animal (five minutes on the rocky shore and we had already begun to learn!).

TOURISM DEVELOPMENT GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP TO ROTORUA

The Okato bus sailed through the King Country hills with ease Stopping for lunch at Bennydale the former coal mining town, we were in Rotorua by early afternoon. The purpose of our 3 day trip was to study a Cultural geographic process , tourism development. We stayed a Keswick Camp at Holdens Bay on the eastern shores of Lake Rotorua. This was to prove comfortable and interesting.

Rotorua attracts 1.6 million tourists each year, 40% of them international and 60% domestic visitors. As a result the city has a massive range of services, accommodation, attractions and facilities which are provided to meet the needs of these travellers.

We had several informative speakers, firstly from the Rotorua Museum on the history of tourism, then on the next day the domestic tourism marketing manager gave an entertaining overview of the industry in Rotorua and the District Council's role in encouraging that growth. The manager of the Agrodome was the final speaker on the last day, and our visit there provided the students with great material about the development of Adventure Tourism.

The visits to attractions are the highlight of such a trip such as the Lake foreshore and Ohinemutu village are both superb examples of interesting and accessible attractions that are free. The hotsprings and mudpools of Hell's Gate, the thermal baths at Waikite, the Skyline Skyrides Gondola and luge rides, the Agrodome farm show packed with enthralled Asian Tourists. The thrilling Jetspint ride, the Swoop, Zorb, Freefall and Bungey jump are all available at reduced student prices and these were a big hit.

The mapping and land use study work make the pupils really focus on the Tourism development topic, providing excellent case study material for the Bursary exam and a sound understanding of the impact of this sort of development upon a community.

The students represented the College with pride and contributed towards continuing the valuable role fieldwork can play in learning.





WORLD YOUTH DAY IN TORONTO

"Come and make the great avenues of Toronto resound with the joyful tidings that Christ loves every person".

This was the invitation Pope John Paul II, extended to the youth of the world to join him for the 17th World Youth Day this year in Toronto, Canada. Two students from this college, Patrick Bradford, Simon Martin and our Youth Minister Margo LaBerge took up this invitation, along with Fr. Craig Butler, and five other young people from our Diocese. We then joined 60 other New Zealanders, and a total of 800,000 youths from around the world.

Before we left, we were involved in formation sessions to further develop our faith, practical preparations, fund-raising events, and a meeting with the mayor, Peter Tennent, who commissioned us to be Honorary Ambassadors for the city of New Plymouth.

A small group of us began our pilgrimage by visiting Margo LaBerge's home town – Legal. There we witnessed a bi-cultural French / English mass, attended the Calgary Stampede, featured in the local newspaper, and met Janelle – singer of the international World Youth Day Theme song "Salt of the earth, light to the world". (Coincidentally she was also Margo's niece!).

Following this, we met up with the remaining New Zealand contingent. The following two weeks saw us grow particularly close-knit because of the two weeks spent together in Vancouver and Banff. In Vancouver, we participated in everything from outdoor masses to service projects, a day with the first nation people of Canada to bush hikes (it was rude to call it 'tramping' and cultural performances to a large mass of 1200 youths heading towards Toronto. In Banff, we witnessed some spectacular scenery - walking on the Athabasca Glaciers, hiking, and simply marvelling at the awesomeness of God's creation.

Simon's experience for the first two weeks was different than ours as he represented New Zealand and our College at an international Lasallian sympsosium in Quebec City and then joined us afterwards for the week of World Youth Day activities.

Then onto Toronto - where the streets, train

stations, subways, parks, churches, buses and walkways were filled with the joyful resounding of catholic youth from all over the world. There, we participated in a week of activities, from catechesis sessions, to masses, reflection to youth festivals. We witnessed countless displays of culture, swapped pins and exchanged experiences of faith – all this, building up to the final day – a mass celebrated by Pope John Paul II.

The 'World Youth Day' however, was not without it's challenges. With 800,000 people sleeping under the stars in preparation for the Pope's arrival, the heavens opened at 5:30am and the heat wave we witnessed the day before, turned into torrential rain and gusting winds. That along with the frogs and mice, a draining 8km walk (in 45 degree temperatures), and the 2 hour long missions to the cluster of 6000 porto-loos - at times, tested our resources and endurance. With youthful intuition however, the site progressed from an old airport runway, to what looked like a refugee camp, with cardboard rubbish boxes used as shelters, and plastic bags as raincoats. But as Pope John Paul himself said, "I have seen enough evidence to be unshakably convinced that no difficulty, no fear is so great that it can completely suffocate the hope that springs eternal in the hearts of the youth". This youthful hope was clearly witnessed at the Pope's mass, when representative's from over 150 countries were unified in song, prayer, communion and a common desire to celebrate their faith with each other.

All in all, Canada was an experience we will never forget. We witnessed the 'biggest of the big', from the Rocky Mountains, to the hospitality of locals. We saw the biggest jars of peanut butter, massive crowds of pilgrims, rocketing thermometer readings...but biggest of all was the impact the World youth Day experience has had on our sense of Church family and unity. Pope John Paul called his youth to be "salt of the earth and light to the World - to keep alive the words of eternal life...and improve the taste of human history". The passion and energy Toronto witnessed this World Youth Day was just a taste of the hope youth hold for the church, but as John Paul II reminded us: "holiness is not a question of age; it is a matter of living in the Holy Spirit."



ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME

This year has been another busy one within the Enrichment programme. It was decided to put an emphasis on Drama and so to this end Sara Ashworth was employed. She took a group of Year 9 and 10 students for 4 two hour blocks on Dramatic technique early in the year. In Term 4 the same opportunity was given to a group of Year 7 students. Hopefully this will encourage students to be involved in drama in the College.

We have again had a Leadership programme as part of Enrichment. A group of Year12 boys travelled to Auckland in Term 1 to attend a National Young Leaders Day. This is a worth while motivational excursion. Others have been to Turangi on Outdoor Educational courses, to the United States, to Wellington and two groups

have been on programmes in Waitomo. The idea is to inspire others as role models both in and out of the class room.

There have also been Computer Programming days, Science courses, Maths Workshops and Poetry workshops. Boys ranging from Year 7 to Year 12 have been involved. LIBRARY REPORT

Our aim as librarians at Francis Douglas is to try and ensure that pupils leave the school knowing the pleasure of reading, finding the thrill in exploring an exciting novel, non-fiction book or computer resource and feel at ease with coming into the library.

If we succeed in this then we have laid down a foundation of using a library to its full extent that will be of future benefit to the boys for life-long learning.

It is important to keep abreast of the latest developments within the school library service and this year Miss Jordan and myself have attended several workshops and many network meetings. In June the school library hosted

a National Library mini conference. It was called "Spice Up Research with SAUCE", the speaker being Dr Trevor Bond from the University of Waikato. The subject discussed was the importance of good library skills being an intricate part of all lessons. SAUCE meaning search, acquire, use, communicate and evaluate. No sooner had we settled down from this conference than Miss

Jordan and I took off to Wellington to attend the SLANZA Conference (School Library Association of NZ Aotearoa). The key speakers at this conference were William Taylor and Kate de Goldi, who are well known New Zealand writers of children's fiction. Both spoke of the importance of stories in the lives of children.

Lois Lowry, a renown author of children fiction said in a speech she gave in 1994 after winning the Newberry prize for Childrens Literature

"The man that I named the Giver passed along to the boy knowledge, history, memories, colour, pain, laughter, love and truth. Everytime you place a book in the hands of a child, you do

the same thing. It is very risky.

But each time a child opens a book, he pushes open the gate that separates him from Elsewhere. It gives him choices. It gives him freedom. These are magnificent, wonderfully un-

safe things."



She was talking in context about a character in one of her novels called "The Giver", which is an extremely thought provoking book about knowledge and who should possess it.

We try at Francis Douglas to keep up with all the latest books both fiction and non-fiction, especially books published in New Zealand. This year we have

purchased over 500 new books for the library. We try to keep up with the many changing facets of library up-skilling as our knowledge base has to change and broaden each year. These are exciting times to be working in a school library.

As the school year draws to a close I would like

to take this opportunity to yet again thank our volunteer workers for the outstanding contribution they make to the running of our library.

Mrs Margaret Wright, who has helped with book processing and has acted as relief librarian when called upon and Mrs Jean Thorne who works every morning in the library with shelving and keeping our vertical file up-to-date. Without these two ladies, Miss Jordan and myself would not have quality time to spend with staff

and pupils on their enquiries.

From Miss Jordan and myself best wishes for 2003. We hope that you all have a safe, happy, relaxing and enjoyable holiday season, and we will see the majority of you in the New Year.



This year's dux is Blaise Drinkwater who came to this school as a year 9 student in 1998. Blaise is from Inglewood where he went to St. Patricks School.



Looking back over his time here Blaise says one of the highlights was winning at O'Shea Shield in 2002.



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
Simran Singh is this year's Proxime Accessit. He began school here in 1996 as a year 7 student having come from Westown Primary School.




Love is Emotion


Why me? Am I all that stands in the wind's way?

On and on we musn't stop the whole world is waiting. On cozy couches in their homes whilst we are navigating.



The pure talent really showed through in the


