



Thanks to Mrs Simpson who organized and helped all of the teams to compete and do the best they could.




Championship after consistently finishing the three race series with 2nd, 2nd and 2nd.


From here the Taranaki Secondary Schools Surfing Team was chosen to go to Gisborne to


compete. Ben Connolly and Anaru Hurunui were the two FDMC students chosen to go. Unfortunately Anaru could not compete so the team reserve was called in.

AGRICULTURE/HORTICULTURE REPORT

The year 2004 began with the news that the examination results from 2003 were pleasing, especially the results of the Year 13 students. A large number of these students have gone on to tertiary study.

The LA Alexander Trust enabled the further development of the Agridome facility in 2003. The greenhouse, shadehouse and workroom have been extended to a useable size. Safety features such as fire extinguishers and first aid kits have been installed as part of the upgrade.



This facility and the gardens were fully utilised by the students.

The students developed and maintained their individual garden plots, propagating plants from seed and cuttings. The endeavours of these students has commercial potential for the school with approximately 350 kowhai grown and available for sale this year.



2004 saw Year 9-12 students being involved in a practical feeding trial. This involved the students calculating the feed required for the animals to gain 0.5kg weight per day, calculating the feed in the paddock and rationing the feed to achieve this weight gain and weighing the

cattle to check the results. Accuracy was everything.

After 10 weeks they were 0.5kg off target.







2004 has been another busy, productive year for the Art Dept.

This year the numbers of Year 13 students studying photography has grown. We had a worthwhile trip to the Govett-Brewster Art Gallery to listen to Lawrence Aberhart (a leading New Zealand photographer) speaking about his work. He uses a large format camera and often long exposures to capture his images which contrasts with the digital technology being used today. Through Star funding we were able to bring Kevin Capon to the school to run a photography course for the students over Labour weekend. He was inspirational and undoubtedly the boys benefitted hugely learning techniques and experimenting with using their cameras in new ways.

Year 12 students completed their year's work with a Painting Achievement Standard where they got to paint on stretched canvasses. These were displayed in the gym at the Senior Prizegiving. This group completed Achievement Standards in Photography, Design, Printmaking and Painting, and produced some extremely good work throughout the year.

Year 11 is always a busy one. Remembered by most students for the three board external submission, it also has three other Achievement Standards. The most memorable of these is where they have to take their chosen images into alternative media. They make maquettes out of clay based on the image and sculpture of artist model Chris Booth, and then go and construct it in the sand at Back Beach. This is not as easy as you may think. Armed with spades, string lines, trowels, rakes, buckets etc. and clothing and equipment for every eventuality as well as the folder of plans, they venture forth.

Year 10 Option class has been a talented group and should create quality material for NCEA in 2005. Currently we are working on an Achievement Standard entitled 'He Waka' which is a research topic. It is quite time consuming, so I intend to address it this year to enable us to concentrate on practical art next year.



Students involved in the Career Pathways Programme have had a busy and interesting year, at times even exciting and challenging (well, it has been for Ms O'Reilly).


CPP tries to provide experiences through courses and work experience that will help students in their transition from school to employment or further training options.


















CAREERS

Once again the Careers Centre has been well utilised by students across all year levels and for a range of purposes. From mid-year on, Year 13 students in particular have made use of our facility and resources. We organised visits by liaison staff from various universities which were very valuable to, and well attended by, the senior students.

In Term 3 all of our Year 11, 12 and 13 students visited the annual Taranaki Careers Expo. This gave them the opportunity to speak to representatives from the universities, polytechnics, private training enterprises, industry training organisations and the armed services. We also held a PACE (Parents as Career Educators) evening in August, which was well-received by those who attended. The senior Maori students have attended Maori student days, Te Whakamana Taitamariki, and Taiohi Tu Taiohi Ora with Mr Taare Ruakere.

DISTANCE LEARNING

During 2004 we had 31 students from Years 11 to 13 enrolled at The Correspondence School studying Classics, Music, Graphics, Te Reo Maori, Agriculture, Computing and Media Studies. We also had 18 students taking units through The Open Polytechnic, Travel Careers & Training Ltd, Taratahi Agricultural Training Centre and Telford Rural Polytechnic. Students taking unit standards from these providers do so as a means of gaining some theoretical knowledge in the areas they intend to go into when they leave school. They can also use the credits gained towards their NCEA.

WORK EXPERIENCE REPORT

The work experience programme facilitated twenty four placements in Term Two and twenty three placements in Term Three. These were in diverse areas such as hotel management, electronics, building, farming, auto technicians, butchery and engineering. We also have boys learning first hand how to be chefs, landscapers, tilers, auto electricians and joiners.

Placements last a minimum of ten weeks. This allows time for students to build skills and knowledge so they can make informed decisions about their future careers. Similarly, employers get to know the boys and give us valuable feedback on strengths and areas to work on. Our links with the business community are a vital part of the programme. The students are aware they are ambassadors for the college and high standards are expected. As other schools in Taranaki are also running work experience programmes we need to be pro-active in finding and keeping placements.


TOPEC 2004

BIOLOGY LOG BOOK 2004

Fieldtrips:

The Year 11 Environmental Biology class visited the Cowling Plantation and Barrett's Domain to study the diversity of species in each community. They also visited the Taranaki Regional Council and Possum Factory to learn about the control of possums.

The Year 12 class studied the distribution of a selected species on the rocky shore at Kawaroa.

Mount Taranaki was visited by the Year 13 class on two separate occasions. On the first visit the Department of Conservation taught the boys sampling techniques to use in their individual investigations. During the second visit boys collected data for these investigations.

The students used the data collected during the field trips to write reports for NCEA internal assessments.

Waikato University visited the College in June. The Year 13 class attended an excellent lecture on human evolution and had the opportunity to observe twenty different skull types of hominids and hominoids. The Year 12 class was given a Power Point presentation on altitudinal zonation at Taranaki.

John Auty from Ag Research visited the Year 13 class in August. He brought a class set of gel electrophoresis equipment to the college and the students had the opportunity to learn more about the technique first-hand.

Other Highlights of the year:

The Year 11 Environmental Biology class completed two Horticulture unit standards. They grew many plants which they donated to the Hospice Shop. The boys also set up a worm farm.

The Year 12 boys researched microbial technology and experimented making cheese and ginger beer. In the third term they learnt to use scalpels and dissected fish and rats.

Michael Lucas was awarded the WITT Nursing and Science special prize for the best written report at the Fonterra Science & Technology Fair in August.

YEAR 13 GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP TO ROTORUA

A misty Monday morning in May and shadowy figures lever themselves onto Dave's Bus. We're off to Rotorua, tourism development a core topic of the senior Geography class and the best way to study it, in the field.

Mr MacNicol glances at his second-in-charge Kieren O'Neill, and casts an approving gaze over the lads. 'Well done men, all here by 8.00am'. Then turning to the driver,' Fire her up Dave, we're off.' So began the last major field trip of our illustrious careers at Francis Douglas.

There followed hree days of eating, breathing and sleeping in that fetid sulphurous atmosphere, the many tourist features and phenomena of Rotorua. We visited the Buried Village of Te Wairoa near the Pink and White Terraces, smashed and covered by the 1886 eruption of Maunga Tarawera. The geothermal forces that were unleashed in that brief but devastating eruption must have been fearsome to behold. We visited Whakarewarewa, with its excellent Maori Arts and Crafts Institute and the skilled carvers busy at their art. This is where those shattered survivors of the eruption were given land by the Rotorua Arawa Tribe to start their lives once again. This is the site of one of the largest and most beautiful carved meeting houses in this country and also where we gazed upon our famous, most active geyser, Pohutu. This has erupted almost continuously since the illegal steam bores of nearby motels and houses were closed down by the Council in the 1990s. Our accommodation was at a Christian Lodge on the shores of the Lake, at Holden's Bay. This was carefully selected by Mr MacNicol for its quality and the fact that it was far away from the temptations of downtown "Roto Vegas". We were refreshed and fed by the fearsome looking bearded resident chef, Clive, a man who ensured that everyone did his duty in the kitchen. We built our own filled rolls for lunch and headed off to survey and map the Fenton and Tutanekai Street concentrations. These are the areas of motels, hotels, restaurants, souvenir shops, travel information and service providers. Because of the high level of tourism development the size of the CBD is much larger than other cities of a comparable size. The redeveloped lake front with its tourist operators, boat and fishing charters, walkways and playgrounds all provide examples of the type of specific information that just cannot be gleaned from a text book.

The Agrodome with its famed sheep and farm shows now balanced by the thrill tourist attractions of the swoop, the V8 jet sprint boat, freefall and bungy was a highlight. We tried some of these before heading off to Skyline Sky rides, the gondola and the luge. Forty fired up Francis Douglas students screaming down the advanced track was a sight to behold. There were races and passing manoeuvres that will long be remembered. Then it was back home, weary but happy and each of us with a much better understanding of the topic we had been studying. The catch-cry for the trip was "just do it".

AUCKLAND URBAN STUDIES FIELD TRIP

Early in term 3 the Year 12 Geography classes with Mr MacNicol and Mr Dravitzki headed up to Auckland to study the patterns and processes which helped form our largest city. We stayed at Blockhouse Bay on the shores of the Manukau Harbour a place called Motu Moana. Over the period of 3 days we explored volcanic cinder cones such as Mount Eden, the redeveloped waterfront of the Viaduct basin and various suburban shopping and housing areas.

Part of the Geography course requires us to be able to map and explain how our city has developed. Several of our group had not been to Auckland before so the experience of exploring parts of this sprawling city was valuable. We studied the ages and types of

housing and how it changed as we moved further from the heart of the city. The time we spent in the Queen Street area was also of interest, especially during our Monday night excursion. Henderson, with its massive Westfield shopping centre, is a great example of how large these malls can get. This is a real contrast to the shops lining each side of Great North Road, the original Henderson shops.

Chris the bus driver did a brilliant job of navigating us around the busy streets and our Teachers excelled in the kitchen, providing their hot and tasty meals to feed the hungry masses. It was a good trip which was a valuable learning experience.

YOUNG ENTERPRISE SCHEME

YES gives students an opportunity to set up and run a business enterprise through the school year under the Enterprise New Zealand Trust. Participants learn valuable skills such as speaking and presentation skills in the oral presentations, marketing their wares at the Trade Fair, business reporting, and other teamwork and business skills such as managing meetings, financial management, planning, customer service and product research and development. All after tax profits are kept by the directors of the businesses!

A record five teams were entered into this year's Young Enterprise Scheme: Unique Innovations, Christo Duce Stubbies, Paradox, DNA and Total

Package. Ideas for products varied from licence plate surrounds to stubbies, umbrellas, and t-shirts, to socials. Unique Innovations even came up with a brand new product idea of their own.

It was a busy year, with a number of requirements needing to be met in order for the students to be in line for their credits. Teams are partnered with a business mentor to guide them and help focus their energy. In this regard our thanks go to our dedicated mentors Lyn, Deanne and Debbie from Staples Rodway. The teams achieved a number of awards including business planning and technological innovation.

YEAR 10 QUIZ TEAM

The academic brilliance of past students weighed on our shoulders as we, four year 10 students, journeyed to the TSB racecourse on 11th August 2004 to participate in the annual Year 10 Science competition, for the region of Taranaki.

Our champion Taranaki quiz team consisted of the scientific brilliance of Simon Velvin and Brendon Berg and the organizational skills of Jason Senior, the quick thinking of Mitchell Boulton and the factual mind of Amrit Singh. They joined in fierce competition with approximately ten other teams all determined to glorify their school's name with a victory.

Our scientific knowledge soon came under huge pressure, as teams were required to complete 10 individual stations, questioning all the aspects of modern science - everything from balancing chemical equations, to the biological fields of science and even performing some of the more complex practicals. All were worth important points in our quest to achieve victory.

Luckily, our calm composure, overriding confidence and somewhat comical combination shone through. Managing only second place from ten different stations, our desire to win now rested on our performance in the final questions, challenging our knowledge of scientific equipment. The final stretch obviously proved to be an obstacle for the other competitors and allowed the Francis Douglas team a narrow win.

The trophy had now left New Plymouth Boys' High hands for the first time in four years, and the Francis Douglas name now had another accolade to add to its list.

NATIONAL YOUNG LEADERS CONFERENCE

The National Young Leaders Day, was an eye opener, an inspiration but most of all a completely humbling experience. The large group of us that went on this trip was as diverse as the college. There were academics, athletes and culturalists.

The conference offered various messages to a wide range of people. We heard many rousing personal experiences from Mai Chen, one of

the leading lawyers in the country. We also learnt that success is not always in winning, but in the journey through defeat. Liam Jeory — the Communication Director for McDonalds told of his greatest moment when he was working as a foreign correspondent in Gallipoli. The pride in our nation he conveyed caused a deafening silence, but the theme remained the same; live life with no regrets, and live not from the past but in the present, aiming for the future.

ENRICHMENT WORKSHOPS

Another step was taken in the unveiling of the mystery that is life, for the thirty or so students fortunate enough to attend the Science enrichment, "Life's what you make it".

Approximately forty minutes of artistic brilliance, as the two actors conveyed in the simplest form, the secret behind our characteristics. From the use of mannequins, to a pack of cards, the show lacked neither props, nor education. It was an enlightening experience for everyone as the students were informed of the genetic code, the reasons for our individual traits and even how certain members of the audience (nudge-nudge, wink-wink) grew up to be so good looking.

Humour was definitely an important factor, with the highly experienced actors providing a brilliant blend of entertainment and education.

A further understanding of the puzzle that is genetics was achieved, through the unique activities and simplicity of the play. A show paved with interesting facts, veneered with the performance of the actors and perfected with a touch of comedy, the genetics enrichment brought to us by the New Zealand International Science Festival, has certainly given life to the aging text book.


JAPANESE REPORT

JAPAN TRIP

The sudden jolt as the plane landed on the tarmac told us that we had finally landed at our destination, Japan. Ahead of us lay eighteen days of experiencing a completely different life and culture from our own and, along with that, a lot of fun.

The first stop on the trip was Japan's capital city, Tokyo. Tokyo is massive. The number of people in the city is so vast that the population of New Zealand travels through one of Tokyo's train stations every day, something we struggled to get our heads around. In the city, we stayed in a hall that was part of the church Father Leo Schumacher, an old boy of Francis Douglas, worked in. Father Leo was an awesome host and on our last night in Tokyo he took us to a restaurant where we tried, with some caution, a wide variety of Japanese cuisine. Oishii katta desu (It was delicious). We also noticed just how friendly and helpful Japanese people are. The few times we found ourselves a little lost, people were coming up to us in the street offering to help and sometimes even just for a chat, so they could practise their English. Also in our Tokyo visit we went to temples and the Imperial Palace, walked across the very large Rainbow Bridge and went on the largest Ferris wheel in Japan (all 117 metres of it).

On our way to Kyoto we stopped over a night in New Plymouth's sister city Mishima. Here we went on a bus tour to popular areas surrounding Mishima. This trip took us into viewing range of Mount Fuji but unluckily the mountain was covered in cloud.

Then, after a 250km/h Shinkansen ride (bullet train), we arrived in Kyoto. Here we stayed at a youth hostel where we met not only Japanese people but Americans, Germans, English and even Australians, further adding to our cultural experience in Japan. The first place we visited in Kyoto was the world famous Kinkakuji or The Golden Pavillion. This ancient temple is seemingly coated in gold but it is in fact only a golden leaf and with the surrounding gardens is an amazing sight to behold. The Nijojo castle was also on our list of places to visit. Inside the castle, every step taken on the wooden floorboards produced a sound very similar to a nightingale bird. We were impressed by the traditional but unusual Japanese paper walls and with more elegant and very traditional Japanese gardens around the castle; this was another amazing stop on our trip.

Next on our tour was the city of Hiroshima. Looking out over the very large city made it hard to believe that just less than sixty years ago the entire area was completely destroyed by the atomic bomb, save for a few badly damaged buildings. Hiroshima meant the first of two home stays in Japan and what an awesome experience that was. Everyone's skills using the Japanese language were put to the test and

along with the limited English that our host families could speak the language barrier was almost always overcome, although this was not always the case. Hiroshima also offered many sights and things to do. At the Hiroshima peace park we hung the many paper cranes we had made before and during the trip, an act that people visiting the city always do in the remembrance of the past. We also visited the popular island of Miyajima, which is home to many deer that live among the people on the island. On our last night in Hiroshima the host families threw a farewell party, full of fun, food and games before we left the next day.

Osaka was the last city on our tour of Japan and the second of our two home stays. On arrival in the city we went to Ashima High School to meet our host students and their families. During our introduction to all the students we were amazed to hear excited whispers and giggling but most of all screaming, as if we were famous people. Our stay in Osaka was, like the rest of the trip, an amazing experience. We went to the Universal Studios Japan theme park, twelve hours of nothing but fun and good times with our host students. We were able to go into some of the classes at Ashima High School and

Toyosaki Higashi Primary School and experience school life in Japan. We also went to the observatory at the top of the Osaka Sky Tower, giving us an awesome view of Japan's second largest city. The host families in Osaka were, like our Hiroshima families, very hospitable and awesome people and really made our trip the great experience it turned out to be. However all good things must come to an end and the end of our Japan Tour had finally come. The plane left the tarmac of the manmade island of Kansai Airport and we were on our way home to New Zealand.

The Japan Study Tour was a huge success and because of the remarkable and awesome Japanese people, we left with more gifts from our host families than the number of gifts we took over for them. A big thanks to Mr and Mrs Marris for their involvement in the trip, especially to Mrs Marris for her brilliant organisation and hard work and her very good knowledge of the Japanese language. A brief kit-list was sent out that required the normal essentials before I left, but apart from that I had no idea what to expect! However I was soon quick to find out that I was in for a very exciting and challenging week. Something that immediately caused a stir around the campus, especially among the girls, was the mobile phone hand-in. The idea, along with the confiscation of other items, was to create an environment for the week which would put us out of our personal comfort zones; something that would be important if we were going to gain as much as possible from this wonderful opportunity.

Early on in the week it was quite clearly pointed out to us what exactly the Navy holds as its three core values and how these apply to everyone and everything involved. They were 'Courage, Commitment and Comradeship" - a trio of words that would help guide us through the week and give us an interesting insight into a few vital skills required in the Navy - those of leadership, teamwork and discipline.

Among the many briefings and exciting demonstrations on the various career paths offered there, some of the activities we experienced included:

- A leap off the back of a full-size warship in our overalls and shoes into the ocean, as part of the sea-survival skills unit that is a compulsory part of training

-An aggressive competition run on their own confidence course at their physical training base in Whangaparoa. This brought out the best teamwork of the week, as it is a physically demanding course that requires your whole team to complete the obstacle before moving on to the next one.

-Thorough visits to all the ships that were present at the dock at the time.

-A few team building games and scenarios to solve which produced some outstanding results. These evolved from the importance of task commitment and from having a healthy balance between leadership and team cooperation.

-Fitness tests and evaluations that included the ever-so famous 'beep-test'.

-A turn on their life-sized bridge simulator that is so realistic that people have actually been sea-sick.

-An interesting tour around their own Damage Control School where trainees learn how to react under different possibilities of damage on board. -A very physical demonstration from the Navy's own arms squad that included both a thrilling firing range show and a combat skills display. -And finally we witnessed the first-year sailors' graduation parade - a mix of discipline, accurate skill and some fantastic teamwork.






























SCHOOL LEADERS' FORUM





PROXIME ACCESSIT


Jeremy Adams is Proxime Accessit for 2004. Jeremy began his time at FDMC halfway through Year Nine in 2000.







the top 16 in the National Knockout Tournament. The hockey team, for the first time in history, won the Regional Tournament.




all studying hard as the end of year panic sets in.






