

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Tena Koutou Katoa.

It is the privileged role of all adults who work in this place to educate students for life in Faith, Service and Community and to make our school a place where we share the Good News of Jesus Christ within a Catholic environment in keeping with the spirits of the courageous and persistent Father Francis Douglas and St John Baptist de La Salle.

The adults who work here see great value in the Lasallian exhortation to "touch hearts". Staff new to the school rapidly notice that there is a difference here. It is about relationships and mutual respect - the teacher never raising his/her voice to a student and the student saying thank you after every lesson. This fits in with the wonderful saying, "your students don't care about how much you know until they know how much you care".

We are in the business of helping families to build good College men and in the process we grow to love your sons and we hear often about how much they love being here.

Apart from the warmth of relationships that exists in the place, there are other indicators of our school's success. With parent and community help, our students have raised far more than \$21,000 for Lasallian overseas works, \$3,500 for Caritas and continued to support breakfast in Schools and Foodbank. In addition, all Y10 students have carried out community service and Our Leaders' charity quiz supported the local Retreat centre raising \$2,150.

On the academic front we had the best NCEA results ever, with pass rates of 94.2%, 93.9% and 97.4% at the three levels.

We have maintained a high percentage of students moving on to tertiary studies and staying the distance, while at the same time catering more than we ever have, for students more suited to transition into the workforce and trade training

And yet there is a negative edge to our students' efforts. I don't want to sound anti-immigrant, but too often in our radio or TV news, when an expert is called upon for an update, that person has an accent that is not a local one. Rather than criticise our immigration policies I believe there needs to be a greater hunger for excellence in learning than we see in our students at present. The experts on the TV have worked extremely hard to get where they are and good on them. The fact that our companies have to recruit overseas to get the skills they want too often points to our attitude that "achieved" is enough, whereas "excellence" is only for the few. This is a fatal attitude that could see us becoming dispossessed.

The support of school and hostel Boards and PTA is also an ongoing strength of this school. Harmony, resolve and work ethic are strong in all cases. As a staff, parent and student body we owe much to these three groups. On a personal level, I owe much to the support of Tim Stuck, Melinda Stevenson and Anna Mace on a daily basis and David Leuthart and his Board and Bruce Forrest and his PTA committee.

With the departure of staff, we will once again lose institutional knowledge and the part of their soul that they put into this place. I wish to thank Ross Macnicol, Joan Coles, Ruth Marris, and Jenny Sheriff and express gratitude for the assistance this year of Sally Laing, Aimee Watkins and James List.

It has been our privilege as a staff here at FDMC to have worked with your son. Boys are wonderful creatures and it is a great pleasure to work among them.

To you boys - be thankful for all your caregivers have done to bring you to this day, expect to change the world, look after your mates, keep working hard at developing into a better man, look forward to being a good partner and father, and take Jesus with you as your best friend. In short, be a Good College Man.

As God, Francis Douglas and St John Baptist de La Salle would have us do, let's pick up the baton willingly once again next year...

May we remember how fortunate we are in this community as we approach the magical season celebrating our Saviour's birth. Christo Duce - with Christ as our leader.

St John Baptist de La Salle pray for us. Live Jesus in our hearts forever.

ADMINISTRATION

I would just like to let everyone know that our Gala day this year was a fantastic success, achieving a net surplus of \$36,000 on the day. This was due to the efforts of many people, including sponsors and local businesses who donated some wonderful prizes, and students, teachers and parents who gave up their time to come along and help out on the day.

The money raised allowed the College to purchase equipment not already provided by the schools main income stream.

This year we purchased:

- A mini bus at a cost of \$27,000 (50% with hostel = \$54,000)
- Lockers at a cost \$4,000
- Drinking fountains \$3,800
- Coaches jackets \$1,000
- Waka Ama equipment \$5,100
- Additional lockers \$3,500
- Beekeeping equipment \$1,000
- Cooking equipment for Health classes \$1,200

The mid-year raffle was also a big success. A special thank you to Carol Dravitzki who managed the raffle from start to finish - we raised approximately \$9,500. A big thank you too to all of our families and friends for selling that amount of raffle tickets - well done. The total of these combined fundraising efforts for the 2017 calendar year was \$45,000 which was donated to the College proprietors.

A big thank you to Martin and Lauren O'Reilly for making themselves available to the PTA. They both provide a valuable link for our group by keeping us up to date with what's going on at the College.

I would also like to pay a very special thanks to all of our PTA committee members. You have all worked very hard this year and contributed a lot of your time coordinating the Gala Day, helping out at the Swimming Sports, Orientation Evening and at other various PTA activities held throughout the year.

Our major project this year has been the Purangi Kiwi Reserve, where each Year 10 core class has spent a day helping to establish a wetlands area, as part of the East Taranaki Environment Trust's goal to strengthen the population of the North Island Western Brown Kiwi. This has involved a lot of clearing of trees and shrubs, benching of tracks, and the building and installation of boardwalk. During these visits the students have also helped with other tasks such as fencing, burning green waste, clearing slips and tackling sheep! The experiences have been wide, varied and rich.

Every visit to Purangi has been well-supported by the East Taranaki Environment Trust, who have always had a team of adult volunteers there to help guide the boys in their service tasks. The volunteers have demonstrated great patience with your sons, as they have shown them how to dig post holes, ram posts, hold a hammer, saw wood, cut steps into a track, lop branches and shovel dirt, amongst many other incidental and invaluable little life lessons. I thank them for their patience and willingness to work with us, as well as their conviction to a very worthwhile cause close to the hearts of many New Zealanders.

There are a couple of public walks available at Purangi, so feel free to take your sons to revisit the area and let them show you the impact that they have had on this project.

I look forward to another year of service in 2018 with the new Year 10 cohort, and hope that as your sons move into Year 11, some of them remember how validating it can be to give of your time in service to your community and continue to serve others.






Let us remember that we are always in the Holy Presence of God.

Identity. It defines us, it shapes us into the people we want to be. From the moment we entered the College, we were handed a crest which we proudly accepted. With this we claimed part of our identity. That crest bears names and symbols of three outstanding role models and men of character who we can look to for inspiration. Three men who never met but who were motivated by the same thing, God.

"Francis Douglas Memorial College."

Father Francis Vernon Douglas, a local Kiwi bloke who lived in the same time as our grandparents were growing up, was assumed to be killed at the hands of the Japanese because he refused to divulge knowledge shared to him under the confessional vow. His work as a Priest put his life at risk, but it was a risk that he chose. A fairly normal Kiwi man whose life was nothing short of extraordinary - a reminder that we are capable of legendary things.

"DLS"

St John Baptiste de La Salle whose concern for the poor and vulnerable of his society led to the formation of revolutionary schools based on the education of those in most need of it. However, his motivation to do this was not merely based on a feeling- his action stemmed from the belief that 'education gave hope and opportunity for people to lead better lives of dignity and freedom' and also the 'plight of the poor who seemed so "far from salvation" either in this world or the next'.

"Christo Duce": the two words translate as "Christ" and "Leader". Our motto is 'with Christ as our Leader'. The man whom the two others modelled their lives from - Jesus Christ, who, in a historical sense changed the world, but we, as Christians believe he did and was much more.

What better person than Christ to be our leader?

My role this year has been a journey of identity.



Before the school year started, Matt, Dawson, Mr Stuck and I popped across the ditch to meet other student leaders from Lasallian schools in New Zealand, Australia, and Papua New Guinea. A week away in Collaroy, Sydney was a brilliant start to the year, meeting others in similar situations as ourselves and recognising that we were only one part of a larger, global community.

Attending the De La Salle College's Founder's Day was an inspiring experience, with the opportunity to witness how our brother Lasallian school celebrated the life of St John Baptiste de La Salle. From this I learnt that although our celebrations were different, they had the same focus on the life of our founder and both were equally awesome.

The opportunity to attend a Lasallian Youth Leaders' training day at John Paul College, Rotorua, aided in gaining ideas as to how to go about being and leading the LYL group at FDMC. Staying the night billeted with an awesome family, Tomi, Corban and I had an enjoyable experience and this reminded me of the Lasallian spirit of community in which this family would open itself up to a bunch of complete strangers, who wore the most interesting socks...

After a one year break from the Lasallian Youth Leaders being active in the College, it was my hope that this amazing initiative could be reinstated and sustained. Half a minute's speech in a Term 1 assembly granted by Mr Chamberlain, gave me the opportunity to set this goal in motion. 

I say young men for the first time, as I have been guilty of holding on to my visions of each one of you when you were in Year 7 & 8, when you were all sweet young boys, hungry for the knowledge and the experiences of the senior students.

You were so young, so small and so excited to be "College" students. As is the FDMC tradition, you were met at the gates by the College leaders and welcomed to your new community. You wore brand new uniforms, several sizes too large, your backpacks were groaning with the requisites for Year 7 classes, there were fresh haircuts and a number of anxious and teary parents witnessing this milestone in their son's growth. You have been an amazing year group. 

2017 was yet another massive year of sport with the College. The College has always had a reputation for punching above our weight and we certainly maintained this in 2017. Sport has always been an integral part of College life and the lessons learned through participating will stay with students for life. These values, such as teamwork, dedication and sportsmanship were exhibited by everyone who pulled on a College uniform throughout the year and I would congratulate my fellow students for maintaining the culture.

Before looking at any particular results it is important to acknowledge that sport at the College could not occur without the hard work of certain individuals. Firstly, I would like to thank departing Head of Sport Mr. Wales, who carried out his role with great diligence and passion. The effort he has given to behind the scenes organisational jobs is incredible and I wish him all the best in his new role as Head of Social Science. Similarly, Mrs. Hurley deserves recognition as she has made a massive contribution to sport in her role as Sports coordinator, scheduling innumerable TSSSA events amongst other things. Finally, on behalf of all the students who participated in sport, I would like to thank the coaches, referees, and parents that enable sport to happen. Francis Douglas has an insane 50% of staff participating in sport in some capacity and this speaks to the attitude around sport we see at the College. Without these people giving up their time for our boys, sport could simply not exist in the way it does.

Sporting success is never difficult to find at the College, with our boys excelling in a diverse range of sports. While we can hardly make it through any public occasion without mentioning our All Blacks, who continue to do us proud on the world stage, it is important to recognise the less renown sporting codes that excelled, in particular, this year. While I may be slightly biased towards these codes due to my own interest in the immensely popular sport of Golf Croquet, the achievements this year by the cross country motocross team, golf team are truly



remarkable. I feel lucky to be a part of a school with such an enriched sporting culture, that promotes boys achieving their goals, no matter the sport.

The Cross Country Motocross team had an outstanding year, winning the Motorcycle NZ North Island and New Zealand (U17) junior teams titles. The team made up of Adam and Joshua Loveridge and Connor Atrill - Mundt trained, traveled and rode their way over 4 difficult national cross country courses in the North and South Island. These results culminated in them winning the prestigious team of the year trophy at the FDMC Sportsman Dinner. As well as the fine team effort, Adam Loveridge was the overall winner of the 0-250cc 12-16 years old class.

The FDMC golf squad of Matt Allen, Louis Baldock, Joshua Elder, Josh Morris and Corbin Dravitzki became the first FDMC team to compete in the New Zealand Age Group Championships after winning the Taranaki Secondary School Championship for the first time in 30 years. Captain, Josh Morris was the sole player to make the cut on the final day of the championships and he tied 59th in the under 19s and 20th in the under 17s.

Both these teams contain young talent and will undoubtedly grow and improve throughout their remaining years at the College and I am excited to see what the future holds for them.

Some of the more traditional sporting codes also saw great success this year. Under the fantastic leadership of Dawson Webber, they performed well in their interschool matches winning 3 out of 5 losing only to St. Bernard's and St Peter's Cambridge. In their qualifying matches, the team beat both Palmerston North Boys High and New Plymouth Boys High and qualified first in the region for the National tournament. This is the first time the Football First XI has achieved this level of qualification (top 16 in the country) and they eventually placed 23rd in the Lotto NZ Premiership (best 32 teams in the country).

1st XI cricket had a good year in the Taranaki Premier competition. One stand out performer in the premier competition was left arm orthodox bowler Jono Brosnahan who spun his way to a brilliant 4 wicket bag and secured his spot in the competitions 'dream team' The 1st XI also managed to win the majority of the traditional matches played.

During the year 6 members of the FDMC 1st XI took part in the Taranaki Wanderers tour of England. This tour proved to be very successful as many of the school's players put in strong performances and tested their skills in different conditions. 13 games were played on the tour, with the side winning 8 of them.

The pride of the College, the 1st XV, produced some remarkable wins in a challenging season. The season started off with the school's first ever win over Wellington College. The first traditional of the year was a close 25-22 controversial loss to Palmy Boys which started a lot of hatred towards referee Max O'leary. The boys had another win over strong rugby school St Johns Hamilton 15-10. We then won our first two Central North Island games against Wanganui and then a historic come from behind win against St Peter's College Cambridge, after being behind 21-0 at half time the boys scored 38 unanswered points to win 38-21. Following a loss to St Paul's the boys went on a 3 game winning streak beating Lindisfarne, Te Aute, and St Bernards. The boys then had two big wins 59-5 and 83-7 over St John's and Rathkeale before losing their final game of the season to a strong Fielding side.

The final two teams I would like to mention are the true embodiment of College spirit. The FDMCmen social basketball team had yet another dominant year, proving that they are without a doubt, the best social basketball team in College history. Their season finished with them taking out the league on the back of a huge performance from Mr. 4th Quarter, Mitchell Pelham. The Year 13 social football team showed similar dominance, and the boys managed to overcome some great adversity and lack of hydration to win their league without breaking a sweat. Heart and soul of the team, Kai Warburton, and College leader George Miles must be commended for their courageous effort during the course of the year.

In addition to these team achievements, many boys also performed outstandingly in individual sports. Zac Reid again was the very deserving winner of the sportsman of the year award. As one of his mates I have a slight sense of the immense time he dedicates to his sports of swimming and surf life-saving and I have nothing but admiration him. Zac's titles are too numerous to list but I will attempt to present a snapshot of his most notable wins this year. He represented NZ at the Commonwealth Youth Games at the Bahamas in July this year and gained two Gold medals in the 1500 m freestyle and 4 x 200 freestyle mixed relay. Zac is the current NZ record holder for the 17yrs boys 800 m freestyle, beating Danyon Loader's previous record. Zac gained a silver medal at the NZ Open swimming championships in the 800 m and bronze in the 200m, 400m and 1500m freestyle events. Zac also achieved honours at the National Age group championships, gaining a gold medal in the 1500 m and silver medal



in the 200 and 400 m freestyle events. He has excelled in Surf Lifesaving and has been named captain of the NZ Surf Lifesaving Junior Black Fins to compete in the international Surf Lifesaving event to be held in December this year.

Our head boy, Matthew O'Connell, was another to represent the College with great distinction on the international stage. Matthew was a member of the New Zealand Under 18 basketball team which traveled to Guam in July this year and gained second place, meaning they have qualified for the Asia Pacific Championships to be held in January next year. Mathew also represented NZ in the Nike Asia Pacific competition in China in June this year. It was a privilege to play alongside Matthew this year in the Senior A and it only seemed fitting that the basketball season finished with him having his iconic number 6 jersey retired by an emotional Mr. Cowie.

Other notable performances included Thomas Hadley's 4 peaks record-breaking run, my own victory at the Under 21 Golf Croquet World Champs not to mention the Kneepkens brothers, Isaac and Jacob who both have bright futures in rugby/rugby league.

One final individual, I would like to mention is Cobi McCook, one of the most genuine College men you will ever meet. Cobi has been involved in many sports throughout his time here at FDMC including Rowing, Rugby and Rugby League. This year Cobi was the recipient of the "Contribution to Sport" prize for his generous coaching and refereeing. Cobi truly represents the unselfish attitude that we like to foster here at FDMC and I applaud him for his time here.

I realise that I have but scratched the surface with these results, but there is simply too much success to write about and I would be doing the athletes a disservice to skim over their various accolades.

I would like to finish on a personal note. It has been an absolute honour to be the sports captain of FDMC. Since coming here in Year 7 I have participated in more sports teams than I would care to count and I am grateful to FDMC for providing me with these opportunities. The friendships I have made through sport, and the lessons I have learned are invaluable and I would encourage all future students to get involved in sport in some way. And to those who do play sport, always remember the wise words of our College sporting hero.

BIOLOGY

YEAR 13 BIOLOGY

As part of learning about the Level 3 Achievement The Year 13 Biology class studied Plant and Animal Responses to the External Environment, which would be examined externally, in Term 1. For their first internal assessment, the students investigated shrimp responses in this context. The class visited the rock platform at Kawaroa Park on Wednesday 8 February to become familiar with the intertidal shrimp in its natural habitat. Jeanne Marshall and Michelle Stevenson accompanied the students on the trip. The class returned with buckets of sea water and shrimp to conduct various experiments on shrimps' responses to light, temperature, salinity, density etc.

Term 2 saw the students learn about Homeostatic Control Systems to regulate the Internal Environment of an organism. The students learnt about the importance of maintaining a stable internal environment and then applied their knowledge to the context of the 'Coast to Coast' race. Thereafter they were assessed internally and applied their learning to the context of the 'Wanaka Challenge' which is held annually in the South Island. The boys related well to the iron man challenges.

This was followed with studying Evolutionary Processes leading to Speciation and Trends in Human Evolution in the latter part of Term 2 and in Term 3.

On the 29th of June Alton Gondipon visited the Year 13 Biology class to talk to the students about his experiences at university and his future aspirations. In the same week Polaiu'amea Kirifi also visited FDMC and shared with the class about what it is like to be at university in the first year.

James Cunningham, Deputy CEO of the Pacific International Hotel Management School in Bell Block, visited the class on Wednesday 27 September, to present a workshop on 'Thinking Skills' for the scholarship students. It was stimulating and inspired learners to think 'outside the box' and to build 'pyramids'!



This, of course meant that Graphics had to be re-located and again one of the rooms was converted for that purpose which included building storage, adding a wall and putting up white boards.

In the engineering room we wanted to give more boys the chance to learn brazing and welding so brand new, heavy-duty benches were built as well as adding extra, new gas lines. Again almost all of this was done inhouse at weekends to save as much money as possible.

GIFTED & TALENTED

My aim for the Gifted and Talented Programme at Francis Douglas Memorial College is always to be inclusive rather than exclusive. This means I strive to include as many students in as many diverse extension activities as possible, in order to extend their thinking skills and understanding. However, my main rationale is to enable our 'gifted and talented' students to realise their full potential as individuals by identifying them and ensuring that they receive appropriate support and programmes which meet their individual needs.

I believe our top academic students deserve an acceleration class. At present I do a lot of enrichment. This is also great and allows the students to choose the areas in which they want to extend themselves. However, time becomes a problem when they also need to attend classes, do homework, participate in hobbies or sports and often have part-time jobs as well.

I have put together a Level 1 course for 2018 which includes 20 NCEA Level 2 Credits. These come under Education for Sustainability and Senior Social Studies, and are a mix of internal and external assessments. This will truly extend our 'gifted' boys and give them valuable literacy credits for university.

FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVING

I am determined to develop and extend Future Problem Solving at Francis Douglas Memorial College and am delighted that Jo Morris-George has continued to coach. Sue Page, our Librarian, has also spent her free time coaching a team of vibrant Year 9's.

At the time of writing this report 28 boys from Years 9, 10 and 11 had just sat the final exam (called the Qualifying Problem in FPS speak) and we await results to see if any of the 7 teams have made the National Competition.

Simultaneously I have 3 groups doing Community Problem Solving (CPS). In this division where the problem needs to come from our own community and involve local people. In teams of up to 9 we research areas of concern, document possible solutions and come up with an action plan which is then executed over one or two years. This suits boys who have a developed sense of social justice, a good heart and want to DO something concrete about the problems in our own backyard.

CPS is still part of the worldwide competition. New Zealand teams have done well in this category over the last 3 years, possibly due to our practical can-do streak. CPS ties in beautifully with our La Sallian core value of helping others. Boys learn to work in teams to achieve a common goal that benefits our own place/ people.

GLOBAL YOUTH LEADERS CONFERENCE

Several students showed initial interest in this Conference but I believe the cost and the social and political climate in America were barriers to attending. For the first time in 14 years FDMC did not participate, however, I have had two boys approach me regarding attending in 2018.

This conference is for gifted students from around the globe. It is run like a United Nations meeting whereby students represent a given country. FDMC students qualify for nomination through their scholastic merit, by achieving NCEA Level One endorsed with Excellence, and demonstrating eadership ability. Other extremely important factors are that they must be absolutely trustworthy and sensible as they travel without the accompaniment of an adult. They are under strict instructions to keep in contact frequently (hourly!) until they are safely under the care of GYLC personnel.

ROBOTICS

I am delighted to report that the Robotics Club has had a very important success on our journey to greatness! In their very first scrimmage (robotics speak for competition) Josiah Gillespie and Joseph Green have won the final for FDMC Vex Robotics. This was the robotics equivalent of a Central Districts sports tournament played with 29 other teams. It was opened by the AsiaPac VEX representative. There were 29 teams from around the Central North Island representing their schools and clubs.

We have been fortunate to have Aaron Pollard tutoring the boys after school on Tuesdays again this year. He is an extremely effective educator and has diverse groups of boys working on a wide range of technology We are very proud of the boys. Aaron's comment about the boys was, "But better than winning they worked really hard and had a great attitude all the day, modifying their Robot and collaborating with their Alliance Partners."

Through the Gifted and Talented programme we can offer this opportunity and buy the very expensive kit required so that outstanding boys like Josiah and Jacob can take part in this extension. It is really pleasing to note the excellent standard of co-operation and behaviour from the boys.

The old artroom hums with activity from engaged students every Tuesday afternoon from 3.15pm until 4.45. This group has grown expeditiously and I now have a waiting list of interested students.

We have purchased two new robots and components to modify them so are well equipped.

Vex Robotics is run through the Massey University Technology Faculty. Scrimmages are held regularly throughout the North Island. The idea is to compete against other schools but also to work collaboratively with them to achieve a certain result. The boys

LAW MOOTING

This national competition is run by the Law Faculty of Waikato University and is equivalent to their second year Law Course. Fortunately we once again had the expertise and dedication of Caroline McLorinan from the firm of Auld, Brewer, Mazengarb and McEwen to continue extending our top students to take on a real High Court case and represent either the appellant or the defence team.

After many weeks of researching, practising and honing their courtroom manner, two teams from FDMC entered the Taranaki competition. This was held in the New Plymouth District Court. The moots are held around the country, videoed, then moderated against each other. The top eight teams are chosen for the semi finals. Sadly we did not make the top eight this year. Again the boys worked hard and Caroline gave generously of her time. The on-going problem of too many activities and too little school time to complete them could again be solved by an afternoon dedicated to extra curricular events.

Thirteen Years 9 and 10 students attended the Mini United Nations day at NPGHS. They were each given a country to research. The topic was Children in War.


BRAINBEE CHALLENGE

Grateful thanks must go to Jeanne Marshall who organises our top Science students to compete in the Brain Bee Challenge run by the Brain Research Trust of Auckland University.

The first round of the guiz is held annually during Brain Awareness Week in March. The test was conducted online during school hours. The preparation for the quiz involved learning about Neuroscience, the anatomy and the working of nervous system together with related aspects such as how we learn, what happens when we sleep, brain dysfunction, the effect of drugs, stress, ageing and more.

The students who got through to the second round were flown to Auckland and spent the day at the Faculty of Medical and Health Science of the University of Auckland. They participated as individuals and in a team event of the challenge, together with approximately 160 students from all over the North Island. They visited the Human Tissue Collection, saw an MRI scan in operation and learnt how the brain interprets light and movement. The students also had the opportunity to talk to neuroscientists from the faculty.

The students were richly rewarded for their efforts in preparing for the challenge with all the experiences gained on the day. They represented the College well and we are proud of them.





MATHS EXTENSIONS

Thank goodness for retired teachers who can't quite let go! Graeme Mustchin has taken weekly lessons for Scholarship Maths enabling these boys to sit scholarship exams in October.

Again thanks to Graeme Mustchin and his passion, we began Latin lessons for any interested boys. Several boys are hoping to do an NCEA Level One assessment through the Correspondence School next year. Graeme has pledged to tutor them once a week so I will be keeping him to that! This opportunity is open to any student who is willing to learn basic Latin as an extra subject. At times these classes which are student driven, are evolving in to etymology. Great education happening here!

ROUND UP

2017 has been another busy and varied year for the Gifted and Talented Programme. Maths extensions and Latin have been added to our repertoire. Innovative learning experiences have been made available to many motivated students. I am always looking for new ideas and invite students or parents to tell me of opportunities they would like to see included in the programme. It is important to spread the Gifted and Talented net as wide as possible, to involve a high number of students whilst at the same time minimising disruptions to regular classes.

Where possible the programmes have been run after school, at lunchtimes or in my non-contact periods. However, there is a limit to how much time is available outside of scheduled class time. We are making progress, as we have a Year 10 option for Future Problem Solving now and hopefully this will extend to a Year 11 Level 2 accelerated class next year. Community Problem Solving has also been added to our repertoire and I can see this growing as more boys want to do something tangible to make a difference in our community.

The NAGS say we must give gifted and talented students extension opportunities. Let's do it!

Let's go 'fly a kite' with our gifted boys! Let's help them 'soar to the highest height!"

Looking Forward ...

I have managed to complete some Professional Development on working with Gifted and Talented Pacific Island and Maori students but would relish the opportunity to do further research and have the time to implement the strategy. I believe this is incredibly important as different cultures view giftedness in different ways and we must value this diversity. One of my goals is to find and deliver extension opportunities for boys from minority ethnicities.

There is also considerable research being done on how to teach 2E students. These are students who have two or more exceptional facets to their educational requirements. For example they may have autism but also be gifted in music. Obviously this is highly complex and each individual has different strengths and needs. Another goal is to also introduce individual programmes that extend these students in their high interest/ability areas. For this I believe we will need to tap into the expertise that may be available in our

Whilst David Bremner the adjudicator was deliberating, Dominic Jacquemard wheeled out his marimba (three metres of metal barred keyboard) and thrilled everyone with his amazing spatial judgement and skills with four mallets in two hands all moving independently. It was great to see another totally unassuming ex-College virtuoso perform again. After complimentary remarks for all musicians, David Bremner announced David Codd the Muriel May winner for 2017. Daniel Chow was the first to congratulate him! What a fantastic finale to this trio's Year 13 year at the College. We wish them well for their studies at Auckland University, School of Music-Victoria University and Otago University in 2018 and know that they will accomplish great things.

From this, companies were selected to attend the Taranaki Chamber of Commerce Showcase with S.A.Z representing our school.

NZ DEFENCE FORCES INFORMATION EVENING TERM 2

Thirteen boys attended this evening - most with their parents. Information was presented on the NZ Army, the Navy and Air Force. This was followed up with school visits during Term 3 whereby boys could have one-on-one times with Marc Heu, the NZDF Recruitment Officer.

SKY CITY BRAND DAY AT PIHMS TERM 2

Four of our top Economics and Accounting students attended this whereby they won a group commerce competition over other secondary schools represented there. They were: James Batchelor, Ben Smith, George Fleming and Fergus Conley.

THE WHAKATIPURANGA WHY ORA **PROGRAMME**

The objective of the Why Ora (Why Health?) programme is to increase the employment of Maori within the health sector. The target is for another 500 Maori to be employed in all aspects of health, from orderlies and cleaners to surgeons and specialists. 23 senior FDMC boys have participated in the programme this year. The boys have attended workshops at Taranaki Base Hospital and a whanau evening was held with visiting speakers from the universities, Ministry of Education and the TDHB.

YEARS 9 AND 10 WHY ORA PUTAIAO EXPO

The TDHB Why Ora staff organised a Science Exposure programme for 38 Years 9 and 10 Maori students. This was extremely successful at engaging the students and relating the subject of science and its application in the world of work. Pūtaiao was run with the support of Massey University and the Western Institute of Technology (WITT). Transport to the racecourse was provided to ensure all Year 9 and 10 Maori students had the opportunity to attend the expo. Students were rotated around six different stations covering different aspects of the three core sciences - Chemistry, Physics and Biology.

YEAR 11 CAREER CONVERSATIONS

Career conversations/goal-setting with the Year 11 students have been ongoing throughout the year. These include the provision of career or tertiary sector information and discussions about subjects needed for particular courses and careers. They are intended to be motivational, career-planning sessions and are proving to be very valuable, particularly for boys who have no idea what they want to do in the future and/or need goals to work towards.

UNIVERSITY LIAISON VISITS

During Terms 1 and 2 each of the eight Universities has presented an information session for Year 13 students in the library. There was also a combined university planning course for 2018 for the Year 13 students, which was well attended by approximately half of all Year 13 students.

CAREERS EXPO AT TSB STADIUM

The annual Careers Expo was attended by all Years 9-12 students on Monday 14 August, from 12:00 -1.00pm. This year the Expo was clearly set out in each of the Vocational Pathways and there was a huge variety of stands for the students to investigate.

GATEWAY 2017

Gateway opens a new pathway for students from school to the world of work. It is a partnership between the student, the employer and Francis Douglas Memorial College. It is a great opportunity to blend school study with workplace learning and experience. Gateway helps with the transition from school to work and is designed to prepare students for a meaningful pathway to employment. Learning is assessed in the workplace, counting towards national qualifications relevant to their chosen trade/career.

Benefits for Students

- Apply skills and knowledge to the workplace
- Gain insights into working life
- Gain skills in specific industry areas

This year 45 Gateway students undertook a variety of work experience in industries such as Automotive, Building, Electrical, Engineering, Graphics & Design, Hospitality, Joinery, Plumbing, Painting & Decorating, Retail, Sport & Recreation.

This year we had four students nominated for the ETC 'Gateway to Industry Award'. Liam Scott - Taranaki Electrical Services; Mason Porteous - TEL; Kyle Fleming - Fitzroy Engineering Group Ltd, and Vinnie Bestall -Pace Engineering Ltd. The Gateway nominees should be very proud of their achievements.

On the night Mason was one of four winners who shared this award. It was a privilege to work closely with Gateway businesses, students and their families.







2017 has been another successful year for our Gateway students. To date we have 11 apprenticeships (8 Building, 1 Plumbing, 1 Automotive and 1 Electrical), with several other students following up opportunities that we are hoping will lead to apprenticeships in the near future. Other students are either returning to school, have full-time employment (but not an apprenticeship) or will be attending a full-time course next year.

Students develop the foundation skills needed to progress to further study opportunities or move directly into employment.

EE2E (Engineering Education to Employment)

This year we had six Year 13 students enrolled in EE2E studying one morning a week in Terms 1 - 3 to complete one of the 9 papers of the New Zealand Diploma in Engineering (NZDE). This also provides them with 8 NCEA credits at Level 3. EE2E is designed for students who are competent in Physics and Maths, and who are considering a Diploma or Degree in Engineering.

This year Ben Zeylemaker was awarded top EE2E student at their end of year presentation.

STAR

STAR is a roll based (on senior school) fund that enables us to provide non-conventional courses for students. The objectives of STAR are to:

- provide flexible funding for courses which will better respond to students' needs, motivate them to achieve, and facilitate their smooth transition to further education, training or employment.
- support students to explore career pathways and help them make informed decisions about their schooling and future work or study.

It is invaluable particularly in designing individual courses and putting students at the centre of decision making. It enables students to do a range of courses outside of school either by distance learning or through a course with other educational providers.

In 2017 STAR funding was used for Agriculture, Automotive, Barista, Carpentry, Chainsaw, Communication Skills, Electrical, First Aid, Fitness, Forklift, Health and Safety, Health Science, Horticulture, Hospitality, Recreation and Sport, Tourism. We also have had three students doing Canterbury of University Level 1 papers - one Mathematics, and two Economics.

CPP 2017

The Career Pathways Programme (CPP) is a full time programme designed for senior students outside of the conventional school curriculum. The programme targets students who may wish to go on to further training, or work, during or at the end of the school year. It is designed to give students a chance to gain knowledge, skills and experiences for transition to

LEARNING SUPPORT

The Learning Support Department at Francis Douglas Memorial College continues to provide assistance and adapted programmes / learning environments to support students with specific learning difficulties.

The school goal of 2017 has been to improve students' engagement and learning outcomes. In the Learning Support Department, our goal has been to improve students' engagement and learning outcomes by providing

- in class teacher aide support to individual at risk students,
- teacher aide support in the lower ability classes,
- Special Assessment Conditions during assessment to students.

The Department strives to meet the requirement of the Ministry of Education to include all students to enable them to access the curriculum in a range of settings. Inclusive education is where all students are engaged and achieve through being present, are participating, learning and belonging. It means valuing all students in all aspects of school life and removing barriers to presence, participation, and achievement.

The school's Special Character goal for 2017 has been to produce evidence of integration of the 5 Core Values both inside and outside the classroom. In accordance with concern for the poor we have endeavoured to enable students with specific learning difficulties to achieve; we have sought to have an inclusive community where all persons are welcomed and respected, irrespective of ability; and have strived to give the students the best quality education they can attain to in a Catholic/Lasallian ethos reflecting faith in the presence of God.

In our practice, we promote an understanding and respect for all cultures and recognise the unique position of Maori as the tangata whenua in the College and in Aotearoa/ New Zealand.

As in past years the ORS funded students receive the highest level of support according to funding received specifically to address their individual student needs.

We enrol some students in Te Kura-the Correspondence School, in order to adapt the curriculum to their individual needs in Mathematics, Science and Supported Learning.

Literacy Instruction is provided to students in Years 7 and 9 in consultation with the English and Intermediate Departments who identify students with reading difficulties.

The Learning Support staff continue to receive professional development to support students with specific learning difficulties in class.

Application is made to NZQA for Special Assessment Conditions (SACs) for students in NCEA Levels 1 - 3. Students who qualify for SACs are provided with SACs during assessment.

Teacher Aide assistance is provided for in class support



to individual students, and to groups of students with dyslexia and other SLD's in the lower ability/internally assessed classes in English, Mathematics, Science, Pathway, Technology and Agriculture.

Students who qualify for readers and/or writers, extra time and separate accommodation during NCEA assessments, are given reader and/or writer assistance throughout the year when doing assessments.

With the large number of students qualifying for SACs, it remains difficult at times to meet the demand. Priority is given to senior students doing internal NCEA assessments. Students in Years 9 and 10 with specific learning difficulties are provided with SACs for some of their common tests and in the end-of-year exams. Evidence of improved results with reader writer support is kept to support applications for Special Assessment Conditions in NCEA Levels 1 - 3. Michelle Stevenson is responsible for organising the roster for reader and/or writers for students during assessments through the year and during exams.

2017 has been unusual in that FDMC has had no migrant or refugee English Language Learners (ELLs) eligible for Ministry funding, or identified as needing support.

Some of our students competed in the Special Olympics Taranaki Secondary School Athletics at the TET Stadium on Thursday 16 March. They had a great day with Julia Butler who accompanied them. Our boys received certificates for competing in their 3 activities. Callum Butler gained a 2nd place in the 100m run and Cameron Uhlenberg a 2nd in the standing long jump. In Term 2 and Term 3, Julia Butler accompanied students to the Special Olympics Taranaki Secondary Bocce Events at the TSB Stadium, New Plymouth. They won the second division. The Special Olympics events provide the students with wonderful opportunities for enrichment, building confidence and achievement.

We were sad to lose Catrin Scott and Gurpreet Singh as Teachers Aides at the end of 2016. Both Catrin and Gurpreet have left to pursue future careers and we wish them well. Kristel Gillespie and Denise Watson have filled the vacancies created by their departure and we have been delighted with the service they are rendering at present.

Cameron Uhlenberg left school at the end of Term 3. We are thrilled with his success in gaining employment and wish him well for his future.

I believe we are achieving the goals for 2017 and meeting the Ministry of Education requirement to include all students, enabling them to access the curriculum, to be engaged and achieve through being present, participating, learning and belonging.

On behalf of the school, the players, the management and the parents, thankyou to everyone who has both financially and physically supported the team in 2017.

There has been an intense programme of 20 games of which 11 were won and 90 tries were scored. The main goal for the season was to make the Central North Island playoffs which went down to the very last clash of the season against Feilding High School which was eventually lost 13-26.

This meant the team finished 5th and were just outside the big schools, Wesley College, the eventual winners, Feilding, St Paul's Hamilton and St Peter's Cambridge. The team did defeat St Peter's in a cracker of a game and won against all the others; Wanganui Collegiate, Lindisfarne, Te Aute, St John's Hastings, and Rathkeale. The annual clash against New Plymouth Boys' High School was lost following two tough games in less than a week but there was a victory over Wellington College and a last minute loss to Palmerston North Boys' High School that demonstrated this team had the potential to perform at a high level and indeed played some entertaining rugby throughout the season.

There was at least one try scored in every game and only once did the team not register double figures. During the year the players voted after each game on

their 'Player of the Day' and at the end of the season first-five Jacob Ratumaitavuki-Kneepkens was a clear winner, followed by fullback Isaac Ratumaitavuki-Kneepkens, with loose forward Shamus Hurley-Langton in 3rd spot.

Josh Hopkins and Nathaniel Peters, both loose forwards, were the leading players in winning the 'Hammer Award' for the best tacklers in each game, whilst winger Chris Balsom most often won the 'Daimond Award' for best support play.

Isaac Ratamaitavuki-Kneepkens scored the most tries (16), followed by Jacob Ratumaitavuki-Kneepkens (10). Chris Balsom (8) and Nathaniel Peters (7). An average of 4.5 tries per game was certainly one of the season highlights.

Isaac Ratumaitavuki-Kneepkens, Shamus Hurley-Langton and halfback Jackson Sinclair were invited to attend the Chiefs Secondary Schools' camp and Isaac is now included in an extended squad from which the NZ Secondary Schools' teams will be selected. With 10 of the squad of 26 in their last season, the 2018 team is in the healthy position of having a core of regular starters from 2017 in their make-up.

Already a power and strength programme twice a week has been introduced for those who wish to partake (they are all encouraged to do so) and a pre-season trip to the South Island is in the planning stages.

Bring on next year!






NPBA Secondary Schools Competition

HOCKEY

The 2017 season for FDMC 1st XI Hockey started with plenty of optimism, but ultimately finished as one of missed opportunities.

The hockey year began in February with pre-season training for an enlarged 1st XI squad and 9-a-side games with NPBHS 1st and 2nd XI's and Taranaki Masters teams (the 9's were designed to give all those sides a great start to the season proper).

Overall hockey at FDMC grew by a team this year. With an influx of Years 9 and 10 students this meant that we could run a Senior XI in the Taranaki Secondary Boys Prems, Junior XI in the Boys Champs, and a Boarders XI, known as the Wasps, in the Boys 3rd grade. Our 1st XI squad competed in the Taranaki

Senior Mens Championship grade also, with the school Hockey Captains Thomas Morgan and Sam Johnson opting to play prems with coastal club Te Kiri (which is an awesome development opportunity for them personally).

The 1st XI also competed in various exchange games such as the CNI Tournament in Wanganui and the Woollaston Trophy (during tournament week) in Stratford.

Our 1st XI's goals for 2017 were a top-4 in the Mens competition (technically a higher finish than the previous year as two divisions were merged), to win the Boys Premier grade and to make the finals of both the tournaments we attended





In the Mens' grade, we were a bit inconsistent as we learnt to play without our captains; Method Te Huia and Cameron Shearman stepping up in their absence. We found that we were playing to the level of our opposition, struggling against teams who finished lower than us on the table or being ultra-competitive against the other top-four sides (finishing 3 wins, 2 draws, 1 loss against the top 4 teams).

We did make our goal of being in the top-4 and qualified for the semi-finals in the competition. Unfortunately the Taranaki Hockey Club Council were unwilling to grant us allowance to play our semi-final when we found it clashed with the CNI tournament. This was disappointing as we had drawn and beaten the Taranaki Masters team that we were supposed to face (the only side to defeat them during round-robin) so subsequently we had to default in the semi-final.

In the high-school grade, we finished a comfortable 3rd at the end of the round-robin. Both FDMC & NPBHS focus is more on the Mens grades they play in, therefore we used the secondary competition more for development. Our aim was to always play our best hockey at the business end, where we knew we'd have to beat both NPBHS teams (they split their First XI into two) one in a semi, the other in a final. Unfortunately, in our semi-final we were all tied up at the end of full-time, and lost in the 8-sec shoot-out format. Its never a nice way to go out of a competition but after dominating the game we need to have learnt the lesson of taking goal-scoring opportunities when they present themselves. This game was not the first time we've missed out by not scoring in regular time.

Sporting exchanges were a mixed bag! We had a heavy loss to NPBHS 1st XI in the annual exchange which was disappointing but we followed this with wins over St. Johns and St. Bernards where we rested some senior players and gave younger boys an opportunity.

It was then time for the tournament clashes in the first weekend of Term 3. We travelled to the now annual CNI in Wanganui which featured Lindisfarne, Wanganui Collegiate and Fielding. We faced Fielding first up, where the boys struggled with the local umpires and went down 2-0. Next up it was Lindisfarne, who are one of the best teams in NZ and top of the Hawkes Bay competition. We knew it would be tough - the game blew out at the end but we never gave up the fight. On Day Two, we needed to beat Wanganui Collegiate to qualify but the best we could do was a draw. Once again we met Fielding in the 3/4 play-off, but the boys ran out of steam to finish 4th for 2017. On the face of it, this was a worse result than 2016, but the coaches felt we actually performed better overall.

Onto Woollaston, where the aim was to make the final and to qualify for a Tier 3 tournament for 2018 after having to forfeit a place at that higher level the prior year when we couldn't attend. We felt we were one of the favourites to qualify from our pool and we started promisingly enough with a 1-1 draw against Tawa. Unfortunately, losses to Horowhenua and Katikati saw us tipped out of the competition with a loss to Hamilton Christian School in cross-over forcing us into a mustwin situation against Opunake if we were to avoid being in last place. The boys came through with our only win for the week, with a 3-1 finish. In a quirk of the draw,


