This has been an unusual year. The calendar accommodations for the Rugby World Cup have been challenging for all schools yet we have managed to cram in the multifarious activities that our school community's diversity, creativity and traditions demand.

Our NCEA results from 2010 were again exceptional - the best in recent years, with our pass rates shown bracketed in comparison with national decile 8 boys' schools: L1: 94.9% [82.9%], L2: 85.3% [84.1%], L3: 83.6% [77.1%] and University Entrance 86.2% [68.9%]. Our level of Excellence attainment has improved also, although we still have work to do on encouraging our students to stretch to that level.

Apart from these impressive results, other things that have characterised the year are: construction of the all-weather Year 7 and 8 canopy with PTA funding help, exceptional and unselfish fundraising for Lasallian and Christchurch causes, success in winning the provincial Shakespeare competition, musical bands gaining distinction, Kyle van der Merwe's distinctions in throwing events and superb showings by our sports teams with 82% student participation in team sports once again. This year can also be distinguished by its Maori tikanga input. In a bid to better embrace this part of our cultural heritage, our Head Boy Teihorangi Walden has led the whole school in firmly establishing proficiency in our rousing haka; as a fundraiser our senior students put down a whole school hangi and our school and hostel staff members spent a day and a half at Parihaka Pa. St John Baptist de La Salle's institute has as one of its mantras 'Together and by Association'. Cultural understanding is an important part of that ethos.

For me personally, the special aspect of this year was my sabbatical, which apart from offering a break after ten years as a principal, allowed me to deepen my appreciations of Lasallian philosophy and boys' education in the locations of California, London, Ireland and Hong Kong. I feel blessed to have experienced these places and the company of the wonderful colleagues I met in them. We are fortunate to be part of the Lasallian heritage which is globally active and revered.

The powerhouse of any school is its staff, their interrelationships and the way they interface with students. When relationships in a school are built on respect and service, everything else looks after itself. We are fortunate to have an experienced, ethical and reliable staff in our school and hostel. The support of Boards and PTA is also an ongoing strength of the school. I am particularly indebted to Chris Moller, who led the school in my absence and Dean of Boarding, Sjaane Simpson for their capabilities in the vital roles in which they serve. It is heartening that Sjaane has become our DRS after serving to lift our hostel to its present glory over the last four years. Graeme Mustchin has made her transition seamless for our school and his work as Lasallian Coordinator and Chaplain have been much appreciated.

Just as our students have to work individually to match the previous year's academic results, we too have to work assiduously to maintain our sense of community to ensure our collective success. We are called to give moral and tangible support in the forms of encouragement, mutual care, time, finance and service on Boards and PTA to ensure this wonderful school feels cared for and in return makes us feel it has met our needs to ensure our children are the better for it. Despite God's help, our free will means we will continue to have the type of school our efforts create. Our school is not exclusive and does not embark on gimmicky initiatives to attract attention to itself. Instead we work as people, for people so that relationships between all who come onto our school site each day are healthy, productive and Christ-like. As a consequence our students have a deep affection for our school and generally see their needs being met in a satisfying manner.

Let's pick up the baton willingly once again next year.

This is my second report as Chair of the Board of Francis Douglas Memorial College and I am most grateful to my fellow Board members for re-electing me as Chair. Once again, I thank my fellow Board members for their on-going confidence and, again, I hope that confidence has not been misplaced.

As at the time of drafting this report, we farewell John Frederick as Student Representative on the Board and thank him for his contribution during his term. We welcome his replacement, Tanaka Utete, who is a Year 10 student in 2011, so we may achieve some continuity with student representation during the next two to three years, subject to the caprice of his electorate.

We have also farewelled Br David Miller who has resigned as Principal of De La Salle College in Mangere, Auckland and as Proprietor's Representative on our Board. I wish Br Dave well for the future.

The role of Board Chair has meant that I have had cause to visit the College on a number of occasions throughout the year and the one aspect which is so apparent is the almost indescribably positive atmosphere within the College environment. That is undoubtedly fostered by the College's Special Character and the Lasallian ethos which pervades all the activities at the College.

That positivity is reflected by the cheerfulness and courtesy of our students and has flowed through to the College's success in its academic, cultural and sporting activities. Our Principal, Mr Martin Chamberlain, will no doubt report on the College's exceptional 2010 NCEA results with which we can be justifiably proud. The College has gained a mention in the "Brand Catholic" education item in the November 2011 edition of 'North & South' magazine. Who

can forget the magnificent 1st XV victory over New Plymouth Boys' High School at the Gully; the match televised by Sky TV's Rugby Channel as part of its College 1st XV coverage. I cannot let it pass without noting, that the Rugby Channel's "Sideline Sam" commentator for that match is an old boy of our College.

On the cultural front, probably the most visible development has been the College haka: it is an impressive addition to the culture of the College, embracing a further aspect of Tikanga Maori and strongly promoted by Head Boy, Teihorangi Walden. Also, let us not overlook the success of our law mooters, debaters, musicians, fundraisers, supporters of a lower decile local primary school and a myriad of other activities, in which our students participate or support.

Pastoral care is an important feature of the College, but even so there are significant temptations for our students. Unfortunately, the Board's Disciplinary Committee has met twice this year for suspension hearings. In both cases, suspensions were lifted with conditions intended to address the issues which led to the suspensions. The suspension hearings have actually had a positive impact in the sense that the Board has made some recommendations for earlier therapeutic interventions designed to avoid the need for suspension hearings. Fortunately, the College does not feature in either the national nor local statistics relating to suspensions, exclusions and expulsions.

As a demonstration of the practical implementation of the College's special character and Lasallian ethos informing the pastoral care of our students, I commend you to a quote from Albert Einstein as follows:

The mix of talents and abilities are obviously encouraged by the College's staff without whom our students' successes would not occur. I must acknowledge the hard work and dedication of our professional Principal, Mr Martin Chamberlain, who was most ably deputised during his Principal's sabbatical by Mr Chris Moller. The College is blessed with dedicated, experienced and stable staff (stable in the sense that turnover is very low) and it is gratifying to observe the mutual respect and courtesy between staff and students and the very strong management team at the College. I again acknowledge Diana Blair, our Business Manager, for her effective financial stewardship and our Heads of Department who so sensibly manage their budgets.

The College continues to benefit from the unstinting efforts of our parents and the PTA. This time last year I noted that construction of the shelter for the Junior School "is under way" and at the same time this year the shelter is now complete. The Board continues to consider a number of projects, funds permitting, and continues to be deeply appreciative of the magnificent contributions of the PTA and parents.

As I said last year, the College's Board is comprised of a diverse group of proprietors and parent representatives, a teacher representative and our excellent Principal. I acknowledge the willingness of Board members to give up personal time to attend to Board matters. I thank my deputy, Dave Leuthart, and fellow Board members for their dedication, contributions and support.

Staff Comings and Goings 2011

We always value the fact that we have a stable and committed staff at this College. It isn't until you reconsider the movements during the year that you realise there have been some major changes. Because there is a high degree of depth (some staff having taught nearly 30 years here), often these changes happen quite seamlessly.

The year began with the return of Martin Dravitzki (Deputy Principal – Curriculum) from a year's leave and three new staff appointments. Ronie Asi came to us from St John Bosco and is a Junior Homeroom teacher. Jennifer Sheriff is also a Junior Homeroom teacher and returned to Taranaki from Auckland. Ricky Green filled the Physical Education & Health and TIC Football positions and returned from two years in Indonesia. He was previously HOD of PE at our brother school, De La Salle, in Mangere.

Existing staff members took up new roles – Richard Marris (Assistant Principal), Sally O'Neill (HOD English) and Tim Stuck (Director of Sport). Meryn Ashworth was relieving in the position of part-time Teacher of Junior Music held by Cath McGlinchey, who was on maternity leave. Our Lasallian Youth Minister, Leodrina Williams, resigned and a replacement has been sought for her on behalf of our Proprietor who funds the position, during a large part of this year. Director of Religious Studies (DRS) is an important position in a Catholic school because the person



holding it has responsibilities for Special Character activities and Religious Education programmes that are so pivotal to what Catholic schools are all about. Graeme Mustchin has capably served in this role for 16 years and although he relinquished it on 1st June, he has remained on our staff and will return in 2012 in a part-time role. DRS is a challenging position to fill and Sjaane Simpson has applied her considerable talents of diligence and organisation, as well as her intimate knowledge and love of the school and its hostel, towards it. Sjanne remained Dean of Boarding until the end of the year; but in 2012 she will return to being a full time teaching staff member.

Ms Ka Po Wong resigned from her position of part time Mathematics teacher during the year but has continued in her role as a computer technician at the college. Mr Peter Knechtel was appointed to the position of Mathematics teacher. Peter is a former head of department who has relocated to New Plymouth with his family. He has a strong interest in Basketball and has already been involved in coaching many of our boys and gaining some success in competition. We also welcomed Ms Kathryn (Katie) Scripps to the staff when Martin Chamberlain was on sabbatical leave. When Martin returned Katie could not find permanent work in New Plymouth to enable her to extend her visitor's visa and sadly had to move on. She is currently working in Melbourne and loving it

As mentioned above Martin Chamberlain was on sabbatical for a term which meant that the management team re-structured while he was away. Chris Moller ably stepped in to the role of Acting Principal whilst Martin Dravitzki and Richard Marris were the Deputy Principals. Mrs Sjaane Simpson and Mr Tim Stuck shared the role of Assistant Principal and rotated several portfolios until Mr Chamberlain returned. This gave them experience and insight into a senior management role.

Mr Mike Ingram was granted leave for Term Three and was replaced by Mrs Elizabeth Barrientos. Elizabeth has held teaching roles in the College over the past decade so she slid into the role with ease. Mike kept us informed with emails of his travels; many of us could relate to the places, people and experiences he was having, and others wished we could be there too.

Meryn Ashworth completed two terms of teaching music for us and we appreciated her helping us out once again. Ms Ashworth remains working in the college as a relief teacher.

We welcomed Ms Kirsten (Krissy) Jackson to the staff as a part-time Teacher of Junior Music and also Ms Jo Morris-George as a specialist Reading Teacher half way through the year. Both staff members have worked hard to fulfill their positions. Krissy has been responsible for teaching the module junior classes music whilst Jo busily diagnostic tested many of our intermediate and Year 9 students to enable her to further their reading skills. Both staff members have been very welcome additions.

The hostel also appointed a new Dean of Boarding. The Board of La Salle House Ltd was pleased to announce that Mrs Simpson's replacement in 2012 will be Mr Heta Smith. A baptised Catholic, aged 51 and secondary educated in Waitara, Mr Smith originally trained in the construction industry, served in the New Zealand Army, and following his training as a teacher, has taught Technology subjects in two Hamilton secondary schools since 1996. In addition to his role as Assistant Head of Technology at St Paul's Collegiate in Hamilton, Mr Smith currently serves as Housemaster of William's House in the school's hostel. He is responsible for the welfare of 75, Years 9 to 13 boarders on a seven day boarding basis. He has been involved with boarding for eight years. Mr Smith will be joined by his wife Margie. She is a qualified librarian and secondary teacher, specialising in Social Sciences and English. She has also served St Paul's in the capacity of Director of International Students. Mr Smith will take up his duties on 20 January 2012 and will be joined by Mrs Smith once she has rounded off her international student commitments at St Paul's. It was good to welcome Mr Smith at the end of the term when he visited the College and met the staff. He attended the Junior Prizegiving ceremony on Wednesday 7th December.

At this stage there appear to be few changes in the wind for 2012.









2011 has again been a successful year for the PTA. Through the efforts of many people, and the generous support of a range of businesses, the Gala Day was a major fundraiser for the College despite very inclement weather on the day. While the bad weather meant some activities could not be held and others were moved under cover, the community banded together and still raised a significant sum of money. This extra money assists the College in providing those many "wish list" things, which are great to have, but are difficult to meet out of the normal operating budget. The 2012 Gala Day will be held on Saturday 31st March and we again look forward to the input and support of the College community.

The PTA also ran a raffle which again provided money to assist the College. Thanks to Fujitsu New Zealand who generously supplied the Heat Pump which was the major prize and to all those students and families who sold tickets.

However, the PTA does not solely exist to raise money. The monthly meetings are a great opportunity for parents to be informed about what is happening in the College and to share ideas and thoughts with school management about where opportunities exist to improve the school environment. As you would expect, students do finish their secondary school education and accordingly parents and families finish their involvement with the PTA. Therefore there is always an open invitation to new parents and caregivers who want to be involved in assisting to provide a positive environment for our sons.

The PTA is also an opportunity to enjoy the occasional social evening and again we had a mid-winter dinner at 'India Today' which was well attended and a very pleasant occasion. 'India Today' has supported our Gala Day over recent years so it is nice to be able to support a business which supports the PTA in a tangible way. The combined end of year dinner with the school BOT, Hostel board and the PTA was a new initiative in 2010 and is another example of the community coming together to celebrate the good things at the College.

I would like to thank all those people who have contributed to the PTA in 2011 and to wish all those students and families who finish in 2011, the very best for the future. Thank you for your support and friendship to the PTA College community over previous years. Can I also thank our PTA Secretary, Heidi Griffin, and Treasurer, Mark Parr, for their ongoing efforts.

Finally I want to thank Principal, Martin Chamberlain, Deputy Principal, Martin Dravitzki and Boarding Hostel Head, Sjaane Simpson, who all attend our PTA meetings where possible, and keep us informed of everything going on within the school environment.

Lasallian Services 2011

The Board of Trustees recently reviewed the College Charter and Strategic Plan for the next three years. The only change they have made is to insert the phrase "Students will be exposed to elements that give them wider global perspective and appreciation." Isn't it heartening to see the sense of service that is engendered here at FDMC become part of official

policy. The outward looking focus on the needs of others that has developed over the last decade is very much part of who we are as a Lasallian community and is epitomized in the marvellous response students show when appeals and activities highlight local, national and international needs.

Christchurch Earthquake Appeal

When disaster strikes close to home and affects people on a personal level it is much easier to respond to their needs because there is emotional connection with those who are suffering. Thus the one day mufti appeal for the people of Christchurch brought an amazing response. On Ash Wednesday, normally the first day of our annual Caritas appeal, \$3700 was raised. This is an amazingly generous response. In conjunction with our local St Joseph's Church this money went directly to St Paul's Parish in Dallington. The money was used specifically to help pay for a pastoral worker to assist in rebuilding their parish community - not only was their Church destroyed but parishioners were killed, injured or left homeless. The Parish Priest, Fr Simon Eccleton wrote in his letter of thanks, "As one parishioner said, it reminds us that we are not alone. We are all brothers and sisters under the one Lord. God has greatly blessed us through you."

Caritas

"United by our common humanity" was the theme for the annual Caritas appeal. It is truly amazing and a magnificent reflection on the global perspective and appreciation that students of FDMC have when even after raising the unprecedented amount for the people of Christchurch, they raised a further \$2168 throughout the rest of Lent to be distributed internationally and nationally by Caritas. Some of this money was also allocated to the people of Christchurch.

New Plymouth Foodbank

For Founder's Day on the Friday before Queen's Birthday weekend, we concentrate our sense of service on the local Foodbank. This has developed over the years and is now very much part of the tradition of how we celebrate Founder's Day. Again, each Vertical Form aims to get as much non-perishable food as possible to be able to give to this cause, and they respond with many boxes of food. Those who attend the Mass, which is now held at our Parish Church of St Joesph's, are astounded at the large number of boxes that are processed in for the Offertory. The visitors from our fellow Lasallian schools in Mangere and Rotorua are mightily impressed by what they witness. It has become an important source of supplies in the middle of the year for the NP Foodbank, and they are truly appreciative of the efforts of the College.

Mission Action Day Walkathon

In spite of the world being considered to be in an ongoing recession because of corporate greed, the



FDMC community continues to live by values that are counter cultural to many parts of the developed world. In raising funds for the work former principal Br Bill Firman is doing in South Sudan, for the school (at Mainohana in Papua New Guinea) that old boy and former staff member Br Robert McLaughlin (R.I.P.) had until his recent death been the Principal of, ongoing support for the victims of the massive floods last year in Pakistan – students certainly gather a global perspective and appreciation through the Mission Action Day walkathon.

The senior students, led by Head Boy Teihorangi Walden and Deputy Head Tyler Fleming, set a very high target of \$30000 as the goal for 2011. This was a 17% increase on last year's record total. While this target was not quite reached, the total this year is certainly a record - \$27120. This is an incredible result in the light of the global recession and the efforts and strategies of the leaders made the day and sponsorship such a success. Special mention must be made of Lachie Landreth, a Year 7 student who through the support of family and friends raised the highest ever individual amount - a whopping \$901. It certainly shows how successful this activity has become and how the students are able to put the needs of others ahead of their own wants. MAD was given great impetus through the efforts of the seniors in organizing a fund-raising evening at the Arthouse (raising \$860 in spite of it being the night Taranaki won the Ranfurly Shield off Southland) and another \$1646 through a lunchtime hangi. Other students who raised notable amounts were Tyler Fleming (\$540), Scott Murfitt (\$315 – who arranged a guiz night at East End Life Saving Club), Fletcher Hartley-Smith (\$300), and Luke Reumers, Max Keig, JG Coughtrey, Phillip Ternouth, Bayley Southcombe, and Thomas Hadley who all raised over \$200 each, as well as another 18 students who raised over \$100.

The strong ethos of Faith, Service and Community continues to thrive at FDMC.

May God bless all those who have been so generous in their response to the needs of others in our global village.

This year, four students from FDMC were blessed with the opportunity to travel on a pilgrimage through both France and Spain to World Youth Day 2011, which was held in Madrid.

After participating in an internship programme begun a few years earlier, we were more than happy to be on our way to France. After two gruelling twelve hour flights we were treated to the sights and sounds of Paris and visited such famous sights as the Eiffel Tower and the Notre Dame Cathedral.

As we made our way through France, our pilgrimage led us to many places, which are still clear in my memory. Places like Taize, a hillside community where many youths from all Christian religions come to share and pray together. Places like Conques Abbey, a peaceful village where many pilgrims have been before us, surrounded by untouched hillsides. Places like Rocamadour, a fortress built into the side of the mountain where many still live. Places like the Holy Grotto of Lourdes, where a great cathedral has been built right beside the grotto where the Virgin Mary appeared to Saint Bernadette.

After two weeks pilgrimage through France, we crossed the border into Spain where we rested the night in the seaside city of San Sebastian. The next day we travelled through the country to southern Spain and the city of Pomferrada for our 'Days in the Diocese'. Although the school where we stayed had hard flooring, the volunteer students quickly made our stay as comfortable as possible and were soon our friends. Ponfferada had a high supply of both castles and churches, and we got to see our fair share!

After an enjoyable stay in Pomferrada, we made our way to Madrid and World Youth Day. In the last few days before WYD, we attended many talks on Catholic doctrines and teaching which to many of my fellow pilgrims proved to be eye opening. When Pope Benedict XVI arrived in Madrid I was lucky enough to see him in person (although I was about a hundred metres away and up a tree). During this lead up to WYD we would return each night to Talamanca, a small distance outside Madrid, where we rested in the local gym. The Spanish again showed great hospitality with their kindness and ability to acquire mattresses and other items to make our stay more comfortable.

On August 21st we left our new friends and hosts and made our way to the site for World Youth Day. We were lucky to get inside the area provided, as many pilgrims were stuck outside because of overcrowding. It was indeed a sight when we arrived inside, with what would have been similar to the entire population of New Zealand camping in a small airport with fire trucks going up and down the runways cooling everyone down. There was a huge white stage for the Pope to hold Mass but unfortunately we had been placed a long distance away. The closest screen was a

few hundred metres away. As we set up our sleeping arrangements and settled into the programme, God decided to show how surprising He can be and so for the first time since our arrival in Spain, it rained. The storm got so strong that it not only blew the Pope's hat off, but also knocked down a few temporary buildings. Even with the weather as it was Benedict continued the Adoration. The rest of us endured the storm and later, even managed to get some sleep. The next day the storm was declared a hurricane which most of us saw as an over-exaggeration. Unfortunately we weren't able to receive the Eucharist due to the damage that had been done to the tents in which the Eucharist had been stored. Even with this setback and the fact that we were all exhausted from our travels, we were all overjoyed by the fact that we were attending Mass with the Pope.

However, our pilgrimage wasn't only about the places we went to, but the journey itself and those we met and travelled with. In our pilgrim group we had many characters and everyone proved to be enjoyable and memorable in their own way. Whether it was Dylan and the music continually surrounding him and his guitar or Aaron and his sense of humour, there was always a contribution from everyone each day. We also met some amazing new friends from many different countries; Spain, France, Poland and many more. World Youth Day Madrid was an amazing experience and I would highly recommend the next one in Rio, Brazil in 2013.

Now I want to acknowledge our parents on behalf of



The next event on our calendar was the University of Otago Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival. A group of 13 eager and passionate students came together and performed various scenes from William Shakespeare's play 'Much Ado About Nothing' under the direction of Mrs Joines. Well done to all the boys who competed in this competition and a big thanks to Mrs Connolly, Mrs Newton and all parents (especially you, Mr G. Notman) for giving these boys the practice times and the support that helped them reach a high level of performance.

Yet again, the college put up a team for the Waikato University Secondary Schools' Law Mooting Competition. Our very own Mrs Wackrow managed the three teams and we had the help of Mr Russell Wilson who gave us coaching time throughout the competition. Out of the three teams, the team consisting of George Grainger and Alistair Murray, got through to the semi-finals of the competition along with seven other teams. From there they made the top two, therefore qualifying for the national final. After a close match their opposing side, Hillcrest High School, narrowly got ahead of them and took the title. This is the first time in our school's history that a team from FDMC made it this far so I extend my congratulations to all boys involved in this event.



This year contained an alignment of cultural stars thus bringing forth a joint musical with our sister school, Sacred Heart Girls' College. Two years ago we were invited to participate in the musical 'Bugsy Malone', providing skilled actors, musicians and stage crew. This time round called for a different setting... 'Oliver!' Instead of gangs of ... well gangsters, we were given the challenge of bringing the audience back to 'workhouse London'. Several months practice went into getting people into their places, becoming one with their character and learning the script. 


It was a tough challenge for the boys as we had to front up to Boys' High. Unfortunately we came up short and were defeated 44 - 26.





Auckland Geography Trip 2011

A large group of 45 students travelled to Auckland for our Urban Studies fieldtrip in Term 3. We stayed at Motu Moana, the Scouting NZ Headquarters on the shores of the Manukau Harbour. The purpose of the expedition was to become familiar with our largest city and to visit the locations which we study for the 'Explaining Urban Settlements' NCEA examination.

The transport network provides the core of the structure of Auckland, so visiting the Manukau City Centre alongside State Highway 1 and then moving to Mt Smart Stadium, home of the NZ Warriors league team, gave the students an idea of South Auckland and the enormous size of the city. Surrounding Mt Smart's large stadium is the parklike volcanic cone which sits right in our country's largest heavy industrial zone at Penrose.

Mt Eden provides excellent views of the Waitemata Harbour and the highrise core of the CBD, Here we sat the students down to sketch the key natural and cultural landscape features. The most recent volcanic eruption site, Rangitoto showed us just how high the risk of natural disaster is for our 'City of Sails'.

Residential housing ages and styles is another key factor in our fieldwork, Mt Eden and Ponsonby have the 100 year old kauri villas, generally large sections and they have been restored to modern standards. These are the oldest remaining houses in Auckland, followed by the 1920s' bungalows of suburbs such as Pt Chevallier and Mt Albert.

Queen Street and the waterfront area gave the boys a chance for exploration and lunch. Herding them on to the train at the new Brittomart Place railway station was a challenge, with the train pulling away minus the teachers. This provided a few laughs!

Sylvia Park is one of the largest new shopping malls in NZ with a new train station and a huge car park. It is located right alongside the Southern Motorway.

By 4.00pm each day traffic was building up and it was time to head back to the calm of our lodge amongst the trees at Blockhouse Bay. Here we relaxed for a couple of hours before heading out again to forage for our evening meal.

For most of the students, this was their first good look at Auckland. Senior Geography Coastal Field Trip

Forty Year 13 Geographers took part in the North Taranaki Coastal expedition on 16th March. We chose a day with a very low tide. This allowed us to examine the different geology in our cliffs and the varied types of coastal geography. Waitoetoe Beach was a highlight being virtually unmodified by humans. We observed the wide valley of the Mimi River, the papa cliffs and the rapid erosion rates of the weaker coastal strata.

Visiting six key locations enables our students to gather vital information for their research projects and the NCEA "Explain Natural processes" examination.

The Biology students studied new content in a range of different settings through the year. The students had theory lessons in class, did many interesting practical investigations in the laboratory and attended fieldtrips to learn about concepts first hand and to collect primary data for NCEA assessments.

On 15th February, at the crack of dawn, Mrs. Marshall, Ms Wong and the Year 13 class left for a day at Marton to attend a Seminar on Bioethics at the Nga Tawa Diocesan School. The seminar highlighted areas the students would consider later in the year when discussing the ethics of genetic engineering in the Contemporary Issues assessment.

On 24th February, the Year 12 class, with Mr Taylor and Mrs Marshall, visited Taranaki at East Egmont. The object of this trip was to become familiar with zonation, stratification and succession. Bog succession was studied at the Potaemo swamp and compared with gap regeneration where a tree had fallen in the forest. Higher up on the mountain, the students identified areas where primary and secondary succession were occurring.





The Year 13 class visited the rock platform at Kawaroa on Friday 25th February, to study the ecological niche of the intertidal shrimp and to collect data to demonstrate gradients in salinity and water temperature from high to low tide. Shrimp were caught and brought back to class for practical investigations relating to their niche for internal assessment.

The Year 12 class' next excursion was to the Rocky Shore at Kawaroa to collect data on zonation, also for internal assessment. The students monitored the abiotic factors to make links between the physical environment and the distribution of species.

Last year my aim for the Gifted and Talented Programme at Francis Douglas Memorial College was to include as many students in as many diverse extension activities as possible. However, this year I have added "to gain success and/or improvement" to the mix.

"Inclusion not Exclusion" is my motto.

I believe that any student who is prepared to do extra work in his own time deserves the opportunity to do so if it is at all feasible. This can be in pursuit of excellence in a mainstream curriculum subject offered at Francis Douglas Memorial College or an extension such as tertiary papers or a completely new learning area. However, I do acknowledge that for our senior students it is sometimes impractical to attempt new learning areas as well as strive for excellence in their academic subjects, play and coach at least one sport and in some cases have part time jobs as well. I endeavour to have 'Gifted and Talented' activities in their study period but this is not always feasible when outside providers are freely contributing their time and expertise.

Activities continued in 2011

School Poster Competition:

This competition was implemented again. The idea this year was to take each of the values from the original poster and create a series of posters that could be displayed around the school. This year's theme was "Doing your best". There were a number of entries based on the Rugby World Cup, hopefully some other students could focus on a slightly deeper, wider concept! The competition is a good vehicle to get students and teachers thinking and talking about our identified College values.

Future Problem Solving:

This is our second year of 'Future Problem Solving' classes but our first year of entering the national competition. We were lucky to have Ms Tina Dalliston available to work through lunchtime and half of a period once a week with the six teams. However, if we want to be really involved and competitive in the future, we need to look at timetabling FPS for one or two periods a week. I believe this is an excellent way to extend the creative and analytical thinking skills of our gifted students. I have attached a brief summary about the benefits of FPS. The written feedback from the markers that the students receive is outstanding and clearly identifies areas to improve and strategies to use.

FPS is run worldwide and there have been teams from New Zealand schools who win at the World Finals Competition. We have had some great remarks on our initial entries e.g. I would like to see FDMC become known as a "FPS school" in much the same way as it is currently known as a "rugby school". We must

put time and effort into building this programme. In Auckland where the programme has been running for some time, parents are starting to ask schools if FPS is available before they enrol their children.

Professional Development has been undertaken by Tina Dalliston both at a conference and by having an expert come and work alongside the students here at FDMC.

Law Mooting:

I am delighted to announce that this year we were runners-up in the final of this hotly contested competition run by the Law Faculty of Waikato University. This is the best result FDMC has gained so far... I fully intend our boys to be champions next year!

An immense amount of time and effort was given by the students and our 'lawyer extraordinaire', Russell Wilson. Russell gave his time freely and willingly to the students, even going so far as to coach them at his house on Sundays. Thankfully, he is willing to help us again next year.

Three teams were entered from FDMC. The students were Nick Hopkins, Tane Butler, George Grainger, Alistair Murray, Paul Latap, Mark McLachlan and Anthony Finnerty. The first round was held in the New Plymouth District Court and the boys coped very well with the formal surroundings and protocols of the court. I was pleased to learn they had not previously experienced the inside of a court! George Grainger and Alastair Murray were clear winners against the other teams from Taranaki secondary schools and were put through to the semi finals.

The semi-finals were held in the Hamilton District Court. I left school at 1.00pm with the two nervous contestants and a vanload of supporters as our moot was on at 6.00pm. Havelock North High School was no match for our two boys and we learned we had made the final against Hillcrest High. This was held in Hamilton a week later but this time we moved to the High Court and had three judges presiding. Students intending to do Law Mooting next year were invited to come as supporters. Unfortunately, we were beaten by a very polished team of girls. Congratulations to George Grainger and Alistair Murray for their success



at the annual Waikato Law Mooting competition. This is a national event and the first time we have made it into the finals. The boys argued very well; a skill many teenagers are developing, but unfortunately missed out on the title.

I envisage Law Mooting to be an important part of our school academic programme in the future. As George aptly said, "This is the most academically challenging thing I have ever done". Several of these students are intending to study law next year. This competition has been highly beneficial because mooting is actually what second year law students are required to do. I intend to include Year 11 students next year, along with Years 12 and 13 as there is a considerable advantage in having two years experience.

Brain Bee Challenge:

Francis Douglas Memorial College participated in the Brain Bee Challenge run by the University of Auckland again this year. The focus of the quiz was Neuroscience.

A number of Year 11 students participated in the first round. This was completed online at school. To prepare for the quiz, the students were required to study course material covering various aspects of neuroscience.

Four students scored highly enough in the first round to be invited to take part in the second round of the competition as individual competitors and as members of a four-person team from the College. They were Eric Yang, William Aye, Cormac McCarthy and Miguel Montella. The students and Mrs Marshall flew up to Auckland on the day of the quiz. The second round was held at the University of Auckland on 21st July, at the Faculty of Medical and Health Sciences. The Francis Douglas students did not get through to the final rounds of the team or the individual competitions but enjoyed the day tremendously. The guiz activities were fun, yet challenging and stimulating. Besides the quiz, the students observed nerve cells with an electron microscope, visited a neuroscience laboratory, the Anatomy Museum and met with neuroscientists. They were also able to interact with students from schools across the North Island.

Bridge Lessons:

Dr Frengley donated his time and expertise to teach interested boys the rudiments of bridge. His son, John, was an eager participant each week along with Edan Searle, Andrew Xiao, Elijah Lamb and Ryan Sadler. We are hoping to get an inter-school competition started next year.

Film Making:

There were several competitions open to the students. Sadly the University of Otago film making students are no longer offering their expertise due to their own work commitments.

Taiaha Group:

Taiaha lessons were again offered to the students during the second term. Unfortunately there was not enough interest to warrant running these. Hopefully this will continue next year and a certain year group will be selected.

Creative Writing:

Renowned author and poet, Elizabeth Smither, was employed to run workshops for our top Years 9 and 10 English students. We also had teaching sessions from Apirana Taylor. The boys certainly made the most of these opportunities. The challenges set stimulated some excellent writing.

There have been several national competitions open to students throughout the year. There were entries from all year levels. Although we did not win major prizes, the exercise helped the students focus on the skills of writing both creatively and formally. There are several journals and newspapers that publish articles written by students and I am encouraging teachers to use entry to these as class activities. In this way it is not an extra activity the children have to find time for.

Maths Challenge:

FDMC is extremely fortunate to have Graeme Mustchin, who as a dedicated Mathematic's Teacher, gave his time to tutor our top 18 Maths students for two Australian Competitions. These competitions are conducted by the Canberra-based Australian Mathematics Trust under the Trusteeship of the University of Canberra. The first was an enrichment, problem solving activity, run over three weeks for students in Years 8, 9 and 10. Our results are very pleasing and it will be interesting to monitor the progress these students make through NCEA assessments. Logan Walsh (Year 10) gained a High Distinction, which puts him in the top 2% of his year. Distinction passes were gained by Dominic Jacquemard, George Monk, Ben Irvine, Taine Win, Andrew Hockey, Michael McKillop and Joshua Woudt. These boys are in the top 15% of their respective year groups. A further 6 boys gained a credit mark putting them in the top half of results.

Vex Robotex:

FDMC Gifted and Talented Department is the proud owner of two state-of-the-art robots. The boys have designed, ordered the components required and assembled these during lunch times. They are currently honing their operational skills. Next year we hope to improve our technical skills by competing regularly against NPBHS and then to enter the 'Vex Robotics Competition' which puts students' science and engineering skills to the test against other schools and universities. There are local and national competitions.

Again we were fortunate to cajole Massey University lecturers from the School of Engineering and Advanced Technology to visit us several times to help



our group. The team from Massey won the world competition earlier this year so we had tuition from the best!

I see this as an on-going programme under the Gifted and Talented umbrella with students leaving and joining as they wish. However, they are expected to commit to a year as teamwork is an important part of gaining success.

Penquin Experience Workshop - 60 Springs

Unfortunately we did not gain any places on this workshop this year. We will certainly continue to compete though as the boys who attended last year found it very worthwhile.

Challenges

The main challenge continues to be to spread the Gifted and Talented net as wide as possible, to involve as many students as possible, while at the same time minimising disruption to regular classes. Surveys from the beginning of year came back clearly stating that some teachers found it difficult with the same students being out of class for lengthy periods. Another concern was that some teachers were being loaded with considerable extra work. With this in mind most of the extension programmes this year have been run after school, at lunch times or when I have a non-contact period. However, this is not always possible and means we may miss out on some worthwhile programmes that are offered. I am grateful to those such as Mr Mustchin, Mrs Marshall and Mr Hucker who have willingly assisted students to extend themselves.

Undoubtedly we have students at FDMC with superior intelligence and creativity. However, it is their work ethic that is often poor. This is especially noticeable in our senior students and could well be a reaction to the number of assessments they are required to do and the NCEA system.

This is also shown by the reluctance of some students to do scholarship examinations.

I wish to explore ways to encourage gifted students to strive for excellence next year and had thought that a tangible reward such as an exclusive school tie presented only to those passing scholarship or tertiary level exams may work. We can but lead a horse to water.

There are several programmes available through the internet for individual students. These are fairly expensive but are an option we could use in partnership with parents/caregivers. I would like to organise one or two periods per week that junior students could work on these programmes together. This would overcome the problem of isolation. Research clearly shows that gifted students who have difficulty socialising, prefer to be with students of





similar academic ability and interests. Chronological age does not seem to matter in a learning situation. Another thought was to start a family/whanau group where parents and their children could meet socially to help with friendships and float ideas.

It has been an exciting, productive year and I have enjoyed introducing new and extension learning experiences to the students. I would like to see Gifted and Talented activities, particularly the 'Future Problem Solving' programme, given a set time in the school timetable. This would allow the gifted students to really challenge themselves by staying involved throughout the year. We are developing several really good teams and I am hoping to keep these boys together to maximise their combined potential.

I will be attending a symposium on Gifted and Talented for Professional Development. The on-going debate which will be discussed is the issue of acceleration and its benefits and disadvantages. There will also be an opportunity to discuss ways of delivering an effective, relevant gifted and talented programme with co-ordinators from other schools.

It has been another outstanding and busy year for us. We have been actively involved in school, provincial and national arts' opportunities and competitions. Many of these have been provided through the Government Arts' Co-ordination funding, and others have been made available from the small fee students pay per year to enable hosting of shows and opportunities.

Drama / Dance

WOMAD came around quickly and ten boys registered to work for tickets to this event. They met at 6.00am at the TSB Stadium and helped keep campers off the racetrack while the horses were training. For this they gratefully gained Sunday tickets which they took advantage of. Barons of Tang, Hanggai, The Cat Empire, Luka Bloom, Sola Rosa, Afro Celt Sound System were some of the names bandied round after the weekend of outstanding entertainment, with students 'buzzing' about new groups and genres they had experienced. It was great to see lots of our students at this event and involving themselves in workshops where they were exposed to a huge range of cultural diversity.

One of the first competitions for the drama team was the Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Competition. Pascale Joines had coached and inspired a willing group of boys and the day of the heats at Stratford High School on April 14th was near the end of the busy first term. It has been great for the College to compete in this event, and a real coup for them to have won the regional competition in their second year of entering, which enabled them to compete in Wellington later in the year. As mentioned in the 'Special Character' segment of the magazine, students travelled to, participated in, and gained success in the O'Shea Competition for Catholic Schools. This year held in Nelson it meant that few supporters could attend. Ruth and Richard Marris and Diana Blair accompanied the team and helped with transportation. We look forward to 2012 when the event will be held in Wanganui, which will enable a large contingent of supporters to attend.

We hosted several visiting groups this year. In the past we have often had the 'Ugly Shakespeare Company' so this year we employed Wellington Playhouse to demystify Shakespeare for the whole school in a production entitled 'Shakespeare as you write it'. Using strong visual imagery they worked with the boys to write a Shakespearian play using the elements of tragedy and introducing tools such as iambic pentameter to structure it. It certainly helped clarify Shakespearian drama in an accessible and amusing way.

The annual EXCEL Performing Arts' School production came to College and it was good to host old boy Thomas Butler again who this year worked on the sound and technical side after beingr is a vocal acrobat involved in the production last year.

We took advantage of the Taranaki International Arts Festival Schools' Programme and attended Kia Ora Khalid, Com'n Black, Carnival of Souls, Raising the Titanics, Rita and Douglas, Ilmilliekki Quartet, and Mihirangi. It was fantastic to have a rich and varied range of performances available. In addition to this we hosted 'Words in Motion' here at the College. Thank you to Taare Ruakere who performed the whakatau for the visiting Maori authors and performers. We were their first performance in Taranaki so Apirana Taylor, Troy Hunt, Luther Hunt and Karl Teariki appreciated being welcomed to our region.

In addition to this eight senior students helped dismantle the Spiegeltent and for this earned double tickets each to see the show 'SOAP'. We are grateful to TAFT for providing us with this opportunity.

As a thank you and congratulatory gesture to the Sheilah Winn entrants, we gave them the opportunity of attending 'MacHomer'. Rick Miller is a vocal acrobat and brings Macbeth to a society more 'Bart than Bard'. By meshing Shakespeare's works and The Simpsons,

in over 75 minutes, Miller did the voices of no fewer than 50 characters, not all of which were limited to the realms of Springfield. Cameos from George W. Bush, OJ Simpson, Rod Stewart, Annie Lennox and Shrek, amongst others, added huge humour. Talking at a million miles an hour and using a projector and quick changes, we as audience came away feeling exhausted. This was a totally inspiring performance.

This year several students were actively involved in Sacred Heart Girls' College's production of 'Oliver'. It was good to see George Grainger and Marc Bridgeman taking speaking/ singing roles alongside staff member, William Mills. We funded some additional vocal lessons to help ready them for this. Felix and Cormac Griffin and Matthew Browne were also involved in the cast. It was a huge undertaking and congratulations to the staff and students who choreographed and directed it. It was a real credit to their expertise.

We continue to purchase a School Chamber Music subscription from our Arts opportunity budget. This enables 10 students and a teacher to attend performances at the Theatre Royal. If your son is keen to take advantage of this he needs to register quickly for each advertised event. Places are filled on a first come, first served basis.

2012 is our bi-annual Stage Challenge production and basic planning is currently underway for this event which will be held on May 29th at the TSB Showplace.

Visual Art

Throughout the year several of our students have entered photography, film, design and painting competitions. The Year 9 Option class has recently finished a unit of work developing concepts for a logo to advertise the VW Nationals to be held in New Plymouth in 2013. It has been beneficial for them to have a client and 'real' brief to work to. Hopefully some of their ideas will be utilised by the local club.

In May students submitted work for an art auction held at PIHMS with 30% of the sales going to support WAVES. Three students sold prints that had been completed as part of their NCEA Studies. They were thrilled to have work sold and to be recompensed for it!

We attended the annual 'Top Art' Exhibition at the Govett- Brewster Art Gallery which profiles the top scoring NCEA Level 3 portfolios from the previous year in the five Visual Art codes - Painting, Photography, Design, Sculpture and Printmaking. Some of the work displayed also gained Scholarship so it was really beneficial for our students to view.

It had been hoped that 'Photo School' would provide their two day course for our students this year. We usually offer this bi-annually to Years 12 and 13 Photography students and for two days they work intensively with professional photographers and earn Level 2 Unit Standards. Even with STAR funding subsidising the cost we unfortunately did not have enough interest to make this viable to proceed.

The re-alignment of NCEA standards this year saw a change to our curriculum. For the past few years, students had planned and built a sculpture as part of their programme for Level One. This year all of the work was done in the classroom environs and this unit was replaced with a digital technology one where the students had to grid and restructure a work based on the painting style of artist Pat Steir. With the adjustment to our term structure imposed by the Rugby World Cup, we had a shortened final term which meant that portfolio completion dominated most of the available time. The portfolios were due in Wellington two days after the holidays, so we tried to complete most of the work by the end of Term Three. The Year 12 portfolios were couriered the following week and then the Year 13 portfolios at the beginning of November. Personally I am looking forward to the return of a more balanced term structure in 2012 where we will have slightly more time after the holidays for folio completion.

Also in 2012, we have the reintroduction of Art Design at Year 13. This year we had insufficient numbers, so Peter Smith and I am looking forward to teaching this programme again.

Lana Phipps has done a great job with the junior module and option programmes. It is really pleasing to see a depth of potential coming through and we are excited by the prospect of having some very capable students in the next few years. There is currently a large class registered for Year 9 Option Art next year so we hope numbers will continue to grow.

We have registered an interest in hosting the 'Real Art Roadshow' in 2012 which some of you will remember from previous years. This is where a collection of artwork is shipped around New Zealand in two purpose-built trucks which transform into exhibition spaces. These are invaluable tools to enable all students to view a wide range of works from historic and contemporary contexts without having to travel to a Gallery. Please look out for further details in the College Newsletters next year.

Finally we wish our students every success in their external submissions and hope that they gain marks which reflect their efforts and ability.

To the Year 13 students, farewell and good luck in the years ahead.

Warren was an excellent and dedicated tutor; he performed in our Fusion Concert Band, and was loved and appreciated by all who associated with him.

A large number of boys were involved in performing at a lot of music competitions and special events. One member of the public was said to have commented, after hearing our students perform at a concert, "I didn't realise Francis Douglas boys could play like that!" Well yes, we can play well, and audiences have

been delighted with what they have heard.

Our Music Department sadly said farewell to Mrs Cath McGlinchey. Cath was a much loved and respected teacher who is sadly missed. Cath and her family returned to Kerikeri due to her husband's work. Cath now has a position at the local high school there. Mrs Meryn Ashworth took over Cath's classes until a permanent appointment could be made. At the start of Term 3, the school appointed Mrs Krissy Jackson to the role of part-time teacher of Junior Music. Mrs Jackson brings a wealth of knowledge and an enthusiastic spirit to the department. Her expertise in choir has been well received by the boys and we are looking forward to her developing singing at FDMC.

The first event we performed at was the 'Taranaki Secondary Schools' Orchestra Day' at Spotswood College. This event is a fun way for students of all playing levels to join in a massed orchestra and play a varied repertoire, and most of all, have fun getting to know music students from other schools in the province. This occasion is a lovely way to build friendships, renew old acquaintances and have fun making a 'joyful noise!'

The Taranaki regional branch of the New Zealand Chamber Music Competition was held in Inglewood in June at the Cue Theatre. This is a prestigious, yet all inclusive competition, and it gives students the chance to experience performing in a professional type venue to a discerning but encouraging audience. Our school had students in two ensembles. The first was a string trio plus a flute comprising of Andrew Dolan, flute, Andrew Hockey, violin, Bing Bing Wong, viola, and Joshua Connolly on the cello (Gladys). They gave a very credible performance of a Mozart Quartet. Special thanks must go to Susan Case for her tutoring and mentoring and for being a driving force behind getting these boys to this level of playing, and also to Beth Hockey for her encouragement and support too. Dylan Solomon, playing the classical guitar, joined forces with a flute student from Girls' High and a violin player from Boys' High. Their polished performance won the judge over and they deservingly won the Taranaki Competition.

June was also the month for the Smoke Free Rockquest competition. Our school entered two bands in this event. Approximately 18 Taranaki bands entered and had a play-off on the Saturday afternoon. Both our bands 'Living Lightly' and 'Armada' qualified for the finals that night. Armada comprised of Phillip Jagar, Year 9 on the bass, Caleb Brbich Year 10 on the drums, Ryuki Han Year 9 on electric guitar, and Tanaka Utete, Year 10 doing vocals. These students were first time entrants and their enthusiastic performance gained them 3rd overall. 'Living Lightly' was formed with Year 13 students Sam Thomson on bass, Jarrod Bakker on keys, BJ Monk on vocals, Jake Church from NPBHS on electric guitar, and Year 12 student Sam



Notman on the drums. These boys gave an 'amped' performance that showed astute musical thought. All boys profiled their chosen instruments in a way that gelled as a band and got the audience rocking! They impressed the judges and won the competition. Ryuki Han won the overall MAINZ Musicianship Award and BJ Monk won the best Lyric Writing Award.

July and September were busy times for our concert band' Fusion'. This year we combined forces with Sacred Heart Girls' College and Stewart Maunder. We were also delighted to welcome our brass tutor Mr Warren Orr, on the trumpet, to our band. This new initiative was successful socially and musically. The overall sound produced by these combined forces ensured that we had a full bodied and rich sound. Prior to participating in two significant competitions, Stewart Maunder organized a community playout at St Andrew's Church. The audience received us well and gave us a lot of encouragement prior to our competitions. We entered the New Zealand Concert Bands' Association National Music Festival for the first time ever, and took out a Gold award. We were not only competing against other schools but also against adult semi-professional bands. It is just about unheard of for a first time concert band to take out a Gold Award, Our Jazz Combo also took out Gold, and our 2 Early 2 Jam Band gained Silver. In September, Fusion and Jazz Combo then went and competed in the Waikato Itinerant Music Teachers' Festival. Fusion took out a Silver Award there and Jazz Combo took out Gold. The Judge said that the Jazz Combo did everything that a good Jazz Band should do and was suitably impressed. These were really encouraging words in what was a very competitive competition.

The Taranaki Jazz Club hosted their annual Taranaki Secondary Schools' Jazz afternoon. 2 Early 2 Jam and Jazz Combo gave very credible performances and were real crowd pleasers. Daniel Phipps, Sam Thomson and Caleb Brbich combined forces with Jake Church from Boys' High and Lauren Nottingham from Sacred Heart Girls' College to form a band called 'Emilio Estebahn'. They gave a polished and poised performance that took jazz performance to a whole new level. The crowd was wowed by their smooth yet sophisticated sound. This combo then went to Wellington and competed in the inaugural Wellington Jazz School competition. They won the supreme award for small jazz combos and Lauren won an award for the best overall jazz vocalist.

Our Music Department students have continued to support school music too. Boys led the congregational singing and accompanied the Mass hymns for the Founder's Day Service. They also sang and performed in a very moving Easter Liturgy under the expert guidance of Pascale Joines. The annual House Music Competition saw every boy in the school involved in singing, and some also playing instruments in delightfully charismatic energetic renditions of rock

songs of their choice as well as the school song. The musical items for Prizegiving were favourably received and special mention must go to Mrs Krissy Jackson and the choir who performed a most moving rendition of 'Prayer of the Children' at Senior Prizegiving. The audience was really impressed by this performance and boys have been talking since then about having singing lessons!

The combined effort with Sacred Heart in their production of 'Oliver' was also a great success. Jo Suren came back to be Musical Director for this show, and students from our school made up the stage band as well as having some students in singing and performing roles.

We are delighted that there are a group of willing and eager boys who have started learning instruments at the start of this year and now want to play in 'Fusion' and other music ensembles. This year was the first year that an Intermediate Bandquest Competition was launched. Daniel Chow, David Codd and Dominic Jacquemard combined with two girls from Sacred Heart and put in an online entry for this national competition. We are so proud of you boys for entering this competition with such enthusiasm!

Many boys in the Music Department have had individual success with practical and theoretical external examinations and winning music scholarships. Some students were also invited to do public performances for the World Cup Rugby celebrations. 'Living Lightly' performed as a forerunner to a 'Shihad' gig. This was a significant invitation and the band was well received. Daniel Phipps was also involved in organizing a rock concert in association with 'Waves' Youth Centre and two bands from our school played at this event.

I have enjoyed seeing our students getting involved with so many musical events this year and giving really reputable performances. It has also been lovely to see younger students gaining confidence and enthusiasm with their performing too. The willingness of boys who have played for school events is also a delight to see as playing to your peers is often a difficult thing to do. I have also enjoyed forming performing relationships with students from Sacred Heart Girls' College. It is really lovely to combine forces with our 'sister school'. We have also appreciated having students from New Plymouth Girls' and Boys' High Schools perform with students from our school as well.

Music is a wonderful way to form friendships and to make a great sound together. Well done boys! 2011 has been an amazing year and I am so excited about what the future holds for all boys to become involved with making music in one way or another at FDMC.

Careers

Career Education and guidance in schools directly addresses New Zealand's National Education Guidelines (NEG's).

"To enable all students to realise their full potential as individuals and to develop the values needed to become full members of New Zealand's Society." [NEG 1]

To develop "the knowledge, understanding and skills needed by New Zealanders to compete successfully in the modern ever changing world". (NEG 3)

The Careers and Guidance Department embodies a number of initiatives for students at our College - Careers, STAR, Gateway, Career Pathways Programme, Counselling, Correspondence and Distance Learning.

This year we have continued to work in conjunction with Careers NZ in developing our vision of whole – school integrated careers education. Careers NZ ran a professional development seminar with the whole staff after school on June 29th.

We have conducted an 'Intentions' survey for Year 12 and 13 students looking at their current needs in regard to careers information and picking up on any students who are potentially 'at risk' of not engaging in the decision making process.

We have hosted visits from all the Universities, Armed Forces and a number of other training organizations. Many students visited the Universities on the Open Days – this gives the students a great opportunity to see the University and Halls of Residence.

The Careers Department has also supported Jeanne Marshall's initiative for senior Benilde students in organising courses and work placements.

STAR

CPP students have undertaken STAR outdoor education delivered by YMCA, First Aid by Meditrain, and a chainsaw course.

STAR continues to provide unique and vibrant experience for our students outside the conventional programme.

2011 Correspondence and Distance Learning

This year there were 30 students enrolled as dual students with the Correspondence School each having designated timetabled periods four/five times a week. 



Students with different special education needs were assisted in a variety of ways at Francis Douglas Memorial College in 2011:

- The ORS funded students received the highest level of support according to funding received specifically to address individual students' needs.
- Students with special educational needs, ranging from Year 7 to 13, benefited from assistance in the Benilde room.
- The Special Education Needs Department worked together closely with the English and Intermediate Departments to identify students with reading difficulties and dyslexia.



- Specialist reading instruction commenced at the start of Term 3 for students from Years 7 and 9. Students needing remediation were identified, tested and tutored twice a week by Jo Morris-George, the Specialist Reading Teacher.
- Year 12 reading tutoring programmes for Year 7 and 8 students were run in Terms 2 and 3 respectively. A

number of students from Years 7 to 10 received adult reading tutoring during the same period.

- Students diagnosed with dyslexia were given teacher aide support for two periods per week during English.
- Students qualifying for readers and or writers were given assistance during assessments.
- Teacher aide assistance was given to specific students needing extra help in the classroom to learn more effectively. Teacher aide support was also given to classes in the science laboratories and technical workshops.
- Students in Year 10 exhibiting symptoms of dyslexia were referred for assessment to support their applications for special assessment conditions in 2012.

Gaye Bolstad, a long serving teacher aide, resigned at the end of 2010 and Melva Howard, who had been at the College for two years, accepted a position at Sacred Heart Girls' College at the start of Term 3.









Marianne Friend and Pamela Low were appointed to the College in Terms 2 and 3 respectively. They have, in the short time at the college, proved to be of great help and support to the students.

Students in their third year in Benilde needed a curriculum that would equip them for an independent adult life. The Special Education Needs Department worked closely together with Careers and Guidance to make this possible. Senior students attended Cooking and Hospitality classes at FEATS, studied Health and Safety in the Workplace and had the opportunity to do Work Experience during school hours.

The Junior Benilde class was continued in 2011 with two new students in Year 7 and one student in Year 8.

Four students completed the work for the SPEC Level 1 Mainstream Certificate. Jacob Abbott, who completed the course in 2010, was the first student in New Zealand to receive this newly approved certificate. Shaun Gordon received his certificate in July.

Robyn Wackrow and I took an eager bunch of 23 Year 12 students to attend the Young Leaders' Conference in Wellington on April 3 and 4. All students were a real credit to the College and we had no problems at all.... only a stop for an overfull stomach of McDonalds just south of Patea!!!

The Halogen Young Leaders' Conference had a range of speakers. Some were involved in the issues of drug and alcohol abuse and graphically demonstrated the dangers of these to the students. Probably the speakers I was most impressed by were Jehan Casinader and Mai Chen; two people who had followed their ambitions and overcome adversity.

Jehan Casinader's message to the students was that young people often settle too much for mediocrity and as one of the guest speakers at the Halogen sponsored National Young Leaders Day he had the youthful exuberance to deliver this message with credibility and make students consider their actions.

Mai Chen was inspirational. In her usual blunt delivery she highlighted the issues of racism, sexism and the need to get over the hurdles of being in the minority, issues that she had experienced in her own life. She candidly told all assembled how it is to be marginalised at school, university and when trying to get your first work placement. She stressed the importance of surrounding yourself with people who believe in you and to strive to accomplish the goals you set. Mai Chen is a founding partner of Chen Palmer New Zealand Public Law Specialists, Barristers and Solicitors, Australasia's first public law specialist firm, which she co-founded in 1994. She has led Chen Palmer for the last 18 years. As a young graduate she found it difficult to get a placement and with the support of lecturer, Geoffrey Palmer opened her own firm. Mai is currently writing 'Public Law Tool Box' for publication in December this year and is an Adjunct Professor in Commercial and Public Law at the University of Auckland Business School.

This opportunity was really beneficial and would have suited the Year 13 students as well.

It is also an opportunity for students to demonstrate safe practice in cattle handling, chemical usage, ATV operation, tractor operation and use of firearms. They also had to demonstrate first aid skills and their knowledge of hearing protection.

Two firsts this year were the inclusion of the hearing/ noise challenge as part of the competition, and NPBHS competing. All Year 11 Agriculture students were involved in the event either in a team of four competitors or assisting with the smooth setup, running and cleanup after the event. Their assistance and cooperation was appreciated.

This was an achievement considering all of the training was done last year (students were currently studying for NCEA achievement standards) whereas the competition concentrated on the practical skills unit standards this year.

Year 10 - Scooter/Motorcycle Training

On the 15th April our boys attended an hour long Scooter/Motorcycle training session. This training was at the College with no cost involved.

This training was funded by ACC because statistically, motorcycle and scooter riders are 16 times more likely than any other road users to be involved in a crash, and they're far more likely to be seriously injured. While one of the top two causes of those crashes is the motorcyclist losing control, the other cause is a motorist simply not seeing the rider. Riders need to be constantly monitoring their own riding ability and to be super aware of what is happening around them.

This one-hour session is designed to give students the opportunity to experience firsthand 'Scooter and Motorcycle Basic Handling.' Ian Lanfear, a qualified motorcycle, scooter and AA Driving Instructor, instructed this Safety Training.

Participating students were entitled to the free training session at school and also a Basic Handling Skills Test at a later date, free of charge (valued at \$70). This is the first stage of the Motorcycle Learner License.

All the students involved thought it was a very valuable and worthwhile training session and they learnt a lot. The boys loved the hands-on approach.

On behalf of the College, I would like to thank all the rugby players this year and the wider college community for your continued support of rugby at Francis Douglas Memorial College. 2011 has been an exceptional year with a large number of College rugby teams making the semi finals or final.

The 1st XV won the Taranaki Rugby football Union Under 20 competition for the eighth consecutive time. This added to an already impressive season having beaten De La Salle by a considerable margin in Auckland as well as the victory over New Plymouth Boys' High School at the Gully 19-13. The 1st XV was also runner-up in the new Catholic Hibernian Cup that started this year.

Our 2nd XV completed a very good season in the Premier Secondary Schools' competition, qualifying for the final. These groups of individuals played an expansive style of rugby and were well drilled by Coach, Mr Martin Dravitzki. The level of experience these players gained from playing in this competition bodes well for future first fifteens.





This was a keenly contested fixture where the boys played extremely well but found themselves 2-0 down after an hour of the game. After a few strategic changes we pushed for a goal and found one with 15 minutes to go. In a frantic finish we scored another goal to give us the draw we needed. This draw also meant we were in the 'hot seat' to automatically qualify for National Tournament as we had already beaten Wanganui High School 2-0 in May. With NPBHS losing to PNBHS we qualified 2nd from our region and gained entry into the National Tournament in Napier.

In Napier, we were looking to qualify from our pool 1st or 2nd to reach the Lotto Bowl Tournament for the 1st time in three years. First up we played Christchurch Boys' High School and were playing well until an unfortunate penalty decision was given against us; this disrupted our momentum, causing us to lose 2-0. The second game against Hutt International was a must win game. We made some strategic changes and played them off the park winning 3-0. The third and final game was against Westlake Boys' High School. This is the team that defeated us last year. We played extremely well and drew 1-1 after they scored a late equalizer. This draw meant we qualified 2nd and had to play against St Peter's Collegiate (Cambridge) the 13th seeded team. The boys played well but gave away a scrappy goal 10 minutes from time. We ended up losing 2-0 as we had to gamble going forward trying to pull the goal back.

Next up we played Kelston Boys' High School. This was probably our hardest match as they had won 3 out of their four matches only losing to Rotorua Boys' High School on penalties. We began slowly and conceded a penalty midway through the first half. After some harsh words at half time the boys played outstandingly in the 2nd half but just couldn't put the ball in the net, with the Kelston keeper making some outstanding saves and lost 1-0. Next we played St Andrew's from Christchurch and dominated the match winning 4-1. The last game was against Malborough Boys' High School. The boys were tired from the 6 previous games and unfortunately made some mistakes that cost us a 4-3 defeat.

Overall the boys performed to the best of their ability throughout the week and I was extremely proud of them. We ended up finishing 22nd in New Zealand, which was our highest finish since 2008. As a group, the boys bonded well and worked hard for each other on the pitch. I would like to thank Sandra Smith, Mary Reive, Peter Melody and Steve Brailsford for all their help in Napier this year.



Regarding the Taranaki Men's Premier League, we knew it was going to be an extremely difficult season with our young team playing against seasoned professionals with years of experience to call upon. Although we finished bottom of the league we retained our status in the Premier division by easily winning our play-off match 7-2 against Waitara Men's Team. However, the experience gained in the division proved invaluable when competing in the National Tournament. The main highlight for me was the win against the previously unbeaten Peringa Premiers. Although we struggled for wins we played some attractive football and were unlucky in quite a few keenly contested matches.

I would like to thank Central Finance for their sponsorship of the 1st XI over the last 5 years; it has been greatly appreciated.

It has been an excellent year in general for Football at FDMC in 2011. We had 11 teams competing in local leagues with 25 players making Taranaki Rep teams.

an idea of the skill required, the boys have to shoot a target the size of a pin head at a distance of 25 yards, 30 times each, with a .22 rifle with open aperture sights in order to reach a top score. Concentration, patience and control are obviously integral to this sport, which is also competed at Commonwealth and Olympic Game levels.

The competition in Wellington was intense, with Rangiora College winning with a top score of 889.5 followed by Palmerston North Boys' High School and Taita College, third. The top individual shooter got a score of 300.3, and she is a member of the New Zealand Shooting Team. There were some very skilled shooters competing.

Our boys competed strongly and we were absolutely stoked to finish 9th overall amongst this fiercely fought competition with a score of 849.6, particularly because it was the first time we have entered. FDMC also had two shooting teams compete at the Taranaki Secondary Schools' Competition held in Inglewood earlier this year finishing fourth. In the last four years FDMC has won this local competition twice, and has come 2nd and 3rd as well.

I am confident that these boys will continue to improve their shooting skills, and we are looking forward to the nationals next year and will endeavour to improve our national ranking by targeting a top five finish.


TSSSA Surfing and Bodyboarding
