

Principal's Report - 2006



As we reflect on the year just past and look forward to the future, we can feel a deep sense of gratitude and appreciation for all the events and experiences of 2006. The "Cardinal, Blue and Gold" seeks to record the people and events that have given us the many fond memories we have enjoyed as a College community. The College magazine attempts to capture the pulse, the passion and the vitality of College life, our aspirations, struggles and triumphs. There is so much spirit in our young men, so much energy and talent yet to be harnessed. In the 2006 College magazine, we salute the hard work and dedication of our staff, the talent and commitment of all our students, especially the Class of 2006, and the support and co-operation of the wider College community.

Academic Achievement

Academically the year commenced with the news of the results of the 2005 National Certificate of Educational Achievement. Francis Douglas students maintained the improved levels of performance that have built up in recent years with the overall benchmark figures higher than the national and comparative decile averages. While there are some fluctuations from year to year there seems to be a relatively consistent picture of success for students at the College.

The achievements of the 2005 NCEA Level 3 class were a credit to students, whose hard work across the last three years has borne fruit in unexpected abundance. 61.8% of our students who were part of the Year 13 cohort gained a Level 3 qualification (50.3% nationally). It is also a credit to their teachers, who have taught and guided them, supported and encouraged them throughout their time at the College.

77.5% of our students who were part of the Year 12 cohort gained a Level 2 qualification (55.5% nationally), and 74.5% of our students gained a Level 1 certificate, compared with a national average of 56.4%.

In less formal academic settings, the College has performed solidly. High Distinction and Distinction certificates have been obtained in international competitions in English, Science and Mathematics, including solid performances at the Fonterra Science and Technology Fair.

I salute all the teachers for their efforts with the boys, helping them to develop to the best of their ability.

Faith Development and Religious Education

The College ensured the continuing acquisition and reinforcement of positive values through all our programmes. The Religious Education classes in particular, continue to challenge the boys academically and spiritually. The College's Religious Education programme enables the boys to come to an appreciation and realisation of the importance of prayer and God in their lives as well as to reflect on various social, spiritual and moral issues. Most importantly, we celebrated God's love for us through regular prayer and the Eucharist.

We also reflected and prayed as a College community on many occasions such as the Prefects' Investiture and Commencement Mass, Ash Wednesday



and Holy Week, Founder's Day, Mission Action Day and the Year 13 Leavers' Mass.

Our College Youth Minister, Miss Veronica Fouhy, provided students with the opportunity to reflect on their life and experiences through participation in retreat days. It was extremely heartening to see the manner in which the boys entered into the spirit of these days.

We have been very fortunate to have as our College Chaplain, Father Joe O'Riordan, who has displayed tireless generosity and flexibility. I know students and teachers have appreciated his involvement in the life of the College.



We must continue to present to our young people the relevance of God and encourage them to recognise the importance of faith in their daily lives, at the same time challenging them to uphold strong values to become men of faith, integrity and scholarship.

Co-curricular

Co-curricular activities feature strongly in the ethos and the organisation of the College. Success in the co-curricular activities can be seen in the range of activities offered, the participation rates by students, and the significant successes achieved in all fields.

An extensive sporting programme in the College offers boys of all abilities the opportunity to participate in team sport. Francis Douglas Memorial College supports boys in developing their sporting skills through regular team practice sessions and involvement in weekend sport, where boys gain valuable lessons in perseverance, resilience and team spirit. In offering a successful sporting program, boys displaying sporting talents can participate at one of the highest levels available in schoolboy sport. Along with teachers, specialist coaches are employed in various fields to provide





an additional professional dimension to the sporting life at the College

In many ways, 2006 has been a year of unparalleled success on the sports field. More than 130 students have gained selection in regional teams and 8 boys have gained selection in national age-group teams. It is easy to focus on such tangible successes as the 1st XV's third consecutive victory in the Taranaki Rugby Union Under 20 Competition, our Intermediate Rugby team's victory in the Linkhorn Cup or the many outstanding individual results in regional and national championships. However, it is equally important to focus on the hundreds of other FDMC sportsmen who turn out loyally week after week in lower grades to represent their school with pride.



The inaugural Sportsmen's Dinner was held on Saturday 28th October at the New Plymouth Club. 250 staff, students, parents and coaches attended this event. Mr Jed Rowlands, coach of the New Zealand women's Rugby team, was Guest-of-Honour. He presented certificates and awards to various teams and individuals. Nathan Coombes was named as Sportsman of the Year, the 1st XV Rugby team was named as the Team of the Year and Connor Landrigan was recognised for his contribution to College sport.

Culturally, the College is stronger than ever in an increasing and diverse range of activities.

It has been particularly pleasing to see the re-emergence of choral music under the professional and enthusiastic leadership of Ms Jo Suren, teacher-incharge of Music and Mrs Jeanette Hasell.

'Fusion', the College's unconventional orchestra, performed in a combined orchestra at the Hamilton Festival, the Contemporary Combo performed



admirably at the Taranaki Jazz Club and "Da Boyz" Junior Choir, accompanied by senior musicians, performed at the New Plymouth Schools' Music Festival. Six bands entered the Taranaki heats of the 2006 Rockquest, three made the finals, and one band, 'Ruin', was selected to perform at the National Rockquest final.

The Kapa Haka group has performed with pride, commitment and professionalism on a number of occasions and saw the first performances of a College haka.

The O'Shea Shield team performed with skill and enthusiasm, winning the Debating, Impromptu Speech and Junior Prepared Speech sections of the competition.



Boarding School

Francis Douglas was set up to provide a Catholic education for boys in Taranaki; to that end the boarding school is integral to the College. There is also a real opportunity to build a strong Catholic community where the practices and programmes helping to develop these young men reflect Gospel values. A Community of De La Salle Brothers ran the boarding school in the past. 2006 saw a significant change in the overall governance of the boarding school with its incorporation as a company of limited liability. The De La Salle Brothers remain the proprietors but have given guardianship of the Hostel to a group of dedicated people who form the Board of Directors and staff of the Hostel. The boarding school was also given a new

name – La Salle House – to distinguish it from the College and to reinforce its identity as an important and continuing part of the Lasallian ministry in New Zealand. I would like to acknowledge and thank Mrs Mary Lawn, Chairperson and the directors of the La Salle House Limited Hostel Board, for their dedication and support of all things pertaining to the governance of the Hostel. We thank them for their unselfish service, loyalty and commitment to the College.

48th Speech and Graduation Day

The 48th Speech and Graduation Day was a significant occasion for our Year 13 class. On this special occasion, we gave due recognition and prominence to our graduation students who have given so much to the College during their years here. Head Boy, Shaun Butler was named as Dux of the College, and Michael Hobbs as Proxime Accessit.



Each of these people has left a mark on the school and the College community is grateful to each of them for the contribution they made to the life of our school. We thank them for their dedication and commitment.

2006 is the final year of this term of the Board of Trustees with elections in the new year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow board members for their contributions throughout the year and indeed this term of the board. We are very fortunate to have quality representation from the De La Salle brothers through Brothers Peter Ryan, Pat Lynch and Steve Hogan who collectively have a wealth of information and experience in the management of schools such as ours.

This year has seen the opening of the St Miguel Technology block, being the fruition of many years of planning and co-ordination so that we may have this valuable teaching resource. I remember back to the 1970's when I was at the College and the offerings for technology was essentially wood-work with Brendon O'Neil under the gymnasium, while music was taught out of a small classroom next to the boarders' dining room. It is great to see the vast improvement in the facilities we now have on offer!

Other new resources for the College this vear include a wireless network giving 99% coverage of the campus, enabling teachers to access the Internet and LAN wherever they are working. In addition a number of Smartboards have been purchased. These promise to revolutionise the way our children are taught with a far more graphical interface with the students and connection to the internet. This in itself raises challenges in so far as while it is great to have the latest technology, we also have to have the teachers capable of getting the most out of it. To this end I believe we are very fortunate in that we have secured Ministry of Education funding to form an IT cluster group with New Plymouth Boys' High School. The joint application by NPBHS and ourselves is unique in a number of ways in so far as we have a State School joining with a Private Integrated School, both of which could be said to be competing in the marketplace for students. Education can surpass competition. This funding of an IT Cluster Group will deliver a dedicated resource to review our IT strategy and implement targeted training of teachers so that they may impart their new-found skills onto students. The funding comes at a very opportune time in terms of the development of the Schools IT infrastructure and delivery mechanisms.

This year also sees the end of an era at the College with the well-earned retirement of Bro William Harnett (affectionately known as Chinny among many other such pseudonyms). He has been instrumental in developing the Agricultural resources of the College and maintaining the farm over many years. His instant recollection of past pupils and the history of the College will be sorely missed. We wish him well for his time back in Kaikoura on the family farm.

The College can be most pleased with the results being achieved on the academic front, with our results being better than most schools of a similar size and decile ranking not only in Taranaki but also in New Zealand. Again while our results are good, there is still plenty of room for improvement.

Roll of Honour - Mrs Tess Gaffney

In Gratitude: Mrs Tess Gaffney (26.03.1926 - 02.01.2007)

On Monday 24 July, the College community, students, staff, Brothers, Old Boys and friends gathered in the College gym to recognise the service to the College of Mrs Tess Gaffney. We were joined by members of Mrs Gaffney's family as well as 24 old boys who travelled from all parts of the country to recognise and thank an amazing lady.

Mrs Gaffney joined the College in 1970 as the Librarian. Brother Peter Bray, Principal (1979-1990) wrote that Mrs Gaffney "brought to that task (Librarian) a commitment and excitement that ensured that the students were able to access the very best material she could find. Underneath all the things she did in getting books, in keeping books and providing opportunities for students was a deep respect and care for the boys. This was displayed in very practical ways - she would follow through on what she had promised, she would respond to students who were having a hard time and would stand up for those who were finding the going tough." Brother Bill Firman, Principal 1998-2002 added, "With boys, Mrs Gaffney was always caring and helpful, gentle yet firm, sympathetic yet expecting achievement."

In addition to her wonderful work in the library, Mrs Gaffney was passionate about the O'Shea Shield. She would put hours of her time into preparing the students who would represent the College and was very excited for them when they did well and very supportive of them when they did not. This was again a shining example of Gospel values in practice.

It was in 1976 that sadly one of Mrs

Gaffney's son's, Mark, a Year 10 student at the College died of a brain tumour. Amongst his belongings were found half a dozen newspaper clippings relating to events at the College. These small clippings of Mark's became the impetus for Mrs Gaffney to set up and maintain the College archives, a task she continues, with extraordinary devotion. to do today. As Brother Bill says, "she wanted to be sure that every student and staff member who would ever come to Francis Douglas Memorial College would understand the history, tradition and ethos that makes this place the great College it is today."

The College salutes Mrs Gaffney as a woman who made a great and generous contribution to Francis Douglas Memorial College for 36 years. She continues to be an example of the best values and principles a person can display.






















Roll of Honour - Head Boy's Report

The Cross Country was up next. Benildus earned valuable points with many participating. Congratulations to those boys who took part in this committed event.



Another win, this time off the field, where we took out house debating. I must congratulate Travis Graham and, most importantly, Jamie Barrett who played a


















College Diary - Te Wera Camp Year 9



The boys went to the beach to choose a rock or two, brought them back to the marae and got to work. There were some very colourful and interesting pieces at the end of that session. Work for the Hangi began that night with the boys involved in peeling kumara and potatoes and stacking the firewood. When the work was done the boys went off to the river for some eeling.

On day two Whaea Joanna Tito took the students for some raranga (weaving). The importance of flax was explained, as was the cutting method. This was a challenge for some as we were making kono (baskets) – a lengthy process.

After lunch the wood for the hangi was set alight and a number of students volunteered to make sure the rocks stayed on top and help put the kai down once the rocks were hot. The hangi was very nice. That night we played spotlight.

On the final day Matua Clive came and gave us an in sight into Maori weapons followed by some kapa haka. We began putting actions to the new school haka.

At the end of the Marae Noho we were all very tired but had gained valuable experiences. Thanks must go to the parents who stayed and helped out on the noho, namely Mrs Hobbs, Mr and Mrs Clement and Mr Walsh, Whaea Jo and Matua Clive. Looking forward to another Marae visit in 2007.

Fieldtrip - Japan

This year, nine Japanese language students, led by Mr and Mrs Marris, had the privilege of spending three weeks in Japan as part of a language study trip.

On 7 April we arrived at Narita International Airport after an 11-hour flight. After a long train trip across Tokyo we set up our futons at our home for the next five days, Shiomi Church Hall, and went to bed.

On day 2, after breakfast at a bakery inside Tokyo railway station and another train trip, we arrived at Asakusa, a temple complex in the middle of the city. After having a look around the temple some of us started our shopping. A very useful phrase was "Ikura desu ka" – How much is it? Hot chocolate in a can from the vending machines became a favourite. We were amazed at how busy everything was, yet how smoothly it all ran.

Over the next two days we visited the Imperial Palace, the Metropolitan building in Shinjuku, which gave an amazing view of the city of Tokyo, and the modern city of Yokohama where we went to a theme park with a ferris wheel about 112 metres high. In the evening we had dinner with Father Leo Schumacher, an old boy of the College.


On day 5 we had our first trip on the famous Shinkansen or "Bullet Train". These trains can run at about 300 km/h. On that day we went to Nikko and the Kegon Falls in the mountains. At the end of the day we packed our bags and slept on the futons for the last time, for the next day we headed to Kyoto, where we visited Kinkakuji (a temple covered in gold leaf) and Kiyomizudera, a colourful temple with a view of Kyoto.

On the 8th day, after another trip on a Shinkansen, we spent a brief part of the day in the cities of Okayama and Kurashiki, before moving on to Hiroshima where we met our homestays. This was, for me, one of the most fun and challenging parts of the trip. While in Hiroshima we went to places such as Miyajima and the Hiroshima Peace Park, where we hung the paper cranes that we had made.

On the way to Osaka we stopped in the city of Himeji where we went to visit the castle. In Osaka we spent the first night in a 4-star hotel courtesy of an Air New Zealand booking error. Over the following nights we stayed at a youth hostel near Shin-Osaka station. We spent another four days sightseeing in Osaka, Kobe and Nara before finally boarding the plane bound for home at Kansai Airport.

This trip proved to be a valuable experience where we got to experience a completely different culture and improve our language skills. It was loads of fun and we met many interesting people on the way.

Thank yous go out to Mr and Mrs Marris for organising the trip, to parents and to other members of the community who helped to organise events for fundraising. Thanks also to the people over in Japan, Father Leo Schumacher, our homestay hosts, and Mr Sugimoto who shouted us a fabulous dinner on our last night in Japan.

Saturday started at five o'clock in the morning when we were back on the bus and heading for the Military base in Waiouru. After dressing up in number ones and feeling honoured to have breakfast in the mess hall, we put our PE gear on and took part in many indoor team activities including falling backward from over three meters hoping to be caught at the bottom by our teams, strategic games with rope swings and a few good old games of tug-of-war.

This was our day of celebration embracing the Lasallian principles of FAITH, SERVICE AND COMMUNITY.







Blessing & Opening of St Miguel Design & Technology Centre

On Friday 11 August, the College blessed and opened the St Miguel Design and Technology Centre. The building has been in the planning stage since Bro Bill Firman was Principal of the College and his vision and foresight has seen the realisation of this fine new building in 2006.

The Centre is named after Saint Miguel Febres Cordero, a De La Salle Brother who was born in 1854 in Ecuador. He was aged 5 before he could walk, and physical disability and poor health would remain throughout his life. The nine-year old Francisco attended the Brothers' first school in South America, and soon was attracted to their way of life. He found the Brothers' community and school to be a kind of second home but, on telling his parents of his wish to become a Brother, they were strongly opposed. It was several years after he became a Brother that his family grew to accept his vocation.

Brother Miguel became a great success as a teacher. No doubt his positive attitude was of great help: "Our first reaction in dealing with others," he said, "should always be to find something about them worthy of praise." In later years a younger Brother asked Miguel why, after many years of teaching, he made such detailed preparation. He replied that, whilst he had taught the topic for twenty years, probably he could find a clearer way of presenting it, so that it could be better understood. One of his former pupils wrote: "It was his great charm of manner that drew us to him, and we were always delighted to be with him at any time. He treated everyone alike. He genuinely enjoyed being among us, and we certainly loved to be with him." "He was known as the smiling Brother with the twinkling eyes." "He was one of the happiest persons I ever met." Miguel himself said: "Always work cheerfully for the Lord."


In naming the Design & Technology centre after St Miguel, we pay homage to a De La Salle Brother who is a fine role model for teacher and student alike.
















Ball Committee - 2006


On 21 July the 6th and 7th formers came, with their cowboy hats and cowgirl partners, to the FDMC Wild Wild West Ball held in the College gym.






