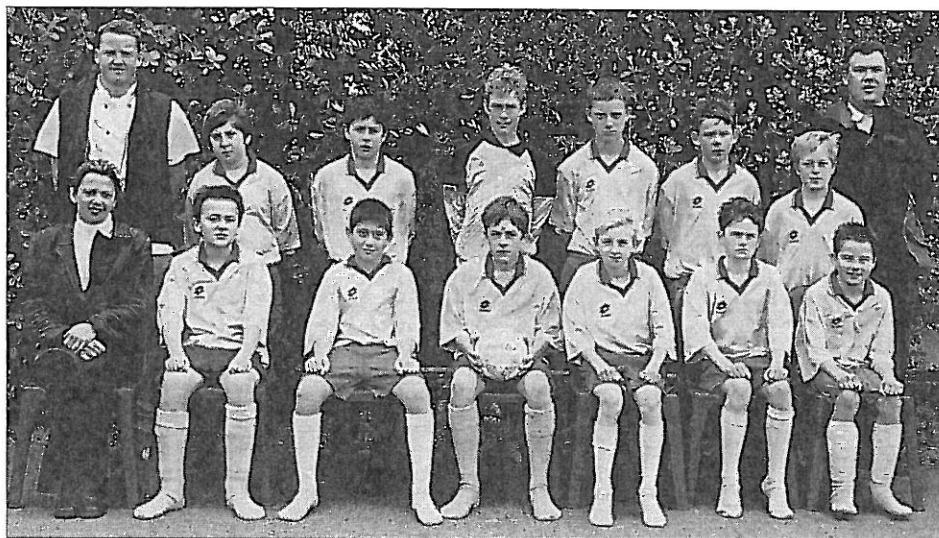

The Smiths were a team lead by the rising star David Freeman who could always be looked to for inspiration when the team needed to pull out everything it could to secure a close win.

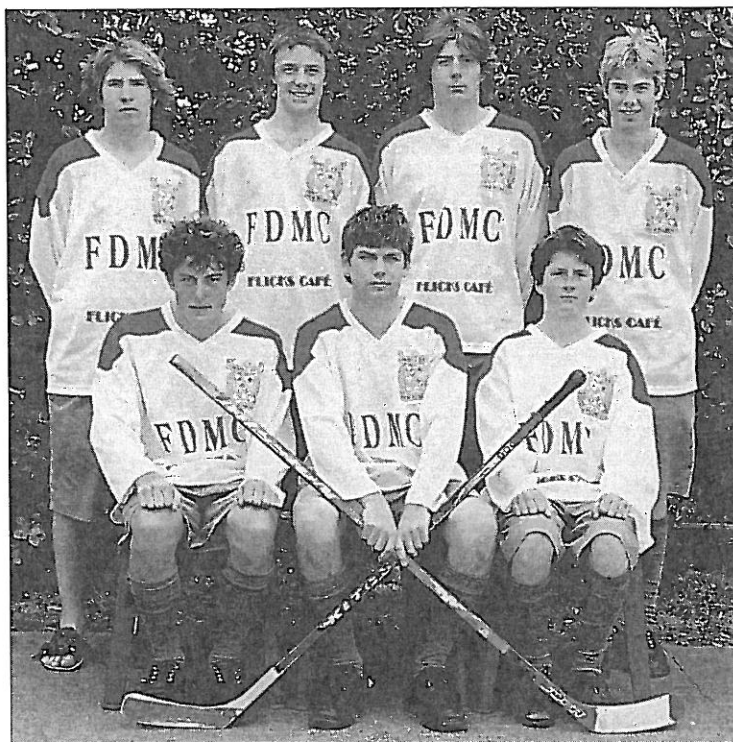
With our first away game being played against St. Peter's College Palmerston North we left their young team eager to play again with our convincing 13 – 3 victory. Unfortunately our

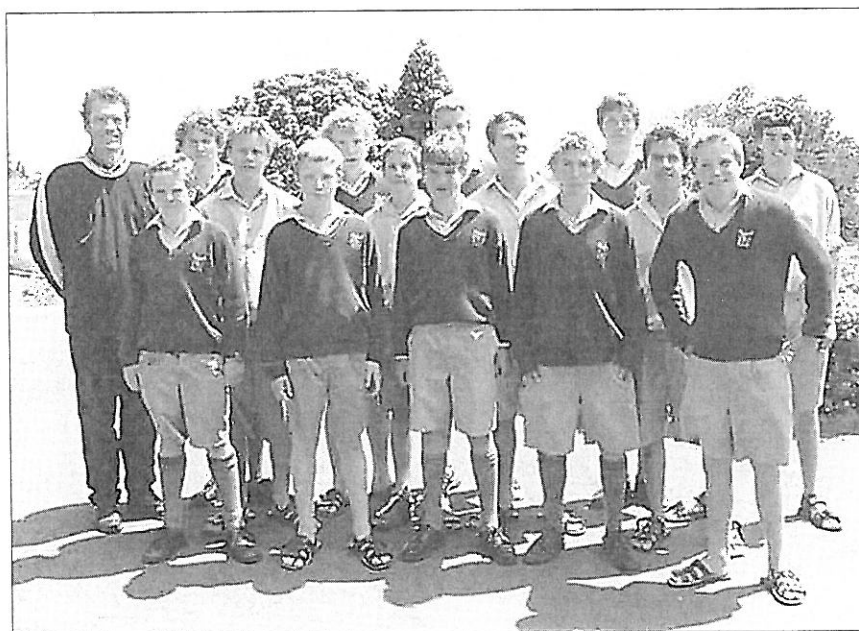
DUATHLON

AGRICULTURE/HORTICULTURE REPORT

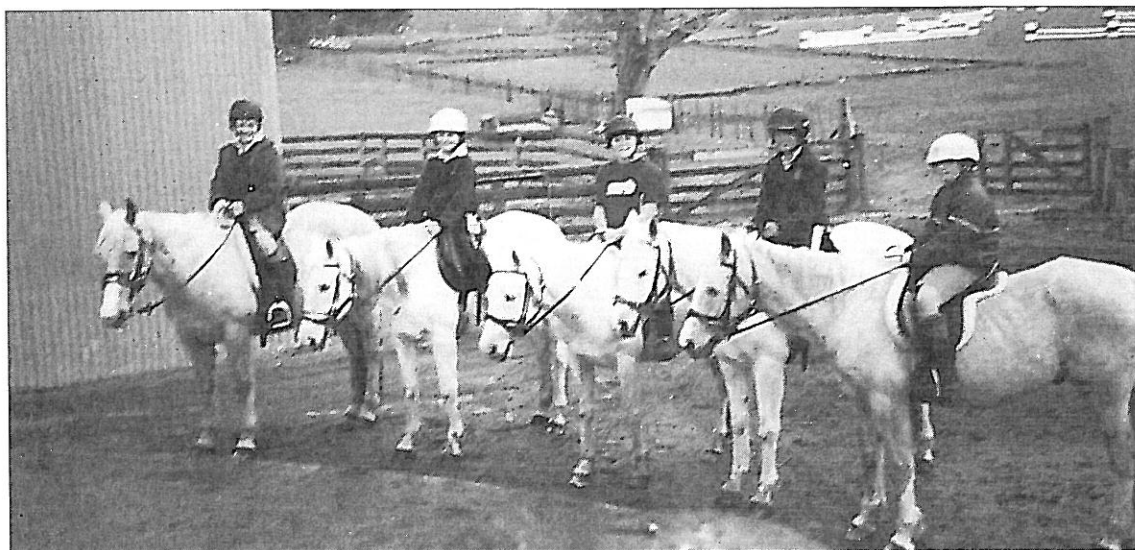
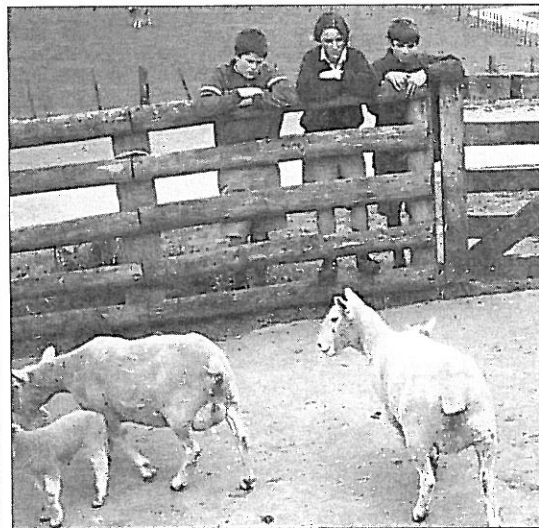

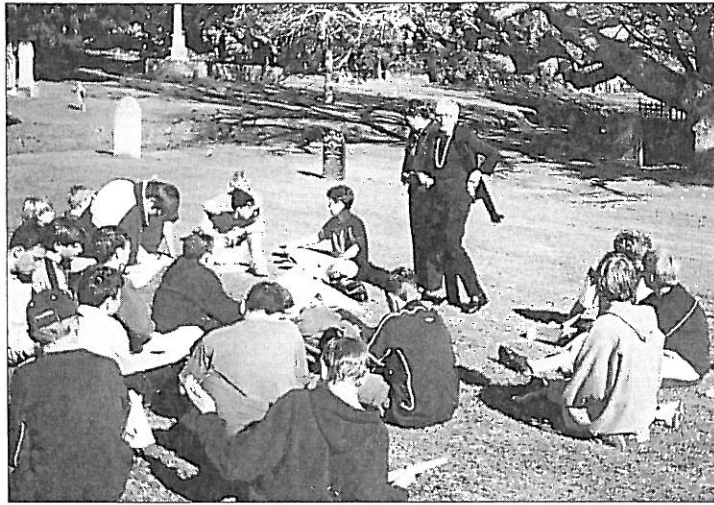


YEAR 9 SOCIAL STUDIES

sculptures in the sand. It all sounds like fun, but on both occasions the weather was inclement so it was quite a challenge. Awesome work was produced from both these experiences however.

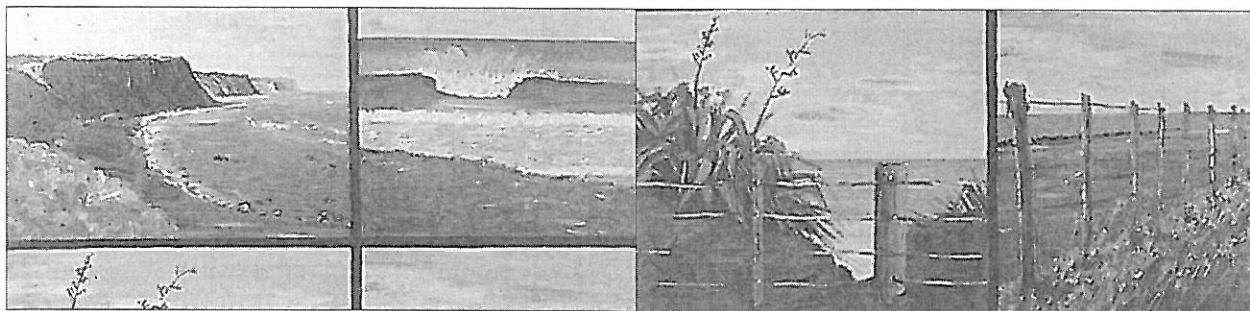
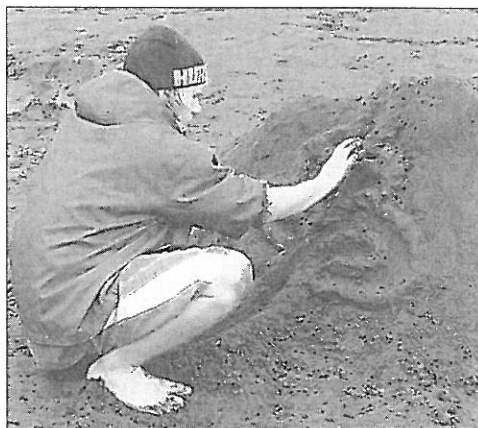

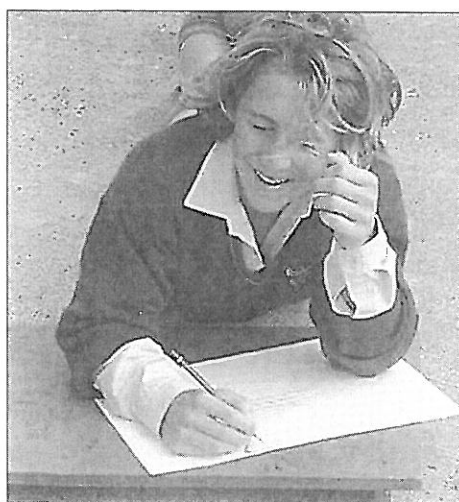
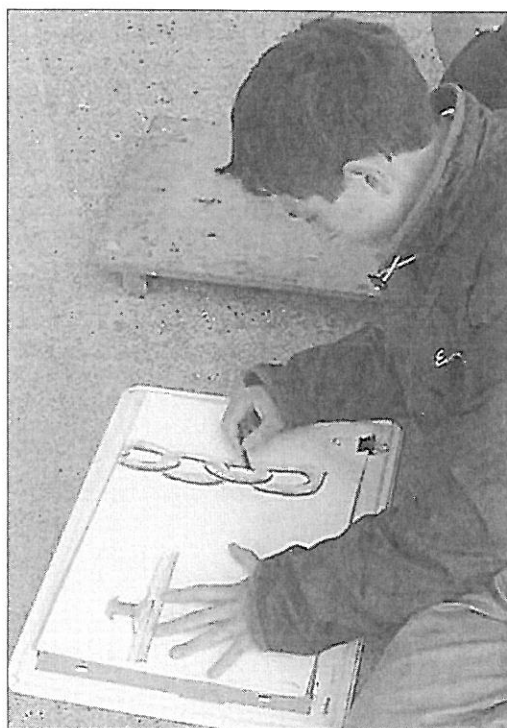
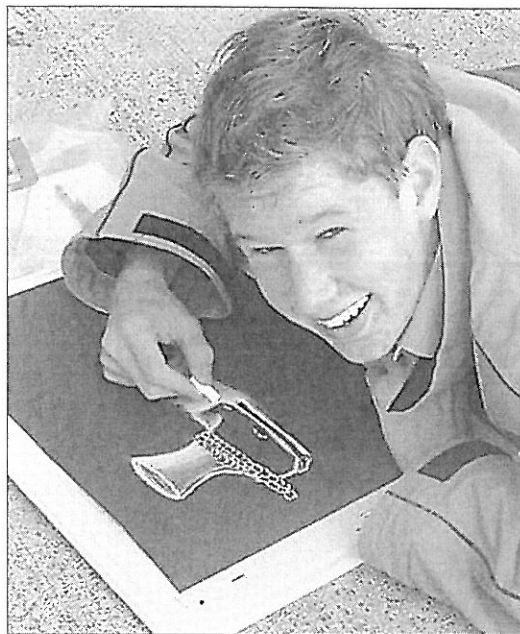


YEAR 11 VISUAL ARTS TRIP TO PORT TARANAKI

CAREERS PATHWAY PROGRAMME 2003

The aim of the Career Pathway Programme is to facilitate the smooth transition and access from school to employment. This includes work based learning or tertiary type study or training. It also helps retain students at school because it opens up opportunities for them to experience learning in different settings, trial career aspirations, experience success in school and gain credits towards qualifications which they can continue to pursue after leaving school.

For the 25 students involved in CPP this year it has been a busy time. In Term 1 the group undertook a YMCA course gaining credits in outdoor activities such as abseiling and river crossing. The students also gained credits in a Hospitality/Cooking course run by the Practical Education Centre. As well the students were able to choose from a variety of courses such as Engineering, Carpentry, Automotive, Agriculture or Horticulture.

Two days a week were spent at school with the timetable offering Maths, English/Communication, Self Management, RE, Computer Studies and PE. There was also an opportunity to take individualized programmes through distance learning courses offered by the Open Polytech, Correspondence School or Taratahi.

In Term 2 the students had the opportunity to be placed in work experience 1 to 2 days per week. Robyn Wackrow does a great job placing the students in appropriate work environments and keeping tabs on them.

The student's timetables became more diversified as the year progressed and the students continued to take the chance to try out new opportunities. A big thank you needs to go to our main driver – Trish Davidson and to those who helped out over the year. They were Phil Sole, Brother Steve, Brother Ben and Michelle Stevenson. They all helped the students reach their courses on time.

By Term 3 the students were starting to make decisions about their futures. CV's were being compiled and options for further training/study being investigated. The students focused on gaining Unit Standards in the area that would help them reach their goals. We've had some great outcomes throughout the year with several

students gaining apprenticeships/jobs as a direct result of their work experience. Congratulations must also go to Isaac Hayward and Mathew Cartwright who completed a Level 2 National Certificate in Hospitality through their course at the Practical Education Centre.

WORK EXPERIENCE

This year we have had 39 term placements for Work Experience. These have been in diverse sectors such as Building, Engineering, Education, Graphic Design, Hospitality and Retail.

The boys are gaining valuable practical skills and knowledge of training opportunities while on the placement. Lastly from work the boys learn to mix and work in the real world with adults. For some this can be something of a shock after the safety and security of school. Nevertheless it is a vital skill they need to ensure a working future.

BIOLOGY LOG BOOK 2003

Fieldtrips:

24/2/03 - The Year 11 Biological Science class visited the Cowling plantation and Barrett's Domain to study the diversity of species in each community.

25/2/03 - The Year 13 Biology class went to Kawaroa to study the niche of the intertidal shrimp.

26 & 27/2/03 - The two Year 12 Biology classes travelled to Back Beach on consecutive days and studied zonation at the rocky shore.

12/3/03 - The Year 11 Biological Science class did their first NCEA assessment in the Cowling Plantation and Barrett's Bush.

14 & 17/3/03 - Each of the two Year 12 Biology classes visited Barrett's Domain to become acquainted with the species present and ecological techniques.

Year 12 Biology students researched 'The impact of humans on our fisheries' &

'Reproductive technology.' Both projects were used for NCEA assessment.

The Year 13 boys prepared an essay for exam purposes on the contemporary issue of whether New Zealand should introduce genetically modified plant crops and farm animals.

Other Highlights of the Year:

The Year 12 Biology students made ginger beer and cheese and had a Cheese Tasting Expo for the teachers.

The Year 13 Biology class was visited by Mary Sheridan from Agricultural Research. Mary Sheridan described the method of genetic modification of plants and farm animals to the boys and discussed various applications of the technology in New Zealand. After the lecture the boys had a hands-on demonstration of gel-electrophoresis with 'DNA' samples.

NCEA News:

The Year 11 & 12 students did all the internal assessment standards offered in Level 1 and 2 Biology. Much effort was put into learning to *DESCRIBE*, *EXPLAIN* and *DISCUSS* biological structures and processes in preparing for the external NCEA Biology Assessments.

The Year 11 Biological Science students did a number of Unit Standards during the year instead of the external NCEA assessments.

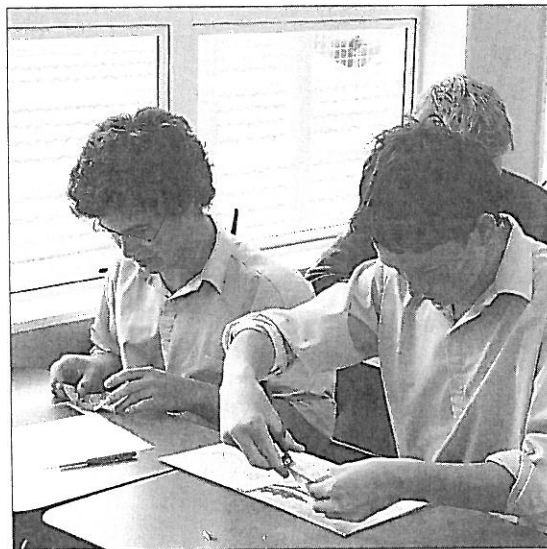
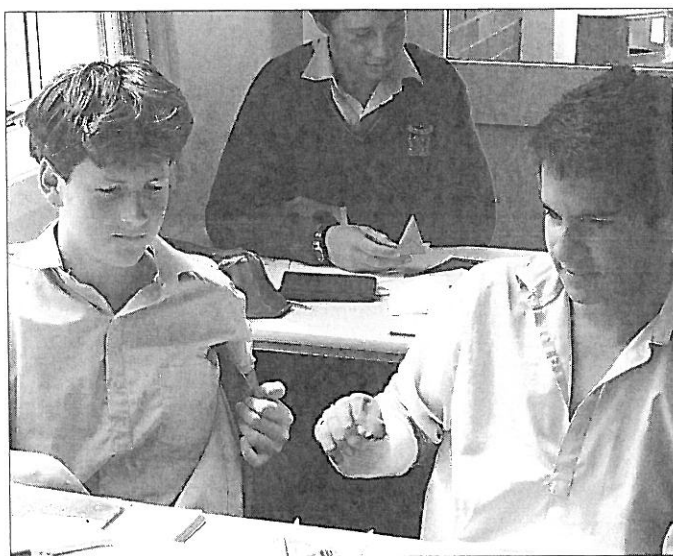
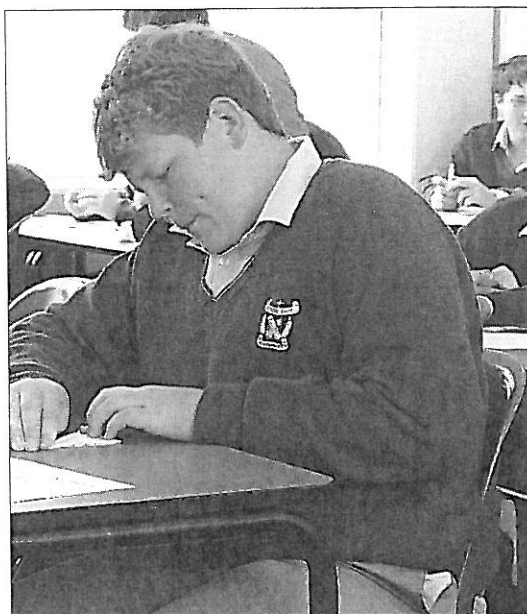


JAPANESE REPORT

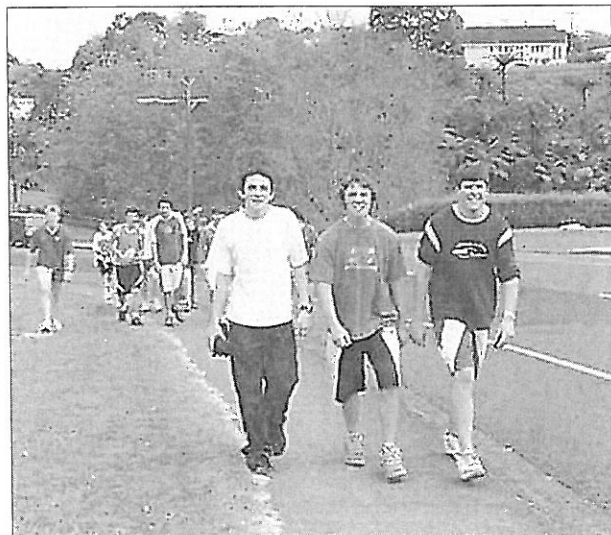
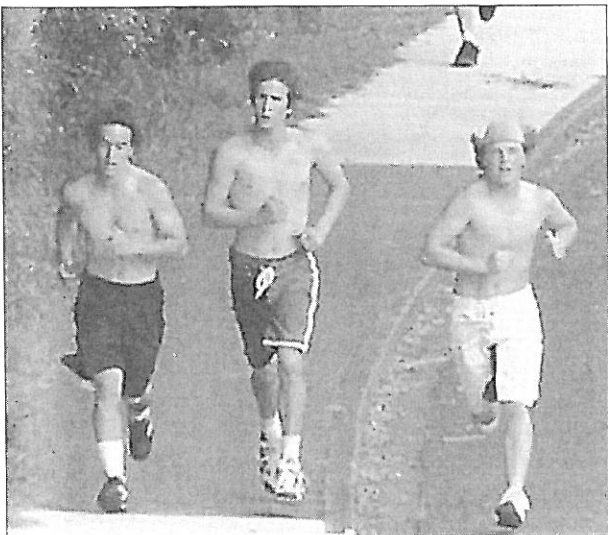
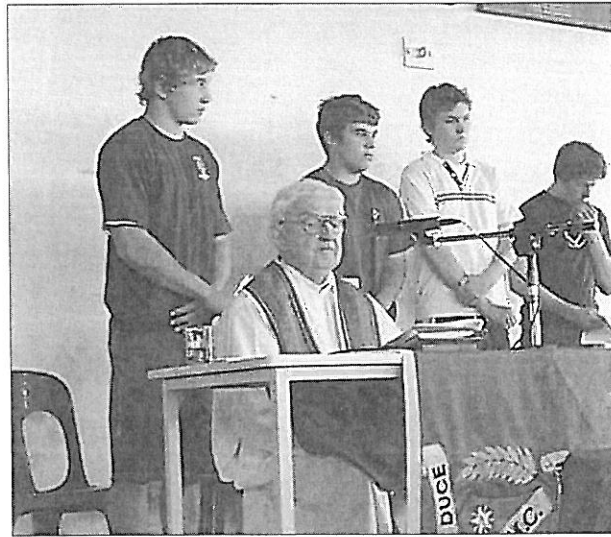
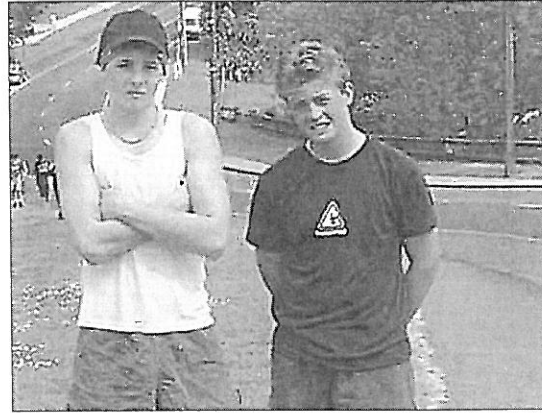
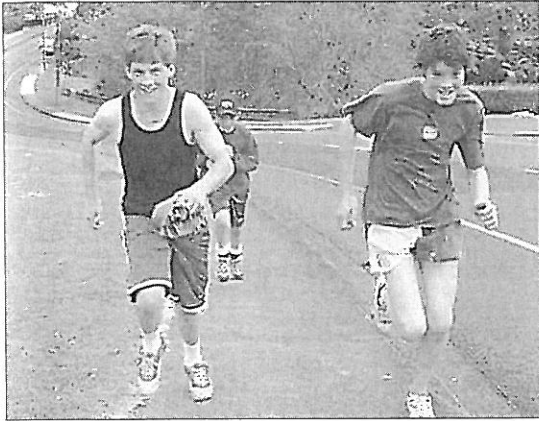
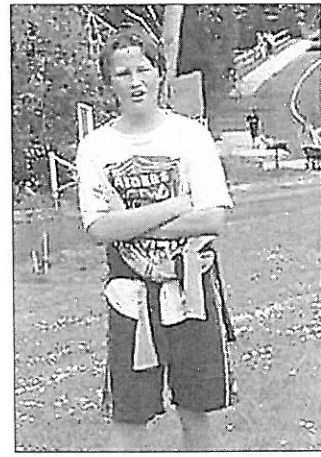
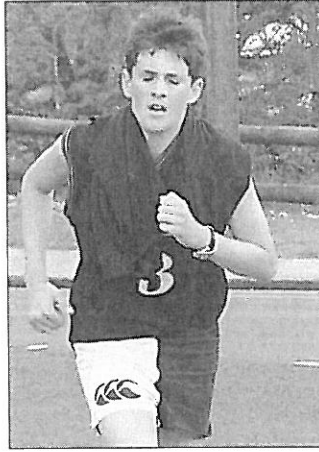


MISSION ACTION DAY WALKATHON

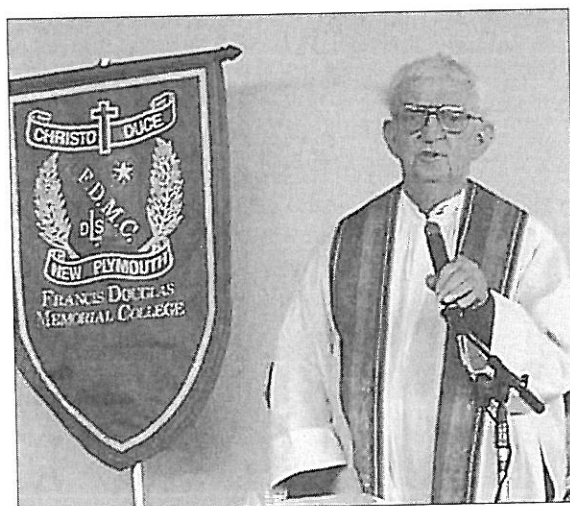

So, it has come to pass that another year of enthusiasm and challenge is behind us.

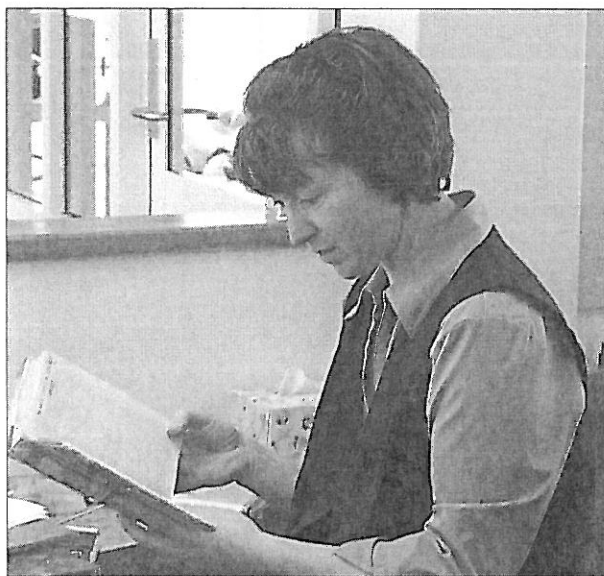

The intermediate boys who represented FDMC at the Science and Maths fairs did us proud gaining many first and second places.

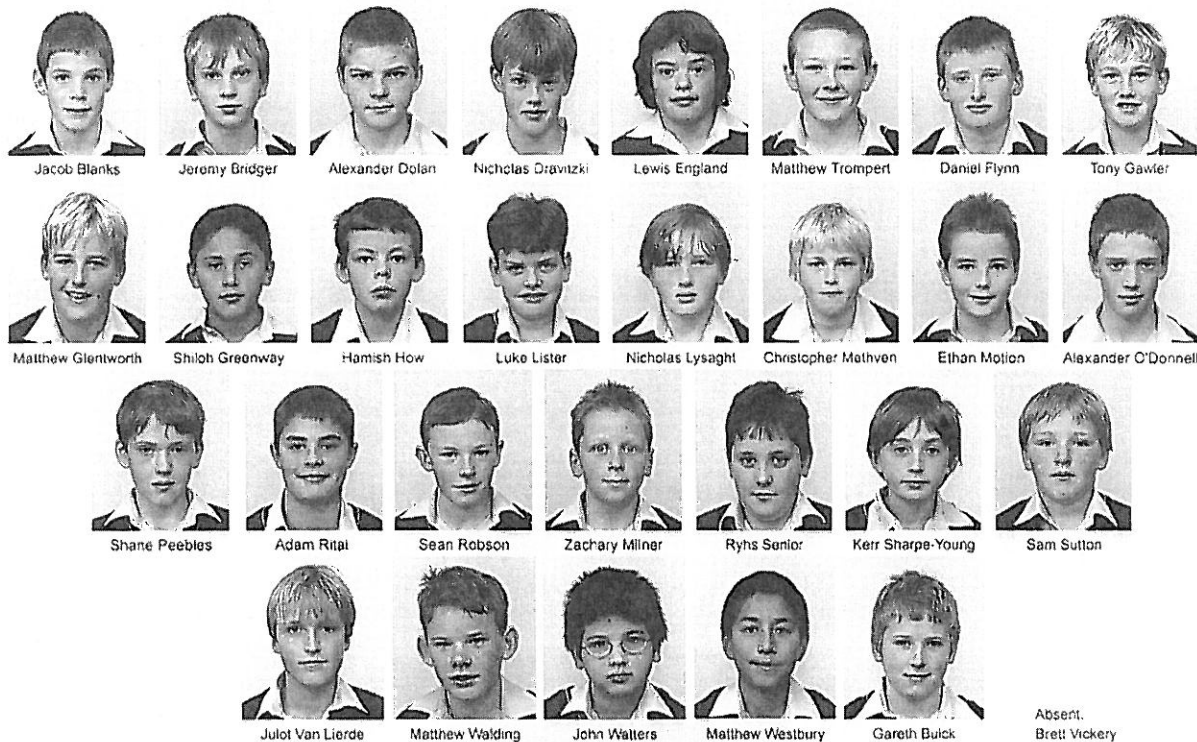

By the end of our intermediate years we are well and truly ready to take the big step up to Year 9 as we feel well prepared for the next 5 years of our secondary schooling.

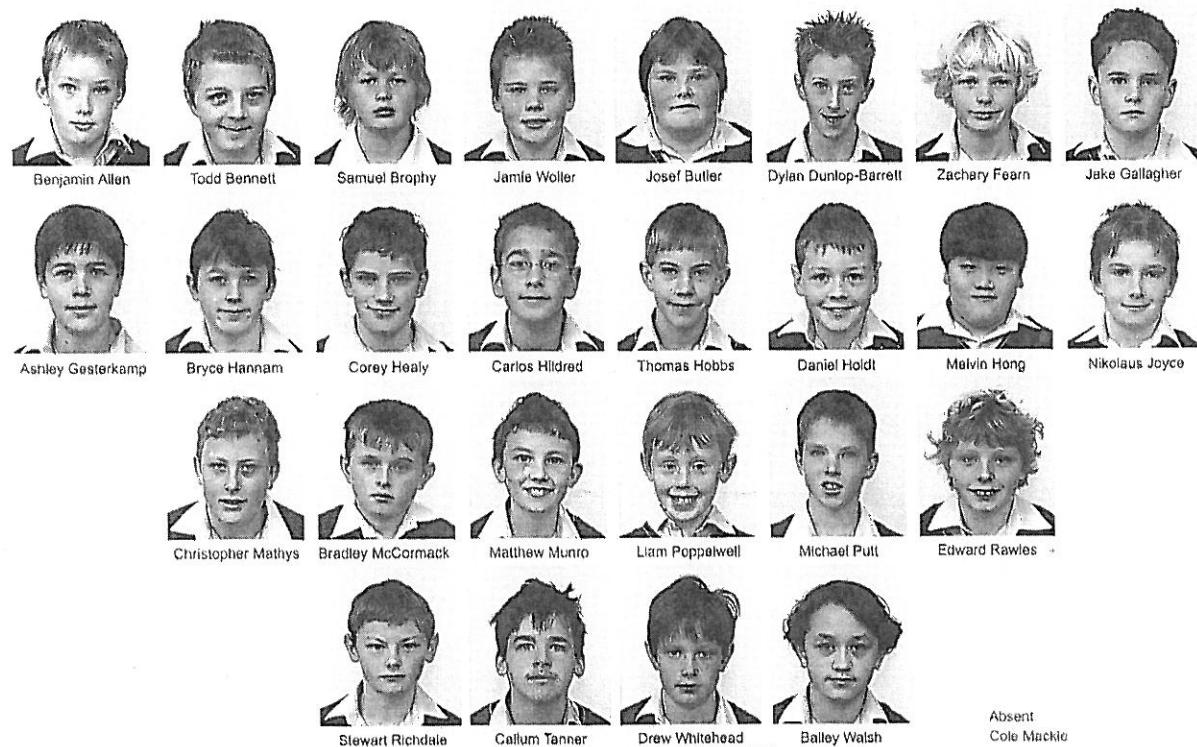
We must thank our homeroom teachers, and especially the Year 7 and 8 Dean Ms Alexander for their inspirational guidance throughout the year.

The 2003 Year 11's involved themselves admirably in the cultural side of College life. The cultural showcase was one of the highlights of

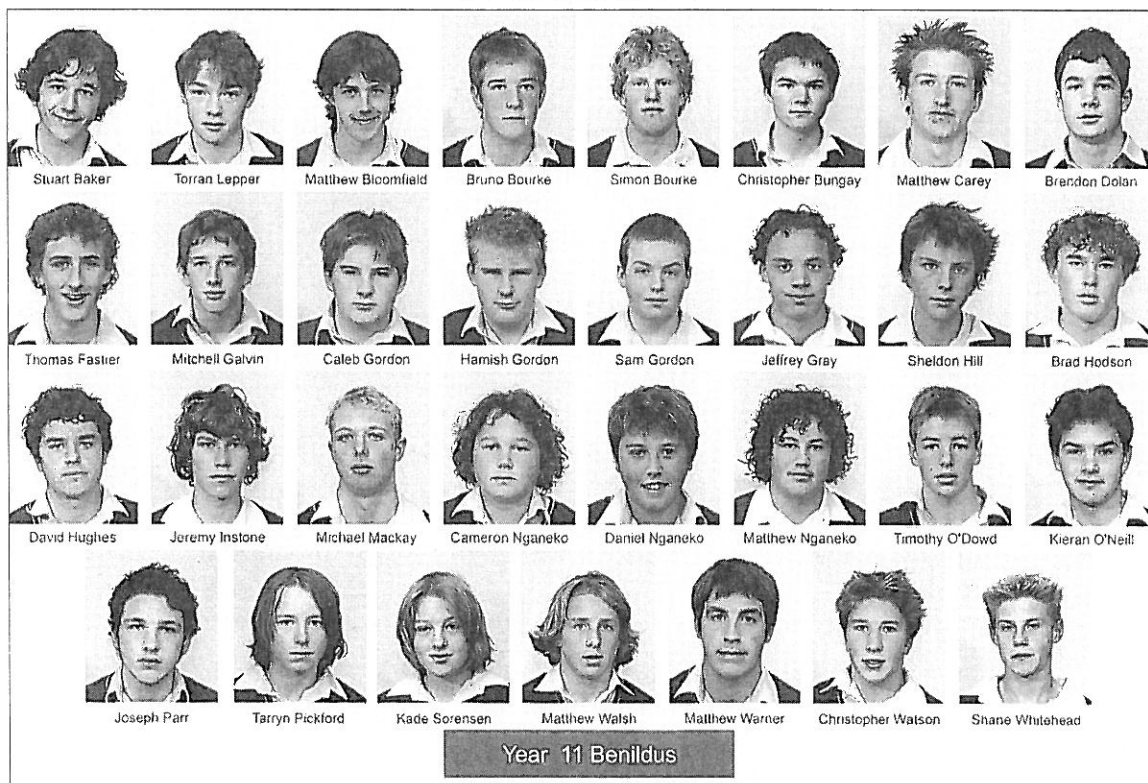
the college year with many Year 11 students showcasing their talents. The Year 11 group was also strongly represented in college bands, debating teams, drama and the O'Shea shield.
