

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Our school is fortunate to have as its charism's founder the Patron Saint of educators, St. John Baptist de La Salle. His biographer Luke Salm said of him:

"The originality of John Baptist de La Salle is not so much that he was a pioneer, for example, in gratuitous schools for the poor, the simultaneous method, the use of French as a vehicle of instruction, centres for training teachers, or any of the other educational innovations with which he is credited. Rather, his contribution was to create, resolutely and against great odds, a stable community of religiously motivated (teachers) to construct a network of schools throughout France that would make practical and permanent the best elements from the pioneers who had gone before him."

The word persistence shines through in this passage. De La Salle had a deep love for God. He was a genius. He lived at a time when there was a need for new thinking. Without his persistence however, his wishes would have been mere concepts. His was an incessantly tough job. He experienced episodes of opposition, treachery, betrayal and depression. His faith and zeal however, won through. Ours has to be the tradition of doing the same. Our school is successful because of its glorious past. Its future however will depend on our persistence in carrying the baton given to us faithfully.

This year the College catered for 758 students, 121 of them boarders, and it employed over one hundred staff. It is the role of all adults who work in this place to educate students for life and to make our school a place where we share the Good News of Jesus Christ within a Catholic environment in keeping with the courageous Father Francis Douglas and the persistent spirit of the Lasallian tradition.

Central to our objective to do the will of God, is a regard for the poor and the marginalised. Apart from other endeavours, more than \$27,250 raised for Lasallian missions on Mission Action Day, \$5,500 raised for Little Fighters and more than \$3,500 raised for Caritas, give witness to us attempting to be compassionate people who persist in serving the needs of others.

NCEA results from 2013 were most satisfying and among the best we have had. An emphasis on students





not being too strategic about being satisfied with the minimum number of credits and encouragement to stay in the examination room longer, once again paid off. The number of students reaching Excellence Endorsement saw increases at all levels to exceed national averages by more than double and the total number of endorsements across the three year levels has moved from 10 to 61 in the last five years.

We can be proud that only two of last year's school leavers departed without NCEA Level 1 and 85% had Level 2 at time of leaving.

It was a major sadness that Year 13 student Riley Looker died of motorcycle injuries on Waitangi Day. The deep way in which Riley is missed in the school shows how precious each of us is.

We have seen staff departures of Brendan Bergin, Kirstin Jackson, Suzette Stevens, Peter Ingram and Russell Cleaver and in their stead have welcomed Anna Zsigovits-Mace, Briana Matthews, Nick Taylor (the elder), Steve Ritchie, Matt Lash, Liz Huston and David Prentice. Next year we will also welcome Allen Jones into the Technology Department and Mrs Rae Sullivan Brown (previously Principal of St. Joseph's School, Stratford) as a permanent part-time teacher of Mathematics. We sink or swim on the basis of our staff and can feel proud of the ethos that exists among them. I am especially grateful for the efforts of new Deputy Principal Tim Stuck who has proven that his capabilities and passion for our College has made him a good choice.

The support of Boards, and PTA is an ongoing strength of the school, where harmony, resolve and a work ethic is strong in all cases. As a staff, parent and student body we owe much to these three groups and to our Lasallian Proprietor represented by the indefatigable Brother Pat Lynch. Funding from the Proprietor and the PTA has seen the construction of three Science laboratories, two Art rooms and our pleasing front entrance way.

As God, Francis Douglas and De La Salle would have us do, let's pick up the baton willingly once again next year...

St. John Baptist de La Salle pray for us. Live Jesus in our hearts forever.

He now plans to spend more time with his family and is looking forward to increased flexibility. After biking over 3,300 miles around Europe with his wife Alison during Term Three, we look forward to following his adventures and are sure we will see him back in a relieving capacity soon.

Ash Reader-Nokes (at the time of going to press) is awaiting the delivery of his and Dee's first child. After travelling to his old school from Eltham daily to work in part-time Sports Coordination, as Director of Football and in Junior Mathematics and Physical Education roles, he was pleased to gain a permanent position at Hawera High School for 2015.

Krissy Jackson was initially employed as a permanent part-time Teacher of Music. Unfortunately this year there were no additional hours available for this and she taught in the Religious Education and also Arts Department as a Year 10 Drama Teacher. Stephen Ritchie began work in the Technology Department after Peter Ingram gained the HOD Technology position at Waitara High School. Steve has a background in engineering with experience both here in NZ and in Australia. He has continued to deliver programmes that the boys love such as minibike construction and implemented new projects that have really engaged the students.

Matron, Sandra Kelsen, decided that it was time to spend more time with her family and to engage in activities she enjoys, and retired at the end of Term One. After being a 'Mum' to many of our boys and providing them with 'TLC' when they needed it for injury or otherwise, she was sadly farewelled by the staff and students. In Memory of Riley Looker

The beginning of our College year was filled with much sadness as the community mourned the loss of Year 13 student Riley Looker in a trail bike accident on Waitangi Day. Riley was a bright-eyed, lively student with many male and female friends who loved him dearly. He loved outdoor pursuits and had an impressive knowledge of vehicles and their workings.

Our students were at Riley's service at Oakura in large numbers as a mark of love and respect for him and his family. It was impressive to also see such a huge number of young people in attendance from all New Plymouth secondary schools and to realise how much Riley had touched others' lives. The 'Haka' that our College boys performed was a strong sign of their respect and grief.

On April 7, a small Memorial Service was held in our College Chapel for Riley's family and the Year 13 cohort. Philippa, Wayne and Tobias were presented with a book of photographs and messages written by students from the College. At the end of the service a tree was planted by his family below the Chapel. Some students during this year have visited this to pay their respects and used this as a place of solace.

We have continued to feel Riley's loss throughout the 2014 school year. When the school has been gathered

together his presence has been kept alive. At all the graduation celebrations such as the Mass in the College Chapel, the Prayers and speeches at the end of year Senior Prizegiving and also at the Graduation Dinner, Riley has been remembered in the staff and students' hearts and words. Throughout 2014 the Year 13's have bonded together and helped support each other through a serious loss.

Riley had been fortunate to experience many opportunities in his life, and the memories made during overseas trips, skiing holidays, holidays in the Coromandel, roadtrips with his family and friends, boating, sailing and having fun at the beach etc., will be times to remember and cherish by his many mates and extended family.

This would have been Riley's final year at Francis Douglas Memorial College. We continue to hold his memory close to us, and offer condolences and prayers of support to his parents Wayne and Philippa and his elder brother Tobias, himself a former student.

DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS STUDIES



LASALLIAN SERVICES

It was their extra effort to raise further money following MAD Day by selling food from India (meals made by India Today), Italy (Pizza Hut pizza) and China (Noodle Canteen) that got us over the line. Those students, with the support of Mrs. Joines, can rightly feel proud of their efforts, as can all those students who got sponsorship or made donations themselves to MAD Day. The College's focus on helping people who do not have access to education like we have here at Francis Douglas Memorial College, is a wonderful reminder of the Catholic, Lasallian values we espouse.

Caritas

During the six weeks of Lent students are asked to make cash donations in support of the annual Bishops' Appeal on behalf of Catholic Social Services. The focus this year was "Partnerships for Change in the Solomon Islands". Each form is given a donation box and the students collect money that is counted weekly. The tuck shop is also given a box and the women working there encourage students to put some of their change into the box. When Easter arrived the generous attitude of the students was clearly seen, as we were able to donate S4,435.00 to Caritas. We would certainly be among the leading schools in the country with our consistent high level of donations to this very worthy cause.

New Plymouth Foodbank

For De La Salle Day on the Friday before Queen's Birthday weekend, we concentrate our sense of service on the local 'Foodbank'. This has developed over the years and is now very much part of the tradition of how we celebrate Founder's Day. Again, each form aims to get as much non-perishable food as possible to be able to give to this cause, and they respond with many boxes of food. Those who attend the Mass are astounded at the large number of boxes that are processed in for the Offertory and it certainly leaves a lasting impression



on our annual visitors from John Paul College and De La Salle College. It has become an important source of supplies in the middle of the year for the New Plymouth Foodbank, and they are truly appreciative of the efforts made by the College.

Mission Action Day Walkathon

The major activity the College is involved in is the walkathon; raising funds for fellow Lasallian schools that do not have access to resources like we do in New Zealand. Even though there are needs in the College, students are able to understand and be involved in working for others at their own expense something that we are asked to do as Christians; giving without counting the cost. The walkathon is a large undertaking, made easier by the full cooperation of the whole school and local community. It is one area where the full local community is tapped into through sponsorship and the results are not even used locally.

The students enter into the spirit of the walkathon and have an enjoyable day. We start with a liturgy focusing on the life and spirit of service of Fr. Francis Vernon Douglas. It is now a custom during the service to hear prayers in many languages, reflecting the diverse



cultural make-up of the College and to bring us greater awareness of the spirit-filled willingness of Fr. Douglas to serve other nationalities. The liturgy is followed by the House Singing Competition and the standard of singing is improving every year. The Senior Leaders realize that it is better to be tuneful than to be overly loud! Congratulations go to Solomon for winning that competition, followed by Benildus, La Salle and Loreto.

The final total for 2014 was a wonderful \$30,354.80, which comfortably beat our target of \$30,000.00. This is the biggest amount ever raised and shows how involved the school community is in serving other Lasallians. There is still room for improvement though, as there were about 90 students who did not contribute to the total at all. The focus this year has especially been on Lasallian schools in Pakistan. Congratulations to the members of the Student Council who arranged the International Food Day, which ensured that we passed the targeted total.

The strong ethos of Faith, Service and Community continues to thrive at FDMC. May God bless all those who have been so generous in their response to the needs of others in our global village.

STUDENT SERVICE

The Order of the De La Salle Brothers is identified by the letters fsc (fratrum scholarum christianarum - the Brothers of the Christian Schools). Here at Francis Douglas Memorial College, the dominant meaning of the letters f,s,c, to both staff and students is faith, service and community.

Let's take a look at some aspects of the student service component of fsc at Francis Douglas Memorial College.

Mission Action Day (MAD Day)

This is an important day in the College's calendar. Students attend a liturgy in the morning, followed by a sponsored walk. The liturgy is centred on the life and actions of Father Francis Vernon Douglas, a Catholic priest after whom the College is named. Fr. Francis Douglas was a Wellingtonian who served as a Diocesan priest in New Plymouth. Later he trained as a Columban Missionary and was sent to the Philippines. During WWII, after having contact with the guerrilla fighters, he was arrested by the Japanese, tortured and taken to an unknown destination. He was never seen again.

Our MAD Day Memorial Service is particularly poignant as it has a missionary flavour. During the liturgy Filipino students speak in Tagalog and other students speak in Japanese, Maori, Latin and English. In the weeks leading up to MAD Day, students are expected to seek sponsorship from the local community. The walk of approximately 8 km represents the distance some students in areas such as Papua New Guinea have to walk to get to school and the money raised is donated to the Lasallian Foundation.

So, MAD can also mean 'Make a Difference' as this year over \$30,000 was raised.

Breakfast in Schools

The highly successful Breakfast in Schools service has been operating for a few years now. The service is organised by senior students themselves, Fifteen senior students are rostered in teams of three and work from 7:45am to 8:30am each weekday to provide breakfasts to an average of 20 students at the nearby Decile 1 Primary School.

The Red Cross provides the funding and some personnel to help deliver this initiative. Our students see the service as a great opportunity to sit down and talk with the primary school students and be role models to them.

Hospital Masses

A group of students continue to assist with the Hospital Mass on the first Saturday of every month. Their role is to assist hospital patients and other attendees to get to the Hospital Chapel for Mass and to return them safely to their wards. In doing this, students come to appreciate that service is not always about doing things or performing actions; it can be about simply being a presence. Here they are 'present' with and to the elderly and infirm members of our wider community.



HEAD BOY

The definition of a school is this: an institution for educating children.

But we are not called Francis Douglas Memorial School, and for a very good reason. After what is sure to have been a great day in the blue and grey, I do not arrive at 22 McLean Street, Fitzroy, and say; "man it's great to be back at this institute!" And by the same token, each morning when I arrive at 201 Tukapa Street I don't say; "man it's great to be back at this institute." No, it is much more appropriate and fitting that I say; "man, it's great to be home" on both occasions. And that is why this wonderful place is called Francis Douglas Memorial College, not school.

For the past 7 years this has been my 'home away from home' as it has been for many of you in this gym today. This has been my place to come and learn, to come and share, care and belong, to get involved in sport, culture and service. This has been my place to grow... Here at 'The College' we are not only informed, we are also, and evidently as importantly, formed as young Lasallians- men of Faith, Service and Community, as 'College Men'.

For the past 7 years of my life I, like every Year 13 and all 'old boys' of the College, have forged a path through Francis Douglas. Each person takes a different path, but one thing which in my mind makes our College so special, is that everybody has a path and nobody is forgotten.

My path began in Year 7; a time when schoolwork was put on the back-burner and lunchtime was the most important 45 minutes of my day. For Parent/Teacher Interviews there was a common theme and it went a little like this: "Jack has the potential to do well in all aspects of school life, but his attitude toward school is sub-standard and his attendance, well... I wouldn't use the words - Jack, attend and school, in the same sentence."

However as time wore on and the wise advice of Mrs Coles finally began to sink in, I changed my ways to suit school life. As I grew I realised how important



this school, the boys in my year (and years above and below), along with the staff and all members of the college community, would be in my development.

2013 and 2014 have been the two most devastating, yet maturing and important years of my life. 2013 was just like any other year, up until August the 13th.

On August 13th... Mrs Cocksedge, one of our office ladies, came and removed me from class. I will never forget the moment when I walked around the corner of the Office foyer and saw mum standing there crying. I knew then that I had lost my best friend of 13 years, Adam Clegg, who had been fighting for his life in Starship Hospital. Adam taught me so much about life, but the most important thing he taught me and one thing I would like to share with you is this: the people around you are the ones who shape you, each person you grow close to has an effect on your life and especially your attitude towards life.

Treasure those around you because you never know when you may lose their positive influence on your life.

After losing Adam my eyes were opened to the true compassion which is shared in our special community. The boys who knew Adam or even knew of him, rallied around his family and close friends, encompassing the teachings of special character learned here at the College in an incredible show of support. For this I am so thankful. I will always remember how much this meant to me and hope that in similar circumstances I can respond with similar compassion.

Six months later, one week into this school year, on February the 8th, we lost a comrade, Riley Looker. The pain of losing a great friend all over again seemed so cruel and unfair. A lot of boys here today knew and loved Riley like a brother... including myself. Riley was a special character, a true 'College man' who always did a task to the best of his ability. Riley's honesty, integrity, diligence and perseverance are qualities which define a true college man.

Riley's cheeky grin as he retorted banter with his peers was missed dearly this year and certainly our year group will never forget Riley's favourite classroom comment, "I get that....but".

Riley gave us so much and now it is our turn to give back by learning from his memory and by always remembering his family and friends who will always have something missing: that cheeky Riley Looker grin. Riley's passing was the worst start to the College year but the fact that this year was an unforgettably incredible year, is a testament to the resilience of the college spirit.

The first major event of the College Calendar was the eagerly anticipated Swimming Sports. Solomon was under enormous pressure to maintain the winning form of previous years. This was accomplished by

Jake Limmer and his "pool of talent." Congratulations must go to Michael McKillop for being crowned Senior Champ. and capping off a stellar career in FDMC swimming, having won this accolade each of the 7 years he has competed.

Athletics saw the Solomon machine claim victory once more with La Salle bagging another second, followed by Benildus and finally Loreto. It is now safe and just to say that Loreto's fate was sealed and they were destined to establish a trend of coming "fourth not last!" Simon French inscribed his name on the Honours Board once again, taking out Senior Athletics' Champ. for the second time "running."

Solomon went on to win Cross-country, Basketball, Football and House Singing to cap off another outstanding year. Benildus took out the House Haka Competition with a rousing rendition of 'Te Atawhai' led brilliantly by Eli Kneepkens: the tactical decision to keep Eli around for an extra senior year paying off for the 'green machine'.

La Salle took consistent seconds but they gave Solomon a scare by winning Rugby, MAD Day and the Foodbank Collection (events worth a lot of points). Loreto struggled to lift themselves to the high platform set by the other houses, eventually settling for fourth

FDMC had a great year in terms of competing at the highest levels in both sport and culture. People always love an underdog that punches above their weight. For many years the College has been that underdog with a small roll of boys who always seem to be achieving great things. But that is no longer true.... Francis Douglas is no longer an underdog and it is due to the



fact that we have managed to consistently produce top quality teams and individuals for a number of years. This year was no exception.

The 1st XV had another great year knocking over De La Salle Mangere, Palmerston North Boys' and New Plymouth Boys' in the same season for the first time. The highlight of the year, as with any sport which manages the feat, is beating arch rivals New Plymouth Boys' High. It'll be hard to forget the highlight reel of the 1st XV clash at Yarrows Stadium. The image of a young Enele Fidow, breaking countless tackles and employing some real college spirit to get over the line to score the match winning try, will be etched into our memories forever. The 1st XV went on to rightfully be crowned 'Team of the Year'.

1st XI Football had another strong season also beating New Plymouth Boys' High in a National Qualifier. The team managed a respectable 4th place in the Taranaki Premiership and went on to place 17th at the National Tournament held in Napier. The boys also managed to out-compete all other Western League men's teams in the Federation Cup, making the semi-finals of this: a highly respectable achievement.

On the cultural front, the O'Shea Shield Team had a very successful year this year. The highlight was the second placing earned by the Drama team. The entire team represented the College well, earning respect and providing a benchmark for future FDMC O'Shea Shield teams.

Other successes on the cultural front included gaining entry from the provincial competition in Stratford to the Sheilah Winn National Shakespeare Festival in Wellington, the Future Problem Solving team earning their place to compete on the world stage in the United States, and of course Cultural Captain Tanaka Utete's qualification for a trip to the UK to perform at 'The Globe'.

All of these successes on the sporting field, in the cultural realm and in the classroom, stem from the attitude set by those at the top. Mr Chamberlain, Mr Marris and Mr Stuck as the Senior Management Team are behind the scenes in every aspect of college life. My role as Head Boy has been very busy but every experience has been made enjoyable by the positive influence the Senior Management Team has had on my movements. I would especially like to thank Mr Marris for all the work you have put into the Leadership Team and into helping me in my role at every opportunity. Countless hours of work behind the scenes by you has resulted in our success as a Leadership Team this year - so thank you very much.

The Leadership Team this year has been a great one to lead. We have raised (through shaving our heads, running a quiz night, selling pizzas and seeking sponsorship) over \$5,500 for our charity 'Little Fighters' - a record amount. Each person did their bit to help







GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIPS

YEAR 11 FITZROY BEACH AND OAKURA BEACH EROSION STUDY

Coastal erosion in New Zealand and worldwide is a major environmental, economic and social problem. As part of NCEA Geography internal assessment the 70 Year 11 Geography students had a full day fieldwork experience to observe and photograph the examples of erosion in Fitzroy, Oakura and the wild undeveloped Tapuae Beach.

Great examples of boulder sea walls, gabion rock cages, the groynes and recreated sand dunes gave students hands on experience as we could clamber over these structures and discuss the effectiveness, cost and aesthetics of erosion control. NZ has a coastline longer than that of the main part of the USA with most of our population living within 15 kms of the coast and much of our high value land for food production is low lying. It is important 15 year old students discuss the impact of increasing sea levels and erosion rates as the next few generations will have to manage a control or retreat strategy.

YEAR 13 GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIPS

Fieldwork is an important component of the course at all levels, with research data collected by students in the "real world" being used by them to earn credits. During the Year 13 Coastal Taranaki field excursion we expose our pupils to the more technical physical geography of the natural processes operating at different parts of our coast. They learn to measure, sketch, photograph and report on the information we discover in the field. For many of our students going on to tertiary study, this self-driven learning and information collecting followed by analysis and report writing, is a good introduction to major assignments. For all students it is an interesting way to discover more about the natural environment and the way humans interact with natural processes. The cliffs and reefs of most of Taranaki are constructed of volcanic material, which has collapsed and slid down from the weak andesite peaks. The sea level of our coast has risen 120 metres since the end of the last ice age about 15K years ago. The cliffs we observe today are just the most recent manifestation of natural forces interacting in this dynamic environment.

The Rotorua Tourism Development trip is a three day highlight of the senior geography calendar. This field trip enables the pupils to experience what it is like to be a visitor to a resort centre, to try out some of the activities and hear experienced tourism operators and administrators speak on their area of expertise. The value of fieldwork is tested in the external NCEA exams and their great pass rate reflects the value of practical experience in the learning of geography which makes it much more relevant to our students in the College. Tourism development is an historic and economic geography topic. With about 2,000,000 overnight

visitors each year, Rotorua with its blend of natural and cultural attractions is an economic powerhouse. But it is the adventure attractions which interest the students most with the spectacular 'Swoop' at Agro Adventures a major highlight.

YEAR 12 AUCKLAND FIELDWORK

This year Mr. MacNicol and Mr. Wales took 33 of our young men to New Zealand's biggest city. The purpose was to become familiar with the patterns of growth and change, the various land use zones and to enable information or ideas we study in class to be seen from the street level.

Most of our lads have not spent much time in Auckland; some had never been there. We managed to cover quite a few kilometres, visit different styles and ages of residential zones such as Karaka, Wattle Downs, Mt. Roskill, Point Chevalier and Mt. Eden, survey business in the Penrose Mt. Smart area, stroll along the redeveloped waterfront and explore the Queen Street CBD zone.

There are NCEA credits directly linked to the fieldwork and this helps focus the students as they listen more carefully, take their own photos and complete labelled diagrams describing house styles and neighbourhood characteristics.

In terms of the personal development of our students, they have a fair amount of free time so can explore Auckland, manage their own food budgets and meet the appropriate deadlines for being back at the bus. They respect this responsibility and manage it well, looking after each other and making sensible choices. Field trips can be expensive and we appreciate this and make an effort to keep prices down. The Motu Moana facility is NZ Scouting HQ and has amazing grounds whilst being a good value lodge. It is convenient and amazingly our skilled driver, Colin, can get us around the big city very efficiently.

It is the lads and their learning experience, which make it all worthwhile.

BIOLOGY

Biology proved to be a popular subject choice this year with two Year 12 and two Year 13 Biology classes, taken one each by Mr Nick Taylor and Mrs Jeanne Marshall.

Ecology was the main focus during the first term for both year levels. The Year 12 students investigated the diversity of species in the Waiwhakaiho River near TOPEC and the Year 13 class studied responses of organisms to their external environment and investigated shrimp responses in the laboratory after a fieldtrip to the rock pools at Kawaroa. The data collected from the above-mentioned investigations was processed, analysed and discussed in reports submitted for internal assessment.

A highlight for the Year 12 class was the visit by Kevin Archer from Taranaki Regional Council who addressed the students on the diversity of invertebrates in the fresh water streams in Taranaki, in a lesson prior to embarking on the fieldtrip. The quality of many reports was to a high standard. Matthew Codd, Tanaka Utete and Aaron Ritchie presented their reports at the Fonterra Taranaki Science and Technology Fair. Aaron was awarded a Special Prize for Statistics in the Years 11 - 13 Scientific Investigation Category.

In Term 2 the Year 12 students studied Cellular Processes, Gene Expression and completed their second internal assessment - a practical investigation on osmosis and water balance. The Year 13 students learnt about Genetic Modification that was internally assessed and Evolutionary Processes and Speciation.





Term 3 saw both groups complete their course work. The Year 12's focussed on Genetic Variation and Change whilst the Year 13's looked at Trends in Human Evolution. Here the highlight for the Year 13 students was handling replicas of prehistoric skulls and stone-

Term 4 was dedicated to thorough revision and exam preparation.

Quietly confident, the lads went 'all out' with Aiden Beer's rapid writing playing a big part in their effort. The team had amassed 25 points sealing the win as they passed Stratford, NPBHS and Hawera with a narrow margin of .8 of a point, which was enough to reclaim the trophy from Stratford High.

The boys enjoyed getting out of the classroom to get involved hands-on in activities, There is a strong passion for agriculture in the school- especially amongst the boarders.

ECONOMICS

Economics involves central government control on much of the decision-making made in society. As an experience for Senior Economics students to see firsthand the people and places that spend our taxation dollars, 11 boys visited Wellington in September.



We received talks from the Reserve Bank, Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment and also visited Parliament, the Treaty of Waitangi at the National Archives, Victoria University and the new City & Sea Museum. Other team-building activities involved the movies and paintball battles (with many round bruises received - even by the teacher).

Overall the students enjoyed Wellington. Their eyes were opened to academic expectations and a much larger world among the 'movers and shakers' of NZ

TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

This year the Technology Department has been busy 'pumping out' some fantastic projects. The students have shown great dedication across all of the subject areas in Technology and the work they have produced clearly shows this.

Design and Visual Communication (Graphics) has seen some fantastic design ideas coming through. The Year 9 modules jumped straight into learning all about the design process and some very important technical drawing skills. The students went on to design block vehicles such as cars, ute's, motorcycles, ice-cream trucks and helicopters. The finished rendered drawings were outstanding with no two designs quite the same.

Year 10 DVC (Design and Visual Communication) classes saw the students refreshing their technical skills before completing two projects over a half-year course. The first project saw boys using their imaginations to design their dream bedroom in the form of a sleep-out. The students had an introduction to designing 'briefs' and working collaboratively to decide why they were moving out to a sleep-out and what type of sleep out they would be designing. This had the students using their imaginations to come up with great scenarios with the first group deciding on a tree house sleep-out.

The second project consisted of students again collaborating on a 'brief' for a racing event. The class decided that there was a need for a tractor and lawnmower event in Taranaki and they set about designing their own tracks and posters for this event.

This year we had 28 students doing Level 1 Design and Visual Communication. The course consisted of three design briefs with a focus on spatial and product design. This was assessed across six Achievement Standards: three external and three internal. While there were a number of boys producing high quality work, the stand-out student for 2014 was Owen Griffiths whose designs showed innovation and flair, coupled with outstanding presentation skills.

This year we had a combined class of Years 12 and 13 students doing 'Design and Visual Communication'.




Level 2 DVC looked to extend their skills and focused on two major design projects that were assessed across 7 Achievement Standards. The first project required them to design a new gymnasium for the school using the influence of a major design movement. There were a variety of movements the boys investigated including Gothic, Bauhaus, Post Modernism, High Tech and Deconstructivism. The inspiration exhibited in these designs was phenomenal. The second project involved the students producing designs for a water feature.

Level 3 DVC involved completing 2 projects that were assessed over 5 Achievement Standards. The first project looked at the students designing a Sports

Pavilion. Much like the Level 2 project it needed to show influences from the design world and all students did very well to successfully integrate a design influence into their work. The second project saw the students designing a product. The students followed the design process and used a mixture of manual drawings and computer design work to produce some great projects. This combination of manual drawings with an understanding of computer design programmes will be vital skills that remain with the students and will be put to great use when they go on to tertiary education. Congratulations boys on some fantastic design.

Year 7 and 8 Technology have had a great year learning various concepts and then constructing projects that demonstrate these.

Year 7 this year learnt about the design process, completing it from start to finish through the idea of bridge construction. Having researched what shapes are the strongest and looking at existing bridge designs from around the world, students then designed their own bridge. Students really enjoyed going through the process, reflecting on problems that came up, finding solutions and the practical side of actually making the

Year 8 had a very successful year learning about levers, hydraulic pressures, isometric and orthographic drawing via the medium of constructing a wooden digger. Students needed to learn about different processes and create working drawings to build from in order to begin construction. All students enjoyed their finished product: a digger whose arm operated using 'hydraulic pressure'. Well done boys, on a productive

Year 9 Wood Technology saw the boys completing an eight-week module where they had to make a Cheeseboard. This required the boys to do a material study and learn basic safety skills to be used in the workshop. They then went on to produce the cheeseboards and came up with ways to personalise their work and make it stand out from others in the class. This was a very successful project that saw the students picking up some fantastic skills.

Year 10 Wood Technology is a half-year option that focuses on improving the students' knowledge of safety and skills in a wood workshop. The first group created a wine rack that slotted together which they personalised with their own designs. The first layer was made from a template and the second was designed by the boys using prototyping. By making their design out of cardboard first, it minimised mistakes and gave them a way of visualising what the finished product might look like. The initiative the boys showed when coming up with these designs was incredible and there was a wide range of final designs.

For the second group half-year option we changed the project. Instead of designing wine racks, this class looked at creating an attachment for their personal music devices that worked like a speaker. The attachment could not use any electricity: instead it would use acoustics and echo around to increase the amplitude of the sound produced. This has involved a lot of research. The boys began by testing household items, such as ice cream containers and paper towel rolls, with an app on the iPad to see what sort of shapes worked best. They then drew up some designs and made them out of cardboard. This meant that we could use the app. again and test their designs before they made them. This project had a lot more benefit for the students and introduced them to the idea of following the design process and completing plans before embarking on a project. It also taught the students that sometimes your designs don't quite work out and that you will need to go back to the drawing board and make changes. The designs the students all produced were unique and personal to each of them. Overall they were very proud of what they had accomplished and so was I. Well done boys!

This year we had two Level 1 Wood Technology classes and both classes set to work completing a Vanity Box project. This project allows the boys to learn a lot of valuable skills and introduces them to many different types of joints, fixings, fastenings and finishes. The process they worked through to complete a project like this covers all the necessary skills to complete 5 BCAT papers. These papers are 'Industry' papers that also count as unit standards towards their NCEA qualifications. Overall the students worked really well to produce very good projects and master all of the different jointing methodology.

Level 2 Wood Technology worked on completing the Level 2 BCAT assessments. These students completed a rustic cabinet complete with a drawer and a hinged door. The cabinet counted towards the assessment of the BCAT standards, which like Level One counts as unit standards towards their NCEA qualifications. The skills these students learnt are a step up from Level One but focus on very similar things.

Overall the projects completed in technology this year have been fantastic and the boys should all be very proud of their efforts.

TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT - ENGINEERING

Students in the Year 10 Metal Tech. modules received an introduction to workshop practice, safety and project design in the classroom for two weeks, then enjoyed developing workshop skills while they made a small toolbox and a wind-vane. A range of designs and themes were in evidence on the windvane project, with all types of sporting and outdoor activities represented.

Year 11 students spent their year designing and building their own drift trike and built upon the fabrication, cutting, welding and machining skills

introduced in their Year 10 module. Year 11 students were also trained in preparation and spray-painting techniques, and a wide range of colourful trikes could often be seen after school drifting on the concrete driveway behind the Gym.

Year 12 students built their own mini-bike kitsets and utilised skills gained in Year 11. These incorporated machining and turning skills as well as welding, cutting, fabrication and mechanical assembly. Next year it is hoped some students will develop a racing mini-bike to compete in the inter-school minibike racing event held by Competenz in Fielding in October.

ARGENTINA TRIP

On June 27th Hunter Putt and I left New Plymouth beginning a 14-hour journey to travel to a foreign Spanish speaking country 10,000km from our homes. We were setting out on the greatest adventure of our lives. This was a student exchange with a de La Salle school in Buenos Aires, the capital city of Argentina.

Arriving we met our host families, who greeted us with typical Argentine hospitality before being taken to our home for the next 20 days. I thought that their homes were certainly a big change for us as we climbed in the elevator up to the 25th floor of their apartment block.

On Monday our next challenge lay ahead, school. At 6:30am my host mother woke us up for school, travelling there by car. The Argentine school day begins in the early hours of the morning at 7.00am with 5 periods and two 15-minute breaks before lunch. At lunchtime, the entire school floods out into the streets to eat lunch in nearby cafes or restaurants, or go home to eat or sleep.

In the afternoon school starts again and finishes finally at 4:30pm. Hunter and I were in the same classes where we endeavoured to make sense of the fast and difficult Spanish. After school and in the weekends we set out exploring the hectic yet enchanting city that is Buenos Aires. Walking the old streets, pushing past hurried porteños (locals) with the timeworn but grand architecture surrounding us all the time. A huge difference to urban New Plymouth.

In my opinion the best things for both of us during the trip was the food. Every day at school at lunchtime we would go out to eat the local and traditional foods of Buenos Aires: 'Choripan' (a barbecued sausage in bread), 'Milanesa' (like chicken schnitzel), steaming 'empanadas de carne' (like a meat pie). But the mother of all the foods there for me was the great Argentine 'Asado'. This is a cooking method including barbecuing huge amounts of meat over an open fire. This produced some of the best meat I have ever tasted.

On our final day we said a sad goodbye to our wonderful host families to whom we owed so much at the airport and boarded our plane to New Zealand. All in all the exchange was an unforgettable experience, meeting all of these new people, seeing, hearing and eating our

way through such an amazing new culture and learning oodles of Spanish.

I can thoroughly recommend this amazing opportunity to anyone.

Late Saturday afternoon is a good time to learn how to use the ticket machines for the first time, and we eventually stepped, rather wearily, into the rooms that were to be our living quarters at the Meguro Catholic Church. It was good to meet up again with Father Leo Schumacher who has frequently organised handy, reasonable accommodation in Tokyo for our groups over the last decade.

Sights included the busy tourist area of Asakusa, an elevator ride up more than fifty floors for a view, the calm of the massive green park around the Meiji Shrine, a view of the Royal Palace in the midst of some of the most expensive real estate in the world, and the forward thinking hands-on Science Museum on reclaimed land in Tokyo Harbour. Father Leo organised a calligraphy lesson for us, and in return the boys did the school haka outside the church. We

were also spoilt to a lovely Japanese shared meal, which Father Leo shouted us all.

On Wednesday of the first week we travelled on a shinkansen (high speed train) for the first time. Lunch was the obentoo (lunch box with a variety of foods) we had chosen in the station and after stopping for a wander along the canal at Kurashiki, we arrived at Hiroshima Station in the early evening to a crowd of welcomers from the little English Language School which has hosted us so well on all our trips to Japan.

Hiroshima is a lovely place. The boys had homestays here with delightful families, and enjoyed a weekend of activities with them. Of course the Peace Park was a highlight- very moving and memorable as we understood the horrific reality of nuclear war. We also enjoyed the Mazda Car factory, Kure's Yamato Naval Museum, an afternoon checking out a ropeway, a hilltop castle and an arched bridge in lwakuni, tasting Japanese soft cream icecream, walking around part of the famous island Miyajima to see the Itsukushima shrine and the deer that were almost too tame, then enjoyed another ropeway and the view from the top over the Inland Sea. The boys farewelled their friends by doing the school haka once again in front of the main station.

From Hiroshima we headed south for Nagasaki. The sun was shining when we stopped at Hakata where the boys, and especially Jack, enjoyed a real golden sand beach and real seawater. Another Peace Park, some interesting tourist attractions, and another ropeway









trip, for a stunning view over a night harbour followed before we headed north again, this time destined for Osaka. Five days here meant we could spend time seeing Kyoto - Mr Marris's favourite Golden Pavilion and other interesting temples, a modernistic rail station where you could easily get lost, Nara with its giant Buddha and more deer, Kobe where we watched Pocky being made and took another ropeway, as well as another Japanese castle, a world famous aquarium and a touch of Americana- the Universal Studios Theme

Our last stop was Mishima, our sister city. Here there were formal and informal occasions. Again the boys had home stay families, and enjoyed special treatment as visitors from a 'sister city'. Our time here included a public holiday when we were able to enjoy sight seeing and activities with our hosts, and a party where there were speeches and performances. Kaleb and Kai, our champion jugglers, were special stars. Once again our school haka was very popular. Our Mishima contacts always spoil us and we were honoured to meet the Mayor several times. At the end we sadly boarded our bus, so kindly provided by our Mishima hosts, hauling our swollen bags behind us. We waved goodbye to the Mayor and headed via a short stop at the giant Buddha at Kamakura to Narita Airport, enjoying a last view of widespread Tokyo along the way.

We wanted time to enjoy the airport shops, but a surprise was in store. Our New Zealand plane was three hours late and we had plenty of time to use up any remaining yen. Air New Zealand did a great job getting us all on the later connecting flight.

Our trip ran smoothly. Our students learnt a lot, including some language, and they were excellent ambassadors for our school and our city. Well done all.

FPS is an international programme that facilitates development of all the key competencies in the New Zealand curriculum. Students work in teams to understand global issues that will affect the world in the future. Research is analysed and critical thinking skills used to explore solutions and present an action plan. The aim is to produce creative, futuristic ideas that form ethical and humane solutions. The tricky part is that these must be futuristic but at the same time workable.

Recent results have proved that our Francis Douglas Memorial College students have the academic ability to successfully compete against those from some of the top schools in New Zealand and around the world. NEW ZEALAND BRAIN BEE CHALLENGE 2014

Dominic Jacquemard, Nicholas Walton, Ziah Taumoepeau, Benjamin Hall, Kellen Fisher, Michael Kerr and Tom Reumers participated in the New Zealand Brain Bee Challenge this year. The students studied detailed facts about the nervous system, neurons, chemical messengers, dyslexia, learning and memory, stress, sleep and different neurological diseases from a book, "Neuroscience - Science of the Brain" in their own time. The students participated with another 577 students from across the North Island in an online quiz of 35 multiple-choice questions on 20 March.

Dominic Jacquemard achieved in the 1st percentile and was invited to participate in the second round of the guiz on Wednesday 2 July at the Faculty of Medical and Health Sciences at the University of Auckland. He had to study another more advanced book "Brain Facts: A primer of the brain and nervous system" to prepare for the challenge.

In Auckland Dominic had the privilege of visiting a laboratory where DNA technologies were demonstrated to the students. He attended a lecture on cochlear implants and new technologies envisaged to correct hearing impairments. Another highlight was the visit to the Pathology Museum/Learning Centre to view diseased organs preserved in formalin. In the afternoon Dominic and the other participants met neuro-scientists and watched the finals of the team and individual competitions.

The competition was tough with 160 top scholars from top schools across the North Island competing.

THE ARTS

It is only in hindsight that we realise the range and depth of activities we have accomplished this year in Visual Art, Music and Drama at the College. Some of the activities are set in the calendar annually whilst others occur more spontaneously.

A Year 9 Arts Module course was implemented this year. It was delivered to all Year 9 classes for three periods per week over an 8 week slot. It provided students with an introduction to drama skills and enabled them to devise/write a script based on an event, to cast it, block it in and finally perform their productions which were then videoed as a teaching tool. Each class had a student producer and co-producer, and the planning and performance required the integration of all of the Key Competencies. The classes short play scripts were based on diverse topics: 9/11, the Tangiwai Disaster, JF Kennedy's death, WWE Wrestling and the Batman premiere. Year 10 Students also engaged in drama as a half year module. This was taught by Kath Curd, Krissy Jackson and Lana Rowland. The Year 10 students developed work for Achievement Standard 90006 Version 5- 1.1 entitled Apply drama techniques in a dramatic context and had the opportunity to gain NCEA credits when they looked at Wilfred Owen's war poetry amongst other subject matter, to devise and deliver their responses and performances. It is fantastic to have an NCEA Drama class being delivered in Year 11 in 2015 (which is a first for the College), and I am grateful to Kath Curd for her work to plan and deliver

The implementation of half year options at Year 10 meant that more students could experience Art, Music and Drama than in past years. There is a wealth of talent in our students at the College and hopefully with Career Pathways being available to parents and students through reporting systems and online, they will see the huge and varied range of employment opportunities available and see the 'Arts' as a viable

The first half of the year is often guite congested with O'Shea Drama, the Sheilah Winn contest, Chamber Music Competitions, 'Rockquest' and other Arts opportunities being calendared closely. Our 'Arts' boys tend to have roles in many of these and it becomes a bit of a juggling act getting them to rehearsals, performances etc.

WOMAD also comes to New Plymouth in March. This year's dates were the 14-16th and 10 boys earned tickets to attend through our on-going relationship with TAFT. Unfortunately this happened to be the weekend of the Sheilah Winn National Competition in Wellington and I was thankful of Christina Hermanns' help to meet and oversee the students who worked for tickets. I took our winning student produced team to Wellington for the Sheilah Winn finals and was in awe of the range of



delivery of the Bard's works and the passion the students from Northland to Southland had for Shakespearian drama. Much of this is due to Dawn Sanders energy as founder and CEO of Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand which provides opportunities for NZ students, and also identifies talented performers who can then travel to Britain to perform at 'The Globe' and visit the Bard's home at Stratford-on-Avon with like minded souls. Tanaka Utete shared his experiences of this in his Cultural Captain's Report. Tanaka had several meetings and commitments throughout our weekend in Wellington and was in the performance at the Prizegiving possessing several cameo roles which kept the audience amused. It would be true to say that after seeing so many renditions of MacBeth (referred to as simply the Scottish play) it would be a good one to steer clear of ever performing in the future!

The O'Shea Drama Team travelled to Hastings this year for the annual competition on May 17th. The Drama Team came away with a cup for their shared win of the Religious Drama section. This was due to the hours of preparation shared by Pascale Joines and Richard Marris. Several members of the FDMC staff had also helped prepare competitors for events ranging from debating, impromptu speech, prepared speech, oratory and religious questions to drama.

A new direction was undertaken by the College this year after Pascale Joines enquired about the 'Pasifika Fusion Competition' run in Palmerston North. Helen Talamaivao came and spoke to us one afternoon and even though our 'Pasifika' cohort is small here at FDMC when compared with many other schools, we decided to enter the competition. Many of the boys were busy with sporting and family commitments and at times our short window for preparation was thwarted. We entered several categories- Small performance, science, short-story, Junior and senior speech, and visual art. Richard Marris, Pascale Joines and I travelled with the team. We felt that it was a good opportunity to gauge the competition, and see the standard required for the performance categories. As three 'palagis' accompanying the team I think we realised the necessity in future years for the boys to have some 'Pasifika' mentoring. We hope that in the future with a longer preparation time there will be resource people in our community who can be utilised and support this initiative. Our team was well behaved and mesmerised

(Du'Plessis had unfortunately suffered a rugby injury in the First XV game on the day we left.) Polaiu'amea also won a prize in the Junior prepared speech category. Jonathan Fidow was thrilled to meet John Key and in the photograph we took, they looked like old buddies! It was great being part of this inaugural entry and seeing the group bolstered with pride concerning their efforts.

'Excel School of Performing Arts' came and performed their annual promotional showcase at the College on June 5th. The Level 3 Certificate in Performing Arts' drama, dance and music students presented a programme based on their theme of 'Tall Poppy Syndrome'. They again pumped out a huge sound in our gym, and showcased their talents in dance, speech, drama, singing and music whilst satisfying the performance criteria for their course.

Currently we have a small but passionate band of boys that volunteer for many of the 'Arts' opportunities available at the College. We took 21 of these students to an afternoon of workshops at the New Plymouth Operatic Society on Tuesday 24th June followed by the night performance of Andrew Lloyd Webber's 'Phantom of the Opera'. In the afternoon workshops we saw how the pyrotechnics and gas were controlled, were shown the construction of the Phantom's prosthetic face, were provided a close-up view and clothed in some of the wardrobe pieces, visited the sound/lighting desks and spoke to the technicians about career opportunities and associated training. Before the show there was a Q and A session where the two lead male actors, Chris Crowe (The Phantom) and Bevan Williams (Raoul) along with the Producer, Warren Bates and NPOS Chairman, Kevin Landrigan, responded to the boys questions they had sent in prior to the meeting. I know she will love her new teaching space without having to pack away and cleanup in Lab. 1 after each session. She will also enjoy profiling her students' work on the walls. I would also like to thank Tobias Wright for joining the visual art realm in the second semester to teach Year 9 Core Art, and for designing some new programmes which reflected his strength and passion for Maoritanga.

This year has been as busy or busier than every other one. Tobias has continued to provide new opportunities for many of the students and it has been great to see him perform alongside them on keys, drums and bass guitar. Tobias has been an inspiration for many of the boys and it has been awesome to have groups of Year 10 Option students performing in the guad during lunchtimes at the end of their half year courses.

Student numbers always fluctuate in this subject with some of our best musicians being very capable academic students whose option choices preclude them from Option Music study. They manage to keep a 'foot in the door' of the musical life of the College by performing with Chamber Music groups, Fusion (the College and SHGC Concert Band), the Jazz Group, String Group, their own bands and also support the Music Department by helping with accompaniment for masses, liturgies, assemblies and other activities. For this we are grateful. It is interesting that Auckland University has identified the correlation between students entering Medicine and their related artistic

strengths. We see it annually at the College and are heartened that students studying Medicine are now encouraged to take an 'Arts' related paper as well.

On Wednesday 5th June several of the boys competed in the regional Chamber Music Competition held at St Andrew's Church. Andrew Hockey's group won the 'Adjudicator's Choice Award' for presenting a demanding and well executed piece. Many of the students were able to submit these performances for NCEA credits in Group Performance standards. Many thanks to the many Itinerant Teachers who helped prepare the groups for this. In particular, thanks to Jocelyn Beath and Susan Case. Jocelyn spends hours arranging this opportunity and melds students from all Taranaki schools in to trios, quartets and groups with their ability, instrumentation and music in mind. Jocelyn is also the driving force behind the Taranaki Youth Orchestra. With many of our students involved in this it has been fantastic to attend two concerts this year. The last one entitled "Emerging Musicians" profiled Andrew Hockey as a violin soloist. It was a combined concert featuring the New Plymouth Orchestra alongside the Taranaki Youth Orchestra. For a small fee we are always guaranteed great entertainment at these events.

Practices for the Concert Band began in earnest early in 2014 with Sunday evening ones at Sacred Heart Girls' College along with Friday practices at the College in preparation for the Waikato Competition at the University of Waikato on August 29th. 

SHAKESPEARE GLOBE CENTRE NEW **ZEALAND YOUNG SHAKESPEARE COMPANY**

When I first partook in Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand University of Otago Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival in 2011 as a Year 10 (ineligible for any awards), never would I have envisioned that three years later, I would be delivering a monologue from Julius Caesar in Shakespeare's 'Globe'. The thought of me, a young boy from South Africa who deemed himself not "cultural" enough to tackle the Bard's works, eventually developing a deep passion for one of the greatest writers in English history, was something that a younger self would have failed to comprehend. But here I am; a 17 year old fanatic whose eyes will brighten and whose smile will widen when someone mentions the word Shakespeare.

The most challenging aspect of being granted the opportunity to travel to the UK to receive an education from individuals of a very high calibre with twenty-three other keen and creative talents, is definitely writing the report on all of it. I find the task of summarising two weeks learning at the world's most famous stage, in one of the world's most vibrant cities with some of the world's most passionate Shakespearean enthusiasts, incredibly difficult. I will most likely fail to fully encapsulate the amazing nature of the experience not because I am not gifted in the area of report-writing (although this could be a contributing factor...), but because there was so much to be absorbed that it is almost impossible to share it within the limits of a few paragraphs. This report will only display a glimpse of the wonderful experience that was Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand Young Shakespeare Company 2014.

A very minimal amount of sleeping occurred on the night of the third of July. There's something about knowing that you're going to embark on a once-in-alifetime journey the next day that gives you a dose of insomnia. To fill up the hours I spent awake in my bed, I re-read Julius Caesar, and I pictured YSC members uttering the words from the text on the Globe stage. The thought of a bunch of kids from little old New Zealand killing Caesar and liberating Rome from tyranny, whilst also bringing civil war to the nation, was very exciting to me. I was also very excited about gaining a deeper appreciation for aspects of Shakespeare that I did not have much particular interest in earlier, such as the historical context, and also seeing myself and others, develop skills in a way we have never done before. Needless to say, excitement isn't the best of feelings when you're trying to get some "shut-eye."

The Fourth of July had arrived and whilst Americans were celebrating their independence (or would be in twelve hours due to time zone differences), I was traveling on a plane to Hong Kong, about to begin my life-changing journey. I am sure the other passengers on the plane found the ecstatic vibe our group brought intriguing or, most likely, annoying. The natural response to being selected for an event like ours





is to show a copious amount of joy and our laughter definitely displayed that on the plane. I couldn't help but smile when I caught glimpses of shining teeth amongst my family for the next two weeks. Knowing that I would be sharing this experience with them was something special and would prove to be a highlight

Hong Kong definitely "brought the heat" and proved to us that we can be completely drenched from perspiration in less than ten minutes. It was definitely a challenge we had to overcome and simply had to deal with, but the culturally fascinating experience of being in Hong Kong took away any concern we had with the temperature. Exploring the vibrant night markets was enchanting. Being able to purchase cheap goods and organic fruits, some of which I had never seen before, was an opportunity that I am sure many of us exploited. After a night of attempting to sleep in hot weather, we went on a tour of Hong Kong Island which took us to the top of Victoria Peak and to Aberdeen Harbour. We ended the day with a very filling meal at a local restaurant that offered a range of dishes. At the airport, we said goodbye to our lovely host in Hong Kong with a powerful haka that brought those surrounding us to a standstill, and we boarded the plane for the real beginning of our journey.

Upon arrival in the UK, we were welcomed with a small tour of the city we would be staying in for the next two weeks and were treated to a viewing of Antony and Cleopatra on the Globe stage. You would think a twelve hour flight would completely drain the energy out of all of us but as we walked into Shakespeare's Globe for the first time, we were all hit with a surreal feeling that only a space like the Globe could give. As the actors

entered the stage and began the production with a beautifully choreographed dance sequence, I found myself smiling and stuck in a dream-like gaze. Not only was I enthralled by the fact that I was watching a show on the Globe stage but I couldn't believe that the play was actually that good; within the first five minutes! The rest of the play did not disappoint and it was as if I was not jet-lagged at all (which, of course, I was). The interactivity of the actors and the audience response, supported by some tour-de-force performances, exceeded my expectations (which were already pretty high) and I was absolutely thrilled knowing that this was an indication of what the next two weeks would be like.

Needless to say, the next two weeks became the best few days of my year, if not my life! It is only now, as I reflect, that I realise how much of an absolute privilege those two weeks were, as many of the things we were offered are things not many others will be able to experience, especially in the small timeframe that we had. There was no day where there was nothing to do and each day brought a fresh dose of something new for us to enjoy.

The workshops, some of which had tours integrated into them, were highly appreciated by everyone and we ensured that we absorbed as much information as we could. From the lovely Glynn MacDonald's Movement workshops to Patrick Spottiswoode's passionate Remember Me session, every moment with these highly enthusiastic and informative people was not to be taken for granted. Before the trip had begun, I was looking forward to the practical workshops such as voice, movement and stage combat. What I expected of these workshops was surpassed by far as our tutors gave us exercises that at first seemed completely radical to most of us, but all made perfect sense in the end. I remember our voice tutor, Alex Bingley, making us deliver pieces of text from our scene while placing us in absurd positions - like making us push against a wall or clench our teeth. It seemed weird at first, but once we tried it we began to realise how these exercises revealed to us aspects of our voice that we had never really learned to explore before. Similarly with the other practical workshops, we were given techniques to use that really helped us improve our performance in ways that many of us never knew we could. Initially, I was not sure how I would respond to the more theoretical sessions, such as the ones about history or architecture, as it was an area of Shakespeare that I did not have much interest in, not because I found it boring, but because I had never really had much experience with it apart from the National Shakespeare School's Production. However, my attitude was completely changed after YSC. Being in London itself definitely made these sessions much more interesting. Patrick's Remember Me session involved us finding our way through London to find images of Shakespeare around the city, such as portraits, busts or monuments, and noting what aspect of Shakespeare's image they represented. The Heaven to Hell tour involved us having a detailed look at almost every area of the Globe. The text workshop with Giles Block opened my eyes to how much really is in the text and this helped me to have a better grasp of delivering the text so that the message is portrayed. These theory sessions helped me to understand how much the history and the context contributes to Shakespeare's works and how having better knowledge of them is essential for providing better performance in the Bard's plays.

Possibly one of the biggest highlights for me were the productions we were fortunate enough to view. I have never been able to see so many plays within the space of a few weeks of such a high quality! The gory production of Titus Andronicus was, to me, more than just a viewing of a play, but an experience. Standing as one of the groundlings gave us a perspective of the play that changed it from being just a show to something way beyond that. Having the Goth slaves dragged through the crowd in chains as we stood right in front of them and getting splattered in blood as Aaron the Moor stabbed a nurse in the backside, made me completely forget that I was standing on concrete for three hours! It was absolutely amazing! I mean, how many productions can claim to be able to make

four audience members faint in less than ten minutes! Watching Julius Caesar was not only entertaining but also very helpful as it was the play we were to perform on the stage and it was good to see how the actors in this production used the space. I also managed to watch The Lion King on our free day; a show I'd been wanting to see for a very, very long time! I couldn't help but sing along when the villainous Scar voiced his anthem "Be Prepared" and my feet were tapping along as Simba sang about how he just "couldn't wait to be

In Stratford we watched two of the Royal Shakespeare Company's shows - Two Gentleman of Verona and a modern version of a play named Arden of Faversham. Both were entertaining and light-hearted, providing a much-needed contrast to the dark plays we viewed in London. However, my personal favourite out of the ones we watched, was the Greek tragedy Medea which we saw at the National Theatre in London. I was literally left with my mouth wide open and with a tear rolling down my cheek after the play's climatic end. Very strong performances, the use of frantic dance choreography to represent Medea's conflicted nature, the contemporary design and the blend of electronic music and classical instruments provided me, and the others, with a show which will forever remain imprinted in my mind. It was an absolute pleasure to watch!

Of course, there was our preparation for a performance on the Globe stage. I am still in awe of how we managed to put together an hour long performance of Julius Caesar in the space of two weeks when only a few days of those weeks were actually used for rehearsal. We were all very excited to get started on the project and restlessness definitely showed in one of our rehearsals where our director, Tim Walker, gave us a stern lecture on the reason why we were here and that we should not lose focus. It gave us a much needed reminder about the fact that we had been given an incredible privilege to have this opportunity and that it was not a time for us to muck around but to utilise our potential to the fullest. By the next rehearsal we had all 'stepped up' our game and I was left in awe as I watched fellow YSC members bring some very convincing performances to the table. It seems so surreal that we managed to develop our characters to such a level within the short time frame we had.

We have a lot of people to thank for that though. Joe Atkins' singing workshops were helpful but also very efficient and without him, our singing for the play would not have been as good as it ended up being. The workshops we had, particularly Alex Bingley's voice and Glynn MacDonald's movement workshops, also contributed to us being able to put on stronger performances. Of course, the helpful direction of Tim, whom we were very fortunate to have, played a major role in getting us up to par so that by the time we performed on "that stage" to our friends and family at 11:15pm on Thursday the 17th of July, we had the energy and the passion to give it our all.

From hearing "Et tu Brute", to witnessing the "Friends, Romans, Countryman" speech, to delivering my own monologue as Brutus; every moment of that play was performed with passion. That passion escalated even further when we performed our 'Haka' on the Globe stage and left our mark as New Zealand performers. I look back at all of this now and it was a performance to be proud of and to cherish forever.

Our final few days were spent in Stratford-upon-Avon after our intense time in London. There we were able to watch some shows at the RSC, have some tours that took us to Shakespeare's birthplace, burial place, Anne Hathaway's cottage and Warwick Castle, and we simply had time to cherish our last days together before we all returned to reality. My gratitude must be sent to the hosts at our guest houses who provided us with accommodation and some lovely meals.

Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand Young Shakespeare Company 2014 was the most special opportunity I have ever been granted and I have many people whom I have to thank for making it all possible. First of all, I must thank Graham and Su Conlon for putting up with us for those two weeks. It can't be easy supervising twenty-four teenagers but I must say you did an absolutely incredible job and I have nothing but appreciation for the compassion and care you provided us with. I think I speak for the whole team when I say you became like a mother and father figure to us for the time we were away from our own families and we could not have survived the trip without your guidance. Thank you very much!

Thank you to Kerry Maher who chased us all up for documentation and helped us with all the travel organisation, making it possible (and legal) for us to travel all the way to the UK. I must also extend my gratitude to the number of groups and individuals who provided me with financial assistance to enable me to embark on this adventure. The fact that you were more than willing to help a young boy chase his dream means an incredible amount to me and I am deeply humbled by your support. So thank you to: the Francis Douglas Memorial College Leadership Team, Rotary Club of New Plymouth West, Ida Gaskin and the Shakespeare Society of New Plymouth, North Taranaki Community Arts' Council, New Plymouth Pakeke Lions' Club, Bryna O'Brien and Boosted, and the Rotary Club of Waitara.

I would also like to thank my friends and family for continuously supporting me in my endeavours and









allowing me to reach my goals. You are my rock and without your constant support I would not have been able to make it this far. A big thank you must also go to Mrs Pascale Joines, my wonderful teacher who saw the potential in me and got me to play Mercutio for Sheilah Winn in 2011. Thank you for believing in me and for helping me to grow into a stronger performer. You have inspired me to continue doing what I love and to continue doing my best.

Dawn Sanders and the Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand deserve more than just my gratitude. It goes without saying that if SGCNZ did not exist, all of this would not be possible. Every year you give young people like me the ability to shape their dreams and to learn more about themselves not only as performers but as individuals. The work you do for us is inspiring and many young people in New Zealand owe you a lot. Thank you for everything. Last but not least, I must thank the twenty-three other beautiful members of the Young Shakespeare Company 2014. I could not ask for a better group of people to spend those weeks with. From the breakfast banter at Bankside Hostel to acoustic guitar accompanied singing sessions on the bus, every moment with you was special. Amongst the good times, there were also some very challenging days in which many of us felt the effects of the pressure and stress. Because of the supportive nature of the team and our care for one another, we were able to pull through and no one was left to struggle on our own. I love every single one of you and I hope to be able see, or even work with some of you in the future.

CAREERS

The Careers and Guidance Department continues to embrace new initiatives, such as Skills Squad - Build a Bach, Trades Academy-both at WITT in a variety of areas, and at Taratahi in Agriculture - along with Vocational Pathways, and continues to offer opportunities for Careers Counselling, Year 10 Modules, STAR, Gateway, Career Pathways, Correspondence and Distance Learning.

Over the years the work of careers staff in the school has increased dramatically as political attention has turned towards ensuring that all school leavers are continuing on to further training, education or employment and more recently to viewing NCEA Level 2 as a minimum qualification. There is a greater awareness now that nationwide only 30 percent of students continue on an academic pathway to University and that the educational needs of the 70 percent majority may need to be better addressed at senior secondary school level in collaboration with other educational providers and industry. The demands of the national labour market for skilled tradespeople are being heard.

This year Careers and Guidance underwent an external review of Careers Advice, Careers Guidance, Careers Pathway Planning and Careers Education (CIAGE) across the whole school. Thus, the Careers Department will increase in staff with the intention to offer a more effective service to our students.

As in past years senior Maori students have participated in Incubator - now renamed Why Ora, a programme facilitated by the Taranaki District Health Board. This programme encourages students to look at the wide and varied opportunities in the health sector.

Years 9 and 10 Maori students also had the opportunity to visit BEAMS (Business, Engineering, Architecture, Mathematics and Science) at the University of Auckland while another group spent a great day at Auckland University of Technology (AUT) looking at a wide range of career opportunities.

Year 10 modules looked at the interactive career tools available at www.careers.govt.nz and also had a range of speakers from 'Futureintech'.

As per other years we had a range of visitors from the Universities, Combined Armed Forces, Agriculture, Industry Training Organisations. Senior students also attended an Agriculture and Engineering breakfast.

STAR

(Secondary Tertiary Alignment Resources) enabled many students to do non-conventional courses from distance learning to hands-on cooking and automotive skills at FEATS, carpentry at G & H Training, an introduction to audio engineering at 'King Street









Studios', scuba diving at 'Dive HQ', forklift driving at 'AB Equipment' and chainsaw use at 'Tree Machine'. We also ran short introductory STAR courses for Years 9 and 10 in Hospitality and Automotive.

We had a number of students attend the Trades Academy one day per week at WITT in welding, engineering, automotive, electrical, hospitality, front of house, and at Taratahi (Primary Industries - Agriculture). Another new initiative undertaken by the Taranaki Futures Education Consortium was the Skills Squad - Build a Bach. Three of our students achieved great success in this fulltime contextual learning experience.

The new Vocational Pathways provides a challenge so students can develop a career map and plan what they may need to study to meet their goal and move on to further study or the workforce. The following are the six Vocational Pathways:

Construction and Infrastructure Manufacturing and Technology The Primary Industries The Service Industries Social and Community Services Creative Industries

These Pathways will be reported on via NZQA next year and students will have an opportunity to get NCEA endorsed in a Pathway.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Special Education Department at Francis Douglas Memorial College continued to provide assistance and adapt programmes / learning environments to support students with different special educational needs in 2014.

The Department strived to include all students to enable them to access the curriculum in a range of settings, as required by the Ministry of Education. Inclusion means valuing all students in all aspects of school life and removing barriers to presence, participation, and achievement.

The Department sought to recognise and affirm students' identities, languages and abilities while addressing their learning/behavioural needs and emphasizing high expectations and resulting outcomes for each student according to individual differences.

This was consistent with the School Wide Goal, "that all teachers at FDMC are effectively engaged in reflective inquiry in order to improve their teaching and learning and therefore the learning of the students."

The Departmental Goal that followed was "that the Special Education Department supports departmental personnel to meet the various needs of the students on

CORRESPONDENCE AND DISTANCE LEARNING

Throughout 2014 there were 34 Years 10 - 13 students enrolled as dual students at 'Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu' (The Correspondence School) as well as 16 Years 12 -13 students undertaking Distance Learning. The latter used Unit Standards sourced from Travel Careers and Training (Tourism), the Waikato Institute of Leisure and Sport Studies (Sport Management), The Open Polytechnic (Electrical) and The Southern Institute of Technology (Healthcare). All of these students had timetabled periods each day throughout the school year, for their chosen subject. Year 10's had three periods per week, Year 11's four periods per week and Years 12 -13 five periods per week.

Being able to enrol our students at 'Te Kura' enables them to study/continue to study subjects not available to them at the College. This is particularly important when it is a subject they may need to follow their chosen career pathway. This year the subjects studied were as varied as previous years: Classical Studies, Digital Technology, Music, Chemistry, Physics, Economics, Accounting, Spanish, Japanese and French. We

the 2014 Special Needs Register." In order to achieve the above mentioned goals:

- The ORS funded students received the highest level of support according to funding received specifically to address their individual student needs
- A number of students received funding for Behaviour Teacher Aide hours provided by the Ministry of Education, Special Education or RTLB Cluster. They were minded during morning interval and lunch and/or given Teacher Aide support in class according to the funding received.
- Two students were enrolled in Te Kura, the Correspondence school, in order to adapt the curriculum to their individual needs in Mathematics and English.
- Literacy Instruction was provided to students mainly in Years 7 and 9 in consultation with the English and Intermediate Departments who identified students with reading difficulties.
- The Special Education staff received professional development to support students with specific learning difficulties in class.
- Resources (books & 2 new iPads) were acquired for use in the Literacy class, Benilde class, for the ORS students and English Language Learners.
- Application was made for Special Assessment Conditions (SACs) for students who qualified for them and the students were provided with the SACs during assessment.
- Teacher aide assistance was provided for students struggling in English in Years 9 - 13, Mathematics Years 7 - 11 and Science in Year 11. This year Teacher Aide assistance was also provided in the Years 12/13 Gateway/Star class.
- Students in Year 10 with dyslexia were referred to independent assessors for assessment to support their application to NZQA for Special Assessment Conditions in 2015.
- English Language Learners (ELLs) were provided with English language instruction, regular assessment on ELLPs (English Language Learning Progressions), subject support, some in-class support if needed, and pastoral care. This was previously referred to as English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL).

The team of competent teacher aides, together with the expert personnel from outside agencies, enabled the department to run smoothly to meet the needs of individual students and to help lift the students' achievement. The Special Education Department is pleased to contribute to the Lasallian ethos of the school by 'touching hearts' with the students when supporting their learning, often on a one-to-one basis.

Two International students from our College have participated to date: Yutaka Kunizaki from Japan and Aaron Gao from China. 1ST XI FOOTBALL

2014 was another great season for the Pak 'n Save 1st XI Football team. After finishing 3rd in the Taranaki Premier League in 2013, the team showed their consistency finishing 4th in 2014 with 7 wins, 4 draws and 5 losses.

For the first time, FDMC entered into the Federation Cup to get some experience against teams outside the region. The boys surprised everyone by beating Palmerston North Red Sox 5-0, Napier Port Hill 4-3, then Wanganui City 3-2 to make it to the semi-finals and be the only western club side left in the competition. The boys lost to Napier City Rovers in the semi-final but it was a great cup run.

The team played two National Secondary School Qualifiers against New Plymouth Boys' High School and Palmerston North Boys' High School. 

FDMC finished 7th out of 8 teams.




